BASEBALL SCHEDULE

First Game with Colby Tomorrow

With the Colby game close at hand, the interest on the Campus is centering around baseball and Maine's prospect for the coming season. The athletic field is at present in too poor condition for practice, and the squad has been playing on the Kappa Sigma lawn. Before the first home game, however, the baseball diamond is to be harrowed, leveled, and rolled.

The Freshman and Sophomore classes have sent out some valuable material this spring, and it is evident that everyone, even the last year's men, have got to work to make their positions.

In regard to the Colby game at Waterville tomorrow, little can be said; it is an exhibition game and with the advantage on Colby's side, for Colby has already taken one trip and has had outdoor practice for several weeks.

The result of Wednesday's game will in no way foretell Maine's prospects for the season; the game is merely a tryout of candidates. It is impossible to say just what the lineup will be, but Captain Smith will undoubtedly occupy his old position behind the bat while George Bearce will be on first and Cobb on third. The question of who will pitch will be settled entirely by the conditions met at Waterville. Wentworth, Fulton and Richards will accompany the team; one of them may occupy the box the entire game, or all three may try their hand.

The real prospects for the season will be measured to some extent by the Massachusetts trip. The games with Harvard, Rhode Island State College, and Boston University will enable Coach Wingard to pick out the faults of the team and remedy them in time for the state games.

APRIL ATHLETIC BOARD MEETING

Medals for Interscholastic Meet—Baseball Suits

The regular April meeting of the Athletic Board was held on April 11, and several matters pertaining to spring athletics, and the organization of the University Store were discussed. The track manager reported that a suitable silver cup and a large silver medal had been presented to the association for use in connection with the interscholastic meet, the cup to become the property of that school first winning the annual meet three times, and the medal to be presented to that school winning the highest number of points this year. The board also limited the number of men to be taken to the Vermont Meet to ten on account of the length and heavy expenses of the trip.

The board also decided definitely upon the style of the new baseball suits to be worn by the team this spring. They are to be white with blue trimmings. The baseball shirts are to have short sleeves and the word, Maine, running vertically down the middle of the front. A sample of this style has already been made up, and its uniqueness and splendid appearance is very complimentary to the taste of the committee in charge. The board is planning also to have a new system of giving out athletic suits and supplies next year. The idea is to take such matters almost entirely out of the hands of the managers of the several teams, and have one man order, issue, and keep account of all supplies. The matter has not been definitely arranged as yet, and was left in the hands of Director Wingard.

On account of the presiding need that the association has for funds to finance the spring athletics, the Athletic Board voted to allow 10% discount on all athletic dues paid before May 15 in hopes of getting the dues in earlier than in previous years. It was also urged that everything possible be done to impress upon the members of the association that their dues should be paid at once.

Director Wingard reported that the directors for the University Store Corporation had been elected, and that the plans for the management of the store were fast maturing.

A special vesper service will be held in the Chapel next Sunday afternoon at the regular time of three o'clock. The speaker will be Rev. L. O. Hartman, Ph. D., who has charge of the Sunday-school work in the Methodist Episcopal church in Ohio. He is to be in attendance at the Methodist Conference this week in Oldtown.

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SOPHOMORE HOP

Plans Well Under Way—Invitations Out a Week Ago

FOOTBALL SCHEDULE

Eight Games—Vermont Game Here to be Feature

Manager Philip R. Hussey announced the football schedule for next fall last week. He has completed the list of eight games and in doing so at this date has accomplished something that few managers have been able to do in recent years.

The principal games will be as usual the three State contests for the championship, but a feature will be made of one other games, that with Vermont on Oct. 21 at Alumni Field. It will be played the week before the State series opens and on account of the rivalry that has been kindled between Vermont and Maine by the baseball games and track meets in which their teams have come together, this game, the first to be played with Vermont here, will arouse a great deal of interest. Last Fall Maine went to Burlington early in the season and played a 0-0 game. Vermont accredited herself well against some of the strongest elevens in the country later and for the last few years she has had very good teams.

Out of the eight games six will be played here, so that Maine men will have an unparalleled opportunity to see their team play. The game with Tufts on Oct. 14 will take place at Medford and the Bowdoin game will be played at Brunswick. The schedule will open with Fort McKinley on Sept. 23. This will be played after the men have had a week of practice, as they will report about the 15th.

Mr. Wingard will probably have charge of the squad as head coach as he did last year with Mr. Reilly of Michigan as his assistant. They both worked hard last Fall and succeeded in turning out a strong team, and with their knowledge of the conditions here and with the material at hand they should meet with fully as much success next year. Seven of the first-string men of this year's eleven will be left, Bearce, Smith, and Buck being the only men to graduate, although Eales has left the University. The backfield will be intact with the exception of quarterback's position, and in the line there will be Bigelow, Cook, McNeil, and Crowell.

Bids for printing baseball score cards will be received by the undersigned committee until April 25th when the contracts will be awarded. The bids are competitive and the person offering the best inducement to the Athletic Association will receive the award.

EDITORIAL.

Sometime last Fall each class in the University voted almost unanimously to assess their members a dollar apiece as a contribution to the fund for repairing Alumni Field. **Eighty Freshmen** Four months have passed since then during which the students might have redeemed their pledges—four months in which to set aside one dollar out of the many each has spent—and still one hundred and forty men out of a student body of five hundred and fifty have failed to make payment or even to mention the matter to the athletic authorities.

This means that slightly more than twenty-five per cent of the undergraduates have probably not given the subject a single thought since they cast their votes. The bulk of the blame for such

a large proportion, however, cannot be placed upon the three upper classes, for more than half of the one hundred and forty delinquents are Freshmen. Eighty in a class of one hundred and fifty Freshmen have failed to "come to scratch"—a remarkably and unusually poor response. For although it may be expected that the support of the Freshman class for athletics will be less than that given by the upperclassmen, probably never in the history of the Athletic Association has a Freshman class failed so ignominiously to carry out a pledge which, made most likely with few if any dissenting votes, was really the individual pledge of each member.

After endeavoring all Winter to collect these assessments to meet the numerous bills for supplies and labor which will be contracted during the Spring and Summer, the class treasurers and the athletic authorities are for the first time bringing the matter publicly to the attention of the students. The Athletic Board does not wish to urge payments from men who are actually unable to make them, and it even goes so far as to offer any such men the opportunity to work out their assessment in labor upon the field. It is probably true, however, that there is not one man in the entire student body who could be relieved from his pledge upon such grounds, and it is not at all unlikely that those who are going through the year on the smallest allowances have long ago made their contributions.

While this lack of interest on the part of some men is more or less common to all student bodies and to this student body regarding other subscriptions, the circumstances under which the classes voted this assessment make their failure to respond to the call a particular stigma upon their reputation as loyal Maine men. In view of the meagreness of the individual contributions voted, the specific purpose for which they are to be made, and the popularity of the cause, it is indeed strange that the Freshmen, and the upperclassmen as well, have neglected payment. It is not a characteristic of Maine men, however, to pledge their support to anything heedlessly with no intention of carrying it out, and it is to be hoped that every man in the University who has not yet fulfilled his pledge will take it upon him-

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In offering a cup to the varsity athlete who makes the greatest improvement in scholarship each year Mr. Wingard is manifest-
The Wingard Cup ing in a material and, as it promises to be, a very beneficial way his personal interest in Maine's athletic success. It is of course necessary that the men on the teams representing any institution of good standing should meet certain scholarship requirements, and Mr. Wingard has chosen the most appropriate means of keeping Maine's athletes eligible in thus stimulating an interest in their studies.

The attention which will be attracted to the athlete successful both in gaining his M and in winning the cup will place a value upon the trophy that will increase as years go on. It will indeed be a great honor for any man to receive the cup and at the same time to have devoted as much of his time to athletics as is necessary to train for a varsity team and win his letter.

For the first time in several years the schedule of football games has been announced some time in advance of the opening of the season. In thus completing the arrangements for the contests of next Fall Manager Hussey has shown what diligence in a manager's position may achieve. The needlessness of delaying the completion of a schedule until some of the games have already been played is well demonstrated, and it can no longer be said that the system under which a manager works is at fault. The success of the football management in the matter this year can well serve as an example to all future managers.

Again comes the news of a well-attended and enthusiastic gathering of Maine Alumni. This time it was in New York, and President Aley brought back a glowing report of the interest of the large number of graduates living there in everything that concerns the University. The success of this banquet adds one more to the proofs that the loyalty of Maine men does not diminish

when they leave the scene of their college career, and that back of the undergraduates and the Faculty in making Maine a greater and better institution are many large groups of prosperous and influential men to whom the name of their Alma Mater is as dear now as it ever was.

While the amount of water and mud on the walks about the Campus during the past week or two has made them at times impassable, this has to a great extent disappeared, and there is no longer good reason for the life of the grass and the appearance of our lawns later in the season to be endangered by the heel-prints of the students.

STORE CORPORATION

Directors Named—President Aley President of Board

At a joint meeting of the Athletic Board and the promoters of the College Store corporation during the recess the five directors of the corporation were elected. Dr. Aley was chosen president, Freeland Jones, '00, secretary and treasurer, and the other three are H. B. Buck, '93, C. W. Mullen, '83, and Director E. R. Wingard. Frank Oak, the assistant treasurer of the University, was elected clerk of the corporation.

The directors are to serve for one year from June 1st, 1911. Their successors will be appointed by the President.

A capital of \$10,000 is the financial backing of the corporation. Of this amount \$8,000 in preferred stock is in the hands of the Alumni and the students. Common stock to the amount of \$2,000 is held by the Athletic Association. The Athletic Board decided to put the voting power of the Association in the hands of President Aley. Outside of the stock taken by the Alumni about \$1500 has been pledged by the students themselves. It is undoubted that, through the interest the students will take in the corporation on account of both their spirit and the personal advantages they will receive, all or nearly all the preferred stock will be taken up before the close of the semester.

The editor of the Cornell newspaper has petitioned the faculty to be excused from his examinations, as he has a lot of work to do in the dull season to get news together.

COMMENCEMENT

Plans for the Week Well Under Way

Although the plans for Commencement have not been completed, they are well under way and will soon be finished. The program for the week is essentially the same as last year with the exception of the Convocation Services which will be omitted. As yet, nothing has been decided upon to take the place of these but some arrangement will be made.

The Commencement Week Exercises will open with the Baccalaureate Sermon on Sunday, June 11. Monday and Tuesday will be devoted to Class Day Exercises, reunions, meetings of Alumni and Trustees, Phi Kappa Phi Initiation, lunches and receptions by the President and fraternities. On Wednesday, the Commencement exercises will be held in the morning in Chapel and will be followed by the Commencement Dinner. The program will be concluded on Wednesday night by the Class of 1911 Reception and Dance in Alumni Hall.

FARMING SPECIAL

To be Sent Into Aroostook County—Extensions over Last Year

It has been definitely settled that a "farming special" train will be run through Aroostook County sometime during the Spring or early Summer. This arrangement is made possible through the co-operation of the Maine Department of Agriculture, the College of Agriculture, and the Bangor and Aroostook railroad. This matter has been under advisement between the College of Agriculture and the Department of Agriculture for some little time. It has been the feeling that a farming special would be of material assistance to the agriculture of Aroostook County and stimulate an interest in more diversified agricultural practice.

At a conference recently held between Mr. Todd general manager of the railroad, the Commissioner of Agriculture, and a representative of the College of Agriculture, Mr. Todd said that the Bangor & Aroostook railroad was vitally interested in the prosperity of the Aroostook farmers and was only too glad to co-operate in this manner, and would furnish a train and bear all necessary expenses incidental thereto. The Department of Agriculture and the College will co-operate in furnishing material for exhibits and instructors to accompany the train. It is planned to devote one car to live stock in which

there shall be an exhibit of representatives of the different dairy breeds. Other kinds of live stock will undoubtedly be shown on the train. Seed improvement will also be made one of the educational features of the trip.

It is expected that it will require at least a week to cover the entire County. The exact date on which the train will be started is now under advisement, and together with the itinerary of the trip will be announced at an early date.

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HONOR POINT SYSTEM

Being Revised and Will be Submitted to Student Body Soon

To meet the many changes that have occurred in the number of student offices during the past two years a committee of the University Council has been at work revising the list and working up a system for enforcing the regulations. They have also added a list of honors that do not carry points but which if approved will serve as a guide to editors of the *Prism*.

They have about completed the work and the matter will be submitted to the student body in the near future. The rules and the list of points are as follows:

1. The maximum number of points carried by one student at one time shall not exceed 11, and any deviation shall be referred to the Student Council.

2. This system of the division of college activities shall be under the supervision of the Student Council, understanding that no subsequent changes shall be made by that body without the consent of the Student Body.

3. This schedule shall take the place of that one accepted in the Spring Semester of 1909 by the Student Body, shall go into effect at the beginning of the Fall Semester, 1911, and shall not conflict with any elections made prior to that time.

4. The presidents of the four classes shall notify the secretary of the Student Council of all nominations that count points.

The secretary of the Athletic Association shall do the same. The secretary of the Council shall look up the record of such nominees and shall make reports to the respective organizations. In case an election will carry a nominee over the maximum number of points allowed, he shall not be eligible for election except by permission of the Council.

M. I. A. A. MEET.

Plans for State Meet—Officials Appointed.

A special meeting of the Executive Committee of the M. I. A. A., of Maine which is a member, was held at the Penobscot Exchange in Bangor on Saturday afternoon, April 15. A great deal of the meeting was taken up with a thorough revision of the constitution, by-laws, and rules for running the annual field meeting. The latter rules were changed to agree almost exactly with the corresponding rules of the New England I. A. A.

The many details of arrangement for the annual field and track meet of the association to be held at Waterville on May 13 were also taken

up. The major officials of the meet were approved as follows: Referee, Eugene Buckley, Boston; Clerk of Course, A. S. Macreadie, Portland; Starter, H. C. McGrath, Charlesbank Gymnasium, Boston. The following were named from the University of Maine to act as officials: Prof. A. L. Grover, E. A. Parker of Skowhegan, and M. R. Sumner, '11. The University is entitled to two more representatives on the official staff, and they will be named later.
