

Ballot on Student Council Wednesday

President Little Consents to Secret Ballot. Urges Everyone to Carefully Consider the Merits of the Council

The constitution of the proposed student government will be placed before the student body for ratification on Wednesday, November 1. A standing vote was taken on the new council in chapel this week. But many considered this method of ratification to be unsatisfactory. Consequently, President Little announced in chapel Thursday that a secret ballot would be held.

In his chapel address Dr. Little urged everyone to give the matter fair consideration so as to be able to vote intelligently. He showed that the matter was near to his heart but refused to railroad anything by the student body.

The proposed constitution is given in full here below.

I. General Statement.

There shall be a Student Government the purpose of which shall be to cooperate with the University authorities in establishing and maintaining proper standards of individual and group efforts and responsibilities in all student activities.

There shall be two houses of Government.

Best Rally of Year Before Bates Game

The best rally for three years was held last Friday night, Oct. 20 in the chapel. To start things right a procession led by the President of the Athletic Association, Chub Thomas, and the forty piece University Band made a tour of the campus and rounded up the delinquents in the fraternity houses and dorms. When the crowd again filed into the chapel the seats were all filled.

Prexy Little lead off for speakers. He said that he had heard of the jinx which followed all Bates games but that he was from Missouri. "Maine," he said, "is bigger and better than the other colleges of the state and now is the time for us to show them that we are. We must and can make a clean sweep in football, cross country, track and base ball. Let's start tomorrow and show them that as Bates puts the 'bates' in debates, Maine can put the 'maine' in ptomaine."

Coach Brice followed saying that if we get the jump on Bates Saturday, and beat her, we will beat Colby and Bowdoin. "The keynote for the game tomorrow," he said, "is We've got to win". Assistant Coach, Cuddy Murphey Captain Lunge, and Manager Hoyt gave out the dope on the team as seen from their respective positions, and urged the further support of the student body.

Coach Flack, the popular track coach, has recently been down to Lewiston looking over the Bates course and the Bates team. He said that Bates is a jinx in cross country just as she is in football, but this year if Bates wins the state meet they will have the best cross country team ever had or will ever have.

Capt. MacKeeman of the cross country team, who was down to Lewiston last week with Coach Flack said that Bates had about ten men running with the regulars and five or six more with the second squad. "But," he added, "even though but few of them look like runners, Bates has a reputation of turning out good racers. "For the last week the Maine team has been running over frozen ground and through snow storms, but there have been no quitters or laggards."

Prexy Little arose for the final word. He said that Saturday we were going to have the opportunity of seeing the best cross country squad in the state run in the inter-class race and that it was just as important to give a cheer for the runners as for the football men. Maine Spirit Conquers in a Clean Hard Fought Game. Bates Jinx Buried by a Score of 19-6

Dartmouth Professor Is Speaker in Chapel

At the chapel exercises on Thursday, October 19th, the students of the University had the opportunity of hearing Professor Arthur D. Wright of the Department of Education of Dartmouth College.

"I think perhaps the thing college people are most interested in today is what they term the 'selective process of admission'."

Dartmouth has room for two thousand men, and no accommodations except those the college provides. A few years ago the wave of students wanting to go to college began to grow very rapidly. More wanted to come than could possibly get in without more resources and extra instructors. Some way had to be worked out for selecting these young men. For several years those who applied first were accepted. That was not fair. Anybody could get in who had the foresight to register several years in advance, while more worthy students were left out.

It was finally decided that the selective process was the only way out of the difficulty. The first consideration in selecting was scholarship, but a scholar lacking in personality was not wanted. An applicant was also judged by his indications of leadership. His preparatory school record was looked into to see if he had filled any class offices, or was active in athletics or on the school paper. He should have initiative and the ability to lead men.

Character is also an essential. At least two statements concerning an applicant's character were filed—one by the principal of the preparatory school, and the other by some Dartmouth graduate or undergraduate. This was a sure way of "measuring men."

Dartmouth received between fifteen hundred and two thousand applications for admission this fall, but by the selective process only five hundred were accepted. The class of 1926 should be a remarkable one. Anyway the men admitted to that group are those who are likely to stick.

It is stated that in a mid-western university, out of fifteen hundred freshmen admitted, five hundred flunked out at mid-years. The college had to provide equipment for fifteen hundred, when five

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Campus Board Revises System of Reporting

A new plan is being tried out for the dividing up of the work of the Campus Board. There are to be six different departments: Alumni, Specials, Exchange, Athletics, Society, and Chapel. An editor is in charge of each department and is responsible for the assignments given out to the reporters under that particular department. Each of these editors must report their assignments to the news editor so that they may be put on the list to be posted each week. Each reporter, when he passes in his article, should check off his assignment on the list posted at the Campus office so that he may get credit for his article and also that the news editor may be able to check up on those who have covered their assignment.

Some inconvenience has been experienced in the past by not receiving the articles within the required time. It is expected that this plan will help to get the articles in on time, will greatly assist the editors in arranging their material.

Showing the old fight during every minute of a long, gruelling game, the University of Maine machine trounced Bates 19 to 6, and proved herself superior in every phase of the contest. Every Maine man gave all that he had for the Blue, and the college may well be proud of them all.

Every sign points to a Maine state championship this year. Of course the dopest works at a disadvantage when it comes to predicting in the way of football victories, because the unexpected often happens, and said dopest becomes a very unpopular man. However, here is the situation. Bates tied Colby after outplaying her. Colby surprised everyone by tying the much heralded Bowdoin eleven, and Maine's opponents find themselves in a triple deadlock. 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"Y" Worker Speaks in Behalf of Student Fund

Miss Ferri Hess who spoke to the student body in Coburn Hall last Thursday evening on "The Conditions Among the Students of Europe," is speaking at the colleges of New England in the interest of the Student Friendship Fund. She has spent two years and a half in Czechoslovakia, where her work was connected with the Relief Work, among the students of the University of Prague.

Miss Hess emphasized particularly the circumstances of Persia and Russia and she said that the physical conditions in Turkey were very critical. Among the things which she related was that the people were lucky if they had one meal a day. A dish of soup, one bun, a piece of butter and once in a while some cocoa for stimulation comprised their daily menu.

The people worked from four o'clock in the morning until four in the afternoon. The populace were so economical that a dollar and a half would buy a month's supply of food for one person. This enthusiastic "Y" worker desired for the people to the United States to save some of their pennies for Christian work in Europe.

Mary Friend was the pianist and the students sang a few hymns. A selection was given by the "Y" chorus. This was followed by a short discussion of eight minutes on Miss Hess' subject. The meeting was called to a close by the Mespah Benediction.

Dr. Baker Speaks in Chapel on Religion

On Wednesday, October 18th, Dr. George R. Baker, Associate Secretary of the Educational Board of the Northern Baptist Convention, gave an interesting talk in chapel.

"Everybody needs religion to live by. In our fathers' time the preachers emphasized the necessity of religion to die on. Of course whether we need it or not depends on how we propose to live."

The English miner does not need to study the English classics. He does not need to enlarge his vocabulary; three hundred words are enough for him and his work. If he wants to enlarge his whole life, then he will need to study English.

If any man will get the idea that he is the son of God, and tries to think God's thoughts over, and enter into the secret of the Most High, and think as broadly as God thinks, and go as far as finite can follow after the infinite, man needs religion. If any man will get under the loads and burdens of life, that man will need plenty of religion.

I think every man has a sprint in him. He must have to amount to anything. He can start a race magnificently, but the sprint comes later in the course. Any man who runs the two-mile, or who plays the whole game will accomplish nothing if he just starts well. He must finish well. It is not how much speed a runner has; it is how much bottom.

One day a fellow came to me who said he was yellow. He ran the two-mile and every time he had run a quarter of the distance, he remembered how tired he was, and that he had three times as far to run and must have a sprint left at the last. He lived in terror that some time he would quit, although so far he always had run it through, when he started. I told him that anybody who does anything as hard as the two-mile, wants to quit when they get a quarter of the way through.

It is at this point that God classes men. Those who quit are quitters. Those who overcome and achieve, receive a crown of light. If we persevere we can come through with the consciousness that we have dared face life, and we can handle it.

In a squad of trackmen was a man who came in just in back of the last point winner. He never won a point, but he always finished fresh as a daisy. Just before a big meet the coach said to him, "I believe you are going to score this time. You run in beautiful form. You come in fresh. Now run!" This fellow ran. There was a record made by that man under the spur. It would have been more to his credit if he had spurred himself.

And He shall divide the sheep from the goats. We would say, "And he shall divide those who dare from those who quit."

In a boat race a man lost by half a length. The winner collapsed in the boat, and the loser picked him up unconscious and carried him to the boat house. If you lose, do not lose with any strength left.

If you want to live a full life, you will need religion. You will need the consciousness of the presence of God.

My small boy wanted just one thing for Christmas. That was an electric train. I bought him one with four batteries to make it go. They lasted until nine o'clock. I found a friendly storekeeper and bought four more batteries. These did not run down until after dinner. Then I bought what I should have had in the first place—a little transformer. I plugged it into the lights, and that boy's train was connected up with a throbbing dynamic in the center of the town.

Just so we should link up our life with God Almighty. It takes something more than human personality to bring us thru. We all need religion if we are to really live and be strong and get under the burdens of life.

Mr. Walpole Interests Audience With Lecture

The English lecturer, Mr. Hugh Walpole, deeply interested a fairly large audience by his brilliant lecture, "Books and Friendship" on the evening of October 10th.

It is difficult to imagine a more fascinating treatment of the subject than that given by Mr. Walpole. With a gracefully worded apology for the personalities which of necessity must dominate his discussion, he opened the lecture by vivid reminiscence. When Mr. Walpole was a very small boy, he fell wholeheartedly in love with the novels of Scott, whom he holds today in the greatest veneration as a supreme literary craftsman. After his initial introduction to the world of books, Mr. Walpole's life, as he expressed it, seemed to be influenced to an almost uncanny degree by them. He spoke of the consecutive phases of his growing literary appreciation, describing with humor and an amusingly satirical insight, that phase which he designated as the Meridith phase. At this point, Mr. Walpole emphasized the essential stupidity in making favorites of certain books merely because it is considered a mark of superior intellectuality to enjoy them. This is really, he said, a form of snobbishness, and a very bad habit to encourage.

Mr. Walpole mentioned three volumes which appeared at successive crises in his life: first, "Marius, the Epicurean," by Walter Pater; second, "The Awakening Age," by Henry James; third, "A Personal Record," by Joseph Conrad. The personality of the two latter authors were cleverly sketched, as they have both been his personal friends. The audience seemed to be fascinated by Mr. Walpole's thoughtful sentences, his satirical comment and his manner of speech. The campus was quite fortunate in having the opportunity to hear Mr. Walpole, and it is to be remembered that the opportunity came through the generosity of our president, Dr. Little.

ment, a smaller or "Senate," and a larger or "House."

These houses will meet at certain stated intervals and under special circumstances, at other times. They will, within their own membership, have two general ways of dealing with problems; (1) a preliminary or committee organization to deal with matters in their formative stages, (2) full sessions for the purpose of discussing and voting on recommendations of the committees.

Any matter to become a regulation must be passed by both houses and be approved by the Administrative Committee of the University, consisting of the President and the Deans.

While at first the functions of such a student government will appear ill-defined and uncertain, it seems sure that they will become orderly and increasingly important.

No organization can hope to be perfect at the start and to spring into a ready-made degree of efficiency and importance.

A beginning is always necessary and in order that the matter may be well known to all undergraduates the initial outline constitution appearing below will be posted until 6 p. m. October 24th. The Senior Skulls and Dormitory Council will receive from and discuss with any undergraduate, suggested modifications and, if approved by the President, such modifications will be made.

The modified form will be voted upon for ratification by all male undergraduates at chapel on October 25th and 26th. If ratified, election of members and the establishment of the two houses will be put through at once.

II. Rules applicable to both Houses.

1. Election of Members.

(a) All male undergraduates in the four regular classes are eligible to vote or to run for office subject to the limitations herein specified.

(b) The time and place of elections as well as the detailed procedure will be announced for this year and will be fixed as a regulation by the Student Government once it is established.

(c) In the members elected from any one locality or district, not more than twenty-five percent shall belong to the freshman class. This is done to assure a working majority of more experienced upper-classmen in the active Government.

2. Committees.

There shall be joint committees with a membership from both houses in a proportion of one from the Senate to one from the House, as follows:

These committees shall hold a joint meeting with similar faculty committees where such exist and shall make their recommendations on the basis of such meetings, to the houses for action.

A matter for action may then be brought before either house by any member. It is, without discussion, referred to the particular committee of that house to which it belongs. If favorably reported by that committee, it is given to the corresponding committee of the other house and if favorably reported by them goes to the joint committee for discussion with the faculty committee. If reported favorably unchanged, it goes direct to the House for vote. If passed there, it goes to the Senate. If passed there, it goes to the Administrative Board for their final action.

If changed in form or intent by the joint committee, it has to be reported back to the committees of the House and Senate for approval before being given to the House to vote upon.

III. The Undergraduate Senate.

1. The name of this organization shall be the undergraduate Senate.

2. Its membership shall be limited geographically as follows:

(a) The dormitories shall be represented by one senator for every thirty or major fraction (twenty or over in excess) thereof.

(b) The fraternities shall be represented by one senator from each house for each thirty or major fraction (twenty or over in excess) thereof.

(c) Those students living outside of fraternities or dormitories shall be represented by one senator for each thirty or major fraction (twenty or over in excess) thereof.

The Senate shall have a president, a vice-president, and three clerks.

The president shall preside at all meetings of the Senate.

He shall appoint all committees of his house and fill vacancies on the same.

The vice-president shall preside in the absence of the president.

He may also be empowered by the president to assume the duties of the president when the former is absent or otherwise incapacitated.

The clerks will share between them the work of recording and reporting meetings and the action taken thereat.

IV. The Undergraduate House of Representatives.

1. The name of this organization shall be the Undergraduate House of Representatives.

2. Its membership shall be limited geographically as follows:

(a) The dormitories shall be represented by one representative for every ten or major fraction (seven or over in excess) thereof.

(b) The fraternities shall be represented by one representative from each house for each ten or major fraction (seven or over in excess) thereof.

(c) Those students living outside of fraternities or dormitories shall be represented by one representative for each ten or major fraction (seven or over in excess) thereof.

The House of Representatives shall have a president, a vice-president, and three clerks.

The president shall preside at all meetings of the House of Representatives.

He shall appoint all committees of his house and fill vacancies on the same.

The vice-president shall preside in the absence of the president.

He may also be empowered by the president to assume the duties of the president when the former is absent or otherwise incapacitated.

The clerks will share between them the work of recording and reporting meetings and the action taken thereat.

which appear to be in somewhat the same class. Why not the other too, as well? If things turn out as rosy as they look, the old pennant will repose in Orono for a year at least.

The game in detail.

Bates won the toss and chose to kick. Peterson booted to the 6 yard line, and the ball was returned to the fifteen. Weiner started Maine's triumphant march to the goal line with a dash to the 40. Small made four on a line plunge, and Weiner, Merritt, and Thomas followed with good gains. Small tossed a forward to Elliott for 20 yards, placing the oval on Bates 30 yard mark. The Maine backs continued to make short but decisive gains, and in just four minutes from the kick-off, Small went thru the line for a touchdown. He missed the try for goal.

Small kicked to Fellows, who ran to his 20 yard line. Woodman plugged guard for four and Davis failed to gain. Davis kicked to the 30 and Merritt ran it back to the 40 yard stripe.

Weiner made a yard. Merritt tried a quarterback run off tackle and added two more. A forward, Small to Merritt, was incomplete. Small punted to Moulton on his 30 yard line and Fraser nailed him.

Fellows made three on an end run. Elliott tackling. Woodman followed with eight and first down around the other end. Bates twice failed to gain. A pretty forward pass, Moulton to Davis netted 25. Moulton and Woodman made six in three rushes. Dalton replaced Fellows at left half. Dalton made seven yards and Woodman two. Kempton came in for Moulton at quarter. Bates fumbled, but recovered two yards to the good, and the period ended; 4th down on Maine's ten yard line.

SECOND PERIOD

Kempton tossed one of the neatest forwards of the game to Rowe, who scored for Bates on the play, catching behind Maine's goal. Davis's eye was away off on his try for goal.

Maine 6, Bates 6.

Davis kicked off to Fraser, who ploughed like a tank from the 30 to the 40 stripe. Weiner garnered three and Merritt five on line plunges. Bates was penalized five yards, giving Maine first down. Thomas tore up the sod for five outside of tackle, and Gentile came in for Lord at center. Small ripped off 8 yards through tackle and Weiner made first down. Physical Instructor Wallace rushed on the field without permission, costing Maine fifteen precious yards. Thomas made six around end. At this point Price grabbed a Maine forward on the Bates 40 yard line.

Dalton gained 4 and Woodman 3. Rowe tried an end-around-end play and made 2. Woodman and Dalton made short gains. Newhall entered for Taylor. Davis failed to gain and Woodman lost the ball on an end run attempt.

Small shot a hair-raising forward to Thomas for a 45 yard gain. A few rushes by Small and Merritt brought the egg to the line where Weiner shoved it over for the second touchdown. Cutts replaced Merritt. Small's try for goal was blocked. H. Woodman replaced Scott at tackle.

Maine 12, Bates 6.

Small kicked off to Dalton who carried the ball to the 20 yard line. Woodman tore off 10 around right end, Dalton made a yard. Kenney entered the game for Dalton, and Jordan replaced Thomas. Bates lost 5 yards. Davis kicked to Cutts, who caught on his 45 yard mark. Small gained 5, and Tarbell came in for Bergman at right end for Bates. Small tried two forwards, but both grounded, so he punted to Kempton. Rowe failed to gain and Woodman made seven yards.

THIRD PERIOD

Fellows replaced Kenney. Davis kicked to Merritt, who was downed on his 20 yard stripe. Small gained 6 and Weiner 7 on plays off tackle. Maine received a 15 yard holding penalty. Small made 5 and then punted to the Bates 40 yard line.

Woodman, Fellows and Moulton advanced the oval for a Bates first down. Weiner intercepted a forward meant for Davis and planted the ball on Maine's 40 yard line. Merritt brought the crowd to its feet with a 25 yard dash inside of tackle. Small added two, and Maine received five on a penalty. Small and Weiner made first down in three attempts. Bergman entered for Tarbell. The Maine backs advanced steadily to the Bates 2 yard mark where they held for downs. Davis kicked offside at his thirty yard line. This time a score was not to be denied the Blue. Mer-

ritt, Weiner, and Small carried the leather to the 13 yard line, where the quarter ended.

FOURTH PERIOD

Merritt gained three and Small five. "Speed" added three more, and Weiner always there with the punch, scored through center Small's try for goal was successful.

Maine 19, Bates 6.

Small kicked to Rowe, who was stopped on his 34 yard line. Woodman and Kempton made short gains. Kempton tried a forward and was jumped on violently for a 7 yard loss. Woodman punted and Merritt got back to the 40 yard line. Monroe replaced Gentile and Folsom went in for Fellows. Small tried twice for three yards. Merritt made two and Small kicked. Bates blocked it, however, and received the ball in midfield. Bates was held for downs.

Weiner gained four, Small three, and Weiner six. Newhall took Taylor's place. Maine took an offside penalty and Small punted to the opposite 20 yard line. Bates was forced to punt after a short gain, Cutts catching. Small and Weiner made first down. Cutts gained ten and Small seven more. Weiner made three and a penalty brought five more. The chance of another score was spoiled by two 15 yard penalties; one for roughness and one for sideline coaching. Small reeled off eight, and a long pass to New-

hall gave thirty. The ball was on the 20 yard line. Dalton stopped another of the same kind and the game ended.

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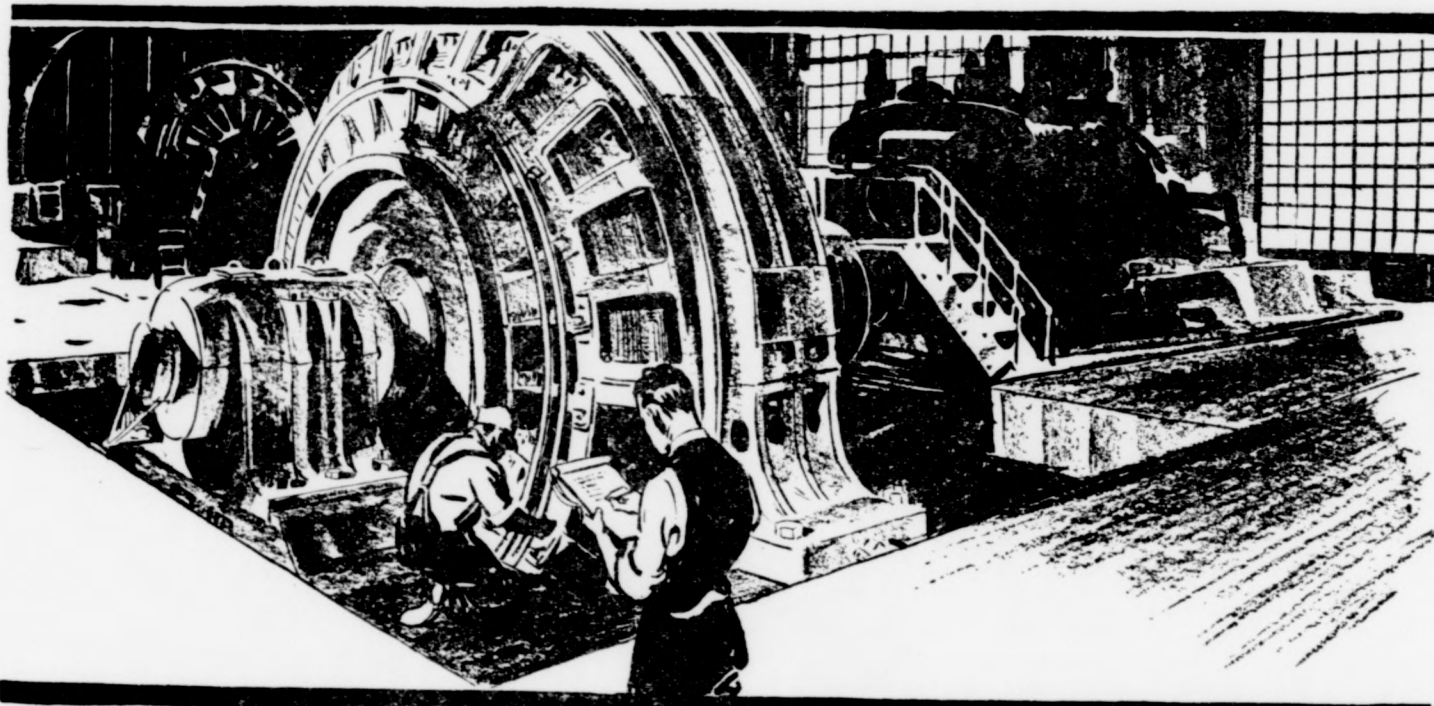
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
