Compulsory Chapel Plan
Accepted by University

Attendance Will Be Required
Twice a Week, and Each Class
Will Be Divided in Half
Alphabetically

Since the Senior Skulls recommended a compulsory chapel, many ideas as to the procedure have been volunteered. The *Campus*, by sounding various sources, gave expression to the different opinions in the four plans published on September twenty first.

A committee was appointed to draft some sort of plan for chapel procedure. This committee consisted of Doctor Ellis as chairman, Mr. Evans and Miss Buzzell as faculty members, Frederick Marston, Carl Stevens and Lucy Chamberlain for the students, and Wayland Towner for the Alumni. After careful consideration, the committee submitted its plan, which was approved by the Administrative Committee and also by the executive committee of the Board of Trustees.

Everything is ready for the first chapel, attendance will be according to Plan III.

Condensed information is given below by the recommendations submitted to the Administrative Committee:

1. *Attendance.* Attendance at chapel shall be required of all students, unless excused, two hours a week, according to the following scheme: Each class shall be divided alphabetically into two equal parts. One-half of each class shall attend on Monday and Wednesday, the other on Tuesday and Thursday. The combinations of students by classes shall be changed each semester, or oftener, to facilitate acquaintance among the student body.

2. *Nature of the Chapel Exercise.* The chapel exercise shall consist of a devotional service or from three to five minutes' duration, an address or musical or other appropriate program lasting from ten to fifteen minutes and the reading of notices of importance to the University community. When time permits, the singing of the *University Hymn* or the *Stein Song* may conclude the exercise. The devotional service shall comprise the singing of the invocation, two or three stanzas of a hymn, the reading of a passage of Scripture by the leader, and the reciting in unison of the Lord's Prayer. When it seems desirable to allow more than ten minutes to a speaker, either the Scripture reading or the prayer, or both, may be omitted.

3. *Conduct of Exercise.* The leaders

A New Cheer Leading
System Installed Here

A new system of cheer-leading has been established to organize cheering which in vital moments of football games has helped toward many victories for Maine. By this system all sophomores who wish to work out for cheer leader may do so. Their work consists of moving seats, keeping crowds off the field and the many other duties which must be done at any athletic contest. From these sophomores who work out for a year two men are chosen, who during their junior year are the active cheer leaders. On their lungs rests the responsibility of leading cheers before the student body at the games.

The "M" Club chooses from these two junior cheer leaders the man upon whom the responsibility of getting action from the student body rests. The senior cheer leader is to have general charge of the parades and seating arrangements for the student body and band. As a reward for his three years' work the "M" Club awards the senior cheer leader with an Old English "M" after the football season.

Since this system cannot be put directly into effect for the next two years the varsity captains of the teams, not in active training, will lead the cheers. At the end of this year the two junior cheer leaders will be chosen from the sophomores who work out. And the year following the senior cheer leader will be chosen from the two juniors.

Consider Formation of
Radio Association Here

A meeting was held in Alumni Hall Tuesday noon, October 4, for the purpose of discussing the formation of a radio association here at the University. J. L. Bernard conducted the meeting, and spoke of the necessity of forming a club of the active amateur and commercial radio operators for the purpose of installing and operating a college radio outfit. The second meeting for a continued discussion of the same subject has been set for Tuesday noon, October 11, at which it is planned to form policies and membership requirements for the proposed association.

Following the establishment of a radio organization, it will be necessary to buy and install a long-distance transmitter and receiver to carry on the proposed work. It is probable that a radio telephone would be preferable to any other type, but that remains to be settled by the University. The radiating aerial wires have been suspended between the pipe mast on Lord Hall and a pulley near the top of Wingate Hall tower, as it was placed prior to the war.

Lowell Textile 34-0

Coach Brice's New Combination Exhibits
Great Team Work and A Real Fighting
Spirit. Gruhn A Sensation As Quarterback.

Score of Pumpkin Meet
Is as Yet Undecided

On Saturday, October 8, the Pumpkin Meet took place on the Athletic Field. The two classes were very evenly matched, and up to Monday night the score was 43-43, with the hammer and discus throw still to take place. The sophomores have some strong men for these events including Sargent. But it is thought that some good material

The University of Maine football team smashed their way through the Lowell Textile School line, led by Gruhn, Cohen and Small to a 34 to 0 win on Alumni Field Saturday.

Coach Brice's men led by the husky and clever George Gruhn at quarterback, played a brand of football that places them well in the lead among the colleges who hope to win the coveted state championship.

Gruhn was the outstanding player among a cluster of stars, Small, Cohen, Thomas, and Young. In the line Dwelley, Reardon, and Lunge made big holes for the backfield men and on the defense blocked any line bucking. Lowell made only one first down, that because of a penalty imposed on Maine for being offside.

The Maine team by its line tearing, and straight football showed wonderful team work and dash and pep.

Gruhn in the second period intercepted a forward and ran the ball back 45 yards. In the third Small smashed through a broken field, 40 yards for a touchdown. In the fourth period, Doc Jordan substituted for Cohen, and Buck Thomas made big gains, Thomas going 19 yards for the fifth touchdown.

FIRST PERIOD

Gruhn, Cohen and Small worked their way down the field to one foot of the goal line, and the husky Gruhn hurled himself over for a touchdown. Small kicked the goal. The play in the remainder of the period consisted of an exchange of punts. The period ended with the ball on Maine's 45 yard line in Maine's possession.

SECOND PERIOD

Maine started to maul up the field but meeting resistance, Small punted to Lowell's 35 yard line. The punt was returned and on the next play Gruhn fumbled, Gocsetrey recovering. Lowell worked a forward pass which Gruhn intercepted and tore off 45 yards by his clever open field running. Maine by a forward pass and short gains thru the line, carried the ball to the five yard line. Gruhn went over. Small kicked the goal. On the kickoff Gruhn ran the ball to Lowell's 40 yard line.

Herrick Breaks Tape in
Coach Flack's New Race

The final event of the Pumpkin Meet held Saturday afternoon was a special race for members of the cross country team. The gun was fired by Coach Flack at 2:23 p. m. starting the runners on an unknown distance. This distance was to be between one and one half and two and one-half miles, to be determined by the coach. For the first four laps the runners were well bunched and appeared to be saving themselves for the longer distance, keeping a good steady pace although not overfast.

During the fifth lap the crowd became restless and moved to the bleachers to make ready for the football game and as the time was limited the gun for the final lap was fired at the start of the sixth lap. There was a decided change in the speed of the runners as they let out for the final circuit of the oval, which developed into a race to the tape. The men spread out somewhat during this final lap whereas before they had remained well bunched.

Herrick was first to breast the tape, Pease second, Wilson third with Ham and others not far behind. The time was eight minutes ten and four-fifths seconds for the one and one-half miles covered.

Make Strick Regulations For the Arts Students

Upon registering each student in the College of Arts and Sciences was given a copy of the regulations printed below. They have for some years been operative in practically all the New England liberal arts colleges.

1. Permission to take examinations in courses not pursued in class will not be granted.

2. Arrearage examinations shall be discontinued for Arts students in courses in the College of Arts and Sciences.

3. Credit for the completion of the first semester of a beginning language course will not be given unless the second is completed.

4. In fulfilling the Mathematics and Science requirement the student shall complete the courses listed in one of the following options: Mathematics 1, 3, and 6; 1, 2, and 3; 17, 18, 19, and 20; or Ms. 1 and As. 15, 16.

Biology 1 and 2
Chemistry 1, 2, 5, and 6; or 3, 4, 5, and 6

Physics 1, 2, 3, and 4; or 5, 6, 3, and 4.

5. No student who has not fulfilled the scholarship conditions shall be permitted to over-register before the spring semester of the senior year; and then only by permission of a committee consisting of the Dean of the University, the Dean of the College, and the Major Instructor.

Men On Football Squad Fighting for Positions

The football team Saturday under the new pilot, George Gruhn showed up to be an entirely different combination than that which opposed Norwich the week before. The line showed up strong. Dwelley and Lunge opening big holes in the Lowell line. No injuries were received in Saturday's game and the Maine warriors are in fine shape for the R. I. State game this Saturday. Coach Brice stated to the Campus reporter that the team showed a big improvement over the Norwich game but there are still 30 men out for line positions, and the fight between Taylor and Blair for left half, with Doc Jordan, Thomas, Merritt and Mason working hard for the other backfield positions, there are still big chances for changes in the personnel of the Blue team. For left half, Taylor seems strong on the defense while Blair is mighty good on the offense; both were used Saturday and went well.

The team is coming slow with the immediate objective being the R. I. State game this Saturday on Alumni Field. The R. I. State team coached by Frank Keane, the old Bates athlete, outplayed Brown and were trimmed by Bowdoin 9 to 0. The game will offer a comparison between the teams.

Monday afternoon on account of the rain the men had skull practice in the gym where Coach Brice went over Saturday's game; the men ran a mile and a half around the indoor track. Scrimmages will be held on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday. For the past week the second team, under the direction of their coach, Don Wiggins, have been working out, with the men looking forward to berths on the first team. The guards and tackles will be as usual under the guidance of the popular and efficient Pat Hussey the old All-Maine guard on the previous Maine championship teams; while coach Brice will take care of the backfield and the ends, and things in general.

The old Maine spirit has certainly returned. The alumni constantly coming and going, the underclassmen and even the freshmen have it. Maine is certainly going forward with "before the war" stride. The alumni are keenly interested and are backing the boys to the finish and doing everything in their power to put Maine, in every way, in the lead among the New England colleges. A training table has been established at Oak Hall. After supper Coach Brice has a skull talk. This feature will be made a permanent one. A new rubbing room has been installed in Alumni Hall and will be under the efficient direction of Doc Schenkel, the popular "fixit man."

Mgr. Karl Oakes and assistants Hoyt and Norell with a bunch of sophomores and freshmen are finding plenty of work to do with the big squad of men. Everything is all a hustle with lots of hard work for football men.

Already the Maine supporters are looking forward to the Bates game at Lewiston on the 22nd. Plans are being made for a special train for both the Bates and Colby games. More than 500 rooters are expected to go to the Bates game while the whole student body will be at the Colby game.

The Bowdoin game will bring together old time rivals in their new roles as college coaches, instead of a Manchester-Portland battle it will be the annual state of Maine football classic, the Maine-Bowdoin game.

Public Square Named in Honor of A Maine Hero

Another public square has been named in honor of an University of Maine war hero. This time it is Gardner Square in Worcester, Mass., in memory of Leroy W. Gardner '10, who was killed overseas during the World War. The square is the intersection of Main, Stafford and Lakewood Streets with a new extension of Park Avenue. Too often the squares so named to commemorate the memory and service of some war hero are but the intersection of two streets, but this new square when completed is where the traffic from the West will go North and East of Worcester. Gardner lived within a quarter of a mile of the square which bears his name.

It will be recalled that the first square to be named for an University of Maine man was Andrews Square in Portland in honor of Harold T. Andrews '18, the first Maine man to be killed in the war.

Custom of Maine "Hello" Should Apply to Women

Perhaps another reason may have been that they knew how I appreciate friends and the man that was to come here they wanted to be, above everything else, a Friend to all the students. We ought always to spell Friend with a Capital.

Now tell me, in the face of all this explanation, don't you think the women should at least greet me with "hello" as the men do? I'm timid so they should "hello" me first.

I'll put it still stronger and say that I want ALL the students of whatever class, creed, sex, or color to feel that I want to be a Friend to them, everyone. I prize my Friends 'most above everything else.

And say, regarding this matter of Friendship and fellowship, I already know I came to the right place. 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Rhodes Scholars Are To Be Chosen Soon

The election of the Rhodes Scholars will be held December 3, 1921. Applications for this scholarship must be in by October 29. Scholars elected will enter Oxford University in October, 1922. The amount of the scholarship is 350 pounds a year, no restrictions being placed on the scholars choice of subjects. They are appointed without examination on the basis of their record in school and college.

A candidate to be eligible must—

(a) Be a citizen of the United States and unmarried.

(b) Be between the ages of nineteen and twenty-five.

(c) Have completed at least his sophomore year in college.

A candidate may apply either in the State in which he resides or in the one in which he has received at least two years of his college education.

The qualities which will be considered in making the selection are:

(1) Qualities of manhood, force of character, and leadership.

(2) Literary and scholastic ability and attainments.

(3) Physical vigor, as shown by interest in outdoor sports or in other ways.

Many Teachers Enroll Here for Summer Term

An indication of the general desire of school teachers to constantly increase their efficiency is shown in an analysis of the registration of the summer term here. In a total registration of 226 the number of teachers enrolled was 107. There were 109 Maine students. Is Our National Policy To Have Citizen Army

General Pershing recently said, "There is one basic principle I urge you to bear in mind. It is that the military establishment of the United States consists of the Regular Army, the National Guard and the Organized Reserves. These components, welded together into an effective and harmonious whole, are destined to make our country eternally independent and secure. The man who is ready to join the ranks of either of these components is fulfilling an obligation which rests upon every citizen of the United States."

In making the above statement General Pershing has more or less summed up our National Military policy.

Our policy in the past has been to maintain a small regular army to be augmented in the event of a national emergency by citizen soldiers until it reached the proportions necessary to successfully cope with the situation. The citizen armies thus formed were officered mainly by citizen officers. The defect of this policy lies in the fact that the organization of these larger forces did not take place until after war was declared. In the late World War this necessarily hasty organization was both a waste of money and of energy. Through Providence and powerful Allies we were given time in which to put an organized force in the field sufficiently large to meet the demands of the situation. We have all, at one time or another wondered what would have happened had we not had more than a year for this extemporization of our resources.

With all this in mind, the Congress set about drafting and passing a bill that would retain our past policy and yet contain the necessary corrective measures. This was a very simple task; merely to provide for the organization of these citizen armies in time of peace. Congress wisely left the details of carrying out the provisions of this bill to the President and grants him as Commander-in-Chief the necessary powers and personnel to accomplish this new responsibility.

Already this organization is under way and divisions of the citizen or National Army are being formed throughout the United States. The Reserve Officers Training Corps is one of the sources from which the officers of these divisions are drawn.

Hold Camping Trip

Phi Mu Sorority had a very successful camping trip over the last week end at Camp Etna. Nearly every member attended, also a number of guests. Miss Marian Buzzell was chaperone. The campers report pleasant cottages, good swimming and boating, and fine weather. Saturday night's entertainment was a dance in the pavilion.

A statue of the famous violinist, Mozart, as a boy, will grace the rooms of the Harvard Glee Club at Cambridge. The statue was presented to the club by Premier Briand of France in appreciation of the Glee Club's recent tour through the country.

The Premier's appreciation is further shown by an autographed letter to President Lowell of Harvard in which he extends his thanks to the management of the institution.

All the expenses of the trip were financed by American business men and all profits, amounting to almost 25,000 francs, were donated to French charities.

Harvard Dental School Makes Entrance Change

The Harvard Dental School has made several changes in the requirements for admission to the school. The school now requires at least one year of college work, including a course in English, (six semester hours), a course in biology (six semester hours), a course in chemistry (six semester hours), and also six semester hours of electives from the following: a modern foreign language, mathematics, history, technical drawing, or shop practice.

It also requires a certificate of the completion of one year of work in physics in an approved high school or one year of college physics.

More Recruits Desired By the War Department

Recruiting for the Army has been resumed. The War Department announces that recruits, ex-service men preferred are now needed to fill existing vacancies in order to keep the Army filled up to the authorized strength of 150,000 men.

For the present, enlistments are open in the Coast Defenses of Portland, Fort Williams, Maine, to fill vacancies in the Coast Artillery Corps and also for 11 musicians to fill vacancies in the 2nd Band, Coast Artillery Corps, one of the crack musical organizations of the artillery arm of service. Men with some experience in or knowledge of music are desired for the band. Performers on the following instruments are especially needed at once: flute, cornet, clarinet, alto, bass, baritone, saxophone and snare drum. This is an excellent opportunity for young men to develop into qualified musicians.

Enlistments are open to a high type of men only, between the ages of 18 and 35, who have sufficient education and give promise of making good soldiers and fulfill all other requirements. Applicants must be sound physically, of good moral character, eyesight normal, or nearly so, teeth good, weight not less than 120 pounds, height not less than 64 inches. Enlistments are for 3 years; pay to begin with is \$30.00 per month and everything provided.

The enlistments of men under 18 years of age, illiterates and men who are unable to read, write and speak English are prohibited. No applicant can be enlisted who is not a citizen of the United States unless he has made legal declaration of his intention to become a citizen (procurement of his first papers of citizenship.) Applicants desiring to enlist must apply in person to the Coast Defense Recruiting Office, Fort Williams, Maine, and defray their own expenses while traveling to the enlistment station.

of chapel shall be selected from the faculty, each leader serving for one week. The leader, and faculty speakers shall be expected to wear cap and gown. The singing shall be conducted by a student leader. The first two rows of seats at the left shall be reserved for the faculty. The doors shall be closed one minute after the beginning of the hymn, the Sophomore Owls being asked to enforce this practice. The gymnasium shall be kept locked during the chapel period, and the lower floor and grounds of Alumni kept clear so far as is practicable.

A fairly even balance shall be preserved between addresses and musical or other programs. So far as possible, speakers and other entertainers will be expected to duplicate their performances to accommodate both groups of students. Jokes and striking illustrations should not be duplicated. An effort will be made to bring to the University outside speakers and entertainers of some note.

4. *Friday Assembly.* The Friday meeting, attendance at which is not compulsory, shall be an assembly period for departmental or organization purposes, possibly during the football season taking the place of night rallies. The chapel committee shall have no jurisdiction over it, and application for use of the period shall be submitted to the Registrar for approval.
