SOPHOMORE HOP

The Affair a Pronounced Success

The Sophomore Hop held on last Friday evening was a pronounced success. Although the night was stormy, a cheerful atmosphere pervaded the gymnasium and everyone enjoyed himself to the limit.

The decorations were a slight departure from former plans, although the general effect of an arch was the same. Strips of green and white bunting about twelve inches in width were interwoven to form a lattice work. This was flat and extended over nearly the whole area, sloping sharply from the sides to the top of the running-track. From there, the ends were draped down over the sides of the track, the idea of a lattice work still being retained. The walls were decorated by the fraternities, with tapestries and banners, while the seats and chairs were piled with sofa pillows. The lights were one of the features of the decorations. Green and white bulbs were intermingled in the arch, each color being attached to a separate switch so that either one or both colors could be used. A small-sized search light was placed in the balcony at the end opposite the entrance which was arranged so that it could produce different colored lights and could be turned in any direction. When the green lights were on and the search light was playing in and out among the dancers, it would have been hard to find a prettier scene.

TWELFTH NIGHT

Production in Bangor Tuesday Night a Great Success

If the dramatic season of the Maine Masque was to end with the production of Twelfth Night in the Bangor Opera House, Tuesday evening, April eighteenth, no better climax to a successful season could be desired. The production on that evening ran very smoothly and was easily the most successful presentation of the season so far. An appreciative audience of 400 people, composed of the best of Bangor society, Faculty, and a large number of students from the College, greeted the cast and proved eager listeners.

The Elizabethan stage never showed to better effect, and augmented by additional scenery from the management of the Opera House, it did much to create a pleasing impression. This new feature of having the original Shakespearian stage has thus far during the season proven a decided attraction to the play.

The members of the cast never exerted themselves to a greater degree than at this performance, and each one of them showed his deep appreciation and knowledge of his part and played it with all the zest there was in him. John E. Ash, '12, in the part of Sir Andrew Aguecheek again proved the master of his part and easily led his audience into the spirit of the play by his continuous humor. Joseph L. Brown, '14, in the character of the Clown has improved a great deal over his earlier playing and becomes a "merry fellow" in the truest sense of the term.

George Clark, '13, who came into the cast late in the season, has proven a find and has shown his worth in the part of Sir Toby Belch. He puts great force and enthusiasm into his acting

and easily captivates his audience. Among the other comedy characters portrayed is that of Malvolio, the part being taken by Theodore W. Haskell, '14. His part is one which when cast over the footlights never fails to amuse the audience, and it is to the credit of Mr. Haskell that he has so played the part that it misses none of its true force. Paul W. Monohon, '14, and Mark Pendleton, '14, as Viola and Sebastian, again prove the center of attraction and add much to the success of the play by their clever and graceful acting.

Among the female characters we must not forget James L. Dinsmore '11, who covers a difficult part in that of Olivia, where he conveys her various moods in a manner both graceful, easy and charming. His acting is natural and shows his thorough conception of the character. To go with this is the clever portrayal of Maria by Everett H. Maxcy, '11. This part is presented in a very spirited and effective manner and the audience readily absorbs the spirit with which it is played.

On the whole, the play is presented with great skill by the members of the club, so that none of the coarser comedy parts are mixed with the more serious romance scenes. The University Orchestra, consisting of seven pieces, rendered the music for the evening and proved an added attraction. Dr. Robert J. Aley was present and viewed the production from one of the boxes.

ATHLETIC TRIPS

Nine on Three-Game Trip—Track Team to Vermont

Thursday evening the varsity track team will leave for the meet with the University of Vermont, to be held Saturday in Burlington. The trials which will determine the ten men who will represent Maine will be held this afternoon. On account of the small number of men who will enter the meet for Maine, the University does not have a very good chance of winning although the outcome of the events in which the men will enter looks good. The team will leave Burlington for Bangor Sunday morning.

The baseball team leaves Wednesday for the games with the southern New England colleges. Thursday, the 27th, the game with Harvard will be played in Cambridge. After the game the team will leave for Kingston, to play Rhode Island State the next day. Saturday it will return to Boston for the game with Boston College.

REPAIRS ON ALUMNI FIELD

Assessments Slow in Coming In

In the past week, due to the efforts of the Athletic Board, a considerable percentage of the assessments levied for the repairing of the field have been paid. About \$50 have been collected after considerable dunning from the Freshman class leaving \$60 still due from them. Of the four classes the largest percentage has been received from the Seniors, \$15 being unpaid. The Juniors have paid in all but \$18, while the Sophomores still owe a little over \$30. Director Wingard wishes to lay stress on the fact that this dollar assessment may be paid by working on the field, and it seems that there is absolutely no excuse whatever for any loyal student to be unable to pay the assessment either in one way or the other.

Before May 27th there must be all of 2000 cubic yards of dirt hauled in and leveled over the diamond itself, to fill the low prices and to make a fairly level field. After the baseball season is over the field will be ploughed up and seeded in preparation for the football work in the fall. Two carloads of cinders have been spread over the track, which is nearly in shape although hardly firm enough to stand any heavy work. The fence is being repaired in the weak spots and the bleachers have been strengthened. There will be about \$400 left from the amount at hand after this work is finished and this will be put on interest and used next fall.

The Dartmouth record for the mile run was broken recently by Paul Harmon, who went to the University from the University of Maine.

With this number of THE CAMPUS the present board of editors retires and the paper passes into the hands of a new set of editors and a new business management. What the publication has accomplished during the past year as the University newspaper and as an organ of student sentiment only its readers can judge; the editors have endeavored, however, to make the paper worthy of this institution.

At this time I wish to take the opportunity to thank publicly each member of the Board for his services. Mr. Davis, as managing editor, has had practically entire charge of the news department, and he has devoted much time and effort to making THE CAMPUS distinctively a

newspaper of the University of Maine. In the publication of the recent issues he has been ably assisted by Mr. Winn, the assistant managing editor.

For the greater part of the year the alumni department was in charge of Mr. Sargent, who edited this difficult part of the paper in the ablest manner in which it had been edited for several years. Since his retirement the work has been carried on quite as energetically by Mr. Whittier.

While the associate editors have had no particular department assigned to them, their work has been quite as essential to the publication of the paper as that of any other editor. Mr. Hamlin, Mr. Waite, and Mr. McDonald have been especially active and faithful in their work. Among the other editors Mr. Garland, Mr. Wallace, Mr. Morris, and Mr. Towner have given much assistance. A number of candidates for the Board, some of whom will doubtless be given places upon it in the near future, have also done their assignments intelligently and conscientiously. These men are Mr. C. From every point of view the performance of Twelfth Night given in Bangor last week was a success. The chief value to Maine in the presentation of the play in that city, however, lies not in the financial gain of the Masque but in the attention which the performance drew to the University. Probably the largest number of people who ever witnessed a college dramatic club production in Bangor was assembled in the opera house that evening, and every one of these went away feeling that the price of admission had not been ill spent, and with a good impression of what Maine students can do in dramatic art.

The importance of the success of the performance can only be measured by imagining the effect of its failure upon the University's standing in Bangor. As a result of it the institution has gained a stronger place in the esteem of the

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people of what might be well called its home city. With such a start it can easily increase this hold by having its Masque and its Musical Clubs appear there each year. Both organizations have a high enough reputation there now to present themselves under their own auspices, and by so doing the University receives the credit for the success, not some society which is seeking to advance solely its own interests.

During the past week the athletic authorities have only been able to secure fifteen payments of the dollar assessments voted by the classes for the repairs on Alumni Field. Most of these, moreover, were only paid after vigorous dunning by the collectors. Such figures show the lethargy with which one-fifth of the Maine student body is affected.

Yet, if any one of these men is asked why the Maine baseball team is so slow in developing, he will reply with a long dissertation upon what he would probably call the "rotteness" of Alumni Field. He knows and says that the field needs improvement more than any athletic field in the State, and when a Maine team falls just short of the championship he is one of the most vehement in his criticism of the men, the management, and the coaches. All this, while very likely the chief reason for the team's inability to nose out in the race is due to the disadvantages under which it worked early in the season.

The one hundred odd dollars which are still owed on these assessments are needed just now to meet bills in connection with the repairs that are being carried out upon the field. The consequences of the lack of this money, however, lie not in the physical effect it will have upon the repairs; they lie in the moral effect that the spirit of these men, scattered among the students, will have upon the general enthusiasm of the entire undergraduate body.

Every fraternity ought to regard it as a matter of honor to have all of its members pay the assessment. The unpaid assessments among the students in the fraternities might perhaps be

placed in the hands of an upperclassman in each house, and after a certain length of time the number of pledges still unredeemed in each house might be posted or published.

Prof. Sprague of the Department of Economics is to be congratulated upon having secured the services of so eminent an economist as Prof. Carver of Harvard to lecture to his classes last week. Prof. Carver's talks were listened to with great interest by many students, who appreciated highly the opportunity of hearing so distinguished an authority.

The base ball team will leave this week for its games with three southern New England colleges, and the track team will go to Burlington to compete with the University of Vermont. The success of both trips will mean much to the University and the teams will go with the heartiest good wishes of every student interested in the institution's athletic fortunes.

VESPERS

Dr. L. O. Hartman of Ohio Spoke on the Art of Teaching

The Vesper Services were continued last Sunday afternoon when Dr. L. O. Hartman, who has charge of the Sunday school work of the M. E. Church in Ohio, and who was in attendance at the Methodist Conference at Old Town last week, gave a very interesting address on the Art of Teaching. In opening Dr. Hartman showed the growing tendency of the time toward a closer connection between the secular and the religious, saying that every place, deed, and function may be sacred, depending on the way it is done or the spirit in which it works.

Continuing, he showed the difficulty of teaching religiously the child with its multiplicate development and conditions of life. The real arts, of whatever form they may be, are whatever of divine and eternal is brought from the world of God down to the material world. In this conception, every man who does his work well is an artist and is creating in his own image the material world.

The faculty quartet consisting of Mrs. Huddleston Mrs. Wingard, and Professors Brown and Bell, sang two anthems very effectively.

NORTHFIELD CONFERENCE

Dates, June 23—July 2—Delegation from Maine

Who is going to represent Maine at Northfield this year? The 25th annual session of the Student Conference will be held June 23 to July 2. Some of the strongest Christian men of the country, including John R. Mott, Robert E. Speer, and President Fitch have been secured as speakers. Over eight hundred men will be there representing over 100 institutions. A great many preparatory school men will also attend. This is a good opportunity to show them where Maine stands, and to induce some of them to choose Maine as their alma mater.

The conference is not merely a place for those going into active Christian work. It is a place where a man gets a glimpse of that larger college world of which he is a part. He meets the strongest men from the New England colleges; he enjoys himself in games and sports. He lives

for a week in the most ideal surroundings in which a man could live. He sees Christianity in its true service and gets the sanest possible view of religion. He has a glimpse of what life means and of his duty to himself and to the world.

President Fitch writes concerning the conference:

"As a student I thought of Northfield as an utopian place which promoted an emotional, abnormal, and provincial religious life. When

I finally went I discovered that there was a free, joyous, single-hearted atmosphere throughout the conference. The men from the various schools and colleges were a selected group of fine vigorous spirits, frankly and earnestly religious, but also normally and attractively so. The speaking was for the most part excellent, there was plenty of sport and recreation mingled with the Bible study and devotional meetings. I think every man who was there was glad that he had come and was the better and bigger for it.

When the men who heard President Fitch at Vespers last Fall realize that he is a sample of the speakers at the conference, they can imagine what a week at Northfield means to a man.

HARVARD PROFESSOR HERE

Prof. Carver Lectured to the Economics Classes

The students in the Economics classes Friday, and many others who are not registered for the courses, had the pleasure of hearing lectures by Prof. Carver of Harvard. During the morning he addressed the class in business law on the Relation of Economic to Social Value. He had been lecturing at the Bangor Theological Seminary for several days last week.

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CIVIL SOCIETY LECTURE

Prof. Tracy of Yale Gave a Very Instructive
Talk on Bridge Construction

Last Thursday afternoon, the civil engineering students were addressed by Prof. Tracy, of the structural engineering department at Yale. Prof. Tracy discussed the design and construction of steel structures, taking up each step from the mining of the ore and the surveying of the building site, to their final result in the completed bridge or building.

The Quebec bridge failure, some years ago, gave a severe jar to public confidence in the engineering profession. The failure of such a bridge, designed by the foremost engineers and constructed of the best materials, was astounding to the average man. To show that bridge design is not, however, an exact science, Prof. Tracy pointed out what seem to him the weak points of the present methods.

One of these is the custom of considering moving loads as though they were stationary, and then adding a certain percentage for the vibration caused by their motion. The effect of moving loads is not easily determined, and no theory applies to it. The method at present in use is nothing more than a scientific guess, and is far from being exact.

Another point which is still uncertain is the design of columns. All column formulae contain certain constants which are obtained only by experiment. No testing machine ever made could crush the enormous compression members used in the Quebec bridge, and they were, therefore, designed by formulae which can not be proved correct. Such considerations show that the design of a large bridge is not a mere matter of applying formulae and solving equations; it is a problem demanding the widest experience and the most sound judgment.

In discussing the erection of bridges, Prof. Tracy contrasted American and European practice. He showed views of foreign bridges in the course of erection, where the bridge was nearly hidden by elaborate false work. American engineers avoid the use of such temporary work wherever possible, devising many ingenious and daring methods, whereby both the time and cost of erection are much reduced.

The lecture was attended by all of the civil engineering students and, in addition, attracted a considerable number from the other departments. It was very much appreciated by everyone present, Prof. Tracy showing a wideknowledge of his subject.

At nine o'clock Friday morning, Prof. Tracy

spoke to the senior civil engineers on the subject "Civil Engineering as a Profession." He spoke of the satisfaction to the true engineer, in seeing his own plans and ideas actually constructed and carried to completion. He warned the young man against expecting too much during his first five years of practice, but promised great reward to the man who has the ability to rise to the top of the profession. His talk contained many good pointers to the young engineer, and was very well received.

THE AGRICULTURAL BANQUET

A great Success in Every Way

The First Annual Agricultural Banquet, held at the New Colonial in Bangor, Saturday, April 15, was a decided success in every respect and points to the continuance of this event. This is an innovation, for the Agricultural department is the only one which has ever had a banquet. There were eighty present including many members of the Faculty.

Prof. L. S. Merrill, acting dean of the College of Agriculture officiated most acceptably as toastmaster and toasts were responded to by the following: Prof. E. F. Hitchings, "The First Apple;" Prof. F. S. Russell, "Veterinary Surgery;" Prof. W. A. Brown, "The Hen, the Egg, or Brown, which was first?" Prof. H. G. Bell, "Oats;" Prof. L. H. Merrill, "How to Keep Young;" Prof. G. E. Simmons, "Bookkeeping;" Prof. J. M. Briscoe, "Domestic Science, What I know about it;" Prof. P. A. Campbell, "Pets?—"; President Aley, "Agriculture, the Student, the College, and the State." All of these toasts were of a high order and were met with appropriate applause.

President Aley in responding to the last toast, "Agriculture, the Student, the College and the State," crowned the whole banquet. He stated that agriculture, the student, the college, and the state are linked together. He said that a few years ago the general public thought it a peculiar thing for a young man to study for an agricultural training, but now, so many young men of fine intellect are going into this field that the standard of agriculture is rising. The speaker concluded by saying that he knew of no other field of labor which offered better opportunities to the mentally and physically equipped young man.

Much credit is due the committee consisting of A. W. Jones, A. C. Hall, H. N. Nash, and the members of the Agricultural Club for the success of the venture, and for the agricultural and Maine spirit which pervaded the whole banquet.

BASEBALL

Colby Won the Exhibition Game from Maine
Patriot's Day

Maine lost the first game of the season to Colby at Waterville, last Wednesday by the score of 13 to 12. The game was decidedly erratic and hard to judge. At times both teams showed manifest ability; at others the errors were rank.

The lateness of the season, and the fact that neither team has had much opportunity for outdoor practice would account for their weakness.

The excitement was not great until the last inning when Maine scored seven runs. At the beginning of the inning the score stood 11 to 5 in favor of Colby. Colby came to bat the last of the inning, and hits by Goode, Reed, and Vail brought the final score to 13 to 12 in her favor.

ALUMNI NOTES

Ora Willis Knight is an alumnus of Maine who is held to be somewhat of an expert in his particular line of work—analytical chemistry and microscopy. He was born in Bangor, July 15, 1874, and obtained his early education in the public schools of that city and of California. His Bachelor's degree was obtained from the University in 1895 and his Master's degree two years later. He was married to Minnie Gertrude MacDonald of Bangor in 1899.

While doing the work for his Master's degree, Mr. Knight was assistant in natural history at the University. From 1897 till 1903, he was assistant chemist in the Maine Experiment Station. Since then he has been state assayer and has been engaged in business for himself in Bangor. Besides chemistry and microscopy, ornithology, botany, entomology and mineralogy claim a large part of his time. His herbarium of collection of Maine plants is practically complete and his collections of Maine birds, eggs and insects are quite large. He is the author of "List of Birds of Maine," of "Birds of Maine," and is a frequent contributor to ornithological and botanical magazines. He is a member of

the American Chemical Society, American Ornithologists Union, Maine Ornithological Society, Josselyn Botanical Society, Entomological Society of America, and of Phi Kappa Phi.

'10. Rev. George Crosby Howard, pastor of the Methodist churches in Orono and Stillwater, died of rheumatic fever at the Eastern Maine General Hospital. Mr. Howard was an alumnus of the University, having received the B. A. degree last June, and he was well known to nearly all the students, being frequently on the Campus.

Mr. Howard was born in Montville about thirty-six years ago and received his earlier education in the schools of that town and in the Eastern Maine Conference Seminary at Bucksport. He graduated from the Garrett Biblical Institute at Evanston, Ill., in 1903. He had churches at Strong, Freeman, and Livermore Falls before coming to Orono in 1908.

He is spoken of as "one of the most brilliant, aggressive, successful, and able ministers of the Eastern Maine Conference." He was a tireless worker and a most profound student, and it is believed that overwork was one of the weakening influences that caused his death.
