MAINE LOSES LAST HOME GAME

Colby Wins 4 to 0 in Poor Game

Maine lost to Colby in a loose uninteresting game, Wednesday. The work of the whole Maine infield was very poor and besides the errors that appear in the score there were several misplays that had much to do, with losing the game. With anywhere near decent support, Driscoll would have kept the score down and the game would probably have gone for extra innings. With men on the bases his support slipped up on the easiest of chances.

On the other hand, James, with men on bases made monkeys of the Maine batters. He was given very steady support and was caught in fine style by Lowney.

Harlow, the first man up for Colby, flied to Pickard. Reed hit over third but died at first when Nutting and Berry flied out.

Maine got a man on third in their half but could not score. Lawry hit to Campbell and was safe when he fumbled. On the hit and run, Pickard was out at first. James hit Abbott. Gilman sacrificed, Lawry going to third but York struck out.

Colby scored one run in the second. Simpson the first man up hit to left field. On a sacrifice hit, Pickard let Driscoll's throw get by him and when Simpson started home threw wild and Simpson was safe and Lowney started for home but was called out for not touching third. Campbell doubled LaFleur, Pickard to Lawry to Chase.

Maine flied out in order in their half.

There was nothing that looked like scoring until the fifth, when after Baker had flied out, McCarthy hit over second, Driscoll walked. Lawry hit to Reed who got Driscoll at second but McCarthy and Lawry were safe at third and first. Lawry stole. Pickard struck out.

The game was completely thrown away in the seventh. Abbott dropped Simpson third strike and he was safe at first. Lowney flied to Gilman. Lawry booted LaFleur's grounder and Simpson went to third. On a double steal Abbott lost Simpson at the plate. LaFleur was caught asleep at third.

Colby got two more runs in the eighth. James the first man up got a three bagger. Lawry, Pickard and Driscoll debated to see who should field Harlow's pop over Driscoll's head and in the meanwhile James scored and Harlow was safe at first. Gilman fumbled Reed's grounder and Harlow took second. Pickard and Chase got Nutting and Harlow went to third. Lawry fumbled Simpson's grounder and Harlow scored. Reed flied to York.

CHAMPIONSHIP TRACK TEAM AFTER NEW LAURELS

Will Compete in New England Meet To-morrow

Eight of the best men of Maine's championship track team left Thursday noon for the annual New England Intercollegiate Track Meet held in the Harvard Stadium Friday and Saturday May 23 and 24. Coach Smith, who has been coaching the Hebron team this week for the interscholastic games, joined the team at Lewiston Thursday afternoon and accompanied it to Boston.

While we cannot expect to win the big meet we do confidently expect to make the best showing that any Maine team has ever made at these games. It is generally conceded by track authorities that Dartmouth will win the meet by quite a majority of points. It is also expected that several records will be broken this year as there are many exceptionally fast men entered. Keen competition and the fact that the Stadium track is perhaps the fastest in the country will both tend toward this end.

It is expected that Maine will place most of the men on her team and we also have a chance to win in one or two events at least.

Bailey has an excellent chance to win in the hammer throw as he has already beaten the New England record of 148 ft. both at the State Meet and at Trinity when he did 153 and 151 ft. respectively. The only other man who has gone over 150 ft. this year is Englehorn of Dartmouth who threw it 155 ft. once this year.

Bell has a good chance to place in the half although he will run against such men as Tabor of Brown and Grange and Dolan of Dartmouth.

Towner, in the mile, is up against an exceptionally large and fast field of men but he has something like a chance of placing. It is expected that Tabor of Brown will win this event in record time. Harmon of Dartmouth, a former Maine man, is another strong contestant.

Capt. Power has good prospects of winning the two mile run. His run of last Saturday, easily won in 9.56 3-5, seemed to indicate that he could do considerably better if pushed. The New England record is 9-48. Ball by Dartmouth is considered Powers strongest competitor.

Rogers is practically sure of a place in the pole vault. His excellent performance in the State Meet assures us of that. Wright and Buck of Dartmouth are also doped by many to place here.

Ashton is thought to have a fighting chance in the dashes if he runs in his best form. Nevers of Bates and Olsen of Dartmouth are among the fast men he will have to contend with.

Shepherd, at his best, should have a chance for a place in the discus. There are many strong men entered in the weights.

Fox, in his form of last Saturday, will have a small chance of getting anything like a place in the quarter.

The above named men left for the big Meet yesterday (Thursday). Eight men may seem a small number for such a big meet but they are good men and Maine confidently expects good results from their work.

NO GAME WITH TUFTS

At its last regular meeting the athletic board voted not to play Tufts at Orono on May 26. Tufts plays at Portland Saturday May 24 and would play Maine at Orono Monday providing Maine gave her a guarantee of \$75, rain or shine. In case of rain this would mean a total loss to Maine and a heavy loss even if the day is fair as Monday games draw very small crowds. Arrangements with Tufts had not been completed and so for the above reasons the matter was dropped.

MAINE SOCIETY OF CIVIL ENGINEERS TO MEET AT U. OF M.

An Interesting Program Planned

The Maine Society of Civil Engineers meets at the University of Maine on May 29, with the following program. A business meeting will be held at 10.30 at Wingate Hall and a paper on the responsibilities of the engineer will be represented by Frank H. Mason. At 1.00, following dinner at Hannibal Hamlin Hall, concrete beam and cube tests will be given. These tests will include the breaking of a reinforced concrete beam in a Rhee testing machine of 150,000 pounds capacity, and also the breaking of concrete cubes and cylinders to determine the ultimate crushing strength of concrete. Previous to these tests a short talk will be given on the theory of design of reinforced concrete. This will be followed at 2.30 by a discussion, illustrated by actual tests, of the standard ornamental tests of cement. At 4.00 there will take place tensile tests of steel to determine its strength, its elastic limit, and its modulus of elasticity. After this opportunity will be given for inspection of the University and its equipment. The meeting will close with a banquet at the Bangor House at 7.00 o'clock.

OLD TOWN A. A. PROMOTES BIG MEET

Many Noted Athletes to Compete in Bangor, May 30

Memorial Day will be a big day in Bangor this year. The greatest collection of track athletes that this section of the state has ever seen will be gathered together to compete in the second annual meet of the Old Town Athletic Association at Maplewood Park. The principal event will be a 15 mile race in which Sockalexis, Madden, Carlson and many others of the distance grinders have signified their intention of entering. Handsome and valuable cups will be used as trophies for this race.

Handicap races of 100 and 220 yards will be held, with such entries as Drew, Howe, Powell and Halpin together with many college athletes.

The half mile, mile, and two-mile should also provide considerable interest. McVicar got away with the mile and two-mile last fall, but should be pushed hard this year. Gold watches will be first prizes in each of the track events, with other prizes for second and third. It is desired that all entries be sent in as soon as possible so that the handicappers will be able to do justice in their line. Entries close Monday, May 26.

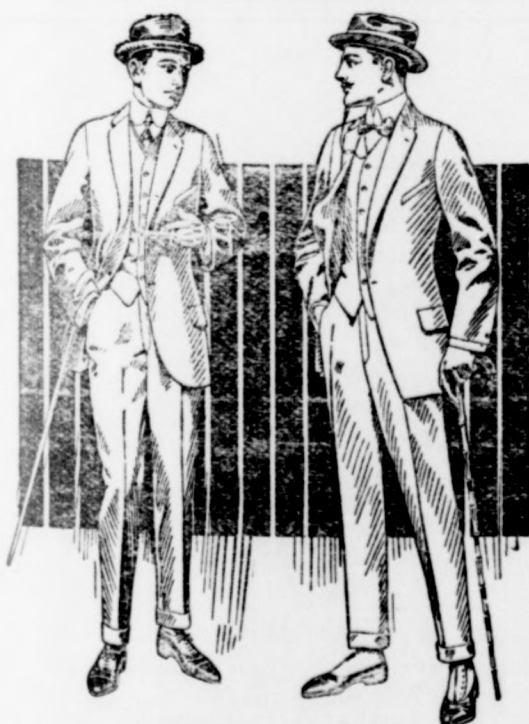

DR. McKEE SPEAKS IN CHAPEL

Gives Interesting Talk on Production of Artificial Rubber

Dr. McKee of the Chemistry Department, gave a talk at Friday morning chapel on the making of artificial rubber. The natural rubber the best of which comes from the Amazon section must go through a long and expensive process in the making, which brings the cost to a very high figure. This cost has of late decreased and although still high, is cheaper than the manufactured article. A great opportunity is now open to chemists in the discovery of a process which will bring the price of the artificial rubber into competition with the natural product. Natural rubber now has the preference although improved methods of manufacture have brought down the price rapidly since chemists all over the world have interested themselves in the production of rubber from turpentine, or according to the English method, from starch, and its possibilities have been demonstrated. Dr. McKee gave a brief history of the English process and compared it to the making of artificial silk from wool-fibre. The demand for rubber is increasing as the variety of its uses becomes manifest and fame as well as fortune awaits the man who may discover the process of making rubber a process that will be at once practicable and profitable.
