Coach Flack, graduate manager Bryant, Manager Beckett and the team which represented Maine in the New England championship run were those who were present. Training rules were out of order and everybody did justice to the delicious supper which Mrs. Buck served. A theatre party at the Bijou was the conclusion of the evenings' entertainment. All the men who were fortunate enough to be the guests at this reception will remember it as the pleasantest occasion of the year.

It is customary at this reception to elect a captain for the next year. The honor went to Clyde A. McKeeman '23 who will lead the hill and dale men for 1922. "Mac" as he is known, hails from Milltown, Me., is a member of Phi Eta Kappa fraternity and a major in Mechanical Engineering. The choice is a popular one as he has accomplished the unusual in the athletic game. His freshman year he worked out for Assistant Manager of track and cross country and won the assistant manager's position. In his sophomore year he lost the manager's berth by a small majority.

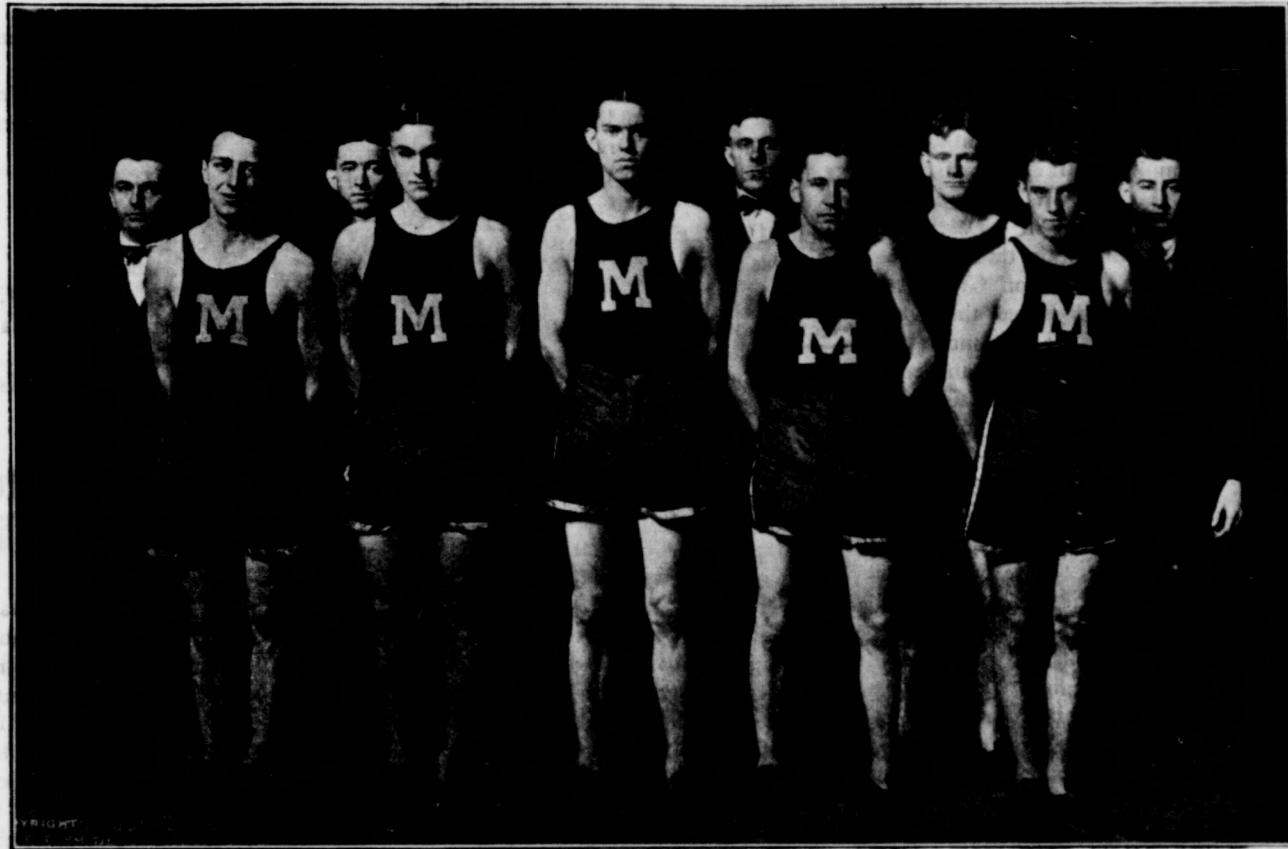
V. F. W. and R. O. T. C. Circus Great Success

Butler College Adopts An Old Maine Custom

Maine's "Hello" is now echoing on the campus at Butler College in Indianapolis, of which Dr. Robert J. Ale, recently of Maine, is president. The Butler Collegian of Nov. 30, several copies of which have been received here, contains a column article announcing an adoption of the unwritten rule whereby every student on the campus shall greet his fellows with a "Hello" whenever they chance to meet.

Members of the Butler faculty warmly endorse, in interview, this plan. Dr. Ale was quoted as saying: "The 'Hello' movement has my unqualified approval. My enthusiasm in this matter is born of experience at other colleges and universities. There is a measureless worth to a hearty 'Hello.' The custom of greeting all of your fellow students should become one of the most treasured traditions of Butler and inseparable from the college spirit." To illustrate what the "Hello" tradition has meant to University of Maine, Dr. Ale furnished the editors of his college paper with a copy of Mr. Cummings' French-Canadian dialect poem on "The Maine Hello," which recently appeared in The Campus, and they republished it.

Maine Defeats Vermont In First Rifle Match

Prospects this Year for the Maine Team Are Very Bright

In the first rifle match of the season, which was held last Friday, Dec. 5, the University of Maine Rifle Team won from the University of Vermont Rifle Team by a score of 468 to 462. This is a very encouraging start for the team, for in the first match of the season last year, which was also held with Vermont, the opponents won.

The scores made Friday by the five highest Maine men were:

The score made by the highest Vermont man was 98 and the next four highest men each shot 91, giving Vermont a total score of 462 points from a possible 500.

The next match of the season will be held with Yale sometime in January. Sec. Bus Steward is laying plans for matches with several other colleges, some of which are Harvard, Princeton, Drexel Institute, Georgetown, and New Hampshire State.

Coach Kidney is well pleased with the showing made by the club so far, but he says there is still room for improvement. He also says there is better material for a team among the members of the Student Rifle Club than there was last year, but many fellows that he knows are good shots have not done much practicing this year.

On Dec. 16, a squad of 20 active members will be picked from the club according to their ability. All other members of the club will be denied the right to shoot on the range. From this squad the team will be picked to represent the University in the other matches of the year. Coach Kidney says, "It is up to every member of the club, if he wishes to make the squad, to get out and shoot, and to turn in as good scores as possible. Don't say you can't shoot, get out

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University Life

University life is a very complex quantity and may be viewed from many different angles. A question which should interest all students here at this university is: "On what does the success of university life depend?" After giving some thought to this question the answer should be: "On the conscientious cooperative effort of every student."

It is natural for the greater percentage of us to take the easiest way out of anything difficult or boring. We invariably "pass the buck" to some other or others who are willing to accept the responsibility. What is the result of such a condition? The result is that the heavy burden of work falls on a few already over worked people. They are not able to do justice to the task for they are trying to accomplish more than any one person can possibly do properly.

You know many in this University who do absolutely nothing for anybody but themselves. They simply will not accept any responsibility. It is this class of persons who keep the degree of the success of university life here, constantly in debate. The enormous potential energy of the University is not realized until the students are willing to accept individual responsibility. Without the cooperation of everyone we fail; with the cooperation of all we succeed. Do you accept your share of personal responsibility? If you do, University life here will be a great success.

The Maine Banner

The Maine banner, which was stolen from the Elmwood Hotel after the Colby football game, has been returned. This banner was taken by a certain group of Colby students acting on the spur of the moment without careful thought.

This childish act was not the idea of the student body representatives and was not sanctioned or approved by them. This is stated in a recent editorial in the "Colby Echo." The spirit shown by the student body in obtaining the banner and returning it is highly commendable and shows us that the spirit of the Colby students is not lacking.

The Faculty Team

At the present time there are only three members of the faculty practicing for the faculty rifle team. It seems to us that many more of the faculty should try out for this activity and not let the team die.

The annual shoot between the faculty, the men and the women of the University will be held soon. The existence of the faculty team depends on the interest of its members. The students like to feel that the members of the faculty are interested and active in some outside interest.

Shall the Concerts Go?

The question of the Lyceum Concerts is again before us in a slightly different form. The last time this was considered it was a question of whether the concerts were to be well supported or poorly supported. It has now become a question of whether the concerts must be discontinued or not. Shall we as students let such a splendid opportunity for education and enjoyment as these concerts offer slip away from us?

The members of our faculty numbering 118 have bought 120 course tickets to the Lyceum Concerts. The student body of the University numbering 1400 have bought but 140 season tickets. What is the trouble with our student

body? Have they a lack of good taste and prefer the movies night after night? It is certainly a very evident fact that something is radically wrong.

The price of the seats for the remaining concerts of the course have been proportionately reduced and it seems to us that there is no excuse for the students who do not support these concerts.

Alumni Notes

Dr. Daniel R. Hodgdon '10 president of Valparaiso University, recently resigned his position under dramatic circumstances. He charged the University with being the hot-bed of Bolshevism, Communism, and other cults.

"The stream of propaganda," he declared, "can be traced to the very heart of the Federal government, so firmly are its protagonists entrenched."

In a letter to the trustees, he said, "I have been visited by so-called 'Reds' and foreign born members of organizations claiming to be backed by strong influences. Such representations, undoubtedly are part of a deep-laid plan to make Valparaiso a center of radical teaching. It is possible that much of the unrest of college life today is due to these destructive outside influences, aimed to destroy the basic principles upon which this government is founded."

Ernest I. Turner '18 is now with the Western Paper Works Chemical Co. in Kalamazoo, Mich. He is the chemist in charge of the laboratory.

J. E. Nelson of Augusta, a graduate of the University of Maine Law School in 1904, is Republican candidate for Representative to Congress from the third district.

Wallace R. Farrington '91 publisher of a newspaper in Honolulu, was recently nominated by President Harding to be governor of Hawaii.

Mr. Farrington began his newspaper career as a reporter for the Bangor Daily News. In 1894, he went to Honolulu and has been connected with the newspaper business there. At the time of his nomination, he was general manager of the Honolulu Star-Bulletin. He has held public positions on the Territorial Board of Education and the Republican territorial committee and has made a close study of territorial conditions.

SCIENCE IN THE AIR

Supercharger Made Record Breaking
Airplane Flight Possible

The recent record breaking airplane flight of Lieut. J. A. MacReady to a height of over 40,000 feet, was made possible through the use of special turbine supercharger. This is a device which takes the scant supply of oxygen from the rarefied atmosphere at these tremendous heights and compresses it to sea level density, supplying it at this density to the carburetors of the airplane engine.

The supercharger does the same thing for the engine that oxygen flasks do for the pilot—prevents suffocation.

Beyond altitudes of 15,000 feet, the aviator must begin to take oxygen.

As the aviator approaches 20,000 feet, the gas engine of his airplane begins to struggle, also for want of oxygen; for at that level there is only half as much oxygen in the atmosphere as there is at sea level. The speed of the engine slows down because there is not enough oxygen for combustion.

Aided by the supercharger, however, the airplane can now master heights unattainable without it. The supercharger has given the gas engine of the airplane actually more vitality than the man who rides in the airplane.

Dr. Sanford A. Moss, research engineer, who designed the G. E. supercharger, has made the apparatus work by means of a complete cycle of operations. The red-hot exhaust gases from the airplane engine, which formerly passed off into the air as wasted energy, are now made to discharge against a small turbine wheel, causing it to revolve at between 20,000 and 30,000 revolutions per minute.

The turbine drives a centrifugal air compressor, which compresses the small percentage of oxygen in the rarefied air to sea level density and feeds it into the carburetors of the engine. That enables the engine to continue running at full power; to continue driving the propeller of the airship; and to continue discharging exhaust gases, which in turn, continue to operate the turbine wheel.

RESEARCH BELOW ZERO

The science of cold—of extremely low temperatures—may be regarded by many persons as still remote from industry. Cryogenics, as this science is called, nevertheless, has become a practical subject, particularly the characteristics of gas mixtures in relation to liquefaction and separation of gases for industrial application purposes. Liquid oxygen has a practical application as an explosive. If an absorbent pad is saturated with a liquid hydrocarbon, it can, in presence of liquid oxygen, be exploded with great violence. The combination is used at the present time in mines in France and Germany. The only commercial use of liquid air is as a source of liquid and gaseous oxygen. Other uses may be developed. Knowledge of cryogenics aids in separation of pure helium. Substituting helium for hydrogen removes many dangers from air ships and balloons.

This year he came out for cross country and after a few weeks of running looked like available varsity material. A week later over the Franklin Park Course, he was tenth man to finish, second on the winning New England championship team and again at the National run in New York he was the second Maine man to finish in the six mile grind.

No dual race was held this year as it was impossible to arrange a run with any of the larger colleges. As the State Meet was held here at Orono, the training was modeled to suit the standpipe course, yet Coach Flack sent his harriers twice a week over the Great Works course in preparation for the level, sandy New England course.

A squad of twenty men trained faithfully until the final race was over and to those men who did not get the chance to represent their institution should be given a full measure of credit.

State Meet: Orono, November 4—Bates 1, Maine 2, Bowdoin 3, Colby 4. New England Meet: Boston, November 12—Won by Maine with M. I. T. in second place.

National Meet: New York—November 21—Won by Cornell, Maine placing ninth out of a field of thirteen competitors, including the larger and more important colleges and universities in the United States.

Jim Baldwin Successful At Trinity This Year

Students and alumni will be glad to hear of Jim Baldwin's success at Trinity College, where he has followed athletics since leaving Maine. Baldwin was for two years Director of Athletics and Football Coach here at the University. Under his coaching in 1919 Maine won the State championship and the same year had the honor of the New England championship for State universities.

According to the *News and Observer*, Baldwin deserves a great deal of credit for the showing his team made in defeating Wake Forest 17-0, at Raleigh, November 10. This was the first important football game the Methodists have played in twenty-seven years, and their splendidly coached team staged a surprise that was a sensation in the football field of the whole State. Says the *News and Observer*: "The victory of the Methodists was as unexpected as it was decisive. Before the game, their Baptist rivals were picked by nonpartisan critics to win to the tune of about three touchdowns. But Coach Baldwin's machine gave the big holiday crowd of some 3500 people a thorough good surprise, as well as a rattling good exhibition of football as played by the book."

"Crushing to shreds the vaunted Wake Forest strength, the Trinity team kept the Baptists on the defensive during the whole struggle. The same team which completed a dozen forward passes against Carolina was not able to get away with a single one against the Methodists. The Trinity warriors, though outweighed, were easy masters of the situation, and showed that they have received and taken advantage of the best kind of coaching."
