## Pumpkin Meet Held on Alumni Field Saturday

The Meet Was Won By The Sophomores With 66 Points. The Freshmen Were Second With 60 Points.

The annual Pumpkin Meet was held on Alumni Field Saturday, Oct. 9, and resulted in a victory for the Sophomores. It looked like a victory for the Freshmen but the Soph's finally came through with the big end of the score. The meet showed the student body that they can expect some good track material next spring when a call is sent out for men on the track squad. Not only did the Freshmen show up well in their events but much new material could be seen in the men that represented the class of twenty-three. On a whole the meet was not only a success from the stand-point of lining up material for next spring but also the student body was more than satisfied with the events. At times the cheering (which was led by a Freshman) sounded like the real old Maine spirit that has led her teams to victory.

The individual honors were carried off by Dunn of the class of twenty-three and he was responsible for their victory. He won the 220 low hurdles, the 120 high hurdles, the 220 yard dash, and received third place in the 100 yard dash.

The best event of the day was the mile. It was a fight from start to finish between Ames and Wilson. Both

## Where the Students at Maine Come From

Thirteen States and Six Countries Are Represented. Massachusetts Is Second

An analysis of the enrollment of 1317 students at University of Maine this year shows some interesting figures. Residents of Maine predominate, 1151 of them being included in the registration. Massachusetts second, with 103, New Hampshire third, 23, Connecticut fourth, 9 and New York fifth, 5. New Jersey sent 4; Vermont, Pennsylvania and District of Columbia 3 each; Canada, China and the Philippine Islands 2 each; Illinois, Louisiana, Arizona, Ohio, Maryland, Japan and Argentine, 1 each.

All of the 16 counties in Maine are represented, Penobscot leading with an enrollment of 347 students and the other counties following in this order: Cumberland, 169; Aroostook, 81; Kennebec, 79; Washington, 72; York, 65; Hancock, 61; Androscoggin, 42; Piscataquis, 42; Somerset, 39; Oxford, 37; Knox, 35; Franklin, 34; Waldo, 26; Lincoln, 14; Sagadahoc, 8.

The classification for degrees places the College of Technology in the lead with a registration of 504, the College of Arts and Science second, 496, and the College of Agriculture third, 231.

## Howard Flack Here as Our New Track Coach

The new track coach appointed to succeed Coach Rider is Mr. Howard W. Flack of Grenoble, Pa. He is a graduate of Syracuse University.

At Syracuse Coach Flack was captain of varsity track, and a member of the cross country, basketball and baseball teams. Before going to Syracuse he went to the University of Pennsylvania for a year where he featured as a cross country man; and a year at Center College where he was a four letter man, playing on the champion baseball and football teams of the Southern College League.

He graduated from Syracuse in 1914, and in the fall coached basketball and track at Miami University. In 1916 he coached football at Louisiana Agri. and Mech. College, and in the spring of 1917, baseball at Oregon Agri. College. From 1918 to his appointment at Maine he was physical director and coach at Sapula (Okla.) High School.

During the war Mr. Flack was commissioned a 1st lieutenant and served in the 302nd Cavalry and the 55th Field Artillery.

The Athletic Department was particularly fortunate in getting, as an associate professor, a man of so varied a career as athlete and coach. Mr. Flack has already made a strong impression on the student body by his handling of the second football team and his track squad. He bids fair to become one of our most popular coaches.

Captain Smith Makes Touch Down in First of Game. Brown Victorious With 32-7 Score.

## Cross Country Activities To Be Opened Here Soon

Dual Meet to be Held Here Oct. 30th With New Hampshire State

Since college opened the cross country squad has been working out every night under the direction of Coach Frank Preti. There were at first about 60 men out but as such strenuous work weeds out the fellows who are unfit, the squad has dwindled to 22 men.

The squad will have a nucleus of three letter men: Capt. Johnny Barnard, Bub Herrick and Midget Raymond, last year's freshman sensation. Ed Kneeland, who was in the squad in 1916, is getting into his old form and much is expected of him. Eames, Ames, Berg and the two Wilsons are rapidly rounding into shape. Hendy Henderson quit the squad as a result of bad feet. In Henderson, Coach Preti loses a good cross country man, and Maine will probably feel its loss before the season is over. 1924 is well represented by Ames, Alquist, Holt, Stella, Shepard, Rollins, Berg and Mesersie.

Although the squad is smaller than last year's at this time, the hill and dale men believe that they have quality if not quantity and they are working hard to equal last year's record. Last year, Maine with an inexperienced team under the direction of Coach Preti won the Brown Dual Meet, came second in the New England Inter-collegiate meet, and won the state meet for the 6th consecutive time.

The athletic followers have great faith in Coach Preti and expect to see another championship team.

The schedule is one of the best ever, it includes: a Dual Meet Oct. 30th at Orono, in all probability with New Hampshire State, the State Meet at Brunswick on Nov. 5th, the N. E. Meet at Franklin Park, Boston, Nov. 13th, and the National Inter-Collegiate at New Haven on Nov. 20th.

Moody fumbled on our 16 yd. line but Brown recovered. Williams went around our end for 30 yards and Moody made the final touchdown. Albright failed to kick the goal.

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## Editorial

For two weeks the student body has been deprived of seeing the football men in real action. But during these two weeks the team has been working to its utmost while the student body has been having it soft. The team has played two hard games and in both of them they have suffered a defeat. The team is not broken in spirit but it is not full of the same pep that it would have if those two games had been the other way. Now next Saturday the team is going out on our own field to play the Rhode Island men. If our team comes off the victor it will regain the pep and fight necessary to win the State Championship. This is the last game before the State series begin and if we can win this game the chances to win the State Championship will be 100% brighter. But the team can not win it alone. Every man and every codd on the campus should go to that game and help to cheer the Maine team to a victory. Just as much depends on your cheering as on the players' playing. You expect the team to do its utmost. Are you willing to do your utmost in putting the pep in the team and sending those football men out on that field with a fight in them that spells victory?

Why do we still attach so much importance to the state series games? True, they show what good-natured rivalry exists among the four institutions, but as to comparing true athletic ability they now indicate but little. The University has outstripped the other institutions of the state in growth, and can no longer be honestly compared with them. Rather should we contest titles with the several eastern State Universities and the numerous other colleges of similar standing. We need money. Good will advertising of this sort or of any sort is bound to help net results. So much to be gained from a utilitarian point of view alone. But of still greater importance will be the fact that we can in this way help to make the Alma Mater of our choice an institution of national dispute.

Maine spirit recommends that we give the opponents as fair a chance as we give our own team. The spirit shown at the two home games this season has been commendable. Let's keep it up. Clap the opponents' men when they are taken off the field or are hurt and resume their playing. Give the opponents a cheer or two but leave off the 'Fight 'em!' Keep as quiet as you can when either team is giving their signals. Play the sportman's part of the game and there will be no complaint from any one.

## Regulations Governing Use of the Library

Perhaps some students do not use the University Library because they think they will have to go through a lot of red tape to get books. The only regulations are those which are made so that the Library may know where the books are if they are needed for special use, such as for class reading in some of the courses.

Any student may have three books at one time, and each may be kept for three weeks. To borrow a book, a student simply signs his or her initials and last name on the two cards which are inside the back cover of the book, and leaves both cards at the desk. (The signing of initials only is not enough, as you may be charged up with the book taken by some one else who has your initials.)

If a book is not returned within three weeks, a fine of two cents a day is charged. To keep track of the date a book is due, small slips are left on the desk, and may be slipped into the pocket inside the back cover.

Books not in demand at the time they are due, may be renewed for another three weeks. Books needed for class use may be recalled to the Library before they are due, and should be returned at once.

Unbound magazines may be borrowed over night by signing a blue overnight card. Bound magazines, like books, are loaned for three weeks. Books in the Reference Room do not circulate.

**Reserve books.** These books are reserved for class use, and must not be taken from the Library without permission. When in use in the Library they must be signed for at the desk. They may be taken overnight by signing a blue card, and must be returned the next day within 15 minutes of the time the Library is opened. If not returned then, a fine of 5 cents is charged for each 15 minutes of delay.

**Library hours.** Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday—8 a. m. to 5.30 p. m. and 7 to 9.30 p. m. Friday and Saturday—8 a. m. to 5.30 p. m. Sunday—2.30 to 5.30 p. m. During vacations the Library is not open in the evenings or on Sunday. Daily vacation hours are from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. and the building is closed after noon on Saturday.

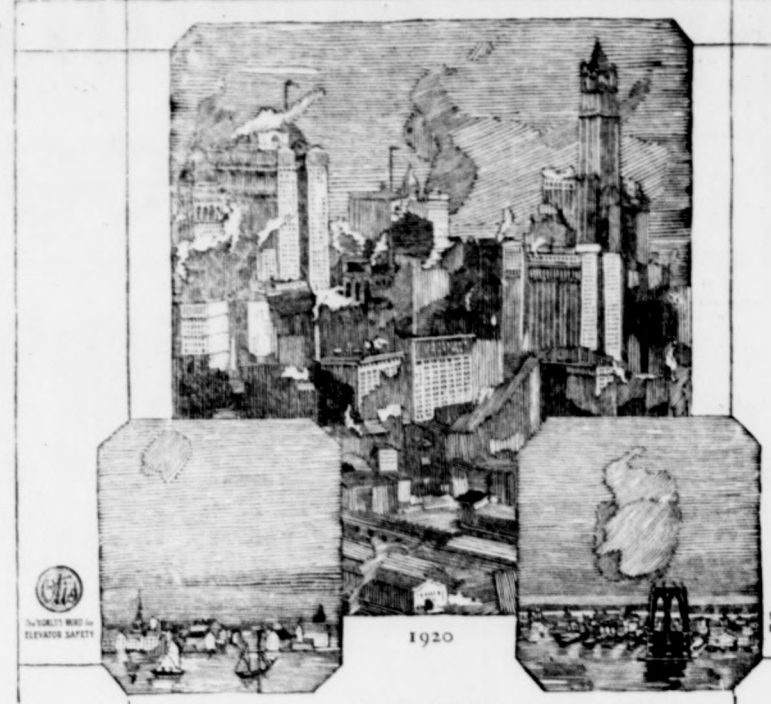
