MAINE DEFEATS BATES

Wins by Small Margin

Maine won her first game in the State series last Saturday by defeating Bates College, 7-6. The Bates team showed much greater strength than was expected and proved to be a dangerous opponent in several instances during the game. The field was in bad shape, due to the rain of the day before, and this made it almost impossible for good football. Maine made its only score towards the end of the second half. Bates attempted a forward pass but Shepherd of Maine received the ball and was downed on Bates' 48 yard line. From this point Maine carried the ball repeatedly through the Bates line and Martin was finally sent over the goal line for a touchdown. Shepherd kicked the goal and this later proved a very fortunate circumstance for Maine. Bates scored her touchdown on a blocked kick in the fourth period. Shepherd attempted to kick from Maine's 12 yard line but Dyer of Bates broke through the line and blocked the kick. The ball went straight up in the air and when it came down, Shepard of Bates recovered it and carried the ball over the line for a touchdown. Dennis failed to kick the goal. One end of the field was much dryer than the other end. Maine was able to make her best gains on the dry ground.

Dennis, the Bates captain, won the toss up and chose to defend the east goal which was on the muddy end of the field. Shepherd of Maine kicked off to Danahy on Bates' 10 yard line. On the next two plays Bates was unable to gain and Talbot kicked to Cobb who was downed in the middle of the field. Martin made 5 yards, Cobb and Carleton both made 5 yards more then Carleton made 8 yards. The ball was on Bates' 32 yard line. Martin made no gain on the next play. Cobb fumbled the ball on the next play but Bernheisel recovered. Carleton made no gain. Martin made three yards on a fake punt. A forward pass was attempted, Shepherd to Carleton, but failed. The same play was tried again but failed and the ball went to Bates on downs. Eldridge made one yard for Bates. On the next play Dennis was tackled for a loss by Bigelow, the ball being on Bates' 18 yard line. Talbot punted to Cobb and he was downed in his

tracks on Maine's 45 yard line. Cobb made 4 yards around right end. Carleton made 10 yards on the next two plays. Martin made 4 yards and Carleton made 6 more yards. The ball was on Bates' 26 yard line. Cobb went through center for 3 yards. Martin made 5 more yards. Maine was held here for downs on Bates' 9 yard line. Talbot punted to Cobb who was downed in the middle of the field. Shepherd punted on the first play and the ball struck Bates' goal post and was scored as a touchback. Bates started the scrimmage on her 20 yard line. Talbot punted to Cobb in the middle of the field and then Shepherd returned the punt. After a return of punts by both sides the quarter ended with the ball in Bates' possession on her own 37 yard line.

Second quarter: Talbot went through center for two yards and Dennis made a yard and a half more. Talbot punted to Carleton who was downed on Maine's 25 yard line. Shepherd punted to Bates' 37 yard line, the ball going offside at that point. Bates next tried a forward pass, Dennis to Thompson, and it was successful, netting 20 yards. Dennis made no gain on the next play. Maine was penalized 5 yards for offside play. The ball was now on Maine's 30 yard line. Dennis was thrown back for a loss of ten yards on the next play. Bates then attempted a forward pass but Shepherd of Maine intercepted it and carried the ball to Bates' 48 yard line. On the next two plays Martin made 13 yards. In six more plays the ball was on Bates' 6 yard line and Martin then carried it over the line for a touchdown. Shepherd kicked the goal. Shepherd kicked off to Eldridge who was downed on Bates' 40 yard line after a run back of 20 yards. Eldridge made 2 yards through center and Dennis 2 more through the same position. Eldridge made no gain on the next play. Talbot punted to Carleton on Maine's 20 yard line. On the first play Shepherd punted to Talbot on Bates' 35 yard line. Dennis made 5 yards through center and Eldridge made 4 yards around left end. Talbot made a yard and Dennis made two more. The ball was on Bates' 45 yard line. Bates was unable to make the required distance and Talbot punted. Carleton secured the ball on Maine's 20 yard line. Maine made no gain on the next three plays, and then first half ended.

Third quarter: Shepherd kicked to Dyer who

ran the ball back 15 yards to Bates' 30 yard line. Bates made 3 yards. Dennis was able to gain only a yard on the next two plays. Talbot punted to Bryant on Maine's 35 yard line. Carleton made no gain on first play but made three yards on the next. Shepherd attempted to punt but was forced to fall on the ball because of a bad pass. The ball went to Bates on downs on Maine's 35 yard line. A forward pass was attempted but failed. Talbot punted to Bryant who ran the ball back 5 yards to the 25 yard line. Bryant made two yards on the first play but lost the same distance on the next. Ruffner made 2 yards. Shepherd punted to Bates in the middle of the field. Dennis made one yard and Eldridge made no gain. Talbot kicked to Bryant on 10 yard line. Carleton made 5 yards and then 3 more yards. Ruffner made 2 yards. Bryant made one yard and Ruffner two yards. A forward pass was again attempted, Bernheisel to Donahue, but failed. Shepherd kicked to Bates on Bates' 30 yard line. Eldridge fumbled on the first play and Bernheisel recovered the ball. Ruffner made 3 yards, Carleton 5 yards and Ruffner 2 yards more. Carleton made no gain. Ruffner made 5 yards. Carleton fumbled on the next play but Bernheisel recovered the ball. Shepherd made no gain, Carleton made one yard. Quarter ended.

Fourth quarter: Cobb fumbled on the first play and Dyer recovered the ball for Bates. Dennis made no gain on two plays. Talbot punted to Cobb on Maine's 34 yard line. Shepherd punted to Dyer who fumbled and Martin recovered the ball for Maine. Shepherd punted to Joyce on Bates' 45 yard line. A forward pass, Talbot to Danahy, failed. Dennis made no gain. Talbot punted to Cobb on Maine's 12 yard line. Shepherd attempted to kick on first play but Dyer broke through the line and blocked the kick and Shepard of Bates recovered the ball and carried it over the line for a touchdown. Dennis failed to kick goal. Shepherd kicked off to Talbot who ran the ball back 10 yards to the 20 yard line. Bates attempted two forward passes in succession but both failed. She was penalized 5 yards on the next play for being off sides. Talbot punted out of bounds on Maine's 50 yard line. Carleton made no gain. Martin made 5 yards and then 4 more. Shepherd punted to Joyce on Bates' 8 yard line. Dennis made 4 yards around right end. Talbot was forced back for a loss. Talbot punted to Cobb on Bates' 25 yard line. Martin made 2 yards in three plays. A forward pass, Shepherd to Bernheisel, failed and ball went to Bates. Dennis made 5 yards and then Talbot punted to Cobb on Maine's 28 yard line. Shep-

herd punted to Joyce on Maine's 45 yard line. Talbot punted and ball rolled back of the line for a touch back. Maine brought the ball out and placed the ball in play on the 20 yard line. Shepherd punted to Maine's 45 yard line. Bates was penalized 5 yards for offside play. Talbot kicked to Cobb on Maine's 18 yard line and half ended.

Maine's cross country stock was somewhat boosted when the five men representing the University so decisively defeated Tufts a week ago. While Tufts presented a one man team the work of the Maine cross country five was by no means discouraging. For the past week the squad has been hard at work preparing for the state cross country race, the first of its kind in the history of the M. I. A. A., which is to be held at Lewiston, Saturday morning, November second.

The Lewiston course is practically all turf and presents a tough proposition for the men from this University to face. In the opinion of Coach Smith the race lies between Maine and Bowdoin. As will be remembered last spring Bowdoin presented the only opposition to Maine's distance runners, so this fall it will be a contest between the same old rivals.

The team which will probably make the trip consists of Capt. Richard A. Power, '13, Howard Burgess, '13, Frank A. Morris, '14, W. D. Towner, '14, and Roger Bell, '16. When the men leave either Thursday or Friday the well wishes of every Maine man will with go them for a victory means the first state cross-country title.

HOLDS BANQUET

West Maine Alumni at Portland

The West Maine Alumni Association held a banquet Thursday evening, October 24th, at the Falmouth Hotel, Portland. There were several members of the faculty present, besides a number of alumni from distant sections of the State, who were in attendance at the Teachers Convention.

Among the speakers of the evening were Professors Jones and Gray, Dean Hart and Dr. Aley. The latter discussed the many changes that have taken place at Maine this year. He spoke especially of the need of new buildings for the Chemistry department, and of a larger drill hall for military purposes. By request, Dr. Aley explained in detail the new method of admission to the University. Mr. Winslow, who was a former president of the board of trustees, told of his recent visit to Maine, and the feeling of pride that he experienced in noticing our growth. He congratulated the Alumni and Faculty on the large registration and the wonderful spirit that prevailed among its undergraduates at the University.

It was noticeable in all the speeches of the evening that the interest seemed to be in a general growth rather than in the field of athletics alone. One speaker voiced the sentiments of all when he said that he hoped to see the University grow to 1500 within five years.

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EDITORIAL.

The first game of the State championship football series is over, and Maine still holds her position as we had hoped! The work of the team has increased, if possible, that confidence which we had in it, and made stronger our hope for future victories. Last Saturday has passed, and as the excitement of that game bears us we must turn our enthusiasm toward the game of next Saturday. Profiting from the experiences of the last game the showing which the student body will make in Waterville should display every material improvement.

From now on the support of the student body should be given daily in the afternoon practice.

The team needs such support and can accomplish more if it is given to them. Given this enthusiastic backing we can, with absolute confidence, trust to our team the football honor of Maine in the coming games.

On last Saturday far too large a number of students failed to take the special train because of the rainy weather. As things later turned out they had very great reason to regret this failure. If the regret was keen enough there should be no lack of numbers on our next special train. More than this, we will be playing our last game of the season away from the home grounds, and will take the last trip of the whole year. The game itself promises to be a very important one in the series. In fact, everything is offered which would be desirable to make the day one of great interest. For these reasons there should be five hundred take the trip to Waterville where last Saturday there were barely two hundred and fifty. Then at least there will be fewer who will have cause to regret their failure to go; and we will be more truly representing Maine and Maine spirit.

There were two things noticeable on Saturday which can and should be remedied before the game with Colby. The first of these is in the singing of the "Stein Song" and "Our Director." To be sure it is difficult to do the snake dance on a muddy street and sing at the same time; but on the bleachers or while marching the songs should be sung by *all*. If any, at this time, do not know these songs now is the time to learn.

The second thing for which we should prepare is more united cheering. Necessarily the arrangement of the bleachers separates, somewhat, the students, but by carefully watching the leaders the cheers can be given together and with much greater force.

Now is the time for determined and efficient action. We are in the middle of our championship contest. Two weeks from now will be too late to decide the best things to do and to try. If ever we need to work together it is *now*. And thus with united action, confident but not overconfident, enthusiastic but not careless in our enthusiasm, let our entire student body go to Waterville Saturday and support Our Team and Maine.

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In connection with the eleventh annual meeting of the Maine Teacher's Association, in Portland, last week it is interesting to **Teachers' Convention** note the part which members of our faculty took in the various exercises.

The presence of men from the University of Maine is of importance as showing the close relation which our institution bears to the secondary and even lower schools of our state.

At that convention were present nearly four thousand teachers and educators from all sections of Maine. Meeting as they did in the interests of the schools of our state and with the desire to discover the best means of improving existing standards, it is easy to see how there would enter into the discussion a consideration of the relation of the lower schools to the colleges and especially to Maine, the state's own college. In this connection it is gratifying to know that Dr. Aley and some of the leading professors of the University were there to represent Maine.

All the practical results of the Teacher's Convention perhaps could not be enumerated. Surely, however, it tended to show that, as a state, we are giving more serious thought to the development of our whole educational system and are trying to advance it to a stage of more efficiency and greater cooperation in all its phases. The part of the University of Maine is by no means small and our standing as the State college is coming to be more and more recognized.

In the midst of our football season there comes a time when all alumni who are within possible reach of Orono should come back to **Maine Night** the college once more. At this time there can be a renewing of old friendships and a strengthening and deepening of Maine spirit.

On Nov. 8, the night before the Bowdoin game, will be held once more the annual "Maine Night" exercises. Careful plans are being made by the committee in charge, and a good program has been arranged. We hope to have Governor Plaisted and his staff as guests, as well as other prominent men. Already twenty-five hundred invitations have been sent out.

"Maine Night" has come to mean more than a football rally; it has reached a stage where it is indeed a "Maine" night, where the spirit of the college and the unity of students and alumni is shown. For this reason *all* the students and *all* the alumni who can possibly be present should make every effort to make this the best and biggest "Maine Night" which we have yet held.

BOWDOIN BEATEN

Colby Wins 20-10

As Maine's closest contender for State Championship honors, Colby led off with a decided victory when Fraser and Lowney ran up a score of 20 points against Bowdoin's 10 last Saturday at Whittier Field. Bowdoin was unable to stop the fast Colby backfield and it was only near the end of the game that the Black and White went over the line for a touchdown. The first score came in the second period when Lowney received Faulkner's punt on his forty yard line and ran sixty yards for a touchdown. Fraser kicked goal. In the first few minutes of the second half while Colby had the ball on her own forty-five yard line, Fraser dug through center for another long run and the second touchdown. After line plunging had again brought the ball within striking distance, Lowney was sent around left end and with good interference covered twelve yards for Colby's last score. A field goal by La Casce and a touchdown by Weatherill netted Bowdoin her ten points.

DEBATING CLUB SMOKER

A Rousing Success

A lot of enthusiasm was shown in the Debating Club Smoker held in the lounging room at Hannibal Hamlin Hall on the evening of Tuesday, October 22. Interesting speeches were given by Professor Daggett, Professor Gray, Paul W. Monohon, '14, and President Aley, all of whom voiced the interest of the Faculty and the upper classes in debating, and urged all who were able to do so to come out either for the University Debating Team or for the Freshman team. They traced the growth of debating at the University of Maine from its beginnings four years ago to its present status, at the same time telling where Maine stood with reference to the other colleges of the state. An urgent plea was made for a team which shall worthily represent Maine in the coming intercollegiate debates this winter.

In the course of the evening's program, a very pleasing musical number was rendered by B. A. Ahrens, '13, who played "Hail Bright Abode" as a violin solo, accompanied by Instructor Harry W. Smith at the piano. At the conclusion of the speeches, the fellows gathered around the piano for a sing.

A large "M" of clay pipes formed the centerpiece on the table, while the words "University Debating Club" were outlined beside it in matches. The word "Maine" was spelled out in snow apples on a side table. The Sophomore Owls Debating Cup also formed a prominent feature of the decorations. The smoker was in charge of a committee composed of George C. Clarke, '13, president of the Debating Club, Philip S. Bolton, '13, and Everett G. Harvey, '14.

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AT CHAPEL

Professor Simmons Talks

At Chapel Friday morning, Professor Simmons gave an interesting discussion of the renewal of interest in agriculture in Maine, and what it may mean to the people of the state. In outlining the history of agriculture in the United States, he said that New England agriculture was begun by the Pilgrims. These people introduced a self-sufficing system which was in vogue in their native land at that time, and which maintained a foothold in New England until recently. The systems introduced in other parts of the country were different. In the South, the demand for cotton and tobacco gave rise to commercial crops.

In Maine, the self-sufficing system provided families with clothing and food, but very little money was in circulation; for it was needed by the lumbering and fishing industries, which were conducted on a commercial basis. The result of these conditions was that many young men left the farms and entered these industries. The discovery of gold in California and the Civil War were also detrimental to Maine agriculture; and, moreover, many men who were still interested in this industry preferred the Middle West where implements and soil were better.

The introduction of the commercial method of agriculture in this state was due to several causes. The most important of these were improved means of transportation and a desire to grow only crops which the climate and soil were suitable.

One of the first steps in commercial farming was the development of the potato industry. The extent to which this product is now grown is shown by the fact that Maine raises enough in a year to furnish a peck to each person in the United States. Other important products are eggs, cream and sweet corn. Enough eggs are produced so that every person in this country could have one for breakfast every morning in the year with a half an egg more for some other use. Large quantities of cream are sent to Boston; while in the sweet corn industry, Maine ranks third in production and first in quality.

The result of this method of farming is far reaching. Interest has been renewed, and many young men now prefer to remain on the farm; proof of which is found in the increased attendance at agricultural schools and colleges.

In closing, Professor Simmons said that even in various kinds of engineering work the influence of this revival is felt. More electric railways, better roads, and progress in all engineering work are made necessary by increased interest in agriculture.

FIRST CHAMPIONSHIP

Maine Takes it in Cross Country

Maine added another championship to her list for the present year by taking four out of the first five places in the first Intercollegiate Cross Country Meet ever held by the colleges of Maine which took place last Saturday morning in Lewiston. Maine finished first with twenty points, Bowdoin second with 45, Bates third with 62, and Colby last with 102.

At the crack of the pistol Parker of Bates took the lead and held it during the two laps around Garcelon Field. Just after leaving the track, Hall of Bowdoin went up to first place. He held the lead until he reached Pope's Hill, about a mile from the start, where he was passed by Captain Power, who kept the lead for the rest of the run. Bell took second place shortly after this and Towner came up to third just after passing the half way mark. This pushed Hall back to fourth place, and they finished in that order, although the Bowdoin runner was hard pushed by Burgess in the final lap around the track.
