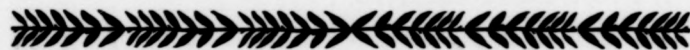

INTER-CLASS BASKETBALL

Schedule Starts January 5

The interclass basketball season opens January 5. There are only two weeks of practice left to the teams before the opening games and the gymnasium will be occupied every night from now until the end of the season in February. The Sophomores are having the first practice this evening and the other three teams will soon swing into line. The leaders of the teams have been chosen only partially. C. S. Cleaves will lead the Seniors, H. W. Hall has been elected captain of the Sophomores. Only one manager has been elected, P. W. Thomas, '14.

Predictions in regard to the championship are more or less guess work. The Seniors will have practically their old team and should be a speedy outfit from the start. The Juniors if they can commence where they left off last year should stand high at the close of the series. Although the Sophs look good to give the Seniors the most trouble. B. A. A. RELAY

Outlook for First Team Dubious

The outlook for a winning relay team this year is exceedingly poor according to Coach Smith. Very little new material seems to be forthcoming at present and most of the old men are ineligible for one reason or another.

A. L. Deering '12 is the only man now in college who ever ran the relay at the Boston meet. Schrumpf, the most promising track man at Maine and the one who ran the best race against Vermont last year, has left college and will not return this year at least.

The fine, outdoor, board track is all but finished and work will be begun on it at once, although no hard training will be done until after Christmas, but the big problem is to get men, and unless they are forthcoming, Maine is due to suffer her first defeat in the B. A. A. relay on February 10.

BOARD TRACK

Outdoor Running Surface About Complete

The new outdoor running track is fast nearing completion under the able direction of Coach Smith. The new track is located on the north side of the gymnasium hardly 25 yards from the door. It is 130 yards in length, and 13 laps to the mile. A 50 yard straightaway makes it possible to get in work on the hurdles. The straightaway is 12 feet wide while the rest of the track is seven feet in width. The squad has been

practicing on one of the banked corners which has already been finished. The track promises to be a great aid to Coach Smith in turning out next spring's track team.

For years, Maine has sorely needed a running track of this type for the benefit of the B. A. A. candidates, and, in fact, all of the track men who have lacked a chance for practice on straight-away during the winter months. At last the track is secured and the credit lies with just two men, Coach A. N. Smith, who has worked with this end in view since he came here, and Hosea B. Buck, an alumnus 'honored and respected by every Maine man for his staunch support of Maine athletics.

MINSTREL SHOW AND FARCE

"M" Club will Give Production

Plans are now being made by the "M" Club to run a minstrel show and comedy early in the winter, for the purpose of gaining funds to aid the athletic situation at the University. The committee in charge, consisting of A. F. Sawyer Law, '14, and P. R. Hussey, '12, aided by W. R. Sansouci '13, and J. L. Burns, Law '12, representing the student body, and Warren McDonald '12, and G. G. Tilley '13, from the Athletic Association are trying to have the production given in the Opera House, Bangor. If possible, some date between February 15th and 22nd will be selected. Phillip R. Hussey '12, is acting as manager of the affair and every possible means are being used by him to have this one of the most successful events of the year. The production is to be modeled after that of the Tech show. The idea of an ice carnival with class hockey games, possibly followed by a dance has been suggested and may materialize. If the minstrel show and comedy, under the capable direction of W. R. Sansouci and Joe Burns, makes a hit in Bangor it may be produced Junior week here at the University.

Of course the plans of the affair are rather immature and definite details will be published later.

ROTATING FOOTBALL SCHEDULE PROPOSED

Conference of Football Managers and Meeting of M. I. A. B. at Portland

One of the most important changes in the history of Maine intercollegiate football was that considered Saturday at a conference of representatives from the four colleges at the West End Hotel, Portland. All that is necessary now for the substitution of a rotating schedule in place of the present system of playing the State series is the favorable action of the Bowdoin Athletic Council upon the plan proposed by the Maine Intercollegiate Athletic Board, which consists of the other three colleges.

If the plan is adopted the Maine-Bowdoin game will no longer be the final game of the year each season. Instead a rotation of games will be introduced, whereby two games will be played upon the final date of the state series and only once in three years will the same colleges meet each other on that last Saturday. That is, Bowdoin and Maine will meet upon the final date once in three years and at the same time Bates and Colby will play. The next season this same set of games will take place the first week of the State series, the team that played at home the previous year playing on its opponent's grounds this time. The third year this set of games will be played upon the second Saturday.

Prof. E. E. Pomeroy of Bates, secretary of the M. I. A. B., has suggested a tentative schedule extending through six seasons, part of which is as follows:

1912—First week, Bates vs. Maine, at Lewiston; Bowdoin vs. Colby at Waterville. Second week, Bates vs. Bowdoin at Brunswick; Maine vs. Colby, at Orono. Third week, Bates vs. Colby, at Lewiston; Maine vs. Bowdoin at Orono. 1913—First week, Bates vs. Colby, at Waterville; Maine vs. Bowdoin at Brunswick; second week, Bates vs. Maine, at Orono; Bowdoin vs. Colby, at Brunswick. Third week, Bates vs. Bowdoin, at Lewiston; Maine vs. Colby at Waterville.

1914—First week, Bates vs. Bowdoin, at Brunswick; Maine vs. Colby, at Orono. Second week, Bates vs. Colby, at Lewiston; Maine vs. Bowdoin, at Orono. Third week, Bates vs. Maine, at Lewiston; Bowdoin vs. Colby, at Waterville.

Thus every seventh year the games would be played according to the same schedule that prevailed the first year. The adoption of such a system by the four colleges would tend to equalize the importance of the games and the financial returns. Maine and Bowdoin would lose by such an arrangement, since now the annual Maine-Bowdoin contest which has been the final game of the series, has been, regardless of the standing of the team for the championship, the most popular game of the year and has yielded by far the largest returns.

For the reason that Bowdoin will gain nothing by approving the proposed schedule and will lose financially and that the college is not a member of the Maine board, there is some question as to the favor that the plan will receive at Brunswick. The Bowdoin representative who attended the conference yesterday asserted that they were unauthorized to take any action upon the plan and they will report it to the Bowdoin council. It is understood, however, that they are not unanimously in favor of it. Colby is the college chiefly interested and it has made strenuous objection to the present system of playing the State games. Bates and Maine are willing to adopt the proposed arrangement.

In its annual meeting following the conference Saturday forenoon, the Maine board re-elected L. C. Southard '75 of Boston, Maine's alumni delegate, president and Prof. P. E. Pomeroy of Bates, secretary and treasurer. The board also adopted the following recommendations to submit to the colleges of its membership.

That a rotating football schedule be adopted by the four Maine colleges to cover a period of six years and to begin in 1912.

That all games between Maine colleges be played on a schedule represented by the last Saturday in October and the first two Saturdays in November.

That each college shall accredit a faculty mem-

ber to assist its football manager in arranging a rotating schedule.

That Bowdoin be requested to accredit a faculty member in like manner.

That the schedule offered to the conference of the four Maine colleges by Prof. Pomeroy of Bates be the basis for the rotating schedule, subject to amendment, such schedule to lend itself to adjustment by the shifting of its starting point.

The representatives of the four institutions who gathered for the conference were: Bowdoin, Professor M. T. Copeland, Lawrence Smith, manager of football and Capt. Wood of the football team; Colby, Prof. John Hedman of Boston, J. Colby Bassett of Boston, and W. G. Chapman, Jr., manager of football. Bates, R. D. Purington, coach; Capt. A. C. R. Cobe, Prof. F. E. Pomeroy and Richard B. Stanley of Boston. Maine, Prof. R. K. Jones, L. C. Southard, '75, W. R. Ballou and John C. Wallace of Portland, manager of football.

MUSICAL CLUBS

Work Begun; Massachusetts Trip Assured

The musical clubs have all started their rehearsals and the program for all of the candidates will be hard work, from now until the concerts are finished. It is understood that Manager Grace has a particularly fine schedule although it has not been officially announced in detail as yet. A trip into Massachusetts is assured, however, and is now being planned for the Easter recess.

The Mandolin and Banjo Clubs held their first meeting Thursday in the Chapel. Manager Grace outlined the plans for the year and urged that a large number of men stay out and help the club to make a creditable showing outside of the state. Another rehearsal was held this noon.

On Friday the Glee Club met and prepared to open the season. Prof. G. W. Thompson tested the voices of the candidates Monday noon. An attempt will be made to keep the club up to the highest efficiency and it is urged that a large number of students work for a chance in the club.

EDITORIAL.

At the present writing, the outlook for winning track and relay teams is very poor. To be sure we probably have the best coach in the history of the institution but there is nobody for him to work on. We have too, a fine board track just completed, but there is nobody to run on it. The situation is about as follows. Here is our University struggling along each year and barely winning, if at all, over institutions of half its size in track athletics, in which so many men are adapted to take part.

We have a noteworthy precedent to uphold at the B. A. A. Meet. The Maine relay team has never been defeated in this annual athletic

event. Unfortunately, however, this record is due, to a great extent, to the inferiority of our opponents in former years rather than, to the efficiency of our teams. Last year the outlook was dark. This year it is worse. We have just one man left from last year's team, many who should make a strong bid for the team are ineligible, and only a deplorably small number of new men have exhibited spirit and determination enough to report to Coach Smith for practice, as yet.

At a safe estimate, 50 per cent of our student body have the time and ability to help out our track and relay teams. Unfortunately 96 per cent do not seem to have the inclination. They prefer laying on their oars and watching the progress of events, prophesying, criticising, in fact, doing anything but working. Such comments are getting to be rather an old story, but they are true nevertheless. The majority of the student body are asleep, and the awakening always comes too late.

We have started on the way up with a championship last spring and another this fall. It is quite probable that Maine will run some Maine College at the B. A. A. Meet this year. Every Maine man knows what defeat at such hands means. It means more discouragement and hard grinding to get back on top again. It is up to Maine men to keep it from being a defeat. We have unlimited confidence in Coach Smith's ability, but he cannot make a team without material. He at least deserves a fair show. The student body is the only thing that can remedy the situation in the least. For the love of the University, they should go out and give their services to the team. Maine needs something more than cheering and songs now. Maine calls for one hundred men with spirit and fight to report to Coach Smith every afternoon. Who will answer the call of Maine?

Either through heedlessness, ignorance, or downright ingratitude, the student body as a whole seems to lack appreciation.

Appreciation The body as a whole like to have things done for them, like to have support of their interests. Service of itself should of course be its own reward, but a hearty word or act of appreciation is a great help and really due the man who performs a service.

Year in and year out men inside and outside of the University are doing things for the institution, the student body, for college activities and the like, and their work is accepted as a matter of course, and never a word or an act of appreciation is shown. We will cite a case. A man comes to the University from another institution and becomes a member of the Faculty. He is a fine instructor, a lover of young manhood. He immediately adopts the University for his own and gives his service freely to all who ask it. He takes great interest in all student affairs, gives to them generously, and enjoys seeing them prosper. He naturally has ideas of growth and improvement. He imparts them to the students, and they accept them as a matter of course. He works hard for his projects, even through ill health and other difficulties. The students accept the results of his work indifferently. Our man then brings to the front some forward movement which needs the cooperation of the whole student body. There is no indifference now, for 95% of the student body promptly turn the idea down flat as too much work or uninteresting. Can such proceedings be called appreciation? This is only one instance.

We hardly feel justified in laying the cause of such lack to ingratitude. We believe that the student body do appreciate service, down deep in their hearts, but unfortunately their hearts cannot be read. It would be much better to say something or do something to show their apprecia-

tion. In the case cited, that man ought to have the untiring support of the entire student body in anything that he desires, provided it is reasonable. It would be well for Maine men to give this matter some thought. On the whole it is best to realize and enjoy good things while we have them, and good things are often lost altogether from lack of appreciation of their value.

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DRAMATIC RECITAL

Delightful Readings by Miss Vida Sutton

In these days of highly developed commercialism a large number of college students fail to keep in touch with those early forms of literature which tell so much of the national history of our ancestors. It is therefore interesting, from time to time, to consider the ballads and folk-lore of earlier peoples. Especially is this true if we can have a reader, skilled in dramatic expression, who can bring before us the chief points of interest of these old ballads. Such an evening was spent last Thursday in the Chapel when Miss Vida Sutton, of New York, entertained a large audience of students of the University and their friends.

Miss Sutton read old English and Scotch ballads, and rendered them with such feeling and dramatic expression as to completely win the audience to which she spoke. She prefaced each of her readings by such explanatory remarks as were necessary to give the setting and general contents of each selection.

Miss Sutton said that art has been defined as an expression of superfluous energy, and for this reason there is much action present in the ballads of medieval times. Dealing first with comedy the reader said that the vixen and the devil are the two comedy characters of mediævallore. As an example of such a ballad she read, "The Farmer's Curs'd Wife," very effectively.

In addition to the comedy there are tragic ballads which portray the sadder things of life. An example of this is found in "The Ballad of the Sheath and Knife" which Miss Sutton read with much feeling. The "Crusader Ballad" chorus a somewhat different relation, in which woman triumphs over man.

At this point Miss Sutton introduced a story told by an old southern negress of how Simon Peter went fishing on the Lord's Day. This was not a ballad but Miss Sutton's presentation was much appreciated by the audience.

The concluding selection was Miss Sutton's own version of an Irish ballad or story of folk-lore. This was in the form of a dialogue and the reader showed pleasing dramatic ability when she

rendered the parts of the various characters.

Not often do the students at the University of Maine have the opportunity to hear such an accomplished reader as Miss Sutton; and great credit is due to Professor G. W. Thompson to whose efforts the evening's entertainment was largely due.

AN APPRECIATION

M. A. C. Honors Maine Alumnus and Former Faculty Member

A booklet has been compiled at the suggestion of alumni of the Massachusetts Agricultural College who were students under either Prof. Charles H. Fernald or Prof. Henry T. Fernald, or under both; and it is issued by the college in commemoration of the opening to collegiate use of the new entomological building, which is itself a memorial of the achievement of Prof. Charles H. Fernald in founding and developing entomological study in the college, and of Prof. Henry T. Fernald in taking up and carrying on his father's work. The booklet gives at some detail the lives of the two men both of whom were connected with the University of Maine. Prof. Charles H. Fernald held the chair of Natural History for fifteen years starting in 1871. The booklet says of his career here at Maine:

"In September, 1871, Prof. Fernald was called to the chair of Natural History in the newly established Maine state college, now the University of Maine. He was to teach botany, physical geography, human anatomy and physiology, comparative anatomy, veterinary science, and zoölogy, giving special attention to entomology, geology and mineralogy. Lest these few subjects should not occupy his energies, he was from time to time in his fifteen years' work at Maine, called upon to teach algebral geometry, trigonometry, agriculture and horticulture.

During his connection with the Maine state college, he prepared and published "Grasses of Maine," "Butterflies of Maine," "Sphingidæ of New England," and a "Catalog of the Tortricidæ of North America," besides a number of shorter papers. His writings appeared in leading scientific

journals in this country and in Europe. His vacations were frequently devoted to special study. Thus in 1872 he was with the United States Fish Commission at Eastport, Maine; in 1873, he was studying zoölogy under Louis Agassiz in his famous summer school at Penikese Island. Whenever he had opportunity to visit a museum, he carried with him specimens he wished to compare or determine."

Prof. Henry T. Fernald graduated from Maine with the degree of B. Sc in 1885. He took considerable graduate work at other institutions. He is a member of Phi Kappa Phi the honorary society for scholastic standing. He went to Massachusetts Agricultural College first as an assistant to his father and finally took his father's position.

BETTER FRUIT FOR MAINE

Splendid Talk in Chapel by Prof. Hutchins

The fact that Maine can raise apples, that are equal to, or even better than those of other states in the Union is being constantly proven. In Chapel Friday, Prof. Hutchins of the Department of Horticulture gave a short talk about the New England Fruit Shows, demonstrating that Maine stands high among the states of New England in the fruit growing industry. The first New England Fruit Conference was held in 1908 where it was decided to hold periodic fruit shows. In 1909, the first New England Fruit Show was held in Boston and as Maine had never before taken serious notice of her apple crops, she was excelled by Massachusetts; despite this fact carried away 588 blue ribbons out of 800. This was so astounding that \$1000 was placed in an Augusta Bank, the interest of which for five years, \$200, is to go every five years to the orchards of Maine. If, however, this money is not needed there, it is to go to the University of Maine; and at the end of five years premiums will be awarded for the best apples. As a result of this work, 180 registered orchards were planted in 1910, each containing from one to twenty-seven acres. These orchards are inspected each year by an inspector sent from Augusta.

This last fall, the second fruit show was held in Boston and Maine was offered \$3000 to help. At the exhibition there were 229 bbls., 1109 boxes, 1685 plates of Maine apples but Maine was slightly behind Massachusetts due to the intense rivalry which has been aroused. Two years ago nearly every grocery store carried Oregon apples; today they are carrying apples from their own state. Last year an apple-packing team went from Maine to Massachusetts and took second prize. This year they went and captured the first prize for box packing, for barrel packing and for apple storing. All these details simply go to establish the fact that Maine is awakening to the situation and will soon be at the front.

MAINE LIVE STOCK BREEDERS ASSOCIATION

Annual Meeting at Winslow Hall

The Maine Live Stock Breeders Association meeting will be held in Winslow Hall December 14 and 15. At this meeting most of the prominent live stock breeders of the state will be present and many of these will address the meetings on matters of interest concerning the breeding and keeping of live stock. 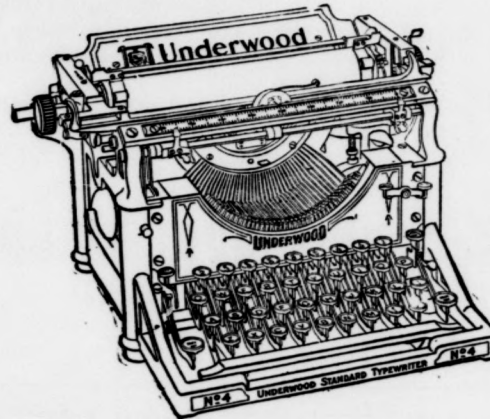
