FIRST CHAMPIONSHIP GAME ENDS IN ROUSING VICTORY FOR MAINE

Bates Beaten 34-0 on a Muddy Field

On a field that was deep in slush and mud, Saturday, the University of Maine eleven overwhelmed the Bates college football team in the first of the series for the championship of the state by the score of 34-0. The big team representing the light blue totally outclassed the garnet warriors in all departments of the game, and only twice did the visitors make first down. The rain and the mud, together with the slippery condition of the ball made fast or open play practically impossible and fumbles frequent. The Bates team was especially bad in fumbling the ball and very rarely did a Bates man recover the pigskin, so well did Captain Sawyer's men follow it. The Maine eleven, with the puzzling shifts and the heavy line made possible a Maine touchdown in the first four minutes of play. There was no withstanding the terrific onslaughts of Ruffner, Donohue and Kriger and well indeed did this great set of backs acquit themselves. However, there was one very conspicuous figure in the Maine offense, and time and time again were the spectators aroused by the brilliant playing of Cobb, the Maine field general. Directing his team with judgment and precision, accurately scenting the weaknesses in the garnet defence, and faultlessly handling the Bates punts, Cobb looms up now as an All Maine quarterback. He also excelled in his punting, gaining at least ten yards on every exchange of kicks. Paul Murray the giant U. of M. tackle also distinguished himself in no small way, both on the defense and offense. In the second period, it was this same Murray who with the ball on the Bates' 10 yard line, broke through and blocked Talbot's attempted punt, the impact of the ball against the big chest, sending the ball behind the goal posts where Bernheisel who should also be mentioned for his great following of the oval, fell on it for another Maine score.

For Bates, the one conspicuous figure was Danahy, the fighting captain of the visiting aggregation, whose bulldog tenacity and never die spirit brought him the commendation of the crowd. He played a wonderful defensive game and together with Connors and Butler many times stopped the Maine backs after they had broken through the tackles or guards.

In the fourth period, Coach Reilly sent in several subs, but the Bates team could not do anything with this aggregation. The student body is now looking forward to the game with Colby which is to be played on Alumni Field next Saturday.

THE GAME

Bates won the toss and Cobb, the Bates tackle kicked off to Sawyer who was downed in his tracks by Manuel on the 48 yard line. Cobb, the Maine quarterback essayed an end run but made but a yard being pulled down by Capt. Danahy. Bates was offside on the next play, giving Maine 5 yards and here started the first rush to the visiting goal. Coach Reilly's line charged low and hard, the Bates line wavered before the rushes of Ruffner, Donohue and Kriger and in five rushes, the ball rested on the Bates 2 yard line

where Ruffner tore through behind Murray for the first touchdown. But four minutes of play had elapsed and the Maine cheering section went wild Cobb missed the goal. Maine 6, Bates 0.

Captain Danahy chose to receive the kick and Gulliver lifted the pigskin to the Bates Captain who ran it in from his 20 to his 37 yard line where he was downed by Murray and Bernheisel. Kennedy here went in for DeWeaver. After futile attempts at the Maine defence, Talbot kicked to Kriger. Here the Maine backfield started another charge towards the Bates goal line but a 15 yard penalty for holding forced Cobb to punt. The kick was a beauty, going to the Bates 15 yard line where Talbot made a fine catch over his shoulder running it back 10 yards before he was nailed by Baker and Gulliver. Butler got a yard at center and Eldridge slipped around Purington on a trick play for a gain of seven yards. The Maine defence stiffened here and Talbot was again forced to kick, Cobb receiving the ball on the 15 yard line where he was nailed by Dyer. Bates was offside on the next play and Maine got the benefit of a five yard penalty. Kriger tore through center for seven yards, followed it up with two at the same hole and Ruffner made it first down. Here Maine was again penalized and Cobb again punted to Talbot. Bates quarter fumbled and Murray fell on the ball. The ball however, was put in play on the 49 yard line after some sort of a mixup among the officials. The play seersawed in the mud about the center of the field for the remainder of the period, penalties and fumbles being very frequent.

SECOND PERIOD

A penalty of fifteen yards for holding at the beginning of the second period placed the ball on the Maine 29 yard line and Cobb punted outside at the 45 yard mark. Butler started on an end run with excellent interference but Murray, again breaking through the line, nailed him for a four yard loss. The Bates back fumbled and Capt. Sawyer of Maine recovered. Danahy nailed Ruffner for a three yard loss and after unsuccessful attempts to gain by Ruffner and Donohue, Cobb again punted to Talbot, the Bates quarter catching the pigskin on the 20 yard line where Purington threw him in his tracks. Talbot immediately kicked, and Cobb ran the punt back to the Bates 38 yard line where he was finally brought to earth by Butler whose defensive work during the afternoon was of the best. H. Cobb, on an end run around his cousin, of Bates got nine yards and Kriger made it first down through Stillman. Kriger ploughed through left tackle for five more and Ruffner wriggled through center to the 17 yard line. Under Captain Danahy's plea, the visitors line tightened and Maine could not gain an inch, Bates taking the ball on downs. Talbot stood on his own yard to punt out of danger. The pass was low and Murray, tearing through the garnet forwards, blocked the punt and Bernheisel recovered the ball behind the line for a touchdown. Cobb kicked a pretty goal. Score—Maine 13, Bates 0. Dyer kicked off to

MAINE DEFEATS DARTMOUTH

Cross-Country Team is Winner in The First Meet

Maine's cross-country team proved that it is a winning combination, Saturday, by winning from Dartmouth. Although Marceau of Dartmouth was the first to finish, five Maine men were right at his heels and Maine won the meet, the total score being 25 to 35. The course though, very heavy, was not a difficult one compared with our own here at Maine. It was of course up hill and down dale but the turf was exceedingly firm considering the weather.

The race was very exciting, being a good fight all the way. Marceau was closely followed by Preti and the other Maine runners were only a few paces behind him. Grager, who finished second for Dartmouth, was less than 50 yards behind Gerrish.

The men finished in the following order:

Marceau, Dartmouth, 22.15 2-5; Preti, Maine, 22.29; Dempsey, Maine, 22.50 2-5; Towner, Maine, 22.51 3-5; Bell, Maine, 22.59; Gerrish, Maine, 22.59 4-5; Granger, Maine, 23.02; Saltmarsh, Durgin, Lewis and Bacon, all Dartmouth.

The Maine inter-collegiate cross-country run that comes off Wednesday, Nov. 5, at Waterville, should be looked forward to with a great deal of interest. In the estimation of Coach Smith, Maine will have to run in her best form to defeat Colby. Wentz, a freshman at Colby has a fine record and is picked by many to win the meet. There are three other freshmen on the team who are reported to be good men. Maine, however, has a well balanced team and should accumulate a very low score.

Coach Smith's Opinion

The Dartmouth Cross Country team which was defeated Saturday, by Maine, was beyond doubt a very weak team. Aside from Marceau Dartmouth had absolutely nothing, and had Preti used better judgment in his race he would have given Marceau the race of his life, for first honors for the crack Green runner was all in at the finish while Preti had considerable running left in him when he crossed the tape.

Colby has a better team than Dartmouth. There three freshmen from New York, Wentz, Golden, and Thompson are all cracks and will give Maine a hard race for the State Championship Nov. 5th. I would not be surprised to see Colby win the championship. In the Dartmouth race Towner, Bell and Brooks were dissappointments, while the freshmen Preti, Dempsey, and Gerrish did well and I hope they can keep it up.

In Brooks case there was possibly an excuse for his funning behind his form and we hope for better in the future from him. I don't think Maine has any right to expect to win the State championship in such an easy fashion as she did last year—in fact I think that Colby's team is equally as good as ours and the slightest failure on the part of any individual on our team is sure to cost us the championship.

A ROUSING RALLY

The most Successful Held in Years

One of the most spirited football rallies for a long time, was held last Thursday evening. Everybody seemed to be out to yell his lungs out and was led on by P. B. Sheridan '15, as cheer leader.

After a selection by the university band of 34 pieces "Prexy" Monohon introduced, as the first speaker of the evening, Prof. Barrows, '02, who played on one of the first championship teams of the university. Prof. Barrows spoke of the condition under which athletic teams existed in his day, giving many good examples of what spirit behind a team would do and can do, also many suggestions for new cheers.

Manager Getchell was then sought out in the crowd but before he had got started captain "Bob" Sawyer was seen sneaking thru the gym door and was brought to the front. Getchell spoke of the grit of the football men, especially of those who were injured.

"Bob" then took his place on the platform and after he grew tired of standing there smiling the crowd decided to give him a chance to speak, and stopped cheering. He gave in a very few words, his opinion of the Maine spirit after the Yale game, when there was no more appreciation shown than the blowing of the whistle. He also praised the scrubs for their work in helping the team.

Cobb was then wanted and after a long chase was brought from his hiding place behind the organ and gave a few words in explanation for the two Cobbs on the Bates team.

Prof. Kaulfuss was the next speaker and gave many suggestions which can well bear consideration.

The meeting closed with "Our Director" by the band. Everybody went home feeling that this was a most enthusiastic Mass Meeting. Surely Maine spirit could not be more in evidence and great praise is due "Phil" Sheridan for his splendid efforts which so successfully brought cheers out of the men and brought them out so strongly too.

The mass meeting was well attended and "Maine Night" is looked forward to with great anticipation.

SOME FACTS ABOUT THE CO-EDS

The Women Students Increasing Rapidly at the University

It may be interesting to the friends of the University to note the rapid change in co-educational life at Maine. It is as great a pleasure to us to publish the fact that the enrollment of women students this year has passed the hundredth mark, as to state that the entire registration of the college has passed the thousandth mark. For, as the number of women students becomes more equal to the number of men students, we come nearer to the ideal State college that we so desire.

Last year the women students enrolled were seventy-two, thirty-six having entered in the Freshman class. This fall one hundred and two were enrolled, the entering class consisting of forty-six. About sixty of these students pursue the Home Economics course, thirty the B. A. course, and the remainder special courses.

As the number of co-eds increase year by year, college life here becomes more interesting for them; they seem to take greater interest in college activities. Last year a glee club and orchestra were formed. Both proved such a decided success that this year they are to be systematically organized under managers. Thru the earnest endeavors of the Y. W. C. A. here, last June three delegates were sent to Silver Bay Conference, N. Y. Since every college where there is a Y. W. C. A. sends representatives to this conference, Maine will not be behind the others next June. We have two well-organized national sororities, Phi Mu and Alpha Omicron Pi, which certainly add spirit to the college life.

With great interest the co-eds are awaiting the completion of their new dormitory which will give them far greater college privileges. There is to be a large gymnasium in the new building, for the co-eds will no longer have the long daily walk to and from Orono, for exercise. This year it has been necessary to use the Wilson House on Mill St., the Colburn House and the Inn, on Maine St. to accommodate the students.

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EDITORIAL.

It may seem like an old story to be writing about the Blanket Tax again. However, we have something to crab about this time.

Does This Hit You? There are only three hundred students who have paid their taxes so far this year. There are as many

more students now holding tickets for which they have not paid. Do you realize what this is costing the Athletic Association? Do you not know that the Association has to share the gate receipts of the Bates and Colby games with the visiting colleges? When you present a Blanket Tax ticket, for which you have not paid, for admission to these two games where do you think the money is coming from to pay Bates or Colby their share of your admission? It must necessarily come from the already insufficient treasury of the Athletic Association. Last Saturday these unpaid Blanket Tax tickets cost the Association one hundred and twenty-five dollars! Next Saturday Colby's share of the gate receipts amounts to thirty-seven and one half cents on each Blanket Tax ticket. This means that if your Tax is still unpaid on that date it is going to cost the Association thirty-seven and one-half cents to pay your admission to the game. Now the question is: Are you going to allow the Association to pay your admission to the game with Colby? If you are,—then you have no claim on the rights and privileges of a real Maine Man, and you are as a rank outsider in the Maine bleachers next Saturday. The Athletic Association

can ill afford to pay your admission to any game. You can easily afford to pay at least your own admission. It's up to you! See some member of the committee before next Saturday and pay your tax.

DEAR SIR:

Your letter of October 4th, notifying me of my election as Alumni representative on the Maine Intercollegiate Athletic Board, was duly received.

We older men are always conscious of the compliments which our successors as students pay to us, and I wish to convey through you to the Association my thanks for this continued evidence of confidence.

The Intercollegiate Athletic Board has for many years elected and re-elected me as its President. I have valued the compliment more as a recognition of the important position that the University takes, than for any personal consideration attached thereto, but it has seemed to me that it would be well to have a change in this office, and I, therefore, sent my resignation to the Board at the Last Annual Meeting.

The Board instead of acting upon my resignation appointed a committee consisting of the Alumni representatives of Bates and Colby to confer with me for the purpose of requesting the withdrawal of my resignation. The matter has been under consideration since that time, and it is only recently that I have reluctantly told the Committee that I would serve for the current year, but that I hoped another choice would be made at the next meeting.

Had my resignation been accepted by the Board, I should, of course, have resigned as your representative, but under the circumstances I now accept the election for the current year.

I have been interested in Varsity athletics ever since I was a student and played first base on the ball team, and I have had an active interest in the splendid development that has been made in athletics at the University ever since that time.

In the early college days, when a team went from one institution to another, it was invariably like going into the enemy's camp, and the attitude of the students, and what was done, unfortunately verified the impression. This hostile attitude was by no means confined to the Maine colleges, but was practically universal throughout the college world. All this has been changed, and the student Intercollegiate Athletic world has now become fairly civilized and tolerant.

True sportsmanship is impossible unless it is accompanied by gentlemanly consideration of your opponents. True courtesy is in no way inconsistent with "hitting the line hard" every time. Your opponents will respect you more if you throw every ounce of your strength, vitality and intelligence into your play, but if a man gets the reputation of being a dirty player, it is more than likely that this reputation will accompany him during the rest of his life, and in whatever occupation he may enter. He may not be informed of this, and indeed, may be unconscious that such is the case, but his associates, business or social, will always feel that the characteristics which he showed as a student player are likely to be manifested in the game of life.

As one of the older graduates, therefore,

earnestly urge every student taking part in athletics to do his very utmost to win every game he enters, whatever it may be, but never to allow himself to be a party to anything that an honorable man would be ashamed of.

It seems to me that every time a visiting team is given a courteous and cordial greeting, and is well taken care of by hospitable hosts at the College visited, that a distinct and upward step is taken in the standing of that institution, and that any discourtesy shown a visiting team by its students reflects adversely upon the character of the institution.

The growth of this spirit of fellowship has been marvelous during the past generation, and nowhere has it been more pronounced than in the State of Maine. While many other influences have been at work, in my opinion no one of them has been more effective than that which has been fostered by the Maine Intercollegiate Athletic Board. The work of that body has been done quietly, unostentatiously, and yet effectively. It has suggested and seen carried out many reforms that have been of the greatest advantage to everyone concerned even to affecting the more sportsmanlike character of the athletic relations between the secondary schools.

The Board, however, has never advertised itself, being content to let results speak for themselves. To a certain extent this may have been a disadvantage as the importance of its work was not likely to be known to the student body, and I fear that the impression often prevails among the students of the different institutions comprising the Board that the Board itself is little more than a name. Let me again assure you that such is not the fact.

The members of the Board representing the different colleges have invariably been men of the highest character, whether representing the student, faculty, or alumni bodies. The members have often had divergent views, but their discussions have always been conducted in the most courteous way with a respectful regard for the opinions of others, as we all knew that we were working for a common end—the good of all—and when a vote has finally been taken after full and free discussion it has always been unanimous.

It has often been necessary for a question to remain open over several meetings, but when the decision was finally reached it met the approval of all the representatives of all the different institutions. Considering the nature of some of the matters involved, often accompanied by strong partizan feeling on the part of the student body, it seems to me that this record is a most striking one, and a clear illustration of how much can be accomplished by those who unselfishly and earnestly strive together for the common welfare.

In closing let me say that our famous "Maine Spirit" can be displayed in no better way than by giving a cordial and generous support to the Maine Intercollegiate Athletic Board, and the members who for the time being may compose it, to the end that the benefits already obtained may not be lost, and that new glories may be added to the past record of that useful body.

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FIRST CHAMPIONSHIP GAME ENDS IN ROUSING VICTORY FOR MAINE

Wark who fumbled, Cobb recovering on the 42 yard line. Kriger made three yards through left guard, Donohue got four at right tackle and Ruffner on a skin tackle play made it first down. Donohue punched center for no gain and the period ended with the ball in the center of the field.

THIRD QUARTER

The Maine team appeared on the field after the intermission with a change of uniforms and both cheering sections gave their representatives fine receptions.

Gulliver kicked off for Maine to Moore who fumbled on the 48 yard line, Danahy falling on the ball. Talbot dropped back to punt and the pass was bad, the ball going over the quarterback's head. He recovered however, and sent Eldridge on an end run. Murray again broke through and with a fierce tackle threw Eldridge for a loss, the latter fumbling. Bernheisel recovered and Maine started on another march to the enemy's goal. Maine was penalized for holding and after Ruffner tried center for no gain, Bernheisel on a trick play broke away on a 22 yard run with perfect interference. Ruffner followed with five yards through left guard but Maine was penalized for being offside on the next play. The Bates forward again stopped the Maine onslaught and Cobb called for a forward pass. The pass was incomplete and Bates got the ball on her own 7 yard line. Davis relieved Talbot at quarterback for Bates and punted to Cobb who ran the ball back to the 35 yard line.

The Maine quarterback, with perfect interference then skirted around Danahy for the longest run of the afternoon, dodging his way through the whole Bates eleven to the three yard line where, losing his feet, he was downed, from behind by Davis the plucky little quarter. Donohue immediately plugged through left guard for the touchdown. Cobb kicked the goal. Maine 20, Bates 0.

Dyer of Bates kicked off to Cobb who ran the kickoff back 12 yards, and immediately punted to Davis who after being nailed by Gulliver on a hard tackle, fumbled and Bernheisel again recovered. Cobb again broke away on another long end run, going 22 yards before he was finally halted by a beautiful tackle by Dyer. Donohue got five through guard but Danahy nailed Cobb for a five yard loss. On a trick forward pass, Cobb to Donohue over the center of the line, the fast Maine back dodged away to the five yard line where he fell. He did not stop however, but slid on the mud the remaining five yards to the line going right through the uprights for the touchdown. Cobb kicked an easy goal. Maine 27, Bates 0. For the remainder of the quarter, the ball seesawed about the center of the field and no more scoring resulted in this period.

FOURTH QUARTER

Many new faces appeared in the Maine lineup, practically a substitute team taking the field. Another score resulted for the Bates line was pretty well fagged out and the fresh Maine substitutes through the Lewiston collegians for gain after gain, Kallock, Gorham and Kirk starring. After an incomplete forward pass, Cobb who was relieved by Kallock again returned to the game and announced his arrival by skirting around end for a 12 yard gain. Donohue punched center for four yards, Cobb got eight more around the end and Kriger shot through guard for four yards and another touchdown. Cobb again kicked the goal and the score stood Maine 34, Bates 0. This ended the scoring and for the remainder of period Maine was content to remain on the defensive.

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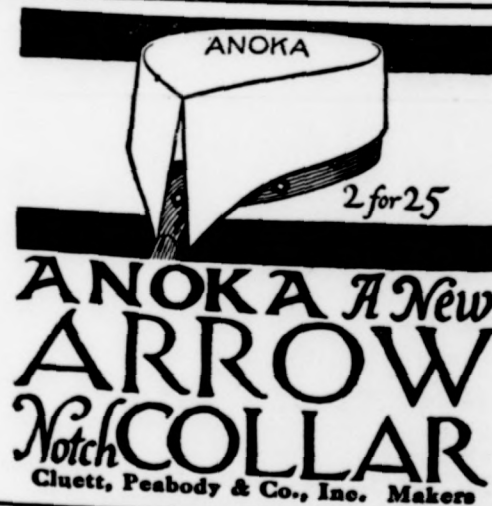
