TRUSTEE MEETING

College Store to be Under A. A.—Mail Delivery in Alumni—W. T. Haines Chosen President

Several important matters were dealt with at the special meeting of the Board of Trustees, which was held in Alumni Hall last Friday. Action was taken to remove the college store from under the management of Sampson Brothers and operate it through a corporation representing the Athletic Association. This change will take place at the end of the college year in June. In order to secure the stock of the store the Association will probably issue stock to individuals, which it will later take up year by year until the store is the property of the Association itself. The barber shop will be rented directly by the University.

The telephone exchange and the mail delivery will not remain in the store, but will be removed to Alumni, where they will be carried on by the University. The exchange will accommodate only the University buildings and the private subscribers will be connected with the Orono office. The private post-office will have accommodations in the room back of the Treasurer's office and will be equipped with an entire system of steel lock boxes, which Mr. Haines has offered to give.

As successor to Mr. E. B. Winslow Mr. W. T. Haines of Waterville was elected President of the Board. Mr. Haines has served longer as Trustee of the University than any man now on the Board. He graduated in the Class of 1876, and in 1883 was first appointed as a Trustee. He served continuously from that time until 1902, acting as secretary of the Board for many years. From 1902 to 1906 he was off the Board, having been appointed to another State office. In 1906, however he was reappointed, and in the past few years he has been one of the most active and influential Trustees of the institution. The Board has the utmost confidence in entrusting its Presidency to Mr. Haines, for since he graduated from the University he has gained a high standing as a lawyer, and is now one of the strongest men in the Republican party in the State.

Various matters regarding Hannibal Hamlin Hall were considered in the meeting. The numbering of the rooms is to be on the modern

plan, beginning with 100 on the first floor and 200 on the second floor and so forth. The rental of the rooms was determined, the three-room suites on the front with bay-windows being five dollars for four men. The other rooms are graded accordingly. Part of the furniture will be furnished by the University, and part of the laundering will be done free.

The old Commons building will be finished off into two-seven-room apartments for members of the Faculty. The corridor connecting the Commons with Oak Hall will be moved to Lord Hall, where it will be used as a store-room, and the east ell of the Commons building will be moved to the rear of the new dormitory, where it will be made into storerooms and lodging rooms for the help.

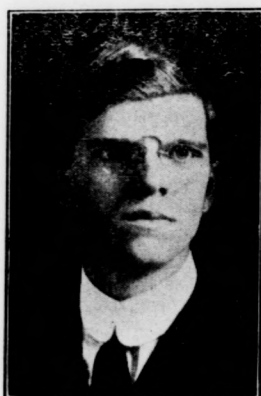
A. A. MASS MEETING

Subscriptions Received—Amendments to By-Laws Acted Upon

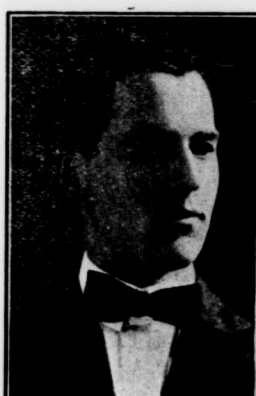
Almost every seat in the Chapel was occupied when President Sumner of the Athletic Association called the body to order yesterday morning for a mass meeting in place of the regular chapel service. It was the first meeting held since the football season closed, and various matters were taken up.

At first speeches were made by G. R. Woodberry, manager of baseball, and by W. McDonald, manager of track, calling for the support of the student body for these two branches of athletics this Spring. Then J. A. Gannett, the treasurer of the Association, made a few remarks, urging the financial support of the students and guaranteeing the best possible expenditure of the funds raised under the direction of Mr. Wingard. The speeches closed with a heart-to-heart talk by Mr. Wingard regarding the material which appeared for the Maine teams. The athletic director held back nothing, and made it plain that the smallest percentage of Maine men turn out for athletics of any of the four colleges in the State. He did his best to stir up a spirit that would kill this indifference toward athletics in the University, and from the applause which he received he was at least temporarily successful. Whether his speech had any permanent effect

remains to be seen, but it will be the fault of the students, not his, if it does not.

Just before the close of the meeting the amendments were reached, which were to be voted upon. Since there had been some criticism of the amendments which had been adopted last fall, especially regarding the awarding of the M in tennis, the Athletic Board had voted to resubmit all these amendments, and they were read by President Sumner, in addition to those recently recommended by the Board. On account of a lack of time, however, only the amendment regarding the tennis letter was considered. After some discussion the following was adopted in place of the section previously adopted, giving only a TMT to men making the tennis team or winning the finals in the State tournament: "To those winning the finals in a State tournament an M shall be awarded, and to those playing in the finals in a State tournament or winning the majority of games in a dual tournament, a TMT shall be awarded."

A meeting of the Association is called for next Thursday evening at 7 o'clock in the Chapel for the consideration of the remainder of the amendments which have been recommended.

EDITORIAL.

In this issue of the CAMPUS is printed a plan for class organization which, if ratified by the University Council at its meeting today, will be presented to the various classes for adoption. The plan has been brought forth because at present there is little or no method in the conduct of class meetings and in class affairs in general. The only rules that are followed are those set down by custom and precedent. Such few form a rather weak basis upon which a class may begin its four-year career, and they have proved insufficient and unsatisfactory for handling the business of a class in the best manner.

Consequently, this proposed constitution deserves the hearty support of every student who

would concern himself at all with the best interests of the University. It will do away with many of the evils in class matters which have come to receive the general condemnation of the undergraduates. It will give to the classes a definite basis upon which to transact their business; it will prevent the speedy and half-hearted calling of class meetings, to the sacrifice of a large proportion of the classes and hence to a great diminution of the interest which should be felt by all in their class affairs; it will provide for better financial methods, and it will make the nomination and election of officers regular instead of haphazard.

On many points it will only reduce to written form the rules which everyone is willing to recognize as proper, but which are often not held to firmly and which consequently lose their strength of inviolability. In a few instances, however, this constitution introduces comparatively new ideas. It calls for an executive committee which shall be more than the mere figure-head that executive committees have been in the past; the committee will have a check upon the care of the funds of the class by the treasurer, it is to have considerable to do with the elections, and it will serve as a sort of board of directors for matters in general. Furthermore, the constitution provides that the officers shall be elected for the most part all at once, with the view of having a larger ballot on the candidates for these positions. Still another clause forbids to any person who is in arrears in class dues the privilege of voting or holding office.

If the plan gains the approval of the Council it will probably be first presented to the Senior Class, and if adopted, to the other classes. Future classes will adopt it as a matter of course when they enter the University. It would seem that such a measure, which is bound to raise the prestige and self-respect of the classes, should receive the favor of a great majority of the students. It may take many by surprise, however, as nothing of a similar nature has ever been recommended or discussed to any length, and for this reason it deserves the careful study of every student, that he may fully appreciate the benefits of which it would be the source.

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Away up at the top of a lofty pole that stands directly in the center of the Campus and only a few paces from the most used of all walks, one sees, if he happens to glance upward, a faded and frayed American flag. It is seen only occasionally, because tattered as it is and never lowered to rest its weary stripes, which often seem to be begging for a little respite from the unceasing batterings of the wind, students have completely lost the significance of its waving above the Maine Campus, and the sense of pride and love that, as boys, they felt for the Stars and Stripes.

Yet, this utter unconsciousness, which should shame the heart of every Maine man, as it would the heart of every true American, of the presence of the flag above him, is not from a lack of loyalty and patriotism in that very same heart. The feeling—or absence of feeling—is caused more than anything else by the spirit with which the flag has been put there. Sentiment should be bursting from the heart of every American as he raises his country's flag aloft or sees it rippling in the breeze. This flag, however, was placed on the pole no one knows when, and has remained there as if nailed to the top, day in and day out, month in and month out, until the red stripes have lost their richness and the ends have been frayed down more and more with every storm.

Deep is the meaning buried in that flag, and appreciative of this were those who pulled the ropes at its first raising. Is it not, then, worthy of regret and criticism that the daily raising of the flag, which was practiced a few years ago, should be lost and the duty which every institution that benefitted by the state university act signed by Abraham Lincoln be decried? How can the students regard that flag with due veneration, when it seems to have been raised there merely to fulfil an obligation?

In many countries the national flag is never passed without receiving a salute, but this is the exception, not the custom, in the United States. It is a pity that this should be, however, and the colleges and universities throughout the country could well use their tremendous influence to foster a less indifferent spirit toward the flag. If the University will float a new flag at the top

of the pole in front of Fernald Hall and will take proper care of it, the students may at least look up at it without its being an eyesore to them. And they will feel, if they are patriotic enough to salute it in passing, that they are paying honor to something worth while.

An honor of more note perhaps than was apparent on the surface, was paid President Alely last week, when he was received by a large number of Colby alumni at their banquet in Boston Friday evening. Not for a long time, if ever, has a similar invitation been extended to the head of one Maine college by the alumni of another. This was indeed, then, a distinctive proof of the place which Dr. Alely already holds among the college presidents, and what is more, was evidence of the spirit of co-operation which is down in the hearts of the friends of each of the four institutions in Maine.

An honor which is for but few of the class that leaves the University every year is the election to Phi Kappa Phi, which was bestowed upon five members of the Senior Class last week. It is the result of nearly four years of toil and faithfulness, which have not had the encouragement that work for the ordinary college honor receives. Yet, because it is the consequence of such a long period of labor and because it is a mark of superiority in a competition in which all take part, the election to Phi Kappa Phi is the greatest honor that can be won in the University.

Next Saturday half a thousand boys are going to visit the Campus. Maine men should appreciate and grasp this opportunity to interest such a large number of the best youths in the State, many of them future college men, in the University. Let us volunteer our aid in entertaining them, and let us throw open our fraternity houses for their reception.

**Many Enjoy the Excellent Interpretation of
Electra by Prof. Daggett, Wednesday
Evening**

The program provided by the Literati for last Wednesday evening was a reading of the Greek drama of Euripides, *Electra*, by Professor Windsor P. Daggett. His introduction took the form of an explanation of the Greek drama, its increasing popularity in large institutions, and how interest in it is aroused by dramatic readings. He said there were two great dramatic eras. The first was the period of Euripides, Sophocles, and Aeschylus, the second, the Elizabethan era. Shakespeare, Ibsen, and Sophocles might be referred to as the keystones of tragedy. He pointed out how little the fundamentals of the drama had changed in 2000 years. However, the theatre of today could not be compared to that of the Greeks which was usually on a hillside and would seat 20,000 or 30,000 people. The subject of the Greek drama was generally taken from mythology or from some noted family, so it would be familiar to the audience and the plot easily followed. The plays themselves were accounted as parts of great state festivals and were only given two or three times a year.

Electra, the subject of the reading, is not considered one of Euripides' best. His works cover a transition period and are more modern than those of Sophocles. The action in it is divided into five parts with choral odes between. The translation used was one by Gilbert Murray, who condensed it by omitting the longer odes, retaining only enough to show the original function of the chorus. The play deals with the story of Orestes and *Electra*. *Electra* is married to a peasant and is awaiting the return of her brother, Orestes, from exile to avenge her father's death.

The play starts with a peasant telling the story of the murder of Agamemnon, King of Argos, by his wife Clymenestra and an enemy named Aegisthus, of the wrongs done his children, Orestes and *Electra*, and of the marriage of Aegisthus and Clymenestra. He is interrupted by *Electra* who holds a short conversation with him and they both depart. Orestes and a friend, Pylades then enter; Orestes has returned to Argos quietly to avenge his father's death. When *Electra* returns that way, he converses with her as a friend of her brother and questions her about the state of affairs in Argos. As they are talking, they are approached by an old teacher who recognizes Orestes and welcomes him. They consult with him as to how Aegisthus

should be murdered and the old man tells Orestes that he will find no friends in Argos to help him, but that he must carry out the murder alone. He also added that Aegisthus was at that minute in a nearby field preparing a sacrifice. Orestes and the old man depart on the errand of murder and pretty soon, the news is brought of the slaying of Aegisthus by Orestes. *Electra* then kills Clymenestra and their father's death is avenged. The play ends with the departure of *Electra* and Orestes' friend, Pylades, to be married while Orestes leaves Argos to seek repentance, a murderer and an exile.

The reading was thoroughly enjoyed by those present, Professor Daggett exhibiting remarkable talent in the interpretation of the characters.

POULTRY INSTITUTE

Three Days' Program Opened Today

The Second Annual Poultry Institute began its three days' sessions this morning in Winslow Hall. There is every indication that the institute this year will have a larger attendance than that of last year, and an excellent program has been arranged to interest the poultrymen of the State.

Every phase of poultry husbandry will be taken up, and among the speakers are some of the leading authorities on the subject in America. The program for today has included lectures on Poultry Houses and Housing, by Prof. C. A. Rogers of Cornell, Poultry Feeds and Their Digestibility, by Prof. J. M. Bartlett of the Experiment Station, The Storage and Shipment of Poultry Products, by Prof. H. C. Pierce of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, and The Fattening of Poultry, by Prof. F. C. Elford of MacDonald College, Quebec. This evening Prof. Pierce will give an illustrated lecture on the Marketing of Poultry Products.

The program for the next two days includes numerous addresses by these same men and by others. These will include Dr. Pearl of the Experiment Station, Mr. A. R. Jewett, secretary of the Somerset County Poultry Producers' Association, Mr. George P. Coffin, secretary of the Freeport Poultry Association, and Prof. F. H. Stoneburn of Connecticut Agricultural College.

During the three days a poultry exhibition will be held in the judging pavilion. The show will take in poultry from outside the University, as well as from the University plant, and the birds will be judged.

BOYS TO VISIT CAMPUS

Plans being made for the Entertainment of the Large Number of Boys Coming

The committee organized to look after the entertainment of the boys who will visit the University during the Conference have held two meetings and definite plans have been made for the occasion. The committee will be further enlarged by the addition of a man from each fraternity and from Oak Hall.

As the boys will have only a short time to spend on the Campus it is planned to show them about as much as possible and then to gather in the chapel and give them an idea of what a genuine "Maine" mass meeting is like.

Every student should plan to remain on the Campus that afternoon and there will be work for everyone who wishes to help.

The committee is made up as follows: Dr. Aley, Dean Hart, Director Wingard, from the Faculty, H. R. Sargent, M. D. Jones, L. C. Smith from the Y. M. C. A., M. J. McCarthy from the Senior Skulls, G. G. Tilley, from the Sophomore Owls.

PROF. SHEPARDSON IN CHAPEL

University of Chicago Man Spoke Last Tuesday Morning

For a few minutes during the chapel period last Tuesday morning the student body had the privilege of listening to a speech by Dr. F. W. Shepardson of the University of Chicago. His talk bore upon the college man as an individual in the community. Speaking of the numerous colleges which he had visited within the past few months, he compared them with the huge power plants turning out energy upon the world all the time.

Then he held up as the key-note of American life the word "Service." The significance of this one word he urged the student body to understand, and during their college course and in future to aim toward it and keep it as their motto.

On Feb. 1st Indiana University celebrated the ninety-first anniversary of its foundation.

The geological department at Cornell has received a consignment of several hundred pounds of ice from Illecilewatt glacier, in the Canadian Selkirks. The ice will be used to determine the nature and flow of glacial ice.

Friday he was in Boston, where he delivered before the school superintendents of the State an address on the Care of the Individual in Education. That evening he was a guest at a banquet held by the Boston Alumni of Colby College.

Saturday he was at Lewiston, where he presided at the evening session of the State Y. M. C. A. conference. Then, after spending Sunday at home, he went to Portland yesterday to attend a dinner given by the Congregational Club of that city, where he gave an address.

TIME WORK ABSENCES

Faculty Rule Limiting Cuts to be Taken

The rule regarding absences from recitations has been changed to include time work, and now reads as follows:

26. (a) Any student absent in one semester, nine times from a subject scheduled five times a week, or eight times from a subject scheduled four times a week, or six times from a subject scheduled three times a week, or four times from a subject scheduled twice a week, or three times from a subject scheduled once a week shall be dropped from that course. In case a subject continues only part of a semester the number of absences is proportionally reduced. A student who has been dropped from a course on account of absences may apply to the Committee on Attendance for reinstatement and may attend until his application is acted upon. If the committee find his explanation satisfactory, and if the instructor reports that he can continue the course with profit, he may be reinstated. If, after reinstatement, his record be unsatisfactory either to the instructor or to the committee, he shall be permanently dropped from that course.

(b). The head of a department shall be given power to drop from any course given in the department any student who in his opinion is seriously neglecting work. Such action shall be reported to the Faculty without unnecessary delay.

A recent census at Dartmouth showed that 52% of the Sophomores, 60% of the Juniors, and 84% of the Seniors smoked.

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"STEVE" FARRELL**Coach Smith's Story About Old Maine Trainer**

Coach Smith of the track team in his experience as runner, trainer, and coach in athletic circles has had much opportunity to become acquainted with the record and reputation of "Steve" Farrell, who as trainer and track coach at Maine two years ago was so well liked by every Maine man, and through this source of information the CAMPUS has been able to get some facts about "Steve's" past career which may be interesting.

There is no doubt that "Steve" Farrell, the man who did so much for Maine teams and who worked for Maine's interests so loyally was one of the foremost sprinters, in his day, that the world ever produced. His success across the water was especially marked. He won the world-famous Sheffield 120 yards Handicap at Sheffield, England, against the best professional sprinters that America, England, Australia and all Europe could produce. He and "Tommy" Keane, who is now trainer at Syracuse University, are the only true Americans that ever competed successfully at Sheffield. This performance speaks for itself for all of our famous sprinters have failed in that event. Prominent among those who have failed are "Nat" Cartmel, the former star U. of P. sprinter and Coach Smith himself. They did not compete in the real Sheffield event for the race has been transferred to Manchester where it is conducted annually, usually on Christmas Day. It is, however, the same event held in a different territory.

As a track coach and trainer, "Steve" was and is a great success. Every Maine man knows the fine work that he did here on the Campus, and "Mike" Murphy of U. of P. with whom Coach Smith worked before coming to Maine holds "Steve" Farrell as one of the leading coaches in America today.

A CLASS CONSTITUTION**One to be Presented to Classes by Senior Skull Society**

With a view to systematize the conduct of class business the Senior Skull Society has drafted a constitution suitable for acceptance by all the classes. This will be laid before the University Council at its meeting today for ratification, and if it receives such approval it will soon be offered to the classes for their consideration. In order that the students may have an opportunity to digest its articles it is printed below:

ARTICLE I

The name of this organization shall be the Class of of the University of Maine.

ARTICLE II

The membership of the Class shall consist of all students listed at the University office as members of the Class, and of all students who entered the University for the first time in and who are not listed as members of any class at the University office.

ARTICLE III

The officers of the Class shall be a President, a Vice-President, a Secretary, a Treasurer, and an Executive Committee of five members, one of whom shall be the President.

ARTICLE IV

Sec. 1. It shall be the duty of the President, and in his absence of the Vice-President, to call meetings when he deems it necessary or upon petition of fifteen members, provided that at least 24 hours' notice be given of each meeting, and to perform all other duties that devolve upon his office.

Sec. 2. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep an accurate record of all meetings and at each meeting to read the minutes of the preceding meeting.

Sec. 3. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to collect and account for all class dues; to deposit all funds in a bank approved by the Executive Committee; to pay all bills by check; and to post a report during the week following the auditing of his books.

Sec. 4. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to have charge of all elections, to audit the accounts of all class officers, committees, and managers, during the last three weeks of the Freshman, Sophomore, and Senior years, and during the first two weeks of the Senior year, and to attend to such other matters as may come within its jurisdiction.

ARTICLE V

Sec. 1. For all class offices, candidates shall be nominated by a Nominating Committee consisting of one representative from each fraternity chapter and for every ten non-fraternity members of the Class, provided that the credentials of each delegate are satisfactory to the Executive Committee.

Sec. 2. The meetings of the Nominating Committee shall be called and presided over by the President, who must give at least 24 hours' notice of each meeting. The President shall have no vote in the meetings of the Committee, and the nominations shall not cease until every delegate has had an opportunity to nominate at least one candidate.

Sec. 3. For each class office three candidates shall be chosen by the Committee, and their names shall be posted on the class bulletin board by the President at least three days before the election.

Sec. 4. Other candidates for any office may be placed before the Class by nomination from the floor in class meeting.

ARTICLE VI

Sec. 1. The class officers and all special officers and committees, including the Commencement officers, the Junior Week officers, the *Prism* officers, the Sophomore Hop committee, the Calendar committee, and managers of all class teams (in the years that such offices occur), shall be elected by Australian ballot at a suitable polling place designated by the Executive Committee, during the fourth week of the fall semester. An exception shall be made in the case of the Freshman class in that only the eight executive officers of the Class shall be elected at

this time, other officers of the Freshman year being chosen at a later date set by the Executive Committee.

Sec. 2. The candidate receiving the plurality of the votes cast for each office shall be declared elected.

Sec. 3. No member of the Class shall be allowed to vote or hold office if he is in arrears in class dues.

ARTICLE VII

A majority of the members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. Three fourths of the members of the Nominating Committee shall constitute a quorum for a meeting. Three members of the Executive Committee shall be a quorum for a meeting.

ARTICLE VIII

This constitution may be amended by a three fourths vote of the members present at the meeting, provided the proposed amendment has been previously approved by the Executive Committee and posted for three days before the meeting.
