CHAMPIONSHIP PROSPECTS

Maine Looks Best on Paper— Cobb Best Quarter-Back in State.

Getting down to the bedrock of their schedules, the four Maine colleges begin the battle for the State title next Saturday. Bates and Maine meet at Orono, and Bowdoin and Colby clash at Waterville. The State elevens have locked horns with teams of varying strength in the ante-championship contests, and the results of these games form a badly jumbled potpourri from which to draw any basic dope. Since the teams have played so many out-of-the-state colleges with such a diversity of results, any Maine man who attempts to plot out the fortunes of the approaching series with any degree of certainty finds himself in the same predicament as the Giant fan trying to pick the winner of the World's Series. Maine for example easily fell before Harvard, 34 to 0, then held Yale to a scoreless tie and finally went down before Tufts, 19 to 6. Again, Colby, branded a 10 to 0 score on the hide of the Brunonian bear and later met a wholesale slaughter from Dartmouth, 53 to 0. These two are the most striking instances of fluctuating scores that one sees as he scans the results of the season to date. From this viewpoint, Bowdoin has played the most consistent game of the four teams, though her fortunes took a sharp veer toward the better after the Wesleyan game. Bates kept down Harvard's tally to two touchdowns after, on the previous Saturday, having nailed one touchdown to Tufts two.

Although the comparative scores this season are of small value, they are given here for what they are worth. Bates has scored 14 points to her opponents 35, Bowdoin 37 to her enemies 16, Maine has 56 to the others 52, while Colby has run up 84 points to her rivals 53. The results by games follow:

From analysis and comparison of these scores, it appears that Maine will start off the championship series with the strongest line, the Tufts game notwithstanding. Bates seems to have the second strongest line, with Bowdoin and Colby finishing in that order. Classifying the quarterbacks is difficult under the present circumstances. Our own Cobb though, has perhaps showed the best form. In the backfield Colby and Maine seem to be about equal, with Colby showing to the best advantage so far. Bowdoin is third and Bates last in this department.

The State colleges have fought for the Championship each year since 1893. Bowdoin has won six and tied three, Maine has won six, Bates has won four and tied two, and Colby has won one and tied one. The State Champions since 1893 follow:

1893, 1894, 1895, 1896—Bowdoin; 1897, 1898, 1899—Bates; 1900—Bates and Bowdoin; 1901, 1902, 1903—Maine; 1904—Bowdoin; 1905—Maine; 1906—Bates; 1907—Bowdoin; 1908—Bowdoin and Colby; 1909—Colby; 1910—Bates and Bowdoin; 1911, 1912—Maine.

THE MAINE MASQUE

FIRST CHAMPIONSHIP GAME SATURDAY

Maine vs. Bates on Alumni Field

The first State Championship game of the season will take place Saturday, October 25, on Alumni Field. Maine will meet the strong Bates team and a battle royal is expected. The Bates team is composed of practically all last years men. The hole made in their line is being filled in a good manner by Cobb, the former Dean Academy star.

Bates, this year has a line fully as good as last year's and it is considered by many to be on a par with the Maine line. For several years Bates has been a jinx to the Maine team and have won victories when all football "dope" pointed to a decisive defeat. However this year's teams seem to be on a more even standing and something surprising is due to take place.

Bates, as well as Maine, has played rather inconsistent football this year. Bates held Tufts to 13-7, and throughout most of the game the Tufts team was outplayed. Shortly after this the best Bates could do against Westbrook Seminary, a "prep" school team was 21-6.

The Bates team will leave Lewiston Saturday morning, on a special train, accompanied by the whole student body and many of the Faculty. The team will put up at the Penobscot Exchange in Bangor, and immediately after dinner they will leave for Orono. Captain Nevers of the Bates Track Team has been elected cheer leader, and this live wire is sure to obtain some noise from the Bates rooters.

The Maine team has been practicing hard behind closed gates all week and Coach Reilly has many surprises which he will spring on Saturday.

All the players are rounding into condition and the cripples are rapidly disappearing from the squad. A large section of the bleachers have been reserved for the Bates followers.

CONVERSATION CLUB

The Conversation Club is an organization which is limited to about twenty of the oldest members of the Faculty.

This Club was organized between 15 and 16 years ago during the administration of President Harris.

GENERAL LECTURE

Prof. Robinson

Prof. Robinson gave the fifth of the course of general lectures on Wednesday afternoon, at the lecture room of the library. His subject was the evolution of printing houses that made the revival of learning possible. The substance of his interesting talk was as follows:

After the invention of printing which occurred 1475, the history of learning takes an entirely different course. Prior to 1475 the northern section of Europe went to the South after the treasures of literature of the Greek and Latin scholars. The invention of printing made it possible for the people in the north to build up their own literature in their own language. In England especially the printing machine was a very important factor in building up a foundation for English literature. Chaucer was the first man to establish a printing house in England. The books published were more of the popular literature such as adventures in hunting, fighting, etc. The greater number of these books were published in English and French. Among the first English books published was Chaucer's "Canterbury Tales."

In the south the value of the printing machine to literature was second measure. The cherished manuscripts which had been written by such scholars as Desiderius and the early Greek and Latin writers were published and sold throughout the whole of Europe. The Bible was the first book published, and its common distribution did much for religion. The books in this section were published almost entirely in Latin. None in the history of mankind has any language been so extensively used as was the Latin language at this time.

The two leading printing houses in the continent were those of Aldine and of Froben. Aldine's publishing house was located at Venice, which was an ideal situation because of its isolation. Over 5,000 books were published by Aldine during the years 1469-1500. Froben's printing house was in the republic of Switzerland. It was much more important to the house of Aldine. The books published by Froben were of the best quality literature. They were published either in Latin or Greek.

Desiderius was perhaps the greatest scholar of his period and a great factor in the printing industry. He was born in Rotterdam in 1467 and died in 1526. He studied at the University of Paris and later spent two years at Oxford. He was an intimate friend of Froben and was a great help to him in his work.

FORESTRY NURSERY

The new forestry nursery provided for by a special appropriation in the Legislature last winter has been located and the ground is being put in condition for seeding next spring. Two and a half acres of the field in the rear of the Kappa Sigma house have been fenced, with drive gates and two foot path gates. This was sown in buckwheat this summer and plowed in this fall for soil treatment. Next spring it will be plowed, harrowed, the soil worked up very fine, and made into plots. These will be sowed mostly with white pine seed, and some transplants from the old nursery will be grouped in. Most of the seeding and transplanting will be done by students in the Forestry department, under the direction of Prof. Reissner. Most of the young trees or seedlings will be sold at cost to residents of the state of Maine, while the rest will be used by the forestry students for experimental work.

It is hoped eventually to have an increased number of species, probably white pine, red pine, red spruce, black spruce, white spruce, a few hardwoods, and some others not native to Maine. The nursery will be of great benefit to the Forestry department, giving the students a greater opportunity for practical work than ever before.

WILLIAM EMERY PARKER

On the twenty-first day of October, in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and thirteen, William Emery Parker of the class of nineteen twelve of the University of Maine met his death at Worcester, Mass. His untimely end was brought about by contract with a live wire while working in a sub station.

He entered the University from Washington Academy in the fall of nineteen hundred and eight and was best known by members of the faculty and the student as Bill Parker.

From the first of his freshman year until graduation his deep feeling for old Maine and her ideals was evident to all. For four years he fought on the football field for his Alma Mater with a spirit that was never conquered. The sad news of his death comes as a great shock to those who knew him and to the University he loved and served so well.

He was a member of the Kappa Sigma Fraternity, of the Sophomore Owl Society, and held many college honors. For four years he lived among us, ever active, cheerful, kind hearted, and the friend of every Maine man. He died at the age of twenty-seven, sincerely mourned by his many friends and associates.

The new catalog will read: "The Sophomore Declamation Prize of fifteen dollars is awarded for excellence in elocution to that member of the sophomore class who receives first rank in the sophomore contest. Eight contestants are chosen as follows: (1) from sophomores in the College of Arts and Sciences, who have held the highest standing in freshman public speaking; (and) (2) from sophomores who have excelled in freshman debate, either in class or university teams or in the freshman debating club. Regard is also given to the student's standing in composition and in general scholarship.

By admitting debaters to the sophomore speaking, it may still be considered a representative class contest. The Debating club gives every freshman an opportunity to show what he can do, and to qualify for the sophomore contest if he has the ability.

It is also understood that women majoring in household economics, who take Eh 1 their freshman year, shall be eligible to the sophomore speaking. It is only by a technicality that these students are registered within the college of agriculture. They take the same English that is taken by the students in the college of arts and sciences.

In order to have one standard by which to judge the contestants, all selections will be of an oratorical nature. Narrative and dramatic selections will be excluded except as they meet the general requirement of the contest. Selections may be from six to eight minutes in length. The contestants will report as follows:

Oct. 31. On or before this date, selections should be approved by the instructor of public speaking.

Nov. 3. Contestants should be ready for rehearsals.

Dec. 12. Sophomore Prize Speaking.

LECTURE BY DR. PEARL

On Wednesday evening the Agricultural Club enjoyed an exceedingly interesting lecture on Inbreeding, given by Dr. Pearl of the Experiment Station.

The speaker emphasized the importance of the practice of inbreeding in procuring the most desirable results in building up a satisfactory type of registered animal. Until very recently line breeding was practiced exclusively but now the breeders of the country seem to be gradually turning to inbreeding. Dr. Pearl stated that he is at the present time engaged in the development of the Jersey breed of cattle by this method and that he will announce his results at a future date.

Shortly after the speech the club held a business meeting to decide upon the arrangements for sending fruit packing and fruit judging teams to the New England Fruit Fair.

INTERCOLLEGIATE PEACE CONTEST

It has been definitely arranged that the state contest this year shall be held under the auspices of the University of Maine. Word to this effect has just been received from Mr. George E. Fogg, secretary of the Maine Peace Society. In view of this opportunity for the university to hold the contest on its own grounds, all local contestants for the peace prize and all student speakers should look ahead to making the event as significant as possible. It is not definitely settled yet whether Colby and Bowdoin will enter the contest this year. Even if it becomes another contest between Bates and Maine, it will be nevertheless interesting. The prizes are \$100.00 and \$75.00, and the winner of the state prize is expected to take part in a later contest including the winning speakers from a group of states. The preliminary contest to be held at the University for speakers from this institution only, will be held before March 15. From these trials is chosen the speaker who will represent the university in the state contest. The regular state contest occurs in April. If students who have not already signified their intention to enter the local contest, wish to prepare, they should notify the instructor of public speaking.

For students who can write but are not qualified to speak, there are prizes of \$200.00 and \$100.00 for the best essays on the subject of peace. This contest closes March 15, 1913.

Princeton has installed a new system of ventilation in the locker rooms of its gymnasium.

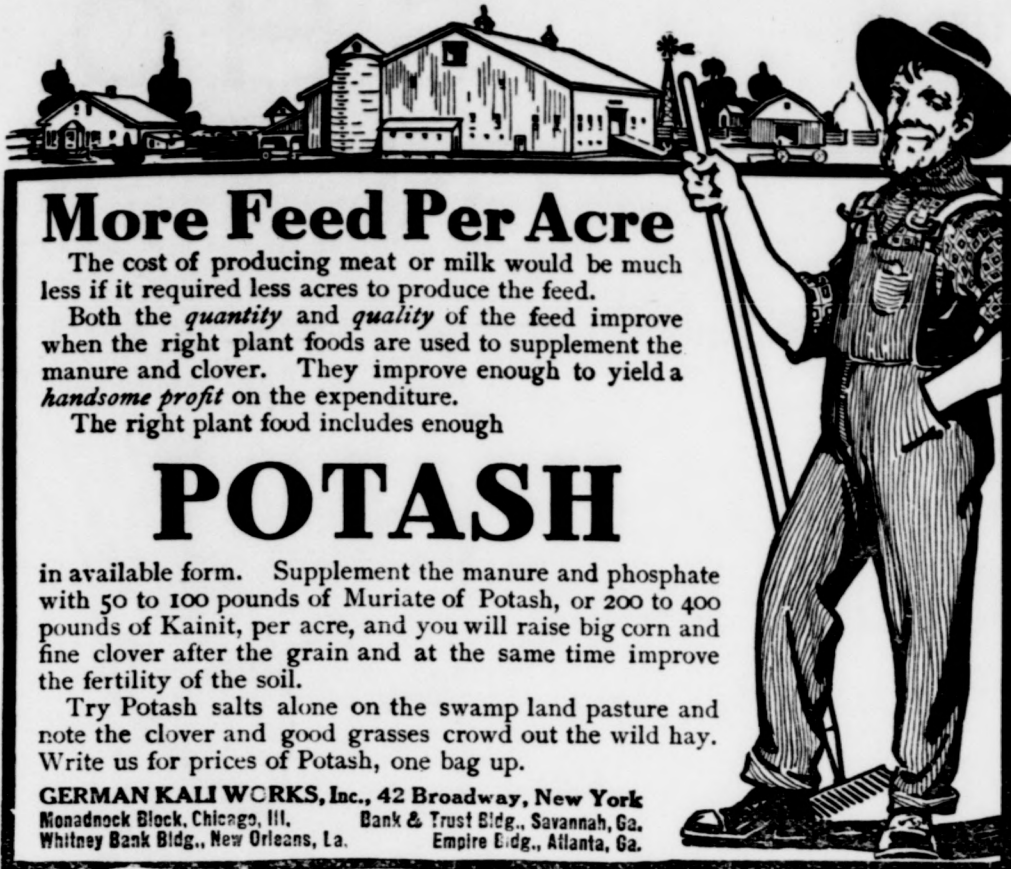
Norwich University has cancelled all the games on its schedule because of the death of Belyea, the halfback, who died of injuries received in the Holy Cross game, Sept. 24.

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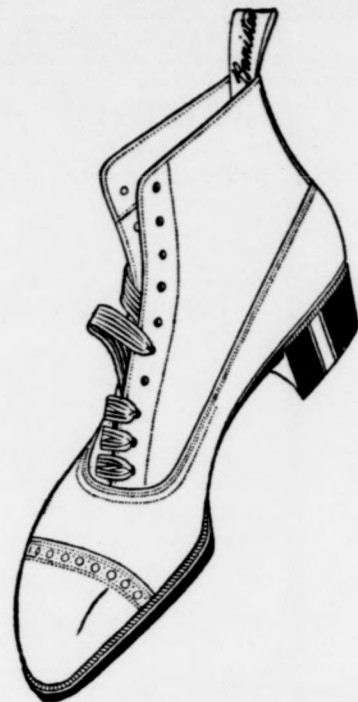
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
