Maine won for the third time this season on Saturday, defeating Tufts at Medford, by the score of 6 to 0. The points were made by two pretty goals from placement by Shepard. Shepard also punted in excellent form, Tufts suffering in every exchange of kicks.

The first score came at the end of the first period Bryant got away with a splendid run of 30 yards being down on Tufts 35 yard line. Shepard dropped back ten yards for the kick and lifted the ball cleanly over the cross bar.

SOPHOMORE CAPTAIN

Abbott, '14, to Fill Vacancy

The failure of Frank C. Cobb, '12, of Hallowell, to return to college this fall, and his consequent resignation as captain of next spring's baseball team, necessitated a second election this fall. The election was held principally by mail as a majority of last year's 'varsity men graduated last June. The situation was a peculiar one in that only two of last season's "M" men are left in college, and both of them are sophomores. The ballots were counted at the regular meeting of the athletic board on Tuesday evening, showing a majority for Arthur W. Abbott, '14, of Portland High School.

Abbott came to the University from Portland High School. He has played a great deal of summer baseball in and about Portland, working always in the capacity of catcher. Last spring, as a second baseman was needed rather than a catcher, Abbott tried out for the position and made it, doing good work at the bat all season. It is a very unusual thing for a sophomore to be elected captain of a 'varsity team, but Abbott's experience in past years should fit him for the position. He made his numerals in three departments of class athletics last year, captaining his class baseball team.

EDITORIAL.

If a strong central government is good for a nation, why is it not good for a student body? For years the student body of our University has been struggling along as four classes, each with its own troubles. Outside of the athletic association, our student body has absolutely no general organization. We have no means of handling general student difficulties. College customs are falling into disuse because there is no responsible person to see that they are respected. The Senior Skull Society has presented a commendable point system, limiting the offices that a student may hold, and it has been accepted by the student body, but the system is disregarded today because we have no power to enforce its

rules. Last year there was no Peanut Scrap because there was no authoritative body to settle the dispute between the two lower classes. Today the sophomores are attempting to keep the freshmen in line without hazing, and we have no strong, central power to support them in their work.

Untold instances may be cited whereby we feel our lack of organization. We have our Student Council to be sure, but at best it is only a link between Faculty and students. The need of a strong organization seems imperative at once, and the failure to establish such seems to leave an insurmountable barrier in the path of growth of the spirit and activities of the students.

Many plans may be offered to supply this lack. Naturally our idea of central government turns somewhat to the forms in use in our state and nation. Of course nothing so elaborate could be of use in this case, but it may not be out of place here to outline briefly what might be done along these lines. We might elect a governing body of representatives from each class. This body could then draw up constitution and by-laws for the organization of the student body. The president or chairman of this body, to be elected by them, might have the power to call and preside over all meetings of the student body. It seems possible that such a body could govern the student body, settling differences between classes, suggesting and putting into effect new college customs, determining methods for handling the freshmen, meting out justice to those who might break the by-laws, handling the matters of delinquent class dues, failure of student organization, and in fact, looking after everything which effects the University as a whole.

Such surmises and suppositions may be useless, they may be scoffed at by some as impracticable dreams, but even the harshest critic must admit that something is lacking in our present arrangement. Such an admission calls for immediate action for the betterment of conditions. Someone must take the initiative in such a matter, but whoever or whatever body may suggest a change in this line, may every Maine man grasp the opportunity with no uncertain sentiment for the best good of all concerned.

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A man who accepts and enjoys privileges for which he is unwilling to pay is a menace to society. Likewise, a man who enjoys the right of being a member of a class at this University and with that right all of the privileges that go with it, and refuses to pay his share of the expenses of the class is a disgrace to his classmates and well worthy of all of the righteous indignation that can be aroused. We do not aim at the man who cannot honestly afford to pay, although such a man, even, should yield up all privileges as a class member. The man to be criticised is the one who walks about the Campus with the same attitude as if his failure to pay his way was not spread on the class bulletin boards, and still lives as well and apparently has as much money as his paid up classmate. Such a man is a hindrance to the class and the institution that neither can afford to carry. There seems to be no way of reaching such a man at present. If there isn't a method in existence, one should be originated and acted upon in justice to the man who saves enough money to pay his bills.

The first real mass meeting comes tomorrow evening. It is up to every student to make it a success by his presence. Enough notice has been given of this meeting so that every man can arrange his work accordingly. The man that appears with an excuse for not attending that mass meeting on Wednesday evening must be absolute devoid of college spirit. Let us hope that there are not any such questionable Maine men. Let us start the year right, and on Wednesday night show a burst of Maine spirit that shall "bowle over" every student, encircle every member of the Faculty and, reaching out, inspire every Maine alumnus on the continent. The beginning is half the battle. Rally, Maine men, rally!

ON DR. WILEY

Dr. Wood Gives Ten Minute Talk in Chapel

Dr. Wood of the experiment station gave an interesting talk in the regular chapel service on Friday morning on Dr. Wiley, the man who has figured in the pure food investigations of late.

Dr. Wood and Dr. Wiley are warm friends and the speaker told several instances where their close resemblance as to personal appearance had caused amusement. Dr. Wood touched briefly on Dr. Wiley's preparation for his work and then went on to tell of the untiring fight that he had made against the food "doper" and incorrect labelling of food products even with enormous moneyed interests arrayed against him. The speaker said that in spite of the righteousness of his cause, Dr. Wiley had been whipped along three distinct lines and that by three different trusts,—first by the trust that manufactures glucose, secondly by the trust that makes whiskey in a minute, and thirdly by the makers of preservatives. Dr. Wood presented the whole matter in a most interesting light, and expressed the hope that Dr. Wiley would keep up the good fight.

OVERWHELMING VICTORY

Maine Defeats Tufts in First Cross Country

Maine defeated Tufts in the cross-country run over the Middlesex Fells course last Saturday, by the overwhelming score of 19 to 36. For the first half of the race the runners were well bunched, but during the last half, Atwater of Tufts drew ahead, with Power second. Atwater secured a large lead, but Power gradually closed up on him, till at the beginning of the last quarter-mile about fifteen yards separated them. Amid great excitement on the stands, Power made a sprint which carried him past Atwater and across the finish several yards in the lead. The next four runners were all Maine men, Houghton, Patterson, Wardwell, and Kelly crossing the line in order. Power's time for the distance about five miles, was 28 minutes, 23 seconds. WIRELESS DESTROYED

Wind Cripples Efficient Apparatus

During the squall of last Thursday, the aerial of the wireless station on Hannibal Hamlin Hall was blown over. The apparatus is the same that was on the Commons last year and is the property of H. C. Gerrish, '14. The aerial, which may be easily replaced, is 100 feet long and 90 feet high. It connects with the operating room located on the second floor. Here messages are received almost daily from Cape Cod, Brant Rock and numerous points along the coast, but the sending distance is not over 25 miles. It is the only wireless apparatus in a radius of 5 miles.
