Commencement Week this year will without doubt be the greatest in the history of the institution. It will mark the anniversary of several important events connected with the welfare of the institution; the fiftieth anniversary of the Land Grant Bill will occur at this time, the twentieth anniversary of the Hatch Act, the fortieth anniversary of the first graduating class, and the fifteenth anniversary of the changing of the name of this institution from the Maine State College to the University of Maine.

TRACK PROSPECTS

Coach Smith's Opinion

An inquiry directed to Coach Smith soliciting his opinion for the prospects for the track team this season received the following reply:

"To state frankly just what I think of our chances to again win the Maine Intercollegiate Track Championship is a task that is not without its limitations. I feel quite confident that I could name the number of points that we will secure in this meet to within a few points of the final score, but anybody who indulges in foolishness of that kind is better off if he uses the energy and mental exertion involved in doing something which can possibly be of some value to himself.

"Nobody can exactly foretell the result of this meet although it does not take a genius to see that both Colby and Bates are considerably better supplied with possible point winners than Bowdoin or Maine. All important meets where competition is keen are decided to a great extent by luck, weather conditions, and the actual physical condition of the competitors on the day of the meet. The fact that a man won points last year is certainly a reasonable excuse to believe that he will do so again this year, but men have lost fortunes on horses just because they insist on following this theory. The fact that it sounds like a reasonable conclusion is just the reason why they year in and year out continue to drop thousands of dollars. Men, like horses, are subject to all sorts of conditions, and one is just about as inconsistent as the other. The fact that either the animal or the man has run a previous race is not sufficient reason to concede that he will do so again. The weather may not be of the sort that is best adapted to him or he may have hard luck, or his physical condition may not be as good as it was when he did win. On top of all this, even though the conditions are favorable to him and he runs on the day that you

need him better than ever before, there is always the chance of somebody just a shade better coming along and "nosing him out." So while theoretically it is generally reasonable to expect a man to repeat if not better his last year's performance, it is an established fact that this theory is not reliable. For this reason there is a great doubt as to whether our last year's point winners who are still in college will repeat at Brunswick in May. Even should they all repeat we will have but 24 points, which, needless to say, will be much below the required number to win. In order to win, therefore, those men who are mainly responsible for last year's victory must do more than repeat—in fact they must almost double their last year's efforts. Our new men are very inexperienced and while we hope for them to do something, we are not expecting a great deal from them. The important question with them is whether or not they will possess the required degree of confidence, determination, and general spirit. Many points are lost simply through a lack of confidence on the part of an athlete, and it is to be hoped that this element will not bother us at Brunswick.

"Just recently a member of the track squad told me that he was not so much interested in the State Meet as he was in the New England Meet. Can you best that? I was so surprised that by the time I had thought out an appropriate reply to his remark, he was two blocks away from me. On all athletic teams I have always found "easy ones" and "hard ones" but this fellow was of a kind that is new to me. I have recently told him not to worry over the New England Meet as I had decided to use him in the State Meet only. Perhaps now he is doing all of his worrying over the Olympic games—anything rather than the object of all our efforts, the State Meet. A few more like this lad together with the inexperienced ones is enough to keep a man busy thinking about something else besides the number of points we will win.

"It is just such elements within our midst that makes our task all the harder. It is a condition that must be downed. I am quite confident that we are pulling and will all continue to pull together, and further that if we win it will be because of Maine's superior spirit. If we lose it will not be because we have not tried hard. Even in our losing our name will be clear of disgrace and those who are associated with us need not feel ashamed of their team."

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UNIVERSITY MUSICAL CLUBS CONCERT**End of Very Successful Season**

The University Musical Clubs gave their last concert of the season before a good sized and enthusiastic audience in the Bangor City Hall, Tuesday evening, April 16. The audience was particularly well pleased with the varied programs rendered by the clubs, each of these and the reader Mr. Thurrell, being liberally encored.

After the concert, Pullen's Orchestra of Bangor took the stage, and in their usual pleasing manner furnished music for the dance which followed. Dancing was enjoyed until mid-night; a special car leaving Bangor at 12.30 P. M. conveying members of the clubs and their friends to Orono.

Tuesday evening's concert marked the close of one of the most successful years in the history of the clubs.

At the beginning of the year, the outlook for a successful musical organization seemed somewhat doubtful but the development of talented material largely from the freshman class, hard work by the clubs as a unit, and the painstaking training by Prof. G. W. Thompson have produced an organization which compares favorably with any of its kind in the larger institutions. During the season, the clubs have given eight pleasing entertainments, five on the Massachusetts trip, and three locally. The combined musical clubs may feel gratified on the creditable showing which they have made both as a musical association and as a representative of the University.

JUNIOR WEEK

EDITORIAL.

This issue of the CAMPUS is the last to be published by the management for the year 1911-12. The election of the new editors and managers will occur on Wednesday evening of this week. The present editor wishes to acknowledge with thanks the services of Mr. Garland as Alumni Editor, and both Mr. Wallace and Mr. Ames as Managing Editor, which have been most efficient and willing in every particular. The entire editorial board which has been composed of a few juniors and many sophomores have done remarkably well, their work as a whole being at all times for the best interests of the paper. Both the editorial and managing boards of the paper owe thanks to many of the Faculty, Alumni, and students for their interest in the paper and kindness in procuring news.

In severing their connection with the paper, the present management, judging from experience of the past year, feel that changes should be made in the scheme of conducting the publication, to know which may be interesting to the readers of the CAMPUS. In the first place, they feel that the paper should appear more frequently, thereby giving news to students which is not stale, and increasing the space for news, so that accounts may be given in more detail, which would be appreciated highly by the Alumni. They feel that the present size of the student and Alumni bodies is sufficient to warrant a semi-weekly or tri-weekly paper. Under this scheme, the circulation would be materially increased, more interest would be manifest in the publication and more and better advertisements would be forthcoming. They feel, too, that the publication should be handled by some permanent organization which would be able to benefit from the experience of running the paper from year to year. The financing of the paper is a difficult problem at present, as many students seem to feel that the management are reaping too great a reward from their labors, and with such understanding are unwilling to do their part toward the production of the paper. This feeling is entirely erroneous as the financial report of the manager will show, but the lack of support of the student body is making the position of manager a hazardous undertaking. It is felt that the student body would feel differently toward the paper if published by an organization from the welfare of which they would all profit.

If possible the Alumni Column should be made larger and better in every particular. An effort was made this year to do this by writing every active Alumni association of the institution, endeavoring to have some member appointed to turn in news to the paper. Very little news appeared from this source due possibly to the fact that this was the first year of the experiment. The Alumni should remember, however, that deficiencies in their column in the paper are due in many instance to themselves, as the great mass of Alumni news should come from the Alumni themselves.

On the business end of the publication, Mr.

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Mountfort has done remarkably well in a hard year. The Bangor fire is responsible for a marked decrease in the number of advertisements, while the financial support of the student body as a whole has been anything but vigorous.

The prospects for a better publication than ever before for next year are excellent. A number of the present sophomores on the board this year have done work of a quality rarely seen on our University publication, while the sophomores and freshmen, who have been working out for the board this year, have done highly commendable work. The present management retires with the best wishes for the success of the CAMPUS next year and a desire that the coming editors may be able to put out a paper more worthy of our University than ever before.

It is a tradition at the University that Maine men should stand on their feet while the Maine Stein Song is played or sung. During the Massachusetts trip of the musical clubs, at every concert as the strains of the Stein Song rang out at the close of the programme, here and there all over the hall, Maine men rose quietly and joined with the clubs in the song, thereby evidencing their loyalty to the University and their respect for the song that is so dear to the heart of Maine men. There was hardly a newspaper account of the concerts which did not speak favorably of the action of Maine men in this particular. It seems regrettable that Maine men at the Bangor concert should fail to observe the tradition. There within a few miles of the University, itself, with probably a hundred Maine men in attendance, the old song was sung from beginning to end and not a Maine man showed any inclination to vacate his seat. For the time being the members of the musical clubs certainly had a right to feel ashamed of the spirit of Maine men, and the men who were thus negligent should feel ashamed of themselves.

It goes without saying that the interests of every Maine man will be in Massachusetts during the coming week. The CAMPUS wishes luck to that baseball team.

TO THE EDITOR OF THE MAINE CAMPUS:—

A communication in the CAMPUS of April 16 contained this statement: "January first each year the librarian sends these unbound periodicals away to be bound. They remain in the bindery until May or June."

If public criticism of any individual is to be made, it is always safer to be sure of the facts first. In this case, the records show that we sent the binder something over 200 periodicals last August, and a smaller lot in September. These were returned to us in October and November. We sent about 200 more in February, all of which are now on the shelves except such as are temporarily out. Another small lot will go forward this month, and should be back so as to be available for use during the Summer Term.

Our policy of loaning periodicals rather than treating them as reference books may be a matter for legitimate criticism. It is a question concerning which opinions differ among those charged with library administration. Only those able to afford two sets, one for reference and the other for circulation, have settled it satisfactorily. The opinion of a would-be borrower is likely to be influenced by his ability to get what he wants, when, and in the way he wants it, rather than by careful consideration of what is really for the greatest good of the greatest number.

If the communication you published will serve as a reminder to those who are inclined to forget that others may be waiting for volumes with which they are themselves through, it will not have been written in vain.

The ninth lecture of the series of lectures on modern aspects of evolution, was given by Dr. Wallace Craig, of the department of Philosophy and his subject was "Evolution of the Mind." He spoke of the mind as being developed in the same manner as the body, that is, as the body developed the mind developed. The difference between the animal mind and the human mind lies in the fact that the animal has very little reasoning power being guided almost wholly by instinct while the human being reasons things out. Many interesting examples were presented.

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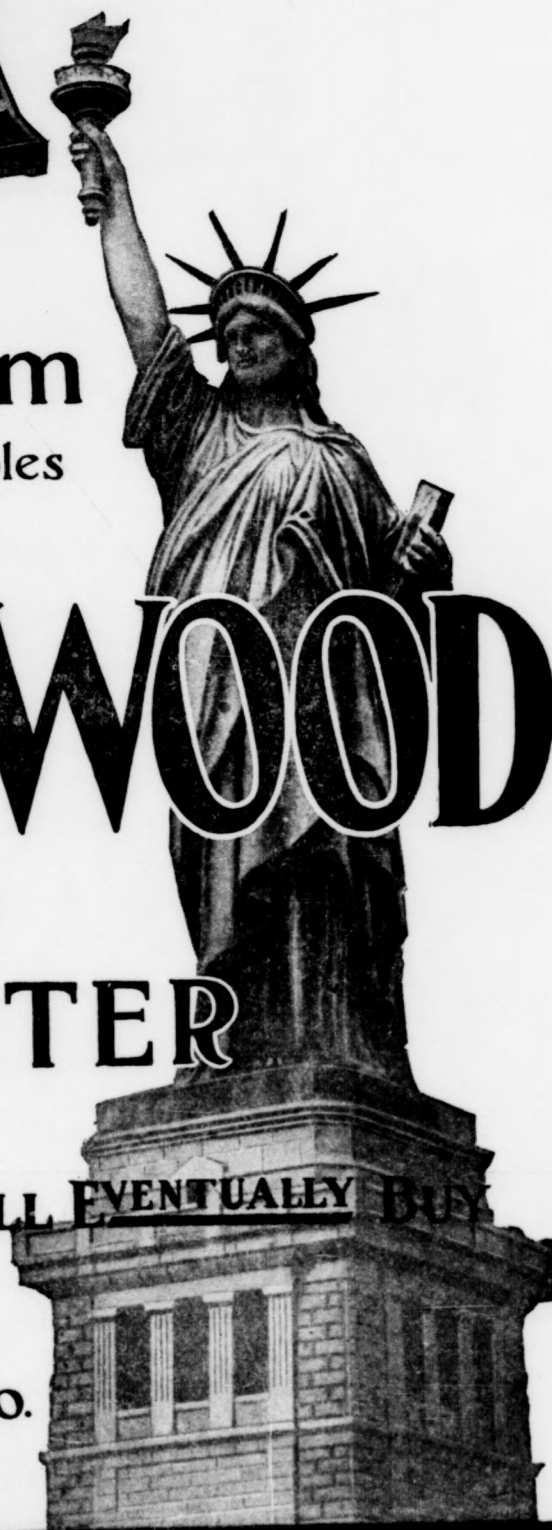
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
