State Hockey Championship Put in Tangle When Blue Wins from Garnet at Augusta

The University of Maine hockey team capped the climax at the Augusta Winter Carnival when they defeated the fast Garnet aggregation from Bates 2 to 1. The Bates team was considered one of the best teams in New England having been on a successful southern trip defeating the Army at West Point and others. With Maine's victory over Bates, the state series is in a tangle as Maine has defeated Colby and Bates; Bowdoin has defeated Maine and Colby while Bates has defeated Bowdoin and Colby. The Maine team was very strong on the defense, breaking up the rushes of Roberts and Corey. The whole team played well together and dazzled the large number of spectators with their passing. Capt. Stearns played a whale of a game for Maine caging both goals. Bates was handicapped by the loss of Cogan who was absent from the line up on account of illness.

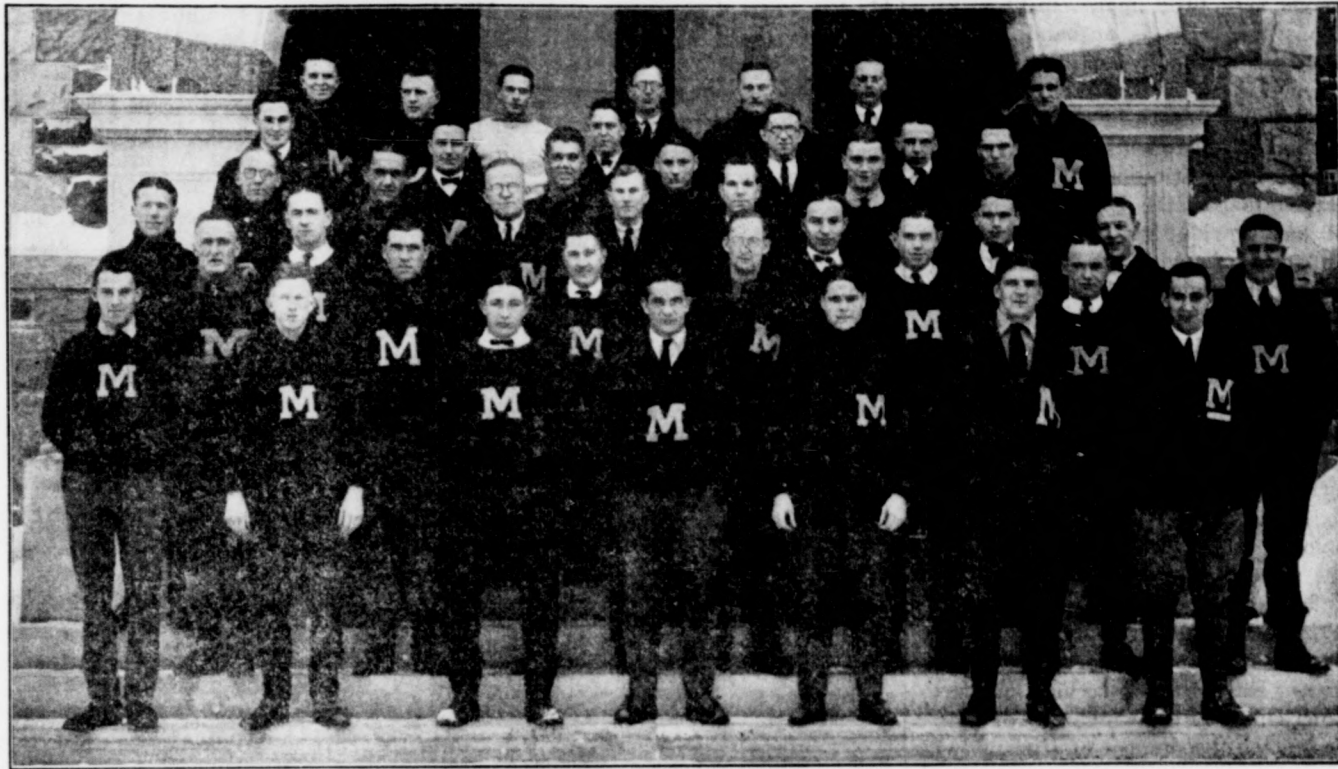

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Class Struggle

This is an eventful season for Maine students, underclassmen, in particular. Here, we have almost immediately following the Carnival the annual class riots that arise over the Sophomore Hop and the Freshman Banquet.

Varying opinions have been expressed from time to time, concerning the activity which arises at this time. Some frown upon it while many others encourage it to their best ability. Upon consideration, it becomes apparent that class fights do have a place in college life. They are embodied in the traditions of nearly all colleges and universities.

After all, little harm results from this guerilla war between the two lower classes and many beneficial aspects may be observed. Nothing unites a body of men as does a common mutual danger. It is the fear of the sophomore menace at such times which teaches the freshmen their first lessons in class-brotherhood. It is then that the ties are made which bind these men together throughout their college careers as members of the same class. Class spirit is the forerunner of college spirit and the foundation upon which the bigger, better spirit is laid.

Class struggles not only establish an esprit de corps among freshmen but, also, at the same time, teaches them the value of organization. After the first clash, they realize the necessity of organization and give free rein to their ingenuity and ability in attempting to build the best possible human machine in a very short time.

Still another advantageous aspect is the opportunity that is presented for the individuals to become acquainted with each other. Men from different parts of the campus are thrown together and come to know each other. Oftentimes, some of these boon companions would never have met under any other circumstances. With this mixing process comes the first recognition of the leaders in college. In this time of stress strong men step to the forefront and become known for their ability.

One other argument for the class fight. It always provides a good time which the individual enjoys and remembers as a landmark on his path thru his college career. It is just another bit added to his sum total of happy memories.

Having extolled the merits of class riots and dwelt upon their desirable features, we will say that they may be attended by unpleasant circumstances. Such things have happened in many places. But one can safely say that ill effects rarely appear except as a result of over-zealous action on the part of someone. Of course the thing can be overdone, anything can. This is something against which precautions should be taken. That is the point where supervision should step in with a restraining hand.

A modern movement of some great extent seems to be in vogue with regard to European tours by American students. During the last two years, we have witnessed the formation of all types and kinds of student tours most of them involving both travel and study in foreign countries.

This movement should certainly be of great educational value to the American student in the group.

Our Snow Birds

Recent events would seem to establish the fact that the University of Maine has the best team of winter sportsmen in the state. Our representatives have come out on top in three winter carnivals in this state this winter. A very good record, we think, especially when we consider the amount and nature of the competition that these men encountered. Without attempting to go thru any offensive back-slapping process, we wish to assure our snow birds that we have been aware of their activity and proud of their success.

To Friends of Maine

During the last few years the problem of securing funds for the University of Maine has been continually before the public and has been a question of moment in legislative circles. The matter has been the basis of much discussion in the various parts of the state, while conditions at the University have undergone very little improvement.

Now, the crisis is at hand. College authorities have averred that failure to receive sufficient funds this year can mean but one thing—the cutting down of the number of students that may be admitted to the institution. The viewpoint is taken that if the University finances will not provide for maintenance of high standards with the present large number of students then that number will have to be cut down.

We wonder if the people of Maine really appreciate the situation that must result by failure to provide funds sufficient for the needs of their state university. Certainly, that would not display the people of Maine in very desirable light. And such failure would, moreover, place the college authorities, those whose highest aim is to serve the people of Maine, in a most unenviable position. In case of such a catastrophe they will have to do one of two things, anyway: Either lower the high standards of curriculum at the University of Maine or cut down the number of students who are to receive this curriculum. They have already chosen the latter as the lesser of two evils.

Certain individuals have voiced the opinion that this is a bluff, on the part of the University officials, in order to receive more money thru the legislature. It is our opinion that those who make such statements show very little actual knowledge of the problem. *How can it be a bluff?—Something must be done.* If any of these individuals happen to be at all kindly disposed towards the educational welfare of their state we would strongly advise against their attempting to call this so-called bluff.

What really would be the attitude of Maine people if their state university were forced to turn away large numbers of students merely because of the lack of proper finances? How would they feel? Would they consider it a situation of which to be proud? Would they desire to publish the matter broadcast and proclaim to the world that they did it with their own hands? It hardly seems possible. We cannot believe that the people of Maine are so lacking in that civic pride which characterizes the generosity of citizens of other states toward their state institutions of higher learning. They must have this pride even though it appears dormant now. But it must be awakened, this feeling of public responsibility, or this situation will come to pass. If the citizens of Maine fail to do their share, the University of Maine will be forced to make a step backwards into comparative obscurity and the people of this state will be in disgrace.

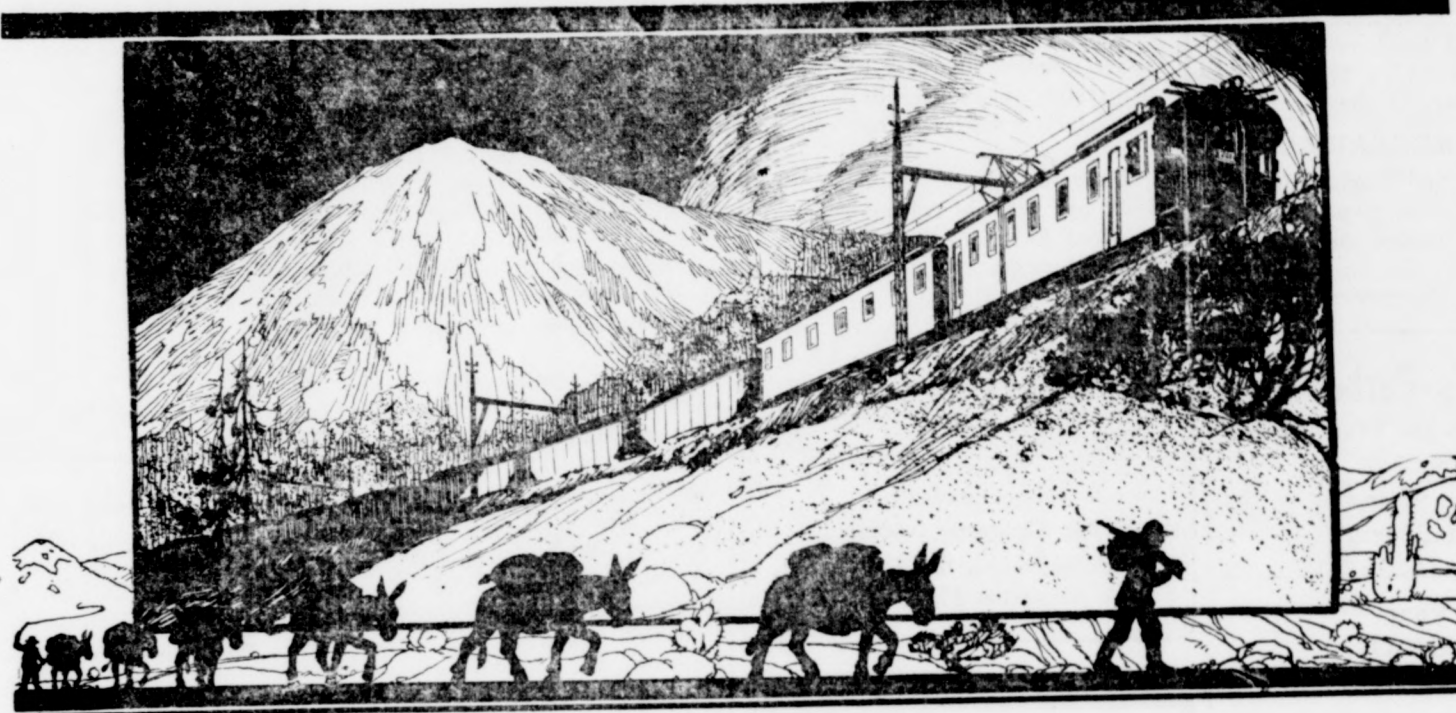

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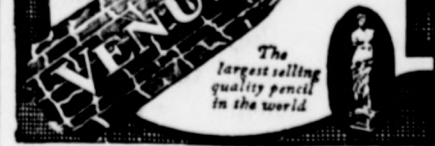
