DECISIVE VICTORY

Maine, 12; N. H. State, 0

Maine wiped out the feeling of disappointment which was evident after the Rhode Island game. by decisively defeating New Hampshire State, Saturday on Alumni Field, by the score of 12 to 0. Maine guessed their opponents' weak point at the start, and used Shepard with several splendid punts which New Hampshire was unable to return to advantage. New Hampshire made substantial gains during the first period, but were unable to make first down inside Maine's 25 yard line.

Maine came back faster and stronger in each succeeding period. The first score came in the second period. Maine gained steadily from the

beginning of the period, Parker breaking through left tackle for 40 yards and Bryant advancing 25 yards. Shepard kicked a clean goal from placement on the 25 yard line. The third period opened with Maine playing better every minute. Shepard kicked another goal from the 15 yard line putting the game out of danger. The final score came in the last period. Maine outclassed New Hampshire throughout the period, advancing the ball easily down the field. New Hampshire braced on their five yard line, but Carleton carried the ball across and Shepard kicked the goal.

The showing of the team was a decided encouragement after the Rhode Island game. Capt. Parker was back in the game with his customary spirit, and was good for a gain at any

time. Martin, the freshman from Conway Hall, did fine work in the last period. In fact, the whole team worked finely fully warranting the statement that Maine has the best eleven in years.

1912 PRISM COMPLETED

Beautiful Annual Soon on Sale

The 1912 PRISM soon will be in the hands of the student body and public, and if this book is given the reception that it deserves it will meet with great success. This publication which is an Inauguration Number and is dedicated to Dean J. N. Hart is attractively bound in green, flexible leather, lettered in gold-bronze ink. The word "PRISM" is set in a triangle, "1912" beside it. In the lower right-hand corner is the word "Maine," and in the lower left hand corner a pine tree. The paper is tinted light green with bronze lettering and makes an excellent background for the drawings and pictures.

The cuts in this issue seem to be of a superior quality and very numerous. There are several full page illustrations of interior and exterior views of buildings about the Campus and a page of the "Memoirs of 1912" comprised of strike views, the Dramatic Club pictures for 1910, and also two pages of cuts of the Maine Masque of 1911. It has the usual pictures of fraternity groups and houses, student organizations, athletic teams etc. There is a suggestive cartoon opposite each Junior's picture which adds much to the humor of the section.

The value of the cuts and pictures in this book is so great that it cannot be reckoned in a commercial way but its worth is intrinsic. The majority of the plates of these views were destroyed in the Bangor fire and can never be replaced, and in many instances the cuts held by the PRISM are the only records with the exception of some individual photographs. These include all our athletic groups, student organization, etc. The PRISM is in the binder's hands and will be out in a few days. It should meet with an especially cordial reception because many of the pictures are so valuable and furthermore because it is an excellent way for the new men in the University to get in touch with college men and the Seniors who are doing things. The books will cost about two dollars and a half and will be on sale in each fraternity house and at the college store.

CROSS COUNTRY AGAINST TUFTS

State Meet Possible

Although the truth about the cross country team is rather hazy at present, it is certain that five men and Manager Seekins will go to Medford next Saturday, Coach Smith going with the football team. Houghton and Power will probably run for Maine and possibly Morris will be on the team. Other runners are Wardwell, '13, Kelley, Philbrook, Patterson, and Towner, '14, Walters, and Brewster, '15. The squad so far has been small and quite different from what Coach Smith has a right to expect from such a college as Maine. In fact, with Phaleen and several other good and experienced men running for Tufts, the outcome of the meet is very uncertain.

Maine will, however, profit by the experience gained on this trip, if the proposed cross-country run for the state colleges is held. At present, Colby is negotiating with the other colleges, and it is quite possible that the meet will be held some time in the near future.

The cross-country team will leave Bangor, Thursday evening in charge of Manager Seekins the way to Medford, Mass., where they will run Tufts on Saturday. Capt. Houghton, '12, R. A. Power, '13, H. M. Wardwell, '13, L. L. Patterson, '14 and F. A. Morris, '14, will make the trip. The team will be entertained on the Tufts campus and will go over the course Friday in automobiles. The race will be run on Saturday morning.

Alumni Plan System

Recently the Maine Alumni, chiefly the civil engineers in New York and Chicago have interested themselves in obtaining positions for new graduates. When Dean Boardman returned from his western trip last spring he was entertained at a banquet by the members of the New York Alumni Association and the situation was thoroughly discussed. The result is that an employment bureau for U. of M. graduates is being established in both New York and Chicago. So far only the civil and chemical departments have been entered into this plan, but is expected that the electrical and mechanical departments will join these before another year.

Under the new system a triple file of graduates names and up-to-date records will be kept—one file in Orono, one in New York, and the third in

Chicago. In each of the two bureaus a secretary will have charge of the active work. If one secretary is unable to provide a man for a situation, he will immediately notify the other secretary and also the Orono office so that these two can have a chance to fill the position. In the same way, if a graduate is looking for work, the two secretaries are notified and use their influence to obtain him a situation. The alumni in New York and Chicago are enthusiastically working to develop the system and it will no doubt prove a big success when the present plans have had time to mature.

NEW POST-OFFICE

Situated in Alumni Hall

Among the various changes that have taken place in and about the University during the past year is the removal of the postoffice from the college store to its present position in Alumni Hall. The office is up-to-date in every detail and is meeting the ready approval of the whole student body.

This office is considerable larger than the former one and is now able to handle the mails in the best possible manner. There are one hundred and thirty-seven individual mail boxes for those desiring private distribution of mail and eighteen large boxes for the fraternities and dormitory. These boxes have access by means of combination locks which is a great improvement over the old method. The mail was previously distributed just before chapel but, because of the delay it caused during the chapel hour, it is now distributed after chapel services. There is also a slight change in the arrivals and departures of the mail. The arrivals are at 9.00 A. M. and 4.30 P. M. and departures at 10.30 A. M. and 4.30 P. M. The office is open from 10.00 to 11.00 A. M. and 4.00 to 5.00 P. M. The distributing of the mail after chapel has caused some congestion at the window but it is hoped that the fraternities will each have one man alone responsible for getting the mail and thus avoid some of the confusion.

EDITORIAL.

This is the season of elections. In all elections on the Campus, there is a tendency to elect the popular man. In many cases the popular man has ability and character to fill the position. In many cases he lacks either one or the other of these qualities, and once in a great while, we find a man who has neither requisite. It often happens that it falls to a man elected to an office in student activities to handle the students' money. Under these conditions it becomes a serious matter for a man to be elected who is unfit for the office, not only to the activity in question, but to the University and to every student. We can go back over the history of the institution and point out such cases.

How can we lessen the changes of the election of incapable men? It might be possible to have a student board of censors to pass on all nominations. Probably many other schemes might be devised to remedy the situation, but, at best, they would all be experiments. There is, however, one line of procedure which will absolutely remedy any such evil, providing the majority of students have enough active interest in their own welfare, as well as that of the University, to carry out such procedure. It is up to every student to investigate every candidate thoroughly before voting, both as to his apparent ability and also with respect to his past performances. No man can rush into a class meeting and pick out the best man from a list of candidates that he is seeing for the first time. A majority of our elections have been carried on according to this method in the past. The result has been in many cases, popular officers and no work. For the best interests of all concerned, we must have workers, popular workers if they are to be had, but first of all workers, with a sense of responsibility and a good measure of ability. Every Maine man must have honesty of purpose and the courage of his convictions. If we use these two essentials, the best of results are assured.

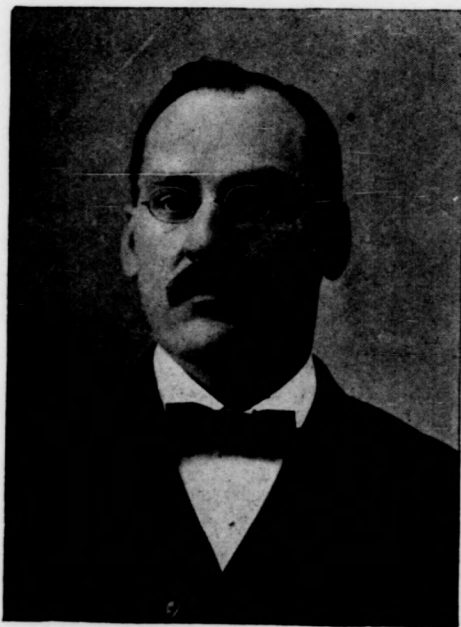
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For many years it has been a University custom for each Maine man to speak to every fellow student in passing on the Campus, whether acquainted or not. The Freshmen seem to be somewhat backward in this particular. They should get into line at once. A fellow cannot long feel under the weather, homesick and ready to quit, if he gets a cordial greeting from three or four hundred students every morning. It is certainly a good custom and we, as Maine men should do all in our power to maintain such a custom.

DR. GILMAN ARTHUR DREW**Now Resident Director at Woods Hole, Mass.**

Among the changes which have taken place in the Faculty of the University during the past summer is the resignation of Gilman Arthur Drew, Ph. D., Professor of Biology. Professor Drew has now gone to Woods Hole, Massachusetts, where he has received the appointment of Resident Director of the Marine Biological Laboratory.

Gilman Arthur Drew was born in Iowa in 1868. In 1890 he received the degree of B. S. from the University of Iowa. He was assistant principal of Hazel Dell Academy, at Newton, Iowa, from 1890-1891; and teacher of science in Oskaloose

High School from 1892-1894. In 1896 he held a scholarship at Johns Hopkins University; in 1897 he received a fellowship there; and in 1898 he held the Adam T. Bruce fellowship in that institution. During his last two years at Johns Hopkins he was assistant in zoology.

After graduating from John's Hopkins University, in 1900, Dr. Drew was appointed Professor of Biology and Zoologist to the Experiment Station at the University of Maine. Shortly after receiving this title a segregation of the Biological department and the Experiment Station took place and Professor Drew remained in charge of the department of Biology.

At the time of his appointment the Biological department occupied but one room on the second floor of Coburn Hall. During the time that he has been in charge of the department the work

has grown rapidly, and more room was required from time to time, until now all of the second floor and parts of the first and third floors of Coburn Hall are devoted to the biology department alone.

Under Dr. Drew's administration the natural history museum has undergone great development. The zoological collections occupy the entire lower floor of the wing of Coburn Hall, and contain many valuable specimens. On the upper floor of the wing of Coburn Hall are the geological collections, which are of great interest. There is also a large collection of pressed flowers which belongs to the botanical division of the department.

In addition to his activity in carrying on the work of his department, Professor Drew has accomplished much research work. As a result of this research work he has published papers from time to time which have made very valuable additions to biological literature. His special line of research has been along the line of the Mollusca, and he recently published the first of a series of papers on The Squid.

During his college course Dr. Drew spent his summers in collecting and investigating among the mountains and along the coast of California; in the West Indies; at Cold Spring Harbor, N. Y.; at Beaufort, S. C.; and at Woods Hole, Mass. For the past few years, however, he has worked at Woods Hole, where for several summers he was first instructor.

In 1909 he was made assistant director of the marine biological laboratory, and now, in 1911, he has been promoted to resident director of the laboratory.

Through the resignation of Doctor Drew the University has lost a Faculty member, who has accomplished much toward the raising of the standard of the college. More and more, under his leadership, have students realized the real worth of the work which he has been doing, and for this reason his department has grown, in ten years, from occupying one room, to the occupancy of eight large rooms, and more room is needed.

Although feeling the loss of such a valuable man as Dr. Drew the University joins heartily in wishing him even more success in his new position, which he is so well qualified to fill.

Donahue at end, Murray at tackle, Kent at guard, Whitney at centre, Cleaves at quarter, Bernheisel and Martin at half, and Davis at full will probably be taken as substitutes. The officials for the game will be: T. F. Murphy, Boston, referee; A. S. Macraedie, Portland, umpire; G. N. Bankhart, Springfield, field judge. The team will arrive at Medford about 10 P. M. and stay at the college over night. The game will be called Saturday afternoon at 2.30 on the College Hill grounds.

It has been interesting to watch the steady improvement of the new material during the past week under the able direction of Coaches Wingard and Reiley. At centre, Baker promises to make the 'varsity by his steady playing. Burnett is also working hard for the position. MacNeil is back in the game at tackle, and the other tackles will have hard work to displace him. Donahue is very promising at end. Bernheisel is being tried at both end and half-back. He seems to play a better game at the former position. Libby, a Law School freshman, is also in the race for a place at end. Murray and Kent are making the new material hustle for tackle positions while Amadon at full completes one of the finest squads in the history of Maine's athletics.

SOCIETY CIVIL ENGINEERS

Plans for Year

At the present time the Civil Engineering Society is without a president, and Frank H. Lancaster, vice president is at the head. However within a few days a meeting is to be called for the purpose of electing a president and to talk over the plans for the coming year. The program for the year is not yet definitely settled, but it is planned to meet once a month. At these meetings original papers are to be read by different members, particularly those who have had practical experience during the summer. In addition, the society will have the privilege of

hearing probably six lectures by men of practical experience or by members of some college faculty.

The trips to Enfield have commenced again this year—the first one being made a week ago last Saturday, and the second last Saturday.

NEW PHYSICAL TRAINING REGULATIONS

Outdoor Work Required

Physical Training has always occupied a prominent part in the career of a Maine student and it has been the endeavor of the physical training department to give each student a practical and helpful course along the lines of physical development and hygiene. The freshmen have been especially helped and altho upperclassmen furnish the bulk of the track, football and varsity material, the freshmen have always been building themselves up and getting into condition for the career before them.

This year the system of training is somewhat changed from last year, the work being out of doors when weather permits. Last year exercises, parallel bar stunts, indoor-yauling, etc., inside the gymnasium constituted the training for freshmen. This year, however, the freshmen are broad-jumping, pole-yauling, sprinting, high-jumping, doing distance running, etc., out on the athletic field, and even at this early stage it seems that this arrangement must be a great success. At present the freshmen are having simply this out door work, but after football is over talks on physical hygiene will be delivered and gymnasium work will be on the schedule.

All Freshmen are required to take this physical training and there is always a large number out each night for which physical training is scheduled.

Besides those Freshmen, out for "P. T." there are a number of the members out for class and 'varsity track work. Distance runners and sprinters are among the candidates, and those who have been watching the progress of 1915 say that she has some good material and should be a prominent factor in the coming events of her college career.

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PRIZE OF \$100

Offer to the College Men of America

A prize of \$100 is offered by the Lake Mohonk Conference for the best essay on "International Arbitration," written by any undergraduate man student of any college or university of the United States or Canada. The giver of this prize is Chester Dewitt Pugsley, of Peekskill, N. Y. Mr. Pugsley, a Harvard graduate of '09, gives this prize not only for the remuneration which the winner receives but also to create an interest among college men regarding the subject, and to acquaint them with one of the most vital issues before the human race of today. The judges of the essays are; Hon. Oscar S. Straus, member of the Hague Court and former Ambassador to Turkey. Hon. Elmer Ellsworth Brown, Chancellor of New York University; and Rear Admiral Charles H. Stockton, retired.

The following are the conditions in brief which cover the contest;

Each essay should show an understanding of the nature and history of international arbitration apart from and in connection with the Hague Conferences and Hague Courts, and may also refer to other prominent works or authorities.

Each contestant is requested to append to his essay a list of works consulted with specific reference.

The term "undergraduate student" applies to one who is doing the work prescribed for the degree of bachelor, or its technical equivalent.

Essays must not exceed 5,000 words (a length of 3,000 words is more desirable) and must be written on one side only of plain paper (8 x 10½ inches). Manuscripts not easily legible will not be considered.

Each essay should bear a nom de plume which should be included in an accompanying letter giving the writer's real name, college, class and home address. Both letter and essay should reach H. C. Phillips, Secretary Lake Mohonk Conference, Mohonk Lake, N. Y., not later than March 15, 1912. All essays must be mailed flat.

For additional information address the Secretary of the Conference.

A similar prize in 1910-11, brought out sixty-one essays from all parts of the United States. The prize was won by Harry Posner, of West Point, Miss. Other essays of merit were written by Eugene Kayden (U. of Colorado), Lindsay Rogers (John Hopkins), Seymour Gilber (Rutgers College) and Charles Schwencke (Brigham Young Univ.)
