MINSTREL SHOW

Success in Every Way

The Minstrel Show staged in Bangor City Hall last Saturday by the University students was in all respects an unqualified success.

Although the last rehearsal gave anything but assurance of a fine performance, the boys made a showing at the actual performance that was creditable to all concerned, and would have done justice to a professional company. A circle of fifty voices and a fifteen piece orchestra were organized for the minstrel. With scarcely more than a week's practicing, this circle and orchestra staged a production that left little to be desired, in the way of quality of finish. They kept their pitch well, were instant in their attacks, and rendered all their numbers in a sharp, clean-cut manner.

The end men were: Bones—J. E. Doyle, '15, J. A. McDonough, '15, W. J. Dolan, '15, J. L. Whittier, '16; Tambos—P. B. Sheridan, '15, L. A. Hamel, '15, E. P. Ackley, '13, P. E. Chadbourne, '16, and Theodore Haskell, '14, was interlocutor. Besides having a good line of jokes, the end men, all of them, made pronounced hits with their end songs. Doyle and Sheridan were especially good in their songs. The latter added a quite unusual feature to his number by using the footlight bulbs as a substitute for the bass drum. Alden Chases' tenor solo, "Thora" was very finely executed, as was the ballad sung by B. A. Ahrens.

One of the best numbers on the program was the quartet consisting of Messrs. Ahrens, Chase, Johnson, and Hudson. They were recalled time and again after their first number, "Kentucky Babe." C. L. Blackman, '16, gave two readings in a very satisfactory manner, and Leader White of the Banjo Club, played an excellent banjo solo. The final number was a duet sung by by Messrs. Chase and Ahrens, which brought much applause.

The success of the Minstrels far surpassed the expectations of all. Too much credit cannot be given Mr. Ahrens for his perseverance in carrying the show through to a successful performance, for his conscientious work in perfecting the production, and the musical ability he showed in his direction of the performance, not to mention the taste he displayed in his singing, both solo

and quartet. He evinced musical talent in no small degree.

TRACK CLUB

Organization Completed

The University of Maine Track Club held a meeting at the Beta house Tuesday evening, Dec. 10. A delegate from each fraternity and also one from the Senior Skulls, the "M" Club, the Sophomore Owls, the Sophomore Masks and the dormitory attended this meeting. The club elected officers, passed by-laws, and voted to meet twice a month.

Richard Powers, captain of the track team, was elected president; Wallace, vice-president; Hart, secretary; and Littlefield, treasurer. The executive committee will consist of Coach Smith, captain Power, manager Adams, secretary Hart, and treasurer Littlefield.

After the business meeting was concluded, Coach Smith gave a short talk in which he outlined a series of three inter-fraternity track meets which will be held this winter after the Christmas vacation.

A prize will be given by the coach to the fraternity winning the highest number of points in all three meets. It is hoped that the student body will show a great deal of interest in this plan by turning out a large number of contestants.

NEW HAND BOOK

To Come Out Latter Part of Semester

In order to fill the vacancy left by the failure of the Y. M. C. A. to publish the annual Handbook, the Senior Skulls have taken up the production of such a book. Forrest B. Ames, '13, has been elected to the position of editor, and George C. Clark, '13, is to have charge of the business end.

As in the past the book will contain a list of all college activities, giving space to their history, and purposes. Then there will be the track records, mathematic and mechanics formulae; a diary for the second semester and the college cheers and songs.

Among the new features will be a complete record of the state football series since its conception. This year the "Freshman Pointers" will be collected on one page rather than scattered throughout the book. There will also be a page devoted to college customs suggesting chapel customs and campus traditions.

Probably the most important innovation is the putting aside of a number of pages for a

record of cuts, together with space for reasons to be given as excuses.

A charge of 10 cents is to be made in advance for a copy. This charge is made necessary to cover the cost in part. The reason is made clear in Mr. Clarke's statement, "Because of the refusal by a combination of advertisers of Bangor to patronize the advertising pages of all student publications, it will be necessary to make a small charge to partly cover the cost. For this reason a charge of 10 cents will be made in advance to all who desire copies of the book."

The book will come out the last of the semester.

ATHLETIC BOARD MEETING

Improvements to be Made on Board Track

At a meeting of the Athletic Board last Thursday evening, the baseball schedule for next season was approved. It will not be made public, however, until the contracts are signed.

The Board also decided to improve the outdoor track by lowering the circles and widening one strip, at a cost not exceeding \$75.00. This work will be done during the Christmas recess.

NEW ELIGIBILITY RULE

Relating to Musical Clubs

At a recent meeting of the faculty a new eligibility rule in regard to the musical clubs was made, going into effect this semester.

Formerly a card certifying that the candidate is eligible has been required at the beginning of each semester, whereas under the new ruling but one card is required for both semesters and is to be issued about the middle of the fall semester. The change was made because the work of the club, although extending into two semesters, really only lasts about one, as far as time is concerned. This rule applies to everyone but the manager, who, on account of extra work, will need two cards.

The annual rush at McGill University has been abandoned. The four classes decided that the class fight there was a barbaric institution not serving to acquaint the members of the incoming class with themselves and the older students any better than other forms of welcome.

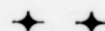

Rule 22 in the booklet of "Information for the Guidance of Students" reads as follows: "Candidates for membership in athletic teams, in order to be eligible, must obtain from the Secretary of the Faculty, a statement showing that their record satisfies the scholarship requirements of the faculty and deposit this in person with the Professor of Physical Culture and Director of Athletics."

This rule applies not only to the 'varsity teams, but also to class athletic organizations. This eligibility rule has been made by the faculty, not for the purpose of restricting in any unfair way, but to render as fair as possible the contests and to make all members of teams truly representative, in college standing, of the class to which they are supposed to belong.

This fall one student failed to realize the significance of faculty ruling and he played on a class team without obeying it. As a result he has been placed on probation for one year. Doubtless he will not attempt to repeat his action and the example should be sufficient to deter others from so doing.



Doubtless most of the students have read on the bulletin board in front of Alumni Hall the notice which tells of the handbook which is to be published next semester. This announcement should be well received by every student. The older ones already know how valuable a thing the little Y. M. C. A. Handbook was; and the new students can easily find out. All have missed the book this year and will welcome its appearance under the new board of publishers.

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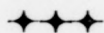
