County Fair To Be Given by R. O. T. C.

Alumni Hall Will Be Scene of
Red Cross Benefit Show on
Saturday Evening

The R. O. T. C. Unit of the University will give a County Fair in the gym Saturday night.

The Military department has cornered the greatest collection of freaks ever seen on the campus. At seven-thirty a vaudeville show of ten big acts featuring soloists, quartets, tumblers and toe dancers will be given in the chapel. The Jewish Symphony of last year's Minstrel Show are to step forth out of their retirement and will no doubt prove a big drawing card. The R. O. T. C. company whose members present the best act on the program will be awarded a prize.

A side-show, having such attractions as the Wild Man, the Bearded Lady, Famous Fortune Tellers and Dancing girls, will be given during the remainder of the evening. The gym will be opened for dancing immediately after the vaudeville show, the Melody Makers furnishing the music. Instead of paying admission at the door the floor will be cleared after each dance and a small sum charged for each individual dance. Between dances such time honored classics as the potato race, candle race and the fresh egg and spoon race will take place.

Refreshment booths will be placed in the corners. Pop-corn, peanuts, ice cream, cake, coffee and innumerable other appetizing fillers for empty spaces are to be on sale.

The purpose of the evening's entertainment is to gather funds for the Red Cross of Orono and Old Town and to provide for a district nurse.

The committee in charge consists of Whitehouse, Sullivan, Nickerson, Leach and Getchell.

To Run Prep School Basketball Tournament

Prof. J. M. Baldwin, director of athletics, is planning for a state tournament here of championship basketball teams in Maine high schools and academies. His idea is to send a circular letter to the captains of preparatory school teams, inviting to Orono at the end of the season all teams that have won the championship in their respective counties.

Here, in a four-day tournament, in the University gymnasium, they would compete for state honors. Arrangements would be made to furnish at the dormitories and fraternity houses free entertainment to the members of the teams.

It is suggested that by giving local county championship winners could entertainments, or by other means, the earn money to cover cost of transportation, so the trip would be inexpensive.

The plan will, it is believed, meet with much encouragement among the preparatory schools in Maine that feature basketball in their athletic activities.

Agriculture Instructor Receives Appointment

Congratulations to Raymond H. Lovejoy, who will this month step from the agricultural course into a responsible and fair-salaried position as agricultural county agent in Oxford county. Dean Merrill, director of the agricultural extension service in Maine, has recommended him for Federal appointment, cooperating with the executive committee of the Farm Bureau, whose unanimous choice he was, and it is expected that he will begin his new duties before March 1.

Lovejoy is the type of student who is bound to make his way in the world. He entered University of Maine in 1913, taking the agricultural course, and earning his "board and keep" by working on a dairy farm. Being the son of an apple buyer and packer, he took naturally to horticulture, majoring in fruit growing.

In the spring of 1917, when agricultural students were released to help in food production, he hired and operated a farm, and the following year bought a farm, which he has since sold.

He taught high school at Flagstaff a year, then turned his attention to business and was getting along finely as a sales manager when he decided last year, despite an offer of increased salary, that he would finish his college course.

He is a member of the honorary fraternity, Alpha Zeta. He was on his class debating team in 1916, a varsity debater in 1917, has served as treasurer of the Agricultural Club and as assistant manager of Practical Husbandry.

Maine Loses Loyal Friend

The sudden announcement, Monday forenoon, of the death of Governor Frederic H. Parkhurst brought to the University of Maine a keen sense of personal loss. He was an avowed friend of this institution, had several times addressed the students here, and we felt that in him the University had a staunch advocate who, insofar as he was able to assist, would see that its urgent needs received due consideration from the members of the Legislature.

Only a few brief months ago the men of the University, responding as a body, regardless of personal political views, joined in Bangor's celebration of the election of their honored son to the chief executive office of the state.

He went into office unfettered by prejudice or class affiliation, and backed by a majority greater than had ever been given any candidate in Maine. Having had the experience of service in both legislative branches, and having kept in continuous touch with administrative matters, he was well fitted to begin at once a term of service that should be a credit to both himself and the State. His inaugural address showed a breadth of vision and strength of purpose that further commended the people's choice of him as their leader.

Five days after he took the oath of office he was stricken, in a singular way, with an illness that terminated fatally, despite all that medical skill could do to avert such an outcome.

Governor Parkhurst's zeal, his alertness, patience and fixedness of purpose, his desire to do real service, his loyalty to his friends and, above all, his charm of personality, will ever be remembered by the thousands who today are expressing sorrow at his untimely death.

As president of the Senate, Hon. Percival P. Baxter of Portland automatically becomes acting Governor for the remainder of the two-year term, and the Senate will elect a new presiding officer. The State is fortunate in having in reserve a young man of such strong character, ability and conscientious devotion to duty to step into the high office from which death has removed so valiant a public servant. It is believed that Governor Baxter will endeavor to fulfill, to the best of his ability, the high aims and purposes of his beloved predecessor.

Relay Team Picked To Run B. A. A. Meet

The final relay time trials were held Monday by Coach Flack and the men picked for the relay team, which is to run in the three cornered meet with Tufts in the B. A. A. games Saturday, were Captain Pratt, Castle, Lawrence, Rock, and substitute. This is practically the same squad that defeated Tufts at the B. A. A. meet last year. However, every man on the team is showing a marked improvement over his record of last year and is sure to burn up the boards in the meet Saturday.

The team has been greatly weakened by the loss of Hagerty and O'Connor, who have become ineligible due to scholastic difficulties. Hagerty is a letter man in relay and his absence will be felt keenly. O'Connor was also showing excellent running ability this season. In spite of these handicaps, the coach is confident that Maine will come thru victorious in the coming meet.

Barwise Act Asks New Board Maine Trustees

Declares University State Institution;
Provides Board of Overseers
Elected by Alumni

The Barwise Act, which was recently brought before the present session of the state legislature by Representative Barwise of Bangor, provides for the termination of the terms of office of the trustees of the University of Maine, who may be in office on July 1, 1922 and for the appointment by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, of a new board consisting of nine trustees. It also contains a provision for the election by the alumni of five persons to constitute a board of overseers of the University. The first section of the act also declares the University of Maine to be a state institution.

The act states further that nine trustees shall be appointed by the Governor between June 15 and June 30, 1922. Three of the trustees are to be appointed, under this act, for a term of one year, three for a term of two years, and three for a term of three years, the term of office to begin on July 1, 1922, and the trustees at the time of their appointments being residents of the state of Maine. Six of the members of the board of trustees first appointed shall be selected from a list of 18 candidates submitted by the alumni of the University, and two members of each group of three appointed in the future shall be selected from a list of six candidates selected by the Alumni.

The duties of the board of overseers, which shall be elected by mail by the alumni, shall be of a purely advisory nature. It will be the function of this body to recommend in writing from time to time improvements in the management and the various requirements of the University.

Inspection Trip Made By Senior Electricals

The senior electricals went to the Bangor telephone office and inspected the various electrical appliances. Before going to the apparatus rooms the manager gave them a brief talk on the organization of the Bell telephone system. After this talk they went to the test rooms where they were shown how the associated press, newspaper and brokerage news is received. The whole equipment consisting of cables, batteries and switchboards were pointed out and explained to them. The feature of the place was the multiplex telephone equipment which worked on the carrier current system with the use of vacuum tubes. This is the second installation of the kind in the country and represents the latest ideas in telephone practice. They also had the vacuum tube telephone repeaters which make commercial conversations between Canadian points possible. From here they went to the Local Exchange and saw the switchboards for local and toll calls. The boys were not able to pay much attention to the operators as they were busy and are not allowed to engage in conversation with visitors.

Approximately 161,000 fans have attended six of the biggest games of the season. The Centre-Harvard game was witnessed by 40,000 fans.

Maine lost her first home game last Saturday night at Bangor City Hall to Boston College by the score of 25-45 before one of the largest crowds ever attending a basketball game at Bangor. Capt. Don Coady and Dresser featured for Maine while Hickey and Urban, the sensational Boston College athletes starred for Boston College.

The players were handicapped by the slippery floor but the game, especially in the first half, was fast, both teams playing about even. In the second half the Maine men showed flashes of speed and clever passing but were unable to cage a basket while they were in Boston College territory.

The game started with Urban (B.C.) shooting a pretty basket on a free try. Dresser (M) followed that up by caging a basket. Melley (B.C.) then shot two successive baskets. Hickey (B.C.) then made a pretty basket from the middle of the floor. Urban (B.C.) on a free try tossed the ball into the basket. Hickey (B.C.) caged another basket. Berg (M), on free tries made both succeed. Urban (B.C.) made another tally by shooting on a free try. Morley, B. C.'s center, made a goal as a result of clever passing by Urban and Hickey. Berg (M) and Urban (B.C.) each added a point to their scores on free tries. Hickey made another goal.

Dresser (M) on a free try caged a basket. Berg (M) succeeded in making one shot succeed out of the two free tries as a result of the fouls called on Rodrick. Morley (B.C.) and Hickey (B.C.) each shot a basket. Berg (M) shot a basket on another free try. Capt. Coady (M) by clever handling of the ball scored a basket. He followed this up by another from the middle of the floor. Morley (B.C.) and Hickey

Business Meeting Held By Athletic Association

A. A. games, it was also voted that the A. A. board recommend a charge for varsity basketball games in the gymnasium of (\$35) for general admission and that for the dance following, the men be charged (\$25) additional.

Editorial

You've heard a lot about the old Maine spirit, but you have never seen it. You seem to think that it is something of the past, something that has come and gone never to return. And if someone told you that you could bring it back you would probably turn it down without a try. If you want to continue doing what you have been doing for the last three years, why, just keep on—doing nothing. But if you really would like to bring back the old spirit: to live, if only for short time, as the old Maine men did, then do as the old Maine men did.

When chapel was compulsory everybody went. And everybody knew everybody else. It was just like one big family getting together for a few minutes every day. You saw all your old friends and you made new ones. You met the visitors to the campus. And thru the speakers you received messages from the outside world. You got news of the old Maine men. And just thru these few minutes of contact with your fellow students you were inspired with the one big thing—Maine.

We just said that you knew everybody. Well, you did, and you felt that everybody was your friend. And for that very reason you did twice as much for Maine, because you did not do it to show Maine spirit, but because one of your friends asked you to. You did it for mere friendship. And this was the feeling that made possible the old Maine spirit. When the team started off on a trip you either gave it a rousing good send-off or you went with it and gave the men on it your support and encouragement just because they were your friends. But were it not for chapel this friendship would not have existed and there never would have been the traditional Maine spirit.

We want to send out one last appeal, while there are still a few of the old Maine men here, that we start some sort of a daily assembly. There never can be that old Maine spirit unless there exists that friendly familiarity. And this in turn depends on a daily assembly. Would not every student here be willing to set aside fifteen minutes every day when it is all for his own good and especially for the betterment of Maine? If we promised you with a vaudeville act for one day, a comedian for another, a live wire speaker for a third, some assorted music for a fourth, and perhaps a band concert for a fifth day, would you be interested then?

If you were asked whether or not you wanted some kind of an assembly, would you say yes or no? If you say yes then we know that you want to help yourself and Maine. If you say no then we understand that you want to crawl away in some little hole, all by yourself like a hermit, and rot.

Exams are like the poor—we have them always with us.

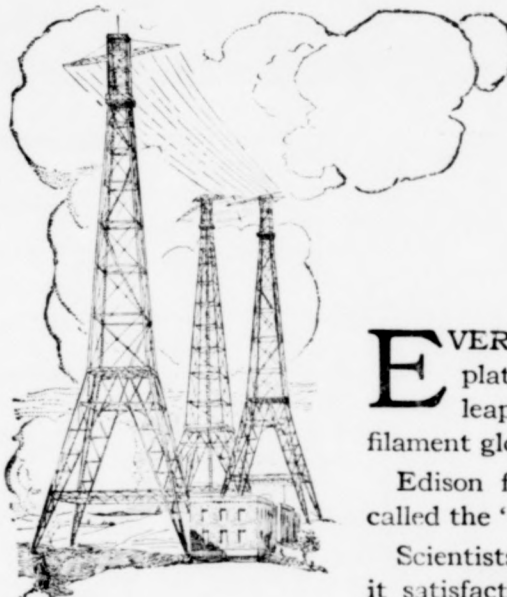

How is a Wireless Message Received?

EVERY incandescent lamp has a filament. Mount a metal
plate on a wire in the lamp near the filament. A current
leaps the space between the filament and the plate when the
filament glows.

Edison first observed this phenomenon in 1883. Hence it was
called the "Edison effect."

Scientists long studied the "effect" but they could not explain
it satisfactorily. Now, after years of experimenting with Crookes
tubes, X-ray tubes and radium, it is known that the current that

by means of the grid, affects the powerful electron stream.

All this followed from studying the mysterious "Edison effect"—
a purely scientific discovery.

No one can foresee what results will follow from research in pure
science. Sooner or later the world must benefit practically from the
discovery of new facts.

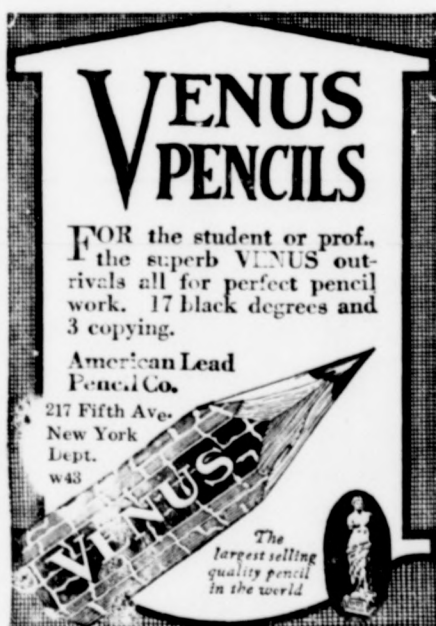
