Maine and Bates Play With a Score of 7-7

Game Witnessed by Large Crowd. Maine Warriors Baffle Opponents During First Half of The Game.

Reception to Be Given Bowdoin Football Team

A reception and dance for the Bowdoin football team will be given in the gymnasium on the evening of November 5 under the auspices of the intramural association. Music is to be furnished by the Six Syncopaters.

Celebrations have been usually held in Bangor but the greater majority of the student body seem to prefer a celebration on the Campus. Old alumni will be back for the game and many will remain over the week-end which will give every student a chance to show them of his loyalty and support to the University.

The idea of the reception is to be a get-together of Maine men and women, both of whom are earnestly urged to be present. Practically all the larger colleges and universities in the country follow this idea of having a reception and dance after their important game of the year and Maine hopes to make it an annual event and one to be looked forward to by the student body.

The committee in charge is composed of George Webb, Lloyd Hay and Howard Flack, Coach of Cross country and Track, who with the hearty support of the university and athletic officials are working hard to make this project a success.

Maine opened up the State series Saturday on Garcelon Field with a 7 to 7 score with Bates in a thrilling game. The game was witnessed by no less than 2500 persons, one of the largest crowds ever seen on the Bates gridiron. Except for a slight breeze, weather conditions were excellent for the fray.

In the first half Small, Cohen, and Blair completely baffled the home team by their long gains through the Bates line. Maine scored in the second period by marching down the field from Bates 28 yard line. Two passes thrown by Small to Cohen netted large gains. Small on a shift play crossed the line for a touchdown, and kicked the goal. Just before the end of the first half, Small made a 15 yard gain which was followed by a 15 yard pass from Small to Cohen.

Bates scored in the last part of the fourth period when they began a determined fight for a touchdown. Moulton was the outstanding light during the last period as he carried the ball two out of every three rushes. On a pass from Dagnino to Davis, Bates scored, Guiney kicking the goal.

Maine's line held like a stone wall when Bates was in striking distance. Bates' aerial attack was broken up many times by McKechnie and Cohen. Capt. Young did excellent work thruout the game.

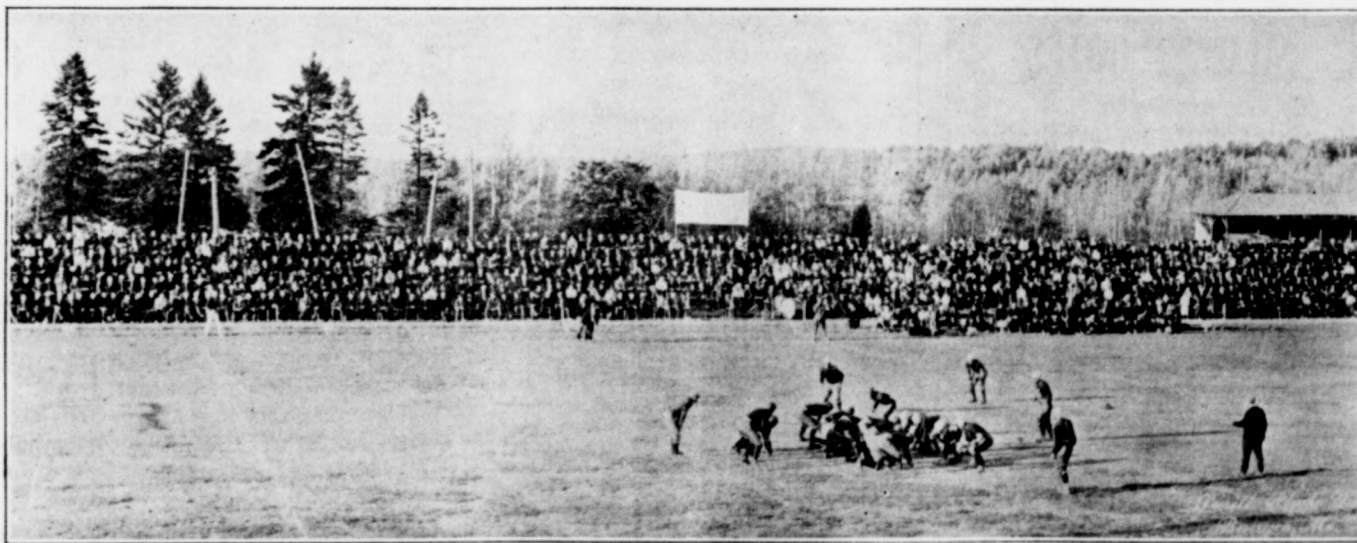

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Maine Radio Club Holds An Election of Officers

Following two weeks of campaigning for active radio men on the campus, a meeting was held in Coburn Hall following the rally Thursday night, October 20, for the purpose of forming a local radio club. All the prominent state amateur and commercial operators registered at the University were present, and agreed that the association should be called the University of Maine Radio Club. The elected officers for the school year are: D. F. Alexander '23, President; R. D. Huston '24, Vice-president; F. E. Handy '24, secretary.

Plans for the operation of the University station were laid, and operator's watches agreed upon. It is planned to operate four nights each week from 8:30 to 11 P. M., commencing October 30, the weather reports and commercial and navy press to be posted on a bulletin board in Lord Hall. Visiting hours are to be from 8:30 to 9:30, and all those who care to inspect the apparatus or receive any explanations regarding the operation of the station should take advantage of the opportunity. The only restriction upon the visitors is that quiet be observed. Later, when the transmitting set has been installed, it is probable that the station will be in operation every night in the University interests, and visiting hours will be but one or two nights each week. Until that time, the purpose of operation will be to install and experiment with various receiving apparatus, that the members of the club may be thoroly familiar with this part of the science.

The Lewiston Journal Speaks of Maine Parade

Lewiston was duly impressed by the influx of University of Maine students the day of the game with Bates. This was what the Lewiston Journal of that day said of it:

The University of Maine supporters 300 or 400 strong, paraded up Lisbon street at noon today.

First came the U. of M. band, in khaki—the only college band in the State and one of the very few in New England. And behind, four and five and even six abreast, marched the University of Maine rooters. The great blue banner of the University had a conspicuous position.

They were very quiet, at least for them, those hundreds of marching students. Their cheers, mingling with the music of the band, echoed up the long thoroughfare and brought hundreds to doors and windows; but they didn't do the fantastic serpentine so familiar on the streets of Bangor. The long column swept by rapidly on its way to the DeWitt, which headquarters for the team and at which many of the students took dinner.

And, when the column finally broke, streets and restaurants swarmed with students. They haven't been so animated, so filled with color, since the Maine state fair.

Men Students Respond to M. C. A. Bible Study

The men are showing great interest in the classes in Bible Study which the M. C. A. is conducting here on the Campus. The idea was started by a student in one of the dormitories, who one day suggested that they should start a small class in Bible study. That same night there were 20 men signed for it, and they were divided into three small groups for more effective work. These classes met the following week to begin their study of "how men should live."

Since then Mr. Clark, under whose leadership these classes are being conducted, has gone into eight fraternity houses at their invitation to explain to them the work of the classes. All of these fraternities, with the exception of two who have not had time, have organized classes within the fraternity.

A great part of the interest manifested is due to the splendid help and advice of Professor Pollard, Professor Toelle and of Mr. Gannett, who are conducting the meetings. The largest number signing in on class is 31 but that last will not hold its first meeting until next week. The average attendance in the groups is twelve.

Mr. Clark has talked to the men about three promises he has made which are the following: (1) These classes must be voluntary, and the men are not allowed to sign up for classes until after he has gone, when they can freely discuss the subject; (2) He insists that the lessons shall not be theological, but that practical religion and the benefits of every day life be discussed; (3) The classes shall be purely discusional, each fellow shall think for himself and offer his ideas in exchange for those of others.

The meetings are held once a week and usually last 40 minutes. There will be no limit to the number of groups that may be formed, as long as there are competent men to conduct the meetings. Mr. Clark will be glad to go into any of the fraternity houses, even if there are only a few boys there interested, and explain to them fully about the work. The small text book used is "Jesus and His Cause," by A. Bruce Curry, Jr.

Civil Engineers Hold First Meeting of Year

On Tuesday evening, October 18, a meeting of the members of the American Society of Civil Engineers was held at 17 Wingate Hall. The business of the meeting was the election of officers for the coming year. The officers were as follows: President, IVAN RUSK, A X A Vice-President, WHITE; Secretary and Correspondent Secretary, GOULD A Δ; Treasurer, McNALLY Θ X; and an Executive Committee consisting of the following members, for the Faculty, Professor LYON and Professor LEAVITT; for the Seniors, RUSK and PATTERSON; for the Juniors, DOTEN, and NISSON. Formerly the secretary and correspondent secretary were separate but it was voted to combine these offices this year.

After the business was completed, refreshments were served and plans discussed for a more active season of the Club. About twenty-five members were present and it was urged that efforts be made to secure the support of the Civil Engineers to make their Club the best and strongest on the Campus.

Senior Electricals Make Inspection Trip Oct. 11

The senior members of the electrical engineering department, under the leadership of Professor Barrows, took an inspection trip to Orono Pulp and Paper mills Thursday, Oct. 11. The students were shown the process of paper making from the time the wood was ground into pulp, thru the acid treatment, until it was finally finished into commercial paper ready for shipment to all parts of the world. About fifteen students made the trip.

Military Fortifications To Be Built by Juniors

The class in Military V, consisting of Juniors, are starting a system of field fortification in the back field. Work on a Type B Fire Trench has already been started. The object of this is to obtain an entire field series of battle positions. This will be obtained by enlarging this first trench from year to year.

Captain Adams has been appointed Commandant of Cadets.

Make Preparations for Rifle Meet in Vernon

Coach Kidney of the Rifle Clubs is busily engaged with preparations for the annual Rifle Meet with the University at Vernon to be held on December 3. For the last two years Maine has won this meet. This year Coach Kidney faces a very different problem. Some of the best men graduated last year and new material will have to be whipped into shape as soon as possible if we are to keep up our record.

The University donated the use of a building for a rifle range and during the past two weeks the R. O. T. C. has been busy clearing it out and leveling up the floor. There is a good deal of work to be done yet however and it is requested that all those interested in the Meet turn out during their spare periods and help Coach Kidney in his preparations.

As the plans stand at present there are to be prom, standing, and landscape targets, on the two ranges. One range is to be constructed 50 feet long and the other 75 feet long.

Target practice for the three clubs formed. The Faculty Rifle Club, Men's Student Rifle Club and Girl's Student Rifle Club, will start next week. The Girls will practice only Tuesdays and Thursdays, as the Coach feels that he can only spare those two days a week for them.

There should be a good representation from the male student body turn out for this as the five men having the highest marks will be awarded their letters. The executive secretary receives his, also.

All male students interested should apply to Coach Kidney or Secretary Weston Stuart before Nov. 15. The girls roster is full at present. Any Acting-Secretary Ben C. Helmick before Nov. 15.

Coach Brice Is Giving Men a Hard Work-out

The Maine team is putting in one of the most strenuous weeks of hard work that it has had this season. Coach Brice was very much dissatisfied with Maine's showing Saturday in the second half after outplaying Bates in every department of the game for the first two periods. The weakness of the line was a source of great disappointment to both coaches, especially to Pat Hussey who has had this part of the team under his personal supervision.

Monday afternoon the gridders were put through not a regular Monday afternoon workout but through a schedule that taxed every man to the utmost. After tackling the dummy, bringing down punts, etc. the first team lined up against the first team subs and went out for blood. It was a real workout with several minor casualties on both sides. Gruhn was particularly rough. Cohen and McKechnie were slightly injured. Dwelley received a nasty blow on the head. The Maine men were smarting under their showing against the Garnet Saturday. Jordan was shifted to right tackle, Dwelley going to that on the subs.

Coach Brice stated that the policy now was a change in the line the remainder being given a stiff workout on defensive work in order to cope with the strong Colby line this Saturday.

Individual mistakes was the cause of the teams weakening in the second half in the Bates game. Two guards, center and right tackle positions are open yet. This week besides new plays, signals, etc. the team will be put through some tough scrimmages with the first team subs. The backs will be the same, with a toss-up between Phil Taylor who has recovered from his bad knee, and Blair. Small who has not shown up as well as he should in the last two games, might be shifted to the subs. Findley is looming to the front as a half back by his consistent work in this berth on the subs.

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Dean Stevens Publishes New Book on The Bible

Among the interesting new books of the season is "The English Bible," written by Dean J. S. Stevens of the College of Arts and Sciences and printed by The Abingdon Press. Many important periodicals have given it very favorable notice and Dr. William Phelps of Yale has especially commended it in a personal letter to Dean Stevens.

The book is an outgrowth of a course given in 1919-20 by the Dean on the literary importance and influence of the Bible. The volume is divided into two principal parts; the first, a study of the best known narratives of the Bible, and the second, a study of its use by literary masters. One striking feature is a list of passages selected, with the aid of over forty experts along English and Biblical lines, as being the greatest expressions in literature.

A brief but intensive study is made of the more important literary productions of the Bible such as the Book of Job (already dramatized by the author) Psalms and Ecclesiastes together with historical explanations on both the Old and New Testaments.

The use of the Bible by the poets comprises the material of one chapter and copious illustrations are given from Chaucer, Shakespeare, Tennyson, Longfellow and other familiar poetic writers. The employment of Scripture allusions and examples by famous orators and essayists is also noted in another interesting section.

The Bible as the "greatest book of short stories and treasury of world songs" does not escape comment but finds a suitable place in the new book. The Biblical origins of well-known figures of speech also claims attention.

At the end appears a long list of passages selected for their special literary beauty. The Dean plans to have the students memorize these in the course for which the book is designed. There are to be found, too, twenty test questions based on general information which the author has given to his classes at the beginning of the Bible course for the purpose of testing students' knowledge of the subject matter before real work in the course is begun.

While the book is especially valuable to the student of the Bible, it is also of great interest and assistance to the ordinary reader of good literature and will no doubt be employed as such.

Mr. Bagley Speaks At Last General Lecture

Mr J. F. Bagley, superintendent of the State Board of Charities and Corrections, gave an interesting lecture on "The Purpose and scope of a state board of Correction especially concerning the state of Maine." The lecture was delivered last Wednesday at the General Lecture hour in 30 Coburn. It dealt with the origin and rapid development of institutions for correction and charity within the state.

His statistics show that, during colonial times, an overseer of the Poor administered relief to the needy. In 1834, an institution for the insane was established at Augusta; it was then called the insane asylum; now it is called a state hospital. In 1853, a reform school for delinquent boys was established in 1863; In 1899, this institution came under state control and in 1913 became known as the State School for Girls. All of the above-mentioned institutions are managed by boards of Commissioners. In 1913, a State Board of Charities and Corrections was established to supervise the entire system of Charities and Corrections that receive public funds. Two years later, a special institution for delinquent women was established. For last year only, the cost of the care of delinquents amounted to \$2,500,000; of this amount, \$31,000 was spent for the supervision of the whole scheme; and \$1,500,000 was spent for the management of these institutions in the counties and cities. At the present time, the state of Maine is caring for: 2500 Children, 60 soldiers and sailors 550 delinquent boys, 675 tuberculosis, 2500 insane, 340 feeble minded, 260 prisoners, 1650 county jails, 2300 hospitals, 420 blind.

Distance Men Inspect The Standpipe Course

Captain Buker of the Bates cross country team and Allan Mercer of the Colby team were on the campus last week inspecting the course over which the race for the State Cross Country Championship will be run November 4.

Both men, who are possible individual winners, were very much pleased with the course. Buker said that the course was a fine one for such a race while Mercer made the statement that the race would be a much fairer one over the Orono course than the one over the Brunswick course last year.

The prospects of Maine winning the championship are practically the same as last week. The boys are all in good condition with the exception of Ames who is bothered with a lame hip and A. E. Wilson who has a bad cold.

As was proposed at the last meeting of the Track Club each fraternity house and the common councils will have at least fifteen men at some point along the course to cheer the runners and to give them the old Maine fight.
