INTERCLASS BASKETBALL

Series started Friday with the Seniors and Freshmen Winners

The inter-class basketball series started last Friday night with two of the fastest and closest games that have been played on the Gym floor for some time. The teams were all well matched and the outcome was doubtful from the first.

The first game was between the seniors and the sophomores. The sophomores started in strong and landed two baskets before the seniors got under way. Then the seniors commenced to work together and shot five baskets before the first half was over. The second half was equally close but the seniors handled and passed the ball better than the lower classmen and the game ended with the score 20 to 10. Bird and Knight played a good game for the seniors and Hall and Williams made the points for the sophomores.

Between the halves the juniors played the freshmen and had their hands well filled in keeping the score from rolling up against them. The junior team started with the same team that it had last year but they were well matched by the freshmen. The freshmen have an exceptionally good team this year in all of their men, Purington and Sneider both showing up good in shooting baskets and covering their men.

Because of the equality of the players in all the teams, the series this year promises to be one of especial interest.

The subject for the Junior-Senior debate is "Resolved, that the law exempting American vessels from paying toll in going through the Panama Canal, should be repealed." The sides have not been chosen on this subject as yet but will be announced later.

DOCTOR OF PHILOSOPHY

Conferred on Prof. G. A. Thompson

The degree of Doctor of Philosophy, *cum laude*, was conferred upon Professor G. A. Thompson, *in absentia*, at the autumn Convocation of the University of Chicago. Professor Thompson's dissertation, an extended piece of research on "Elizabethan Criticism of Poetry," will soon be published.

Professor Thompson has been connected with the faculty of the University of Maine since 1900 and by his faithful and efficient work has steadily advanced until he now holds the position of Professor of English Literature. His degree comes as the result of careful and scholarly research work extended over the past few years.

SHORT WINTER COURSES

EDITORIAL.

We hear much said, from time to time, of college spirit, of what it is and what it means to the student and to the college as a whole. Much has been said of **Basketball and Class Spirit** "Maine" spirit, and this last fall witnessed a renewal and strengthening of the students' support of Maine. At this season of the year, when we have no big athletic events near at home on which to center our interests, there is still left to us a way to keep alive college spirit and to strengthen even more the elements of which it is composed—and that is by developing *class spirit*. The class basketball games offer this opportunity.

A few years ago intercollegiate basketball was discontinued as a University sport; but there were those who did not wish to let this game drop entirely, and interclass contests were arranged.

The greatest difficulty encountered was to maintain the proper support of the various classes for their teams. Usually for the first few games the support would be good; then would come a season of quiet; and finally, as the series closed and the winner was to be decided, interest and support would once more be renewed. The result of this changing support was negative. A class which supported its team in a half-hearted manner was not developing class spirit, and a weak class spirit did not tend, at least to increase college spirit.

Last year, because of its financial condition, the senior class undertook to run a series of dances after each evening of games. This plan worked fairly well, altho the interest would often center in the dance rather than in the games and the classes represented.

This year we face the same situation. Our basketball series has begun. Each class has put forward a good team which can play a fast and interesting game. The question to be answered during the next few weeks, is, What support will the classes give and how much class spirit will be developed? Whatever may be the cause, class spirit at this time seems every weak, and for the good of the students, the classes and *Maine* it should be revived. At least three-quarters of each class should be present at the basketball games; the members of each delegation should be together and all arrangements made, on a larger scale than is now the case, for organized and enthusiastic support of the teams. The result of this will be manifested in many ways throughout the remainder of the year.

Shakespeare, whose words are often quoted as of one who spoke with wisdom, said, "There is a tide in the affairs of men, which, taken at the flood, leads on to fortune; omitted, all the voyage of their life is bound in shallows and in miseries." The other day President Aley told the students of the needs of our University and what we are asking from the State legislature. It would appear that the University of Maine has reached a point in its de-

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velopment where it needs but the help which is asked to send it forward steadily and resistlessly toward higher development and efficiency. There may be little connection between Shakespeare and the University but surely the students hope that the legislature will remember the college of the State as it asks for support.

When any member of the faculty achieves anything notable, or wins some new honor, his own department and the standing of the college as a whole is improved. The Faculty Honor more honor men we have on the Faculty, the more can be accomplished in working along the various lines of study.

Coming almost as a Christmas present was the degree of Doctor of Philosophy to Professor G. A. Thompson of the English department. As the result of hard and tireless work we feel that Dr. Thompson has won a true honor, and that his work helps to raise the standard of our highly efficient Faculty.

All students are urged to remember the importance of paying their ten cents for the handbook to the men whose names are posted on the bulletin board. The subscription list should include every student in college and all members of the faculty.

GOVERNOR WILLIAM T. HAINES

A Prominent Alumnus of Maine

William T. Haines, who was inaugurated as Governor of the State of Maine on January 2nd, is the first graduate of the University to be chosen to fill that office, although Hon. Samuel W. Gould, 1877, was the nominee of the minority party in 1902.

Governor Haines entered the University in 1872, the fall following the graduation of the first class. He had prepared for college in the public schools of Levant and at East Corinth Academy. His class was much the largest that had entered up to that time, and remained the largest up to 1898. He was active in college affairs. He was one of the business editors of

The College Review, a student paper of his day, was a leader in the organization of the local society which is now the University of Maine Chapter of Beta Theta Pi, and was elected valedictorian of his class at its graduation, in 1876.

After graduation from the Albany Law School, in 1878, where he was Class Historian, he began the practice of his profession in Hallowell, but soon moved to Oakland, and later to Waterville. He was chosen County Attorney of Kennebec County in 1882 and reelected in 1884, sharing with Hayward Pierce, of Frankfort, a member of the same class, who was elected a Representative in the Legislature in 1882, the honor of being the first graduates of the institution to be chosen to public office. In 1886 he was elected to the State Senate from Kennebec County, and reelected in 1888. In 1894 he was elected a member of the House of Representatives from Waterville, that city having matters of special local importance to come before the Legislature at the following session. In 1896 he was elected Attorney General and reelected in 1898. He served as a member of the Governor's Council, 1901-05, was a candidate for the Republican nomination for Governor in 1908, but was defeated by Governor Fernald, and nominated and elected in 1912.

The State Legislature of 1883 passed an act providing for an additional trustee of the University, to be appointed by the Governor upon nomination by the General Alumni Association, and in accordance with its provisions Mr. Haines was nominated and appointed in December, 1883, serving continuously until 1901, when his membership in the Governor's Council led to his refusal to accept a reappointment. He was again appointed a member of the Board, in 1906, to fill a vacancy, and his election as Governor will lead to the necessity of his appointing his own successor next April. He has served 25 years as a Trustee, longer than any other member of the Board; he was its Clerk from 1883 until 1901, and in 1911 was elected President upon the resignation of Hon. E. B. Winslow.

PITTSBURG ALUMNI ASSOCIATION

Holds Enthusiastic Meeting and Banquet

The University of Maine Alumni Association of Pittsburgh held its semi-annual meeting at the Hotel Henry, Pittsburgh, on Saturday evening December 14. The first on the program was a banquet, this was followed by a business session

WEDNESDAY LECTURE

On the "Development of the Judiciary in Maine"

Former Chief Justice L. A. Emery of Maine Supreme bench gave the Wednesday afternoon lecture at the library, speaking on the Development of the Judiciary of Maine.

Judge Emery spoke of the judiciary of any state, country, or other politically organized community as the depository of judicial power. There are three powers exercised by the organizations, legislative, executive, and judicial. In olden times these three were exercised by one person or group of persons, but such a combination of powers is likely to lead to despotism. In the modern state it is now the tendency to place these powers each in separate bodies. The constitutions of the various states invest these different powers in different persons or groups so that no two of the powers shall be vested in any one person or group.

The political bodies or institutions established by a state or people for the exercise of the judicial power are styled courts and the individual exercising any judicial power is termed a judge or justice. A Court may be constituted with a single judge or with several judges. The aggregate of the various courts in a state constitutes its judiciary, and the procedure of its courts constitute its judicial system.

At the time that the judicial system of Massachusetts extended over Maine justices of the peace were appointed in the various towns to exercise judicial power in small cases.

The counties of Maine were grouped into three judicial districts and the Circuit Court of Common Pleas was established for each circuit. This court held terms in each county in its circuit.

When Maine became an independent state the legislature in its first session in 1820 organized the Maine Supreme Judicial court. In 1839 the Court of Common Pleas was abolished. The state was divided into three judicial districts and a district court established in each district. The district courts succeeded to all the jurisdictions, powers, and duties of their predecessors, the court of common pleas.

In 1852 the District courts were abolished and all their work imposed upon the Supreme Judicial court. This arrangement has continued down to the present day, except that in Cumberland and Kennebec counties a superior court held by one judge has been established to relieve the congestion of judicial business there.

All judges of judicial courts high or low are now appointed by the governor with the consent of the council. The tenure of all judges except municipal judges is now seven years. The custom of reappointment of judges proving honest and capable has come so into use that the tenure is practically during good behavior.

The function of the judiciary of Maine according to Judge Emery is in the last analysis simply to find and declare the truth in any matter or question regularly submitted. There is no such thing as judicial policy. Judges do not render judgments because they find them just but because they find them to be the law and the facts of the case require such judgments. The greatest duty imposed upon the judiciary of Maine is that of determining whether a statute enacted by the legislature is forbidden by some clause of the federal or state constitution.

Judge Emery said that having resigned his own place on the court he could say without vanity that he is proud of our judiciary. He believes the safety and welfare of the people require it to be upheld.

FRESHMAN DEBATING CLUB

Holds Interesting Meeting

The freshman debating society had an interesting discussion at its regular meeting Thursday evening on the subject, Resolved: That the Policy of the United States in Extending the Franchise to the Negro was Ill Advised. The affirmative was supported by Arno W. Nickerson of Brewer, Clarence M. Cutler of Medfield, Mass., and Elmer D. Potter of Topsham. The supporters of the negative were LeRoy Coombs of New York, Roger L. Gowell of Auburn, and Clayton Storer of Weld. After interesting and well constructed arguments were presented on both sides the decision of the judges was given in favor of the negative. The judges were Harris E. Rollins of Bangor, Fred L. Damren of Auburn, and Daniel E. Higgins of Morrill.

At the next meeting of the society next week the question decided upon for the freshman-sophomore debate will be discussed. Each member will be given five minutes in which to present his argument on either side of the question which is, Resolved: That State Boards of Arbitration with Compulsory Powers be Established to Settle Disputes between Employers and Em-

ployees. In the debate the freshman will support the affirmative of the question but it is the present purpose of the freshmen to gain a view of all sides of the question for their analysis of it. On Feb. 6 the freshmen wishing to try out for the class team will present their arguments before a board of faculty members delegated to select those best qualified to represent their class in the interclass contests.

AGRICULTURAL SMOKER

Very Large Attendance
