We Wish to Introduce Mr. Robert J. Schenkel

Assistant Professor of Physical Education and One of Our Most Popular Instructors

Mr. Robert "Bob" J. Schenkel, assistant professor of Physical Education, is a recent addition to the personnel of that department. Mr. Schenkel has, in a very short time become one of our most popular athletic instructors.

Mr. Schenkel prepared for college at the Temple Preparatory School, Philadelphia. At Temple University he participated in athletics making his letter in football and track. He graduated from Temple in 1916, and that fall was Physical Instructor as well as track and cross country coach at Girard College. The following spring he entered the U. S. Army and served 13 months in the Medical Corps, being stationed at Base hospital No. 38 in Nantes, France. On his return, he resumed his position at Girard. Last summer he took a graduate course in physical education at Harvard Summer School; while there he taught sprinting.

In an interview with a representative of the "Campus", Mr. Schenkel gave some of his impressions of Maine. He believes that we have a wonderful spirit at Maine, and that such a spirit is a great boost to any athletic instructor. He had heard of "The Maine Spirit" and was not disappointed at the evidence of that spirit when he came to Maine this fall. He sees no reason why Maine can not become one of the largest educational institutions in the east if she receives the proper support of the people of the state.

Mr. Schenkel is at present assisting Coach Baldwin and Coach Preti in taking care of the physical condition of the football and cross country men. Those fellows who are unfortunate enough to get injured, appreciate the efficient medical work of Professor Schenkel. Mr. Schenkel will be the instructor of required gymnasium work and will probably assist Coach Flack when the track season starts.

Horticulture Department To Hold Flower Show

There Will Also Be an Exhibit of Maine Fruit

This year for the first time the Department of Horticulture will hold a fruit show and flower display. This show is to be held in number 33 Winslow Hall and will be free to all who are interested.

The students in the Department of Horticulture aided by those who are particularly interested in orcharding will be responsible for the show in all of its details with the exception of the judging and the speaking program.

The dates selected come during the week known as National Apple Week which is ushered in by National Apple Day Saturday, Oct. 30 when every individual in the United States is urged to eat at least one apple.

On Wednesday evening, Nov. 3 the Horticultural Department and the Agricultural Club are uniting in an effort to bring speakers of note to speak to those who attend the show that evening.

The premium lists and rules have been printed and distributed to the classes in Horticulture that have a special interest and there are many indications that the show will be a success.

For several years some of the big institutions in the mid west and the northwest have had student fruit shows at which fruit and fruit products are sold giving a revenue in sufficient amount to make it possible to pay the total expenses of fruit judging teams sent to local and National fruit judging contests and the purpose of this show is similar as well as to add a distinctive educational feature to Horticultural interests.

At the rally, Bill Cobb introduced the speakers, the principal one being Phil Hussey, '12, Pat Hussey's brother. He told us of the 'old days' when Maine made them all take the count. Maine is much stronger now than she was then, and does not intend to spoil her past record. This was shown last Saturday afternoon and will continue to be shown at the Maine-Colby game next Saturday, and also the Saturday following when we win the state championship at Brunswick.

Coach Baldwin told us that the team was ready for Bates and that he was confident of victory.

Captain Ray Smith spoke of the spirit, and support of the team by all the student body.

Coach Preti said the cross country prospects were good, and that after winning the state cross country championship we are going into the New England and bring back the New Eng-

With a dry field and hardly any wind blowing Maine won a hard fought game from Bates last Saturday by the score of 14 to 9. Capt. Stonier won the toss and chose to receive, defending the north goal. Roemer kicked the ball to Kelly of Bates who ran it back 5 yards, after two tries at Maine's line Davis kicked to Ginsberg who ran the ball back 5 yards. Small gained 5 yards thru right guard then Maine fumbled and Bates recovered the oval. Capt. Smith intercepted a forward pass, Davis then kicked to Ginsberg who ran the ball back 15 yards. Maine fumbled but Lord recovered and then Small kicked to Wiggin who was downed in his tracks by Barron on Bates 30 yard line. Maine was offside and this gave Bates first down on her 35 yard line. Bates fumbled and Lord recovered for Maine and on the next play Small fumbled and Davis recovered for Bates on their 45 yard line after making 6 yards thru Maine's line on three downs Davis kicked to Maine's 10 yard line and Ginsberg allowed the ball to roll over the goal line. Maine took the ball out to her 20 yard line where Small kicked to Wiggin on Bates 30 yard line, who ran the ball back 30 yards before he was downed. Finnegan made 15 yards more around R. E. Friday Night Rally Shows Good Spirit

Every Maine Student Should Be Out for Maine Night

Our Maine Night corresponds to the Fall Home-coming of many other colleges, where the alumni visit their Alma Mater in autumn. It is really a culmination of the rallies, or the most pretentious of all the rallies. Generally it has been run by the Athletic Association, with the subject of football predominating. However, the program has sometimes been a boast of all our athletic victories, past, present and future. This year football will be no more prominent than any other branch of sport. Music is furnished by the band and glee club, while the football team sits on the stage. Contrary to the usual custom, the rally will not be held indoors but on Alumni Field. The large number of undergraduates and alumni make this necessary.

Maine Night was first established in 1901, and since then has been held every year except two, making this our 18th annual one. A notice sent out to the alumni in 1902 urges all the alumni to return on the eve of the Bowdoin-Maine game and says that there ought to be 100 back instead of the 50 of 1901. Ex-Governor Haines '76, a most loyal alumnus, played a prominent part in those old Maine Nights.

The program for Friday, October 29th has been arranged by the Athletic board and a student committee with "Pep" Townner as chairman. The undergraduates are "Al" Johnson '22, Don Coady '21, W. C. Plumer '21, "Bill" Cobb '21, and "Red" DeRoche '22.

The student body will assemble at Alumni Hall at 7.15 and from there will have a torchlight procession to the Athletic Field in the following order: band, alumni, co-eds, seniors, juniors, sophomores and freshmen. They will encircle the field once, then pass into the

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Editorial

A man who has played more football than any other player in Maine told us last Friday night at the rally that it's the pep the student body instills into the team that makes the team a winner. And Pat Hussey knows for he has played on a championship team, and otherwise. Then Phil Hussey told us that we won the championship in the fall of 1911 because every man in the University was behind the team. With half the student body that we have now the rallies were held in the gym because Assembly Hall was not large enough. We were crabbed all around for the lack of spirit that we had been showing. And it is evident that a little crabbing does a lot of good. The pep we exhibited Saturday was surely commendable. Even when Bates was eight points ahead of us the cheering and encouraging of the team did not lessen the least bit.

Of course it was too late to increase the numbers at the rally but next week let's do better. There were only about 525 there and the 25 were co-eds. Just think, less than fifty percent of the student body at a football rally, and only three quarters of the seats in the Hall filled. That was pretty poor spirit.

Next Friday is Maine Night. Every student has the double duty of setting up the team for the game next day and of showing the visitors what kind of a place Maine is this year. So kindly reserve that date for this purpose exclusively. And plan on doing all that you can toward carrying out the program, giving the visitors a good time and putting the pep into the team.

Oh co-eds, what is your attitude? Were you showing the real spirit or were you but yielding to a whim? Twice you came to the rallies in full array and with round numbers. But if you will but recall, there were no social engagements on either of those evenings. But last Friday night there was a dance and there were not more than 25 co-eds at the rally. That shows pretty poor spirit on your part. If you are going to let your social engagements predominate over your duty to the University surely we can not rely on you for the support which you ought to give and which you are well able to give. Think this over co-eds, and try to remedy it.

over for a touchdown. Wiggin failed to kick the goal. Roemer kicked to Davis who ran the ball back 45 yards. Bates was penalized 15 yards for holding. On a successful forward Wiggin to Finnegan, Bates made 10 yards. It was Maine's ball on her 20 yard line, but she was caught holding while the ball was in the air and the ball was given to Bates. "Pat" Hussey intercepted a forward then Small made 4 yards around R. E. and Foster made 8 yards more around L. E. On the next play with Small standing back on his 20 yard line Lord made a high pass and the ball went over Small's head rolling in behind Maine's goal line, but before he had time to run it out he was downed by two Bates men and a safety was scored on Maine making the score 8 to 0 in favor of Bates. The ball was brought out to Maine's 20 yard line where the quarter ended.

Second Quarter

Capt. Smith started this quarter off by making three yards thru R. G. and Foster made 3 yards thru L. G. Small kicked to Kelly on his 35 yard line where he fumbled it, but recovered in time before he was tackled. Finnegan made 9 yards around L. E. Bates was offside and Small went thru Davis for a 4 yard loss. A forward Wiggins to Gormally was unsuccessful. Canter kicked to Ginsberg who ran the ball back 10 yards. Small made 4 yards around L. E. Foster made 3 yards thru R. T. Bates blocked a punt on her 48 yard line. Davis picked up the ball and ran 15 yards before he was tackled by Ginsberg thus saving Bates from registering another touchdown. Bates completed a forward, Wiggin to Gormally. Bates tried the aerial route twice more, but failed and the ball went to Maine, on Bates 35 yard line. Small made a spectacular run of 15 yards shaking off tackler after tackler. Maine fumbled the ball on the next play, but recovered. Small then punted to Wiggin who fumbled and Lord recovered it on Maine's 30 yard line. Maine made first down on the next two plays. On a well completed forward, Small to Capt. Smith, placed the ball on the 4 yard line and on the next play Capt. Smith took the ball over for Maine's first touchdown. Hussey, as yet not failing to kick a goal, booted the ball over the crossbar, thus making the score 8-7 in favor of Bates. Roemer kicked to Davis who ran the ball back 30 yards before he was downed. Finnegan then made 15 yards around R. E. Hussey intercepted a forward over the line. On the next play Canter caught Small for a 13 yard loss. Maine kicked to Bates, Maine was penalized 15 yards for tackling Wiggin before he caught the ball. Finnegan made 7 yards around R. E. The half ended on Bates 30 yd. line with the score 8-7 in favor of Bates.

Third Quarter

Gormally kicked off to Capt. Smith who ran the ball back 10 yards. Foster made 5 yards more thru L. T. Small kicked to Bates on her 25 yard line, but Bates fumbled and Maine recovered, on two unsuccessful tries at Bates line, Small dropped back for a field goal, but a bad pass from the center prevented him from completing it. Bates was offside and this gave Maine first down on her 20 yard line. Smith made 4 yards thru R. G. Maine tried a forward, but it was not complete. Small dropped back again for a field goal but this time it was blocked, and

Ginsberg fell on the ball. Maine tried to gain by the aerial route but was not successful.

Small kicked to Davis who ran the ball back 10 yards. Then Bates could not gain thru Maine's stonewall line that had strengthened in the second half. Maine received the ball on her 30 yard line and a combination of line buck plays and forward passes brought the ball to Maine's 12 yard line and another forward placed the ball on Maine's 4 yard line where Capt. Ray Smith again took the ball over for his second touchdown making the score 13 to 8 in favor of Maine and "Pat" Hussey with sure footed toe added one more point to the score. This ended the scoring of the game.

On the kick-off Roemer to Furley, Bates ran the ball back 15 yards. Davis then kicked to Small who ran it back 10 yards. Ginsberg made a fine gain thru center for 10 yards more. Dresser who had taken Capt. Smith's place, made 5 yards thru R. T.

Fourth Quarter

It was Maine's ball on her 32 yard line and she tried to advance toward Bates goal for another touchdown, by the aerial route, this placed the ball on Maine's 24 yard line. Maine tried another field goal but was unsuccessful. Davis gained 10 yards around L. E. On the next play Roemer caught Davis for a 13 yard loss. Then in the last few minutes of play Bates tried to advance the ball up the field by using the trick play that netted her the first touchdown, but after four tries she failed. This gave the ball on Bates 45 yard line. Ginsberg took the ball thru L. T. for five yards and the game ended with the ball in Maine's possession all ready for another march on Bates goal. Capt. Smith, Hussey and Ginsberg played spectacular football both on the defense and offense, Small with his long punts and end running, also played good, as did Foster, Roemer and Lord. "The School for Scandal" by Richard Brinsley Sheridan, really a classic, is considered the finest dramatic work of that author. It has been played by a number of well known stars in the past and has frequently been presented by all-star casts on Broadway.

There have always been a number of difficulties for the Masque to overcome as expensive or elaborate productions are impossible. Having no suitable place to stage performances on the campus, the organization has been forced to provide its own scenery. This expense together with that of costuming is a heavy drain on the treasury.

Performances by the Masque have been given in many New England towns during past years. The annual trip comes during the Easter vacation and usually lasts a week or ten days. During this period the Masque plays in such places as: Augusta, Houlton, Caribou, Presque Isle, Deering, Portland, Biddeford, Kennebunk, Methuen, Mass., Lawrence, Mass., Fairhaven, Mass., and Boston. Later on in the year there is a performance at the Bijou and during Junior Week and Commencement performances are given on the campus.

Rehearsals have already started for this season. First tryouts were held Wednesday evening, Oct. 20th and will continue each Wednesday evening until the cast has been picked. Everyone who has had experience or wishes to enter this activity is urged to come out and try a part. The final cast will be selected by a board of competent judges headed by Professor Mark Bailey, Coach of the Masque.

The few older members of the Masque who are still in college hope this year to see the organization once more firmly established upon its old traditions and taking its proper place among the activities of the university. During the war period the Masque was discontinued but with the splendid start already made, an usually good season is expected. Many new opportunities for obtaining engagements have shown themselves and the management is expecting shortly to close some of the dates for the Easter vacation trip.
