MAINE SWAMPS VERMONT

Marked Improvement in Team

Maine defeated Vermont on Alumni Field, Saturday, 17 to 0 outplaying their opponents in every department of the game. Every Maine man worked hard, and the team deserved to win. Maine used a great variety of plays, working the forward pass especially to advantage. Vermont made first down only four times and that with difficulty. Maine made about 25 yards with every exchange of punts.

The ball was in Vermont's territory practically all of the first period. Maine finally worked the ball to Vermont's 30-yard line where Vermont braced, and Shepard kicked a goal from placement on the third down. The next score came in the second period. After a gain of seven yards by Bryant, Maine tried an onside kick, Murray recovering the ball on Vermont's 22-yard line. Vermont braced, and Shepard kicked a second goal on the third down.

Vermont came back a little stronger in the third period, but it was not for long. Maine worked two splendid forward passes, putting the ball within striking distance. Capt. Parker was put into the game for a few minutes and carried the ball over for the first touchdown. Shepard kicked the goal. The final score came in the last period. Shepard kicked over the Vermont quarter's head, the ball bounding across the goal line. By fast work, Maine's ends were well under the punt and Bernheisel fell on the ball for a touchdown. This honor of being elected to Phi Kappa Phi Fraternity, falls upon the twelve seniors attaining the highest average for their college course. Six are elected from the University

Phi Kappa Phi was founded at the University of Maine by ex-President Harris. Since its establishment it has gradually increased its roll of chapters until it now embraces fifteen chapters. The sixteenth chapter is soon to be given its charter at the University of Iowa. Phi Kappa Phi is the most democratic honorary fraternity in the country, as it is open to students in all departments of learning and election to it is a reward only for scholarship attainments.

CLASS FOOTBALL

MAINE CORN AND FRUIT SHOW

Dr. Pearl in Charge of Educational Advantages

A Maine Corn and Fruit Show is to be held in Portland from November 6 to 11, under the auspices of the Portland Board of Trade. A very prominent feature of the show will be corn shelling contest for which a prize of one hundred dollars will be given. For this the contestants will exhibit corn in one bushel lots and the bushel that shells out the most pounds of corn will receive the prize.

Besides this, the regular exhibits of corn and fruit will be displayed and suitable prizes will be awarded for the winners. Another prominent feature of the show is the educational advantages it offers. Dr. Pearl of the Maine Experiment Station is on the committee in charge of this and he states that everything possible is to be done to make the show as educational as possible.

FINE RALLY

Four Hundred Cheer Speakers

The theme of the first smoker-rally which was held in the gymnasium last Wednesday night, seemed to be Maine spirit and Maine cheering. W. R. Ballou, president of the athletic association, in opening, explained the speeches to be unexpected and wholly extemporaneous. As first speaker he called on Manager Hussey of the football team. He told of the spirit displayed by the Maine Alumni at the Tufts game and afterward at the Alumni banquet and, also, of their keen interest in their Alma Mater. Manager Hussey made a plea for better cheering and said that organized cheering of an enthusiastic student body could push a team on to victory.

E. H. Bigelow, '13, was the next man called upon to speak. Although he endeavored to explain that he was not much of a man at speech-making yet he succeeded very well in describing the sensations of a man in the game at the time the yells are being given.

R. A. Power, '13, the man who finished first in the cross-country race with Tufts, added good words for Maine spirit.

Coach Wingard, the next speaker, gave one of his characteristic heart to heart talks, in which he said that every freshman, sophomore, junior, and senior should feel that he is a part of this University and that it is his duty to support the team by his cheering and personal encouragement.

Captain Parker made one of his witty and enthusiastic speeches. He stated that all football men are true Americans, that is they are true Americans because they are men with plenty of backbone and are willing to take a chance in the game.

The rally ended with rousing selections by the band and a march around the gymnasium.

The band, twenty-five pieces strong did great work during the evening, boding well for appearances during the state series.

FRESHMAN DEBATING CLUB

The members are all desirous that more men should turn out in order that the team that meets the Sophomores may be more truly representative of the class. EDITORIAL.

In this issue of the CAMPUS appears the class constitution which was presented to the student body last year and adopted by the four classes then in college. This constitution is accordingly in effect with all of the present active classes with the exception of the Freshmen. All of the three upper classes have failed either in regard to nominations, time of elections or some other detail to comply with the requirements of this constitution. This is certainly an untimely mistake. The plan of a uniform constitution is a new one and should be given a fair trial at least. To give it a fair trial, its requirements should be lived up to in every particular. The only possible result of laxity in regard to it is its gradual decline into the dead-letter class. It should either be lived up to or voted out.

As far as the Freshmen are concerned, they

have everything to gain by adopting the constitution, and that early in the year. If enforced it will be a power for regulating class affairs and avoiding many of the difficulties and embarrassing situations which have been prevalent in the past.

Every Maine man has a good right to feel proud of the support given our teams at Medford, when nearly one hundred enthusiastic Alumni cheered the blue across the line in our first cross-country, and had the supreme pleasure of watching the football team repeat the trick on Tufts. Then the banquet on the evening after the victories was one long burst of Maine spirit, coming from men who love their Alma Mater and look back on their days at Maine as the happiest days of all. Such is the spirit of Maine Alumni, and such spirit cannot be overcome. We may be defeated, we may receive a series of setbacks all along the line, but if students, Alumni and Faculty show from now on, such loyalty, such enthusiasm, such bull-dog determination to land on top as our Alumni have shown consistently through reverses and dismal failures, the ultimate success of our athletics is assured. Every man on the Campus felt a stranger bond uniting him with the Alumni when he heard the account of the game. May such bonds be many and strong in the years to come, welding together a chain of Maine men in college and out with a spirit that knows no defeat.

The student body both in cheering section and in the band deserve the highest commendation for their enthusiastic, unwavering support of the team on Saturday and their courtesy and sportsmanlike treatment of the Vermont team. Such exhibitions can only bring honor to the University.

Some students were noticeable in the dormitory windows, which face the athletic field, during the game on Saturday. Either such men are willing to take something for which they are unwilling to pay, or, if their own athletic tickets have not enough college spirit to support our team on

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the bleachers. Public sentiment should be sufficiently strong to make such exhibitions impossible in the future.

CLASS CONSTITUTION

The Campus publishes below a copy of the uniform class constitution which was adopted by all of the classes last year.

ARTICLE I

The name of this organization shall be the Class of of the University of Maine.

ARTICLE II

The membership of the Class shall consist of all students listed at the University office as members of the Class, and of all students who entered the University for the first time in and who are not listed as members of any class at the University office.

ARTICLE III

The officers of the Class shall be a President, a Vice-President, a Secretary, a Treasurer, and an Executive Committee of five members, one of whom shall be the President.

ARTICLE IV

Sec. 1. It shall be the duty of the President, and in his absence of the Vice-President, to call meetings when he deems it necessary or upon petition of fifteen members, provided that at least 24 hours' notice be given of each meeting, and to perform all other duties that devolve upon his office.

Sec. 2. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep an accurate record of all meetings and at each meeting to read the minutes of the preceding meeting.

Sec. 3. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to collect and account for all class dues; to deposit all funds in a bank approved by the Executive Committee; to pay all bills by check; and to post a report during the week following the auditing of his books.

Sec. 4. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to have charge of all elections, to audit the accounts of all class officers, committees, and managers, during the last three weeks of the Freshman, Sophomore, and Senior years, and during the first two weeks of the Senior year, and to attend to such other matters as may come within its jurisdiction.

ARTICLE V

Sec. 1. For all class offices, candidates shall be nominated by a Nominating Committee consisting of one representative from each fraternity chapter and for every ten non-fraternity members of the Class, provided that the credentials of each delegate are satisfactory to the Executive Committee.

Sec. 2. The meetings of the Nominating Committee shall be called and presided over by the President, who must give at least 24 hours' notice of each meeting. The President shall have no vote in the meetings of the Com-

mittee, and the nominations shall not cease until every delegate has had an opportunity to nominate at least one candidate.

Sec. 3. For each class office three candidates shall be chosen by the Committee, and their names shall be posted on the class bulletin board by the President at least three days before the election.

Sec. 4. Other candidates for any office may be placed before the Class by nomination from the floor in class meeting.

ARTICLE VI

Sec. 1. The class officers and all special officers and committees, including the Commencement officers, the Junior Week officers, the *Prism* officers, the Sophomore Hop committee, the Calendar committee, and managers of all class teams (in the years that such offices occur), shall be elected by Australian ballot at a suitable polling place designated by the Executive Committee, during the fourth week of the fall semester. An exception shall be made in the case of the Freshman class in that only the eight executive officers of the Class shall be elected at this time, other officers of the Freshman year being chosen at a later date set by the Executive Committee.

Sec. 2. The candidate receiving the plurality of the votes cast for each office shall be declared elected.

Sec. 3. No member of the Class shall be allowed to vote of hold office if he is in arrears in class dues.

ARTICLE VII

A majority of the members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. Three fourths of the members of the Nominating Committee shall constitute a quorum for a meeting. Three members of the Executive Committee shall be a quorum for a meeting.

ARTICLE VIII

This constitution may be amended by a three fourths vote of the members present at the meeting, provided the proposed amendment has been previously approved by the Executive Committee and posted for three days before the meeting.

SOPHOMORE DEBATING CLUB

P. W. Monohon Elected President

The first meeting of the Sophomore Debating Club was held Tuesday, Oct. 10, in Estabrooke Hall. The evening was devoted entirely to business, the first subject brought up being the election of officers. The balloting resulted as follows: president, P. W. Monohon; vice-president, N. R. French; secretary-treasurer, A. B. Ferguson. It was then voted to hold meetings in Estabrooke Hall every other Thursday, at 7.30 P. M. President Monohon then appointed men to debate on Thursday, Oct. 26, on the question: Resolved, that at the University of

Maine, any student obtaining a rank of ninety per cent, or over in any subject should be exempt from final examinations in that subject. Clarke, '13, concluded the meeting with a short talk on the aim and aspirations of the University Debating Club and on the possibility of having a 'varsity debating team and intercollegiate debates.

SOPHOMORES LEAD

Rain Postpones Meet

Under uncertain weather conditions, a number of events in the annual Pumpkin Meet between the Sophomore and Freshman classes were held at the athletic field, Friday afternoon. The events were interesting and closely contested. At the close of the afternoon's meet, the Sophomores had made 38 points and the Freshmen 16 points.

O'Brien and Bailey of the Freshman class won two firsts in the broad jump and hammer throw respectively, while St. Onge, McKenney, Brooks, and Stobie of the Sophomore class, won first places. The remaining events in the meet were to have been run off Saturday afternoon, but because of the drizzly rain were postponed until this week.

1911 COMETS

Dean Hart Talks on Interesting Subject

Dean Hart of the University gave an interesting talk in Chapel, Friday, on the subject, "The Comets of 1911." Dean Hart said that seven comets had been noted this year of which six were new and one a returning periodic comet. These comets were as follows: 1911 A, Wolfe's Comet, discovered at Heidelberg, June 19, by Prof. Max Wolf; 1911 B, discovered at Lick Observatory, July 7, by a graduate student named Kiess; 1911 C, discovered by Prof. Wm. B. Brooks, in July, at Smith observatory, Geneva, N. Y. This is the twenty-sixth comet discovered by Prof. Brooks, and has recently been visible in the western sky. 1911 D, Encke's Comet was observed by Gomessiat in Algiers, July 31. This is a periodic comet, with a period of three and one-half years, but it is gradually shortening its time. This is the shortest period of any known comet. 1911 E. is the same as 1905 II. Borelly and was observed at Helwan, Egypt, by an Englishman on Sept. 19. 1911 F, was discovered by Quenisset at Juvisy, on Sept. 23. 1911 G, was discovered by Beljowski at Simeis. Dean Hart added that Haley's Comet, which was so conspicuous last year, is still visible to an observer using a strong telescope.

Many New Men and Others Wanted

Now that the year is well started and the new men are becoming acquainted with the various college activities, the CAMPUS Board takes this opportunity of placing before the students its new Constitution and By-laws and for presenting the condition of the paper before them.

The board plans to hold weekly meetings on Tuesday evenings at 6.30 o'clock, where new

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ideas and improvements will be discussed. Every fellow who is interested in the Campus is cordially invited to attend any of these meetings and to offer any new suggestions for the publishing of the paper. If any student think she would like to make the CAMPUS Board, the managing editor will be glad to take his name and try him out for a position. There is a big chance for new men, especially freshmen, to make the board. One of the new inducements is the division of surplus money among senior members of the board as explained in the by-laws.

At present the following men are trying out for the CAMPUS Board: R. F. Thurrell, '15, A. E. Carle, '15, J. H. Lewis, '15, E. B. Harvey, '14, M. J. Creighton, '15, L. H. Morrell, '15, R. M. There will be several elections to the board during the year, the first of which will occur shortly.

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I.

The name of this organization shall be the University of Maine Campus Board.

ARTICLE II.

The object of the Board shall be to publish, with or without a magazine section, a journal of events in and of interest to the University, which shall be known as the Maine CAMPUS, and to generally promote literary activity among the students.

ARTICLE III.

Section 1. The members of the Board shall be those students who have been duly elected, by a majority vote of the entire Board, to either the editorial or the business staff of the CAMPUS, together with a member of the Faculty and an alumnus or two members of the Faculty, who shall be chosen by a majority vote of the entire Board at the annual meeting.

Sec. 2. Any member may be removed from Board by a majority vote of entire members.

ARTICLE IV.

Section 1. The officers of the Board shall be a Chairman, who shall be the editor-in-chief of the CAMPUS, a Vice-Chairman, a Secretary, and a Treasurer, who shall be either the alumnus member or one of the Faculty members of the Board.

Sec. 2. Two weeks prior to the annual meeting of the Board, an auditing committee, consisting of two members, shall be appointed by the Chairman, to audit the accounts of the Treasurer and the Business Manager of the CAMPUS and to report at the annual meeting.

ARTICLE V.

The officers of the Board shall be nominated from the

floor and elected by written ballot at the annual meeting, to be held during the last week in April of each year, and the candidates who shall receive a majority of the votes cast shall be declared elected and shall assume office immediately.

ARTICLE VI.

Section 1. It shall be the duty of the Chairman to preside at all meetings of the Board and to perform such duties as may devolve upon his office. The Vice-Chairman shall perform the duties of the Chairman in case of his absence or inability to serve.

Sec. 2. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep a record of proceedings of all meetings of the Board and to perform any other duties which may be assigned to him.

Sec. 3. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to keep or cause to be kept an accurate account of all receipts and disbursements of the Board; to pay by cheque all properly contracted and approved bills of the Board; to deposit all funds in a bank approved by the Board; to see that the surplus, if there be any, is properly divided at the time of the annual meeting; and to make a full report at the annual meeting or at any other time that it may be called for by the Chairman or a majority of the Board.

ARTICLE VII.

A majority of the members of the Board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, but a smaller number may adjourn from time to time.

ARTICLE VIII.

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of all the members, provided that the proposed amendment is voted upon favorably at two consecutive meetings of the Board held at least a week apart.

ARTICLE IX.

This Constitution shall go into effect at the time of the annual election of the editorial and business staffs of the CAMPUS for the spring semester for 1911.

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I.

Section 1. The editorial work of the CAMPUS shall be in the hands of a staff, consisting of an editor-in-chief, a managing editor, an alumni editor, an indefinite number of associate editors, and such other editors or news agents as the Board may vote to create.

Sec. 2. The business department of the CAMPUS shall be in the hands of a business manager and an assistant business manager. It shall be the duty of the business manager to collect all subscriptions to the CAMPUS, and to have charge of the advertising dept.

Sec. 3. The editor-in-chief, the managing editor, the alumni editor, and the business manager, shall be nominated from the floor and elected by written ballot at the annual meeting of the Board.

ARTICLE II.

The CAMPUS shall be published weekly during the

college year, with such exceptions as the Board may deem it wise to make.

ARTICLE III.

Section 1. The fiscal year shall close at the time of the annual meeting of the Board.

Sec. 2. At that time, if a cash surplus over all liabilities exists, the amount of one hundred dollars (\$100,) or the fraction thereof equalling the surplus, shall remain in the treasury as a fund with which to carry on the CAMPUS, and the residue, if there be any, shall be apportioned among the members of the Board as follows: 5 per cent of the whole to the Treasurer; and of the remainder, 40 per cent to the business manager, 25 per cent to the editor-in-chief, 15 per cent to the managing editor, and 25 per cent to be divided equally among the senior associate editors.

ECONOMIC PRIZES

Four Prizes Offered to Students in the Economic Field

In order to arouse an interest in the study of topics relating to commerce and industry, and to stimulate those who have a college training to consider the problems of a business career, a committee composed of a number of college professors, of which Professor J. L. Laughlin, University of Chicago, is Chairman, is offering in 1912, four prizes for the best studies in the economic field. The four prizes are of \$1,000, \$500, \$300 and \$200. The latter two prizes are for college undergraduates only, although they may be awarded the other two, while the first two are open to anyone without any restrictions or age limit.

A list of available subjects is given but a competitor can select one of his own if approved by the committee. All studies should be thorough, expressed in good English, and although not limited to length should not be needlessly expanded. The papers, accompanied by a sealed envelope containing the name and address of the writer must be sent on or before June, 1, 1912, to J. L. Laughlin, Esq., University of Chicago.

Further particulars and the list of subjects may be found on the University bulletin-board.

LAW SCHOOL NOTES

The Assembly of the Law school appointed a committee consisting of E. H. Bowen, chairman, T. E. Sullivan, R. V. Brown, F. L. Fox and W. E. Stewart to draw up a constitution to present

to the Assembly at its next meeting. Arrangements are now being made for a series of competitive debates to be held during the winter. While a good part of the subjects will be of a legal nature, other matters will be discussed. Although but a few of the first year men have yet joined, it is expected that many will do so.

The first number of the Maine Law Review is now in the printers hands and will be issued Nov. 1. The Review will appear the first of every month during the college year. The paper is now in its fifth year, and its usual high standard will be maintained this year as has been in the past. The editors of the Review this year are, E. H. Bowen, editor in chief, C. B. Adams, assistant editor in chief, M. A. Barwise and H. W. Sawyer, associate editors, P. L. Aiken, managing editor and Frank Powers and Meyer Epstein, assistant managing editors.

The Bangor fire of April 30 entirely destroyed the College of Law which was located in the Exchange Block. The \$10,000 library and all the valuable equipment was consumed. All work in the college was necessarily suspended and the students were marked on their work for the term to that date.

To find a new suitable location was the great problem which confronted the University authorities. Finally an option was given the University on the Isaac Merrill estate at the corner of Union and Second Streets. The new college is conveniently located in relation to the Court House and business section of the city. The building provides ample accommodations for the present needs of the college. The lot is plenty large enough for any additions should they be needed.

The property was bought for \$33,750. Through the assurance of one of the leading citizens of the State, that he had made provision in his will for a gift of \$20,000, for the benefit of the College of Law, the trustees were able to obtain the property. The annual cost to the University, including interest and other charges, will be less than the annual rental formally paid for the old quarters.

The library which contained over 3,000 volumes valued at about \$10,000 was fortunately insured for 80% of its valuation. Through two of the leading law publishing houses of the country, making special fire prices, the college was able to replace many of the most important volumes of the old library. Valuable gifts for the Law Library have been received from the Boston University Law School, the Harvard University Law School, and the John Marshall Law School of Chicago. General Thomas Hubbard of New

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York gave \$100.00 for the purchase of books. The subscriptions of Hon. Louis Southard and General Charles Hamlin have been replaced but others given by Chief Justice Emery and General Hamlin can probably never be replaced.

Twelve of the law students risked their lives in endeavoring to save some of the volumes of the old library in the Exchange Block. These men were, Frederick Adams, Cherryfield; Andrew Beck, Deer Isle; Exerett Bowen, Bangor; William Dwyer, Biddeford; Brad Harvey, Haverhill, Mass.; Leigh Harvey, Bangor; William Owens, Lynn, Mass.; Howard Rand, Haverhill, Mass.; Thomas Sullivan, Lubec; John Terzag, Mamouret-ul-Aziz, Armenia, and Harry Westgate, Taunton, Mass. Mr. Ruel Preble and Mr. Guy Lawrence were of great assistance. A few sets of reports were placed in the safe on the second floor, but most of them were destroyed when the building was dynamited.

To say that these men deserve grateful recognition is putting it mildly for many of them neglected their own property to save that of the University. Many of the men stayed within the burning structure until they were forced to jump from the second story windows. Mr. Terzag was injured, and Mr. Westgate was overcome by smoke, but was taken out by his comrades.

Five of the books placed in the vault on the second floor were not consumed. These were given by Dean Walz, one each to General Charles Hamlin and Hon. L. C. Southard, Mr. J. K. Terzag and H. B. Westgate of the school, and one retained by Dean Walz to be placed in the new Law Library, Me. Reports Vol. 28.

A committee, known as the Committee of Eleven, has been appointed by Dean Walz to look after the welfare of the new building and its grounds. The faculty have chosen nine men, who showed special loyalty to the Law School at the time of the Bangor Fire in trying to save the books at the library. The other two men are to be appointed by the student body. Every student should cooperate with the committee in keeping this splendid building in its excellent state of repair.

The ball game between the Juniors and Freshmen was won by the Freshmen in a five inning game, Saturday, Oct. 14, by the score of 3-2.
