Amend A. A. Constitution At the Rally Friday

Speakers Urge Students to Show More Real Spirit. "Tank" Graffam Promises Real Special Train for Lewiston Trip.

A crowd of fairly good size had gathered in the gym Friday night when the band set things going. By the time the first stop was made, considerable enthusiasm had been developed and cheer-leader Sargent got lusty results in the cheers he led. The team entered shortly to the tune of the "Hound Dawg" getting a good welcome as the members took their places down front.

Pres. Fifield appeared on the "counter" stating that he wished to clear up a little business before the real part of the rally began. He read and called for a vote on the Amendments to the A. A. Constitution which were printed in the Campus a few weeks ago and which have been posted pending adoption. These dealt mainly with changes brought by the creation of the Athletic Board as an executive body rather than an advisory one, as formerly, and the powers and duties of the Graduate Manager over game schedules and reports for excused class absences at outside contests. An amendment giving one trustee a place on the Athletic Board was suggested. The resolutions were unanimously passed as read.

Coach Flack took his place as first speaker amid applause and in his concise and absolutely frank manner gave a few cold facts for his audience to think over. The coach was a little disheartened at the present state of affairs, but informed the bunch that he was going to try to win the State Meet anyway, even though ineligibility and men quitting were giving him a bad set back. The one thing he asked of the student body was to cover the coming course to give the runners all the whole-hearted cheering and support possible to bring them home winners.

Coach Brice criticized the spirit of the evening as not as whole-hearted as he wished and pointed out the very bad effect of such on a fighting team. Safe to say he found the kind he wanted when the next cheering was done. He

R. O. T. C. Signal Corps Recently Formed Here

Announcement of the Proposed organization of a signal unit for the military department was made at a meeting of the cadets on Alumni Field last Saturday morning. The cadets interested in the work have given their names to J. L. Bernard, who is to act as radio instructor, and from this list will be chosen twelve men to comprise the signal division. Electrical engineers are to receive preference, but the men are to be chosen for their ability and qualifications as to experience and college record. The names of these twelve men will be read Saturday morning, October 22.

The unit will receive instructions each Saturday morning on brief radio and telephone construction, the erection of masts, the use of the flags and heliograph, and so forth, and will accompany the military unit on its spring camping trip to Camp Benson. It is expected to work with the college station to be installed in Lord Hall, and to maintain communication upon all trips and camping expeditions. Incidentally, the course of instruction will help the men toward membership in the proposed radio club, and make them fitted to operate the proposed University Radio Station.

Uphill Work If Maine Wins State Track Meet

As a result of the first trial races of the year appearances are that Maine will have more than a hard battle to regain the state Cross Country title. Of last year's team Raymond is ineligible and three of the most promising men, O'Connor, Ames and Alquist are unavailable for the team either because of injuries or ineligibility. To fill their places men will have to be picked from those unable to make the team last year or from the freshman candidates. Nowland, a promising freshman who was running a good third in Saturday's race up to three hundred yards from the finish is out of further competition due to a weak heart.

Patten, a freshman from Brunswick has shown a lot of ability while A. E. Wilson, a substitute last year, is coming along in fine shape but the burden of racing will fall upon the veteran Captain Herrick, and Barnard with the assistance of Berg, Pease, W. O. Wilson and Laughlin.

H. F. Noyes, a freshman from Marblehead, Mass., C. E. Noyes, Ham and McKeeman are all going well and should give good accounts of themselves if called upon.

This will leave the team to be made up of three veterans and four new men. With the presence of those on the ineligible list the team would be above the average but in its weakened condition it will have the hardest battle of years to hold the second place of last year.

Campaigning for Radio Activity on the Campus

At Present a Receiving Station Is to Be Placed in Lord Hall, to Form Club for Radio Enthusiasts on Campus

A second meeting of those interested in forming a radio club at the University of Maine was held at 1 P. M. Tuesday, October 11. There was some discussion concerning the erection of a station and the number of men available for the perpetuation of the work to be begun by this organization.

It should be noted by those interested in the work that the station will be erected to serve the University, and that the final purpose of the association must be to handle the traffic incident to the work of the University. The matter of radio instruction and private experimentation may follow, but for the present the attention will be upon the necessity of a modern transmitting and receiving outfit, primarily for the work of the Agricultural Department. It is proposed to establish a daily marketgram service similar to that of the Bureau of Standards and several other colleges, whereby the isolated farmer or local merchant may have the benefit of daily market reports by wireless telephone Time and weather reports, as well as the broad-casting of wireless press, will doubtless be of vital interest to the residents of this state who care to buy a small receiving set. The use of the wireless telephone rather than the wireless telegraph obviates the necessity for each receiving operator to learn the code signals, as the voice carried thru the air is exactly similar to the voice on the ordinary telephone circuits. The range of the station as planned will be several hundred miles under adverse conditions.

For the present, a receiving station is to be placed in Lord Hall, to receive messages from both short and long-wave stations in the United States and

Cross Country Race Won by Sophomores

The sophomores won the interclass cross country race with a score of 23; the juniors came second with score of 28 and the freshmen came third with a score of 38.

At the end of the first quarter of the football game the teams lined up under the west goal posts, and as the pistol cracked, sprinted across Alumni Field. The runners were well bunched until they reached the end of the straight-away, and then settled down for a long run.

The first runners were sighted shortly after the first half. Alquist led the bunch on to the field with Patten about 15 yards in the rear. On reaching the north west end of the bleachers he stopped, thinking that that point was the finish. Patten continued and came in first. Ames and Berg came second and third respectively, with Wilson fourth.

The men finished strong with the exception of Nowland, who collapsed just as he reached the bleachers. Several finished with strong sprints.

The following men will receive numerals: Patten 25; Ames 24; Berg 24; Wilson 23; C. G. Smith 24; and C. E. Noyes 24.

Maine's gridiron men by their stiff defense and baffling attack turned back the R. I. State football team Saturday on Alumni Field by the score of 7 to 3. In a hardfought game, Maine with a snappy offensive consisting of a mixture of plays which baffled the visitors and her ability to assemble a stonewall defense against the attack of the flashy R. I. backs won a deserved victory.

R. I. scored within the first four minutes of play on a dropkick from Maine's 22 yard line with Johnson booting the ball between the uprights. Maine in the opening of the second quarter following a march down the field in which two forwards netted 20 yards gave Gruhn a chance to hurl himself over for a touchdown.

Maine presented a stonewall defense with Dwelley and Lunge tackling Reardon and Mulvaney and Strout guards and Capt. Young and McKechnie ends. The Maine men clearly out-conditioned the Rhode Island gridders and had the punch all the way through the game. Simpson the R. I. State fullback played one of the prettiest games seen this year on Alumni Field with his dodging, swerving, and aggressive playing.

KICKING OPENS GAME

Maine opened the game kicking to Rhode Island, and Connors returned the ball to his 30 yard marker. Johnson was good for eight but fumbled on the next play, Cohen covering the ball in midfield. Two rushes gained but five yards and Small punted 50 yards to Simpson, who wiggled back through a broken field for another 25. Johnson made four, Connors one, and Johnson booted, the ball rolling to Maine's five-yard line. Gruhn misjudged and Small punted on the first play a short kick giving Simpson a chance to sprint back to Maine's 25-yard mark.

Two rushes placed the ball on the 20-yard line, and after an unsuccessful forward pass Johnson dropped back on Maine's 22-yard line and drop kicked but the ball went wide and Maine started play on her 20-yard line. Small kicked and by pretty sweeping of ends by Simpson, Rhode Island worked back into Maine territory, a forward pass to Kennedy from Johnson being good for 25 yards. 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Athletic Tickets

It is a sad but true fact that many of the students here at the University are abusing the privilege granted them, as students, to have a season admittance ticket to the games played on Alumni Field. It is very plainly printed on the ticket that the ticket is *not transferable*. Many of the students both men and women are using borrowed tickets to allow friends to attend the game free of charge. The result is that the athletic association is not going to have sufficient money for the season and the students will be asked for another contribution to take care of this shortage due to the lack of proper Maine spirit by some of the members of the student body.

It is also known that a ticket lost by one of the members of the student body is being used by the friends of one of the other students. The name of the owner is plainly marked on the ticket but the present holder has not seen fit to return the ticket to the owner or to the treasury office. The rightful owner has been paying full admission every week to the games on Alumni Field, as the treasury office can not recognize a lost card. These incidents seem to us to be a mighty poor showing for college men and women of Maine. Think it over.

The New Chapel

When you attend this chapel remember that this chapel is a chapel asked for by the student body. It was primarily formed by members of the student body and is not being made compulsory by

the faculty or by the Trustees but by the student body. We must show the faculty and the Trustees that we are united, as a student body should be, and will support this chapel to a man.

Annapolis Examinations Will Be Given Oct. 29

A competitive examination for appointment to the Naval Academy at Annapolis will be held October 29 at the post-offices of Portland, Lewiston, Augusta, and Bangor. The candidate must be a Maine man, a citizen of the United States, and not less than 16 nor more than 20 years of age on the calendar year in which he enters Annapolis.

The examination will cover the subjects of Algebra, Geometry, Grammar, Geography, United States History, and Arithmetic; and is based on the regular entrance examinations to the Naval Academy. The examination will be given at 9 o'clock in the morning, one hour for each subject and a half hour at noon for lunch.

Candidates receiving the highest ranks in this competitive examination will be nominated as principals and alternates, provided they satisfactorily pass a physical examination, to take the regular Naval Academy entrance examinations on February 15 or April 19, 1922.

Governor Speaks Before Agricultural Convention

Society for Technical Education Meets Here

The fall meeting of the New England Section of the Society for the Promotion of Engineering Education was held at the University of Maine Saturday, October 15th. It is seldom realized by the student body how much study is put upon the various curricula by the various faculties in institutions all over the country. The selection of the subjects which make up any curriculum is not by any means a hit or miss affair. Much study is put upon the best methods of teaching as well as the contents to be taught.

The Society for the Promotion of Engineering Education was started at the World's Fair in Chicago in 1894, and has a membership of not only engineering educators, but also has among its numbers many who teach the fundamentals of engineering, such as professors of English, Physics, Chemistry, and Mathematics.

The National organization meets once each year. The meetings are largely attended, the last one being at Yale University with an attendance of nearly 400. All parts of the country are represented. During the year, sectional meetings are held. New England comprises one section. Dean Gardner C. Anthony, of Tufts College is Chairman, and Dean Harold S. Boardman, of Maine, is Secretary of this Section. The spring meeting of the Section was held at Worcester Polytechnic Institute, and at that time it was voted to hold the fall meeting at the University of Maine. The next meeting will be held at Brown University, Providence.

Most of the visiting members arrived on the Boston boat. They were met by automobiles and taken to the Campus, where the University served them a dinner at Balentine Hall. The afternoon meeting was held in the Lecture Room of the Department of Physics. The evening meeting was held at the Penobscot Exchange, following supper which was served at that place. A special sleeping car was secured for the midnight train, upon which nearly all of the members returned.

As the principal subject for consideration at the afternoon session was "The Teaching of Physics in Technical Schools," in addition to the members who were present, the following institutions were officially represented by the Head of their Department of Physics: Columbia, Yale, Harvard, Trinity, Brown, Worcester, M. I. T., Tufts, New Hampshire State, Norwich, Dartmouth, and Colby. In addition representatives came from Northeastern, Massachusetts Department of Education, Franklin Union, and Middlebury.

Phi Gam Freshmen Have First Smoker of Season

Phi Gamma Delta had its freshman smoker Thursday evening October 13. This was the first smoker of the year and proved to be a splendid success. Several musicians were present and the first part of the evening was devoted to music, both vocal and instrumental. Cattle Barns Places of Interest to All Visitors

It is a pleasure to visit the big cattle barns, the most easterly buildings in the agricultural group. The housing facilities and the equipment are thoroughly up-to-date; the animals supplied with good air and plenty of sunshine and kept scrupulously neat. There is nearly an even division of Jerseys, Guernseys, Ayrshires and Holsteins.

The Jersey herd, comprising 18 cows, is headed by Pogis 99th of Hood Farm Pogis 29th, the offspring of a renowned bull. A number of the cows are on a register of merit test and are making splendid records.

In the Ayrshire herd are 12 females and a bull, Copestone Mischief Maker, who traces back to imported animals owned by Dr. J. A. Ness of Auburn, one of America's best known breeders of Ayrshires. Some of the cows in this

herd are also on advanced registry tests and one of them, a two-year-old, is giving an average of 50 pounds of milk daily, testing 5 percent butterfat.

There are 18 Guernsey cows, headed by Laudholm Royal Creusa, a bull showing wonderful type and capacity.

The Holsteins number 16 cows in milk and in addition there are 13 heifers and calves that the college is raising to work into the herd for replacement purposes. A two-year-old heifer from this herd was exhibited as a Maine representative at the Springfield exposition, last month, and she shared in the prize money. At the present time the head of this herd is a bull loaned to the college by his joint owners, C. L. Pike of Lubec and A. E. Hodges of Fairfield Center. King Pledge Reliance is his name and he is a grandson of the renowned King of the Pontiacs; his mother, Lynden Pansy Pledge, a cow with a 34-pound record. This bull headed the Maine herd chosen by the Maine Holstein Breeders' Association to represent this State at the big Springfield show. The college is

raising for its Holstein herd a very promising young bull, a son of King Pontiac Reliance, out of the Holstein cow having the second highest production record in Maine.

What becomes of all the milk daily produced by the college herd? It all goes to the dormitories to feed the University of Maine students. Any student will tell you that the quality is fine. The cows are all under the Federal accredited test and the best of care is taken of the milk. Immediately after being drawn the milk is cooled, aerated, canned or bottled in the dairy and kept in the refrigerator until ready for delivery, so that its high grade may be maintained.

The college farm management believes that a fair amount of regular exercise helps to keep the bulls in trim, so they are taught to get into the yoke and work in pairs occasionally, doing some of the odd hauling jobs about the farm. This sort of thing is good for their dispositions, as well as for their health.

Maine's 22 marker and shot the ball through the uprights for three points and the first score.

YOUNG DASHES 50 YARDS

Maine received the kickoff with Small getting the ball on his 10-yard line, crossing and passing to Young, who went up the field for 50 yards to be downed by Beck on Rhode Island's 45-yard line. Captain Young threw off four tacklers on this play and only a lunging tackle by Beck forcing him outside of bounds prevented him from making a touchdown, as he had a clear field. Time ended further play.

Small turned in five yards on the first play of the second quarter and then followed with a short pass over the line to Gruhn which was good for 10 yards. Gruhn turned in four and Small slipped off left tackle for 10 yards. Cohen added two, a forward from Taylor to Small put the ball on Rhode Island's four yard line and Gruhn plunged through the center of the line for a touchdown. Small kicked the goal.

Small kicked off to Rhode Island over the line and the visitors after failing to gain, Johnson kicked, Small fumbling on Maine's 45 yard line and Rhode Island had the ball within striking distance again but forward passes failed and time ended play after the visitors had gained 10 yards on plunges off tackle.

IN MAINE'S TERRITORY

Maine's line tightened in the third and although play was in their territory for the greater part of the third quarter, Small punted on most every opportunity. Rhode Island working to within a few yards on first down and then kicking. Four exchanges of punts were made. Maine gained a little ground and Cohen took the ball through center for 35 yards and well back into Rhode Island's last line of defense. With the visitors holding hard, Maine shot two forwards which were unsuccessful and gave up the ball, Rhode Island punted and a few rushes took the ball to Rhode Island's 45 yard line and time stopped play.
