MAINE NIGHT TO HAVE SEVERAL NEW FEATURES

**Many Distinguished Guests to Be
Entertained—An "Old Home
Week" for Alumni.**

The annual celebration of Maine Night falls this year on Friday evening, October thirty-first. The event will be held in the Gymnasium as usual, the seating arrangement being the same as last year. Only members of the student body will be allowed on the floor; their guests and other friends of the University will occupy the gallery.

The committee in charge, consisting of President Aley, Mr. Hosea Buck, and P. W. Monohon, '14, has arranged a list of speakers with the idea in mind of making the event one of greater interest to the general public. As is customary, the President of the Athletic Association, Mr. Monohon, will make the address of welcome and will introduce the chairman for the evening—Hon. William R. Pattangall. The Chairman will call upon Governor William T. Haines, President Robert J. Aley, a prominent citizen of Bangor, a representative of the New York Alumni Association, and an undergraduate speaker. President Roberts of Colby has been invited to attend, but it is not known as yet whether he will be present or not. There may be one or two more speakers as the committee has not fully decided upon the matter as yet. The speakers will, in general, attempt to carry out the idea of the committee and try to make Maine Night an event of interest to all the other colleges in the State and to the general public. Maine Night is something more than a mere rally of Maine men, as one member of the committee put it, it is a rally of all friends of Maine and one of its objects is to bring the University into more friendly relations with her sister colleges and with the people of the State.

Maine Night this year is to be made a type of "Old Home Week" celebration for the Alumnus. Many Alumni are expected back for this annual "Old Home Week." A member of the committee is quoted as saying that the alumni want to see the college in all its activity and that Maine Night and the day following offer him this opportunity whereas Commencement Week does not.

An invitation to attend Maine Night is to be tendered to the Maine Teachers' Convention which meets on the same day in Bangor. The committee expects many of the convention to attend and there is a possibility that some prominent member of the convention will speak.

A NEW COURSE

A new course has been added to the curriculum. This course is open to graduates of Normal schools of equal standard of those in this state, who have first completed a course in a class A high school. The degree conferred is Bachelor of Pedagogy.

The course will cover a period of two college years and 75 hours must be passed up. Of these required hours, 12 must be taken in the department of education. A student taking this course must specialize in some one subject such as one language or science. The other hours are elective and must be approved by a special committee who have charge of the course.

The course was ready for students this fall but as the plans had not been finally made no student has entered it as yet. Several teachers throughout the state have signified their intention of registering for the course next year and it is expected that in a few years the course will be an important one.

The main object of the course was for connecting more strongly the educational units of the states. This course will make a complete chain of the departments of learning in the state, a chain that was started when class A graduates were admitted to the University without examination.

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GENERAL LECTURE

Prof. Huddilston Talks on the Influence of
Classical Antiquity on Europe

Every Wednesday afternoon at four-thirty finds the Lecture Room in the Library, filled with students and many interested outsiders eager for the weekly lecture. The students are likely more interested in this easy way of making a point while the visitors are more attentive to the excellent thoughts which Professor Huddilston gives in his pleasing style.

Professor Huddilston reached last Wednesday, the fourth in his series of lectures on "The Influence of Classical Antiquity upon Europe from the Thirteenth to the Seventeenth Centuries." In this lecture, he dealt with the founding of the great universities and the forces of Classicism in theology and law.

Professor Huddilston's previous talks had treated of the pure Greek Learning. In this discourse, he showed the progress of the early sciences medicine, theology, and law. The lecturer made Aristotle the center of his theme. He mentioned how, after the fall of Rome, the Greek and classic learning had been transferred to Constantinople. From this city, the art and science easily removed to Bagdad, the chief city of the rising race of Arabians. In short order the wanderers carried their precious store of knowledge thru northern Africa and up into Southern Europe thru two great routes: one into Spain and the other thru Sicily into the Italian peninsula.

Professor Huddilston went on to say that for 400 years after Rome's fall, the classical learning was a blank. Thrice this empty space of time was broken. The first inroad came with Charlemagne who ordered a latin translation of the Arabic books. Again, with the Crusades came a revived interest in learning. The complete translation of Aristotle's works at Venice led to the third period of this early renaissance.

The lecturer showed in a logical way how all these changes led to the foundation of the Great universities. All of the four greatest were institutes of general science but each one was particularly noted for a special branch of learning. The University of Salerno was famous for the study of medicine while that at Bologna was the seat of law. The University of Oxford was closely allied with that at Paris. The former was the home of arts and sciences while the latter was a school of theology.

The Professor confessed in closing that he had by no means exhausted his subject and suggested that it might be a fitting topic for a book.

EDITORIAL.

The report on the Grand Stand Fund which was called for last spring is in Mr. Gannett's hands and can be seen by any student at any time. A full report in the **Grand Stand** CAMPUS at this time is not considered appropriate, but at the same time every student is urged to look up the report in the office if he is interested in the matter. We were assured during a recent interview that work will begin on the Grand Stand next May without fail. Publicity at times is bad for any enterprise, especially when, as in this case, the enterprise is lacking in the support which it justly deserves. As soon as the authorities are ready to begin work on the stand they may be assured of the full support of the student body, and of any help the CAMPUS may be able to give.

In order that the Alumni may be informed of the position the CAMPUS now occupies in regard to finances a word or two about what is expected of the Alumni is of timely interest.

Do You Want This Paper This fall the student body voted to give the CAMPUS fifty cents more a year per capita. This was done so that the management of the paper could publish an issue twice every week. The manager has been able to secure more profitable advertisements on account of the fact that the paper is larger than formerly and is published oftener. There is still one thing that would increase the value of our advertising and that is increased circulation. Does it sound reasonable that a college of this size should have an Alumni circula-

tion of but 600? It might be reasonable if the paper was published but once a week and did not contain timely news. The newspaper style of the CAMPUS today has greatly increased the interest in the paper among the students. Why not among the Alumni? We do not ask you to subscribe to the paper merely as a matter of college spirit. We ask you to subscribe *now* because the paper is worth the money to you. If you cannot bring yourself to realize this fact, please send to the Business Manager for sample copies. We must have at least 500 new Alumni on our mailing list before Thanksgiving in order to continue the twice a week policy which we have adopted. Will you help? Circulate your copy of the CAMPUS among the Alumni with whom you are best acquainted, and talk the matter over. The Business Manager is sending out 800 circular letters this week and if the necessary 500 new subscriptions are forthcoming the management will continue the present policy of the paper.

EXCHANGES

The Dartmouth Inc., which is to publish The Dartmouth, a thrice weekly newspaper by the undergraduates of Dartmouth College, was organized in Portland recently, and the certificate of organization was filed Wednesday at the registry of deeds. The company does not represent any great departure from previous policies except to put the paper upon a corporate basis, with a legal standing and stocks to place on the market.

The president and treasurer of The Dartmouth Inc., is J. Theodore Mariner, Dartmouth '14, of Portland, who is at present editor-in-chief of The Dartmouth. When the company is finally organized the other officers are to be the managing editor and the business manager of the paper. Ernest M. White of Portland, a Dartmouth alumnus, is clerk of the corporation, one of the organizers. The home office of the company is in Portland.

The Dartmouth Inc., is capitalized at \$1,000, which is divided evenly between preferred and common stock. The par value of the shares is one dollar.

The purposes of the company as stated in the certificate of organization are as follows:

"To carry on the business of publishing in the town of Hanover, N. H., the Dartmouth College newspaper, now known, as The Dartmouth, and therein to publish such college news as may be for the best interests of the undergraduate and alumni bodies, and to record therein authentic Dartmouth events, and through its editorial columns to express current student opinion and to mould student sentiment along lines that shall harmonize with the administrative functions of the college, and to publish therein such other newspaper matter as shall be advisable in the judgment of its board of editors."

Fraternity and boarding house stewards at Ohio State University have combined to resist the high cost of living. This week an organization has been formed whereby the stewards are to buy jointly the groceries and meat which are now costing these organizations about \$40,000 a year.

The foodstuffs will be bought in carload lots wherever possible, or at least in very large quantities, and they will be stored in a room to be rented near the university. The authorities will be asked to allow the co-operative system the use of the spur tracks on the campus to shorten the haul on such commodities as coal and potatoes. Twenty-one fraternities and nine boarding clubs are in the organization and they are all reasonably near the campus.

Lee C. Hinslea, junior law student, of Lakewood, is president of the stewards organization and George Trautman, of Bucyrus, senior agricultural student, is secretary, and is looking after

the first bids. Committees have been appointed to get bids from Columbus wholesale houses and these bids will be opened every Tuesday.

This is the first plan of the sort to be adopted on such an extensive scale, so university men say, in any American educational institution. The one that nearest approaches it is that at Cornell university, where a manager buys for the fraternities more numerous than in any other university in the country, and saves them many thousands a year on table expenses.

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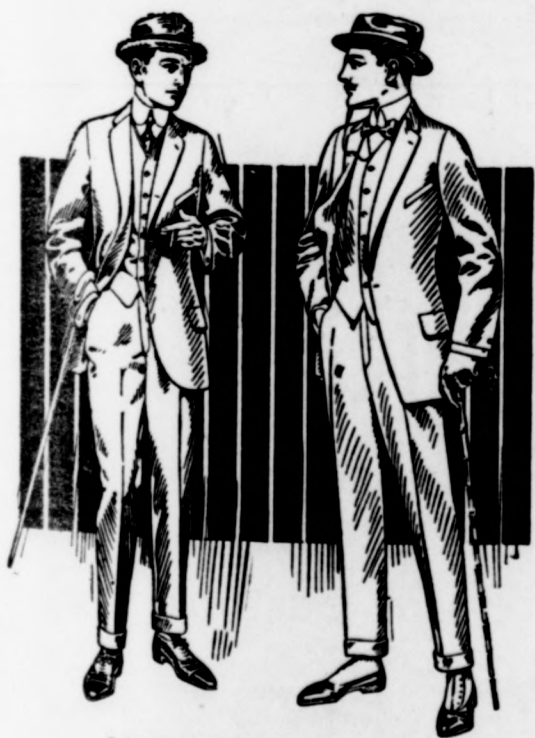
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LAW SCHOOL NOTES

The University of California has struck a forward note in the training of students for modern citizenship. With the opening of the year, the department of Education launched a one-unit lecture course on "The Social Aspect of the Liquor Problem," to consist of fourteen lectures, one a week, on various phases of the problem, with the personnel of the lecturers comprising professors of California and Stanford Universities, prominent professional men of San Francisco, and David Starr Jordan, Chancellor of Stanford. The course is open to students and citizens but credit is given only to students who attend, pass an examination on the entire course, and write a 1,500 word thesis on the subject of any lecture. The course has proved very popular, the first lecture being attended by 152, the second by 255, with an average for the first five of 200.

"Expelled for not drinking beer," is the surprising headline in the newspapers telling of a cable from Greifswald, Germany, which states that because of criticism of the college drinking customs as illustrated in a typical "beer evening" celebration, one student was sentenced to three days confinement in the university dungeon, two others expelled, and four more summoned to trial before the university officials. The despatch is all the more startling because of the recent terrific indictments of alcohol by some of the most brilliant scientists and professors of Germany. We wonder what the Kaiser said when he read this and then thought of his own strong denunciation of alcohol before the naval cadets at Nuerwick two years ago.
