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EDITORIALS.

IT is seldom in the history of the university that we are called upon to mourn so untimely a death as that of the late Prof. Harvey. His loss, in the very prime of life, in the midst of his work, becomes a personal bereavement to students and faculty alike. "He was so widely known, so dearly loved by hundreds of the graduates and students of the university and by the people of Maine with whom he had been brought in contact through

his lectures before farmers' institutes, educational meetings and religious conventions that the announcement of his death was received with sincere mourning everywhere."

Prof. Harvey came to the University of Maine in 1887. His previous career had been a highly creditable one and his addition to the faculty was a matter of congratulation to all who were interested in the university. He was made head of the department of natural history and botanist and entomologist of the Maine Experiment Station, in both of which positions he did a vast amount of original and highly creditable work. Prof. Harvey was given the honor of membership in a number of scientific societies as well as honorary degrees from several institutions of learning.

He has written numerous scientific articles, including reports and proceedings of the Maine board of agriculture, state pomological society and the Maine Experiment station. Many articles of special study and research in insect depredations, plant diseases, forestry and botanical subjects have been published by him from time to time.

He was always in demand as a lecturer, for his subjects were well presented and very interesting. In the class room no professor was more popular. Prof. Harvey won the love and esteem of every student who came under his instruction by his kindly consideration of the individual needs of his pupils. He was a born teacher, possessing that personal magnetism so needful in this work and also the power of making the driest subjects entertaining.

In his family life he was an affectionate husband and father, a loyal friend, always ready to aid others in times of affliction, humbly seeking to follow in the footsteps of Him who said "Bear ye one another's burdens."

In his death the faculty and trustees of the university have suffered a great loss. Ever interested in the rapid growth and progress of the institution, he was prominently identified with every step undertaken for its improvement.

Many an unfortunate student, whose name, by reason of some misdeed, has been brought before the faculty for consideration, will have reason to remember with grateful heart the pleadings of Prof Harvey in his behalf, for the sympathy of the professor was ever extended in cases of this kind.

To those nearest and dearest to him we extend heartfelt sympathy in their sudden bereavement.



FOR some time past it has been apparent to those interested in the musical clubs that a change in the present constitution of these organizations should be made. One year ago a constitution and bylaws modelled after that used by the Bowdoin clubs was adopted, but it has not been found satisfactory. The present constitution does not provide for a president. This is a mistake. The duties of a president of such organizations are clearly manifest—to preside over meetings and to look after the welfare and the policy of the clubs.

The manager should be relieved from any responsibility of directing, should have no control over the programme given by the clubs and should have to do with the business of the club only. This work, if properly handled, is sufficient to keep one man constantly employed.

The programme should be under the control of the leaders of the various clubs, each one of whom should be directly responsible for his share in it. In this way better results can be secured.

It is hoped that these changes in the constitution will be made before the end of the year, for it is thought that they will greatly benefit the clubs in years to come.

WE take this opportunity to congratulate Manager Gray upon his good work in behalf of the musical clubs. He has labored long and well and his efforts are greatly appreciated by every member. Few men realize the magnitude of the work or the amount of time necessary to enable the musical clubs to make a successful trip. Mr. Gray has shown good judgment and marked business ability in his work, and we hope that his future work may be equally successful.



THE managers of the 1901 *Prism* inform us that subscriptions from the alumni are coming in very slowly. Not one-fifth of the letters sent to the alumni have been answered. 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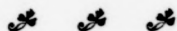
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gymnasium and drill hall. In short it will be an issue which will certainly be of great interest to the alumni.

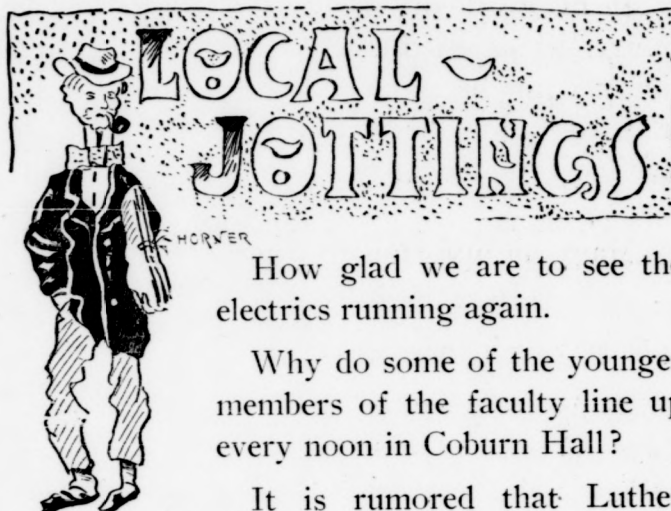

Death of Professor Harvey.

Francis Leroy Harvey, professor of natural history in the University of Maine, committed suicide shortly after 8 o'clock Tuesday morning by shooting himself in the store of Fred H. Walton in Orono. The cause of the act is supposed to have been temporary insanity, resulting from ill health.

It is said that the members of his family feared that, such was his mental and physical condition, he might take his own life. He had even discussed the tragic possibility with his wife and had struggled against it, while family and friends kept anxious watch of his movements.

Prof. Harvey was one of the hardest working members of the faculty of the University of Maine, and for some time he as well as his friends realized that his health was breaking

down but he struggled to stand up under it. The latter part of November he commenced to fail and about Christmas was called to the death bed of his aged mother in Iowa. Her death was a great blow to him and had the effect of breaking him down still more. On the journey to Iowa he contracted a severe cold and that with the grief brought on nervous prostration.

He returned to Orono from Iowa early in January, and attempted to resume his duties at the U. of M., but after two days he gave up with nervous prostration, which passed into melancholy and made him very despondent. He feared that he could never work again as he had in the past, and worried a good deal that his family would suffer without his support. Every effort was made to cheer him and divert his mind to other subjects and a trip to the woods in the northern part of the state with Prof. Hamlin was being planned.

Prof. Harvey was held in the highest esteem by everyone who knew him, and his sad end will cause deep sorrow to very many.

Shortly after the shooting, when the body had been taken to the professor's home, Dr. A. W. Harris, president of the university, Dr. M. C. Fernald, Prof. Estabrooke, Prof. Munson, and other members of the faculty and friends of the family, hastened to the house and tried in every way to comfort the sorrowing family. Mrs. Harvey was nearly prostrated by the affair, but the sons bore the shock with great fortitude.

The funeral was held from his late residence on Forest avenue, Wednesday afternoon at 2 p. m., and was largely attended. The floral tributes were numerous and beautiful.

Professor Harvey's Life Work.

Francis Leroy Harvey was born near Ithaca, in Tompkins county, New York, April 22, 1850, the son of Daniel and Arminda Harvey. His father was a mechanic and in his younger days moved to Iowa where he bought a farm and was one of the pioneer settlers. His early education was received in the public schools in Ithaca. He moved with his parents to Iowa in 1865, and taught fourteen terms in the public schools of that state from 1867 to 1874. He entered the Iowa Agricultural College in 1868 and graduated four years later with the degree of B. S. In 1886 he received the degree of M. S. During his college course he was student assistant in chemistry and took many honors in the natural sciences. He was principal of the graded schools in Iowa in 1873, held the chair of natural sciences in Humboldt College in 1874, from 1875 to 1881 filled the chair of theoretical and applied chemistry in the Arkansas Industrial University, and from 1881 to 1885 the chair of biology, mineralogy and geology in the same institution.

He assumed charge of Dr. A. E. Foote's Natural History Establishment in Philadelphia. In 1887 he became professor of natural history in the University of Maine. Since 1888 he has also been botanist and entomologist to the Maine Agricultural Experiment Station. He received the degree of Ph. D. in 1890 from the Arkansas Industrial University. He was a corresponding member of the Academy of Natural Sciences of Philadelphia, the Torrey Botanical Club of New York, Washington Entomological Society of Portland Natural History Society, and an active member of the American Association of Economic Botanists and Entomologists. He has had instruction from such men of note as Prof. C. E. Bessey, of Lincoln, Neb., author of Bessey's Botany; Prof. George A. Jones, of Cornell University; Prof. A. B. Anthony, formerly of Cornell; Dr. A. E. Foote,

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Professor of Mineralogy; Dr. A. S. Welch, author of Welch's psychology; Dr. Detens, formerly veterinarian for the United States Department of Agriculture; Prof. A. S. Shaler of Harvard; Prof. Wm. M. Davis of Harvard, and Prof. J. S. Diller of the United States Geological Survey. He has discovered about 50 plant forms new to science; has described a number of new insects and algæ and half a dozen plant forms have been named for him by Lesquereux, Peck, Bortt and Gray. He began to write articles for the newspapers as early as 1869 upon popular science and other subjects.

Between 1879 and 1886 about 40 articles were published in various science journals and periodicals of Arkansas. From 1886 to the time of his death nearly 70 articles by Prof. Harvey have appeared, pertaining mostly to the natural history of Maine. Several papers have been read upon educational topics before county and state teachers' organizations. Many lectures have been delivered upon popular science, geology, economic botany and entomology, before granges and state board of agricultural institutes.

Prof. Harvey's parents were in moderate circumstances and he was always obliged to look out for himself. When only 13 he left home to work out summers, while he went to school winters. He worked on dairy farms in New York and grain and stock farms in Iowa, and for two seasons he worked at making brick. He paid all his way through college. He has always taken an interest in the social and moral questions of the day, and especially of the town in which he has resided but has held no political positions.

He was married June 27, 1878, to Addie Lillian Bartle. They have five children, Leroy Harris, Bartle Trott, Willis Lake, Florence Evelyn and Ruth.

Some Characteristics of the Late Prof. Harvey.

I have been asked to give a brief estimate of the character of the late Professor Francis Leroy Harvey. The task is easy. He was generous, faithful, industrious, affectionate. I never knew a man whose heart was tenderer,

whose sympathies were more easily awakened, or who more willingly sacrificed self for those whom he called friends. For such he did not stop to count the cost; he and all that he had were at their command. In this I speak not from report, but from personal experience. But his generosity was wider than his circle of friends. He could not be comfortable while another suffered and it was in his power to bring relief. To this fact many a family in Orono can today bear witness.

Professor Harvey's faithfulness was known to all who knew him. Whatever he did he did thoroughly. It was the quality of thoroughness that made the results of his professional work so valuable. To arrive at the truth of a matter he spared neither time nor labor nor strength. Any conclusion which he reached as the result of his own investigation could be accepted with confidence.

It seems almost superfluous to speak of his industry. He was a tireless worker. He seemed to think there was no limit to the tasks he could impose upon himself, no limit to his strength, giving to toil the hours which should have been given to rest and recreation. The lamp in his study burned while the rest of the world was asleep. He worked till strength was exhausted, till the weary brain could do no more.

Whoever knew Professor Harvey intimately—I say intimately, because it required intimate acquaintance to read his heart—knew how affectionate was his nature. To him wife and child and friend meant all that life was really worth living for. His interests centered in home, and he watched there the development of his children with all a father's love and care. His affectionate nature made him keenly sensitive to criticism. He was one on whom a word of kindly appreciation fell like a blessing. He did not court flattery—he was too manly and sincere for that; but he did covet the good opinion of his fellow men, and if that good opinion were withheld it hurt him sorely.

Finally he was of an essentially religious turn of mind. His faith was simple, but it was deep and abiding. He did not make a parade of his feelings, but sometimes in the confidences of friendship he let us see how pure and warm was the flame that burnt on the altar of his soul.

Maine Scientists in Washington.

In a note a few days since regarding the work of our Maine scientist, Henry Gannett, of the United States geological survey and chief of the national board on geographic names, in his explorations among the mountains of Alaska, we were brought face to face with the fact that among the scientific experts connected with various departments of the government service at Washington, are several natives of our state who have won high distinction for their services to science. Among these may be mentioned the following:

George P. Merrill, head curator of the department of geology in the United States national museum of the Smithsonian Institution, who was born in Auburn and graduated from the University of Maine in 1879. Mr. Merrill has traveled abroad, is the author of authoritative treatises on "Stones for Building and Decorative Purposes;" "Rock-Weathering and the Formation of Soils," together with handbooks to the institution and scientific papers on many subjects. As an authority on the subject of building stones Mr. Merrill occupies a higher position than any other scientist in this country.

Prof. F. Lamson-Scribner, chief of the division of the department of agriculture devoted to grasses, is also a Maine boy, and a graduate of the University of Maine, class of 1873. On occasion of his late visit to this state to inspect certain agricultural advantages of Washington county, a full sketch of Prof. Scribner was published in the Commercial. He has won high honors for his services to economic science, and is the best informed botanist on the history, characteristics and

nutritive qualities of American grasses of any person in the United States, if not in the world. His published writings are numerous, and he is a constant student in the special line of his chosen field.

Arthur M. Farrington, B. S., is a native of Brewer, and a graduate of the University of Maine, class of 1876. Mr. Farrington is one of the younger Maine scientists at Washington, and is chief of one of the divisions of the bureau of animal industry, in connection with the department of agriculture.

There are doubtless many other Maine men connected with the various departments of government in scientific capacities and we should be very glad to see a full and complete list of them. They confer an honor upon our state, upon the institutions where educated, and Maine is proud of them.

At the time this issue went to press, the success of the ninth annual reunion and banquet of the New York Alumni Association seemed assured.
