BASEBALL TRIP ENDS WITHOUT A VICTORY

Team Shows Improvement

The baseball team returned yesterday from its Massachusetts trip and taking everything into consideration it was a successful one. Maine was beaten in every game but these defeats can not, with fairness, be placed against her credit as she was greatly handicapped by lack of outdoor practice. Where the opponents had had a month or more practice Maine had been out doors but a week and so the results were nothing more than could be expected. The first game was played Wednesday against Holy Cross at Worcester. In this game Maine was unable to bunch hits on McManus, the Holy Cross pitcher and succeeded in sending only one man across the plate. Holy Cross scoured her first three runs in the first two innings on as many hits, four hits and assisted by several errors; the other two were secured in the 7th and 9th innings respectively. Gilman of Maine and O'Brien of Holy Cross hit safely three out of four times at the bat.

FRESHMEN WIN INTERCLASS MEET**1916 Scores in all but Four Events, Two Records Broken**

The annual out-door inter-class track meet was held on the athletic field Saturday afternoon. It was a very close meet and was not decided until the last event when Fox won the broad jump and incidentally the meet for the Freshmen. The Seniors were a good second being only five points behind. The Juniors got third and the Sophomores, fourth.

The first event of the day was the trials in the hundred yard dash. Bryant, '15, and Donahue, '15, qualified in the first heat and Ashton, '16, and Leacock, '16, in the second trial.

The mile came next and was won by Towner, '14. Capt. Power, '13, upset things by trimming Brooks, '14, for second place by a small margin. The quarter was one of the best contested races in the meet. Littlefield, '13, set the pace for two-thirds of the run and then Fox, '16, caught and passed him. In the home stretch, Fox himself was barely beaten by St. Onge '14, who won in a driving finish after a hard struggle.

In the high hurdles Morse, '14, was the winner, altho he was closely pushed by Purington, '16, and Small, '16. The half-mile was an interesting contest. Morris, a Junior, made the pace for seven-eighths of the way and then was passed by Bell, '1916, who won in a fast finish. McAlary, '13, got third after a struggle with Doyle, '15.

The 220 yard dash was easily won by Ashton, '16, with Leacock, '16, second and Donahue, '15, third. Morse '14, won the low hurdles by a wide margin. Purington, '16, got second and R. S. Ferguson, '14, third. In the two-mile Capt. Power won easily; Burgess, '13, was second and Coffin, '15, third.

Bailey, '15, threw the hammer one hundred and forty-six feet making a new college record. Shepherd '13, was second, Gulliver, '15, third. The discus was won by Shepherd; Bailey, second, and Purington, third. Shepherd also won the shot-put taking 13 points for 1913. Bailey, '15, was second and Ruffner, '16, third. Bailey won the hammer and got second in discus and shot, making eleven points. Shepherd, '13, was the largest individual point winner of the meet. The high jump was won by Worden, '13; second, Palmer, '16; third; Rogers, '13. Fox, '16, took the broad jump easily with Donahue '15, second, and Palmer, '16, third.

In the pole-vault, Rogers, the State record-holder, surpassed himself making a new record of eleven feet nine inches and just missing twelve

feet. This event drew more applause than any other. Thomas, '14, was second, and Sherwood, '14, third. The score:

PROPOSED CHANGES IN THE "CAMPUS"**Will be Changed to Semi-Weekly Paper**

At The Campus Board meeting last night, a most radical change in the form of our paper, "THE CAMPUS" was discussed. It is proposed to publish the paper semi-weekly and in a newspaper form of eight pages. This will be tried through the month of May and if it receives the support of the student body it will be continued in this form another year. The paper will be distributed in the mail on Tuesday and Friday mornings and it is thought that this will be a decided advantage over the present time of delivery.

Arrangements have been made for an editorial room in Estabrooke Hall. This will be furnished with the necessary office equipment, including a typewriter and telephone for the use of the board. All the editorial business of the paper will be transacted here and the editors will have office hours in order to facilitate the collection of news. The phone number of the printer's office will be published in the first issue under the new scheme and members of the board may be reached there two afternoons during the week. It is hoped in this way to be able to publish the late news.

This change in the paper will mean greater activity of the staff, for the news will be increased much in quantity and a great deal more timely. The originators of this idea are to be congratulate for their efforts and in order to make a success of this venture the student body must back them in changing the paper from the magazine form to an up-to-date newspaper worthy of the University.

We are inviting our friends and relatives to the Campus continually. Strangers and returning Alumni are constantly among us, and it is with an inner satisfaction that we usher them over our beautiful walks and through our buildings, listening the while to their complimentary remarks. Yet as we go from one building to another and from one walk to another, there is one thing that is forever before our eyes. It can be seen long before the Campus is reached. it can be seen from the other side of the Stillwater; it can be seen from every approach. Every time we pass the—yes, the obstacle, with our friends

we say nothing, but the next time we pass with our classmate, we criticise.

The flag that at the present time floats over our heads is no longer an ornament, nor does it remind us every day that we are living under the stars and stripes. For long since, the stripes have united to form an enlarged bar, and the stars have been devoured by the field of blue; while it is hard to distinguish the silhouette of the outline. In fact, it was asked the other day what might be the last battle in which the flag was raised. It seems to be the custom, especially in military posts, that a flag shall be burned in the time of peace long before it shall have the time to lose the designation of its nationality. Furthermore it seems doubly fitting that after the students taking military have been compelled to appear in an orderly and clean uniform that the same should be required of the most sturdy soldier of all, the flag."

JUNIOR WEEK

Programs to be Special Feature

On account of a change in the programs for Junior Week, the final debate in the interclass series will be held Wednesday, May 7. Among the other important events will be the performance of the Masque on Thursday. The Prom. on Friday evening, and on Saturday the Junior prize speaking besides the ball game between Maine and Bowdoin. Sunday afternoon, Doctor Brown of Bangor will speak.

THE 1914 PRISM OUT SOON**To be Issued Junior Week**

At last something definite may be said regarding THE 1914 PRISM. Practically all the book is in the hands of the binders, and although the book will not be issued the first of May, as was first rumored, it will be on sale by the beginning of Junior Week, and efforts will be made to have the book on sale on Tuesday of that week.

In years past, due to the late appearance of the book, and various other reasons, it was found difficult to sell the complete issue. No such difficulties are anticipated in regard to THE 1914 PRISM. The book will be issued on time, and further, there will be a limited number of copies on sale, most of which have already been signed for. This practically means, that if you desire a copy of THE 1914 PRISM, it will be necessary for you to order one before the date of sale. The entire issue is to be put out thru the University Store, and orders for the book may be left with the Business Manager, or with J. L. Gulliver. The price of the book will be \$2.00, or by mail, \$2.25. There will be only one style of binding, imitation leather, with a gold leaf design.

Regarding the book: Mention has been made in a previous article of the fact that the book is to be dedicated to President Aley, that it is to be a football number, and that altho some sections will be greatly abridged, other sections will be greatly expanded. There are to be several articles on Football at Maine, written by men who played on former teams of this university, and these articles will be illustrated by the pictures of 15 football teams. The grind section will contain 40 pages, and efforts have been made to represent every organization in the school, and to record every event of interest to the general student body, making the book truly representative of the University. THE 1914 PRISM certainly promises to be one of the best books ever issued by any class, and will certainly be the most distinctive on account of its general plan, and the many innovations introduced in it. We heartily recommend it to the student body, and there will be something lacking in the college life of every man who does not obtain a record of the past year: certainly the greatest in the athletic history of the University. Watch out for the definite date of issue, and be one of the first ones to get a copy.

The exhibition drill by the five companies began at eight o'clock and was the most interesting part of the evenings' entertainment. Company A., under Capt. John W. Hart, presented the manual of arms; Company B, Capt. F. T. Norcross, close order drill; Company C, Lieut. Dswald B. Higgins, bayonet exercise; Company D, Capt. Philip S. Bolton, double rifle drill; Company E, Capt. Bernard Ahrens, single rifle drill. These exercises were all exceedingly well done and received much applause and favorable comment from those present. The work of Company E was especially good. This difficult drill was done to the music of the military band and was a grand climax to the exhibition.

The wall scaling contest was an innovation which furnished much pleasure and excitement. Teams of eight from men each of the companies competed in this event. The men started from squad order, scaled a wall thirteen feet high, carried the rifles with them and came to attention on the running track. This event was won by the team from Company C. COACH SMITH RE-ENGAGED**Has Signed Contract for Next Year**

The student body, faculty, alumni, and friends of the University will all be glad to hear that A. N. Smith has been signed up for another season as track coach at Maine. His great success in the past speaks for itself as to his ability and with him in charge we may rest assured that the University of Maine will be well represented in the meets which are to come.

Coach Smith entered the running game at Buffalo, N. Y. when a boy. He rapidly came to the forefront as a sprinter until finally we find him winning the Sheffield handicap in Scotland. This is the big race in that country. After a successful career as a professional runner he entered the coaching field and has since filled various positions satisfactorily. At one time he assisted "Mike" Murphy at Pennsylvania. Last summer he accompanied the Olympic team to Sweden as trainer for marathon runners.

He has spent three years at Maine with good success. In 1911 he turned out a team which won the state championship. Also the next fall he had a winning cross-country team. In 1912 we lost the state meet by only a few points. The cross-country team of this year was one of the best in New England, the state meet being won by a big margin, Maine finishing four out of the first five men. Of course it is impossible to foretell the result of this spring's work but it is safe to say that Maine will be very much in the fight for the pennant and that if any other college wins out they will be sure that there has been a race.

Finally Coach Smith is not a one sided man.

Not only in track is he of value to Maine but as a trainer for football men he is of the greatest benefit and it is understood that next fall he is to have charge of the second team.

The present policy of coaching here at Maine, viz., namely having a competent coach at the head of each department of athletics, is proving its worth. In track, as in football and base-ball, the available material is not often of the desired quality. New men have to be developed. In this line Coach Smith is most competent and every afternoon men may be seen working out for the meets which are to come. Let us hope that good fortune will smile on us and that Coach Smith will win the success for Maine and himself which he so well deserves.
