MAINE LOSES FIRST STATE GAME

Forward Pass Does Trick

Bates sprung a surprise in state football circles Saturday by defeating Maine 5-0 on Alumni Field. The game was closely contested throughout. Maine was the more consistent ground gainer, while Bates excelled with the forward pass. Repeatedly Bates worked the forward pass in beautiful style gaining anywhere from ten to twenty yards. Shepard of Maine tried goals from placement four times without success.

The first period opened with Bates unable to gain at all. Maine seemed to have a slight advantage, continually holding for downs. Bryant was playing quarter and tore off some pretty runs. Shepard tried for goal from placement once from the thirty yard line. The period ended with the ball in Maine's possession on Bates 50 yard line. The ball was in Bates territory throughout the period.

In the second period, through brilliant work by Bryant and Carleton, Maine worked the ball to the thirty-five yard line where Shepard again tried for a goal, but failed. Bates ran the ball in 25 yards, but lost it again on a fumble. Maine failed to gain and Shepard again tried a goal from the 50 yard line. Bates was unable to make first down and punted, Danahy recovering the ball on Maine's 40 yard line. Bates worked the ball to Maine's 25 yard line. On third down Bate's quarter worked the forward pass to perfection, Dyer receiving the ball and carrying it across for the only score. Bates failed to kick the goal. Maine kicked to Bates, and Bates was forced to punt. Bryant returned the ball to the 35 yard line, and Shepard tried for goal without success.

Maine kicked off again at the beginning of the third period. Bates was unable to gain consistently and punted Danahy recovering the ball on Maine's thirty yard line. Bates lost the ball on downs, and Maine punted. Bates was again unable to gain and kicked. Maine worked the ball to Bates 25 yard line only to lose it on incomplete forward pass. Bates got several good gains and worked a splendid forward pass. The period ended with the ball on Bates possession on Maine's 35 yard line.

Bates opened the fourth period with a try at goal from drop-kick which was blocked by Baker,

Carleton recovering the ball. Maine failed to gain, and Shepard kicked for 55 yards. Bates punted losing 30 yards on the exchange.

At this point for the first time in the game Maine began to play the kind of football that trimmed Vermont. Shepard and Parker hit the line time and again for consistent gains. Cleaves travelled around right end and planted the ball on Bate's 10 yard line. It was claimed that a Maine back was caught holding, Maine was penalized 25 yards, and the chance to score was gone. Maine tried the open play in hopes of getting away, but the game was soon over with the ball in the center of the field.

Although Bates could not gain ground consistently through the game her backs and ends followed the ball closely. Maine was weak in meeting forward passes, and Bates worked them time and again for good gains. Dennis and Dyer in the back field and Danahy at end were a tower of strength for Bates. Baker played a splendid game for Maine.

Colby had the ball inside Bowdoin's five yard line in the third period, but Bowdoin's line was firm, and prevented scoring.

The celebration will commence at 8 o'clock sharp in the gymnasium. All the floor will be

reserved for Maine men, and the seats will be issued by tickets, which may be obtained a day or two in advance at the college store. The visitors will be seated around the running track.

SPUR TRACK TO CAMPUS

Trustees Considering Proposition

The distance of the University from the railroad station and the consequent difficulty of transporting coal and freight to the Campus, has led the trustees to consider the advisability of building a spur track from the Maine Central Railroad line. With this end in view they have consulted the Civil Engineering Department of the University in order to ascertain the cost of such a project and the civil engineers from the Junior Class, are now making a survey under the direction of C. B. Brown, professor of railroad engineering. Should the project materialize, the line will probably connect with the M. C. R. R. near the lumber yards in Webster and extend through the rear of the farm to the athletic field. Such a line would not only permit the handling of coal and other freight much more economically but would allow special trains to be run to the Campus on the occasion of athletic games.

EDITORIAL.

The defeat last Saturday was a bitter disappointment. It is all over now, however, and let's forget it until we meet Bates next year. It is easy to celebrate a victory. Any kind of spirit can do that. To recover from defeat requires real spirit. Maine spirit is under fire, and will be for the remainder of the week. It must not fail. Coach Wingard tells us that the practice this week will not be secret, and that he expects the entire student body to be on the field every night, and cheer as at a game. Our football team is in a tight place, and it is up to every Maine man to be on the field every night to show how much the team means to them. It is up to the student body to drive that team from now until the Bowdoin game is over. We believe, and we feel sure that the student body believes that the eleven is capable of defeating Colby and Bowdoin. Maine's spirit both in the student body and in

the team is receiving the severest test in years. Maine "came back" last year, Maine must "come back" this year. Coach Smith's statement in this issue of the CAMPUS states the case clearly. For the next two weeks each Maine man must know only the one word, "fight."

Parallel with the fight that the men are putting up on our Athletic field to make the football team, another struggle is going on, the race for the managership. We venture to say that 75 per cent of the student body do not know who the juniors, sophomores or freshmen are, who are working for the football managership. In spite of this, however, we will be called upon to vote for the manager and assistant managers of football probably in less than two months. What will be the result? The only possible result is the election of the most popular man.

Such treatment of the matter is unfair to the men who are out for the position and unjust to ourselves. We, as members of the Athletic Association, owe it to the men who have spirit and ambition enough to work for a managership, to at least recognize that they are working, and to investigate the quality of work that they are doing, and vote accordingly.

Furthermore, we owe it to ourselves and to the future members of the Athletic Association to see to it that workers, men of ability manage our teams and handle our money.

This all applies to other offices outside of the football managership, in fact to every office to which men are elected after competition. In the past, managers have at times found difficulty in getting work from their corps of assistants, simply because the assistants were laboring under the idea that they had the position "cinched." A marked degree of responsibility from the student body in regard to the election of its representatives and a general spirit that demands to be shown would work wonders, and we would not only eliminate the difficulty of getting assistants to really work, but we would be assured of good reliable managers.

The football management have succeeded in using a more attractive type of poster in an-

nouncing the games this fall than in past years. Some enthusiastic Maine men seem to have forgotten that the posters are for advertising purposes and not for souvenirs. In fact, the cards have been removed from the bulletin boards and other prominent places about the Campus as fast as the assistant managers could tack them up. Without doubt the athletic association would sell as many posters as may be desired by the students at a nominal price. The continued appropriation of the posters is, however, a hindrance to the advertising of the games as well as a source of expense to the Athletic Association. Incidentally, too, for all these reasons it is a pretty poor exhibition of University spirit.

We understand from reliable sources that only Maine men, Faculty, Alumni, and students, are to be allowed in the Maine cheering section at Brunswick. This action remedies a weakness of long standing. We go to Brunswick to cheer our team to victory and can accomplish this purpose to the best advantage as a compact body, all of the same intense feeling and unwavering enthusiasm.

DR. ALEY SPEAKS

Supervision of Schools Subject before State Teachers

At the first meeting of the teachers' convention in Augusta last Thursday, President Aley introduced the subject of supervision of schools and its problems.

President Aley said that the school, as a servant of the state, should produce good citizens, who have intelligence enough to judge rightly and conscience enough to do the right. It is the duty of the school superintendent to cooperate with the other school officials of the state to produce this result. In the states where state-wide cooperation prevails the best results are undoubtedly obtained.

The public looks upon the superintendent as the responsible representative of the school. It is, therefore, one of his duties to be able to meet satisfactorily all manner of criticism, and it requires his best judgment to accomplish this. Some of the criticism must be quietly ignored, but much of it must be refuted so completely as to close the case entirely. Public criticism should be met frankly, openly and fully.

The school supervisor must be able to tell what is lacking or what is unnecessary in his schools and how to remedy the trouble. He must make clear the boundaries of school duties and school work. In order to do this satisfactorily the superintendent should be allowed to use his expert knowledge without unreasonable restraint by the school board. He should furthermore neglect no opportunity to bring before the public the actual value of school work.

It is beyond the power of the supervisor to do everything himself, consequently he must obtain the best assistants possible. It is his business to know the characteristics of those who can teach, and to know how to use to the best advantage teachers who are not expert.

In his relations to his teachers the superintendent must be broad minded and sympathetic. He should know them, and be capable of interesting them in the problems of their work. In order to do this he has to be acquainted with the work that is being done, and he needs to be a helpful critic.

The most vital relation that the superintendent sustains is that which he has with the children of the school. He must make and direct the course of study. In doing this he will need all the skill which his rich experience and wide education can command. He must bring to bear upon the solution of the child problems. philosophy, psychology, knowledge of child mind, community interests, and historical knowledge.

FRESHMEN OVERWHELMED

Sophs Find Pumpkin Meet Easy

In the final events of the Pumpkin Meet, the track event of the year between the Sophomore and Freshman classes, held Tuesday afternoon, Oct. 24th, the upper class defeated the Freshmen 84 to 29. There were thirteen events run off with a possible 113 points.

O'Brien '15, showed considerable ability in winning the 100 yd dash, taking eleven seconds for the run. R. S. Ferguson was a close second, and Titcomb '15, secured third place, although he fell a few feet in front of the tape.

In the 880 yd run, Morris, '14, had his own way from the start, finishing a quarter of a lap in front of Luther '15, the second man. Towner of the Sophomores team, finished first in the mile run, doing the four laps in four minutes, 54 and two-fifths seconds. Walters, '15, landed third place in the mile event after a hard fight with Philbrook at the finish.

Although several college records were neared in a number of the events, the records were by no means equalled. The track was not in the best of condition and complaints because of it were heard from several of the runners. That the track was not at its best, was due in no way to negligence on the part of the class managers who worked their hardest to make the meet a success. The rainfalls a few days previous to the meet made the track heavy and soggy, and a number of holes caused by the formation of pools of water in front of the grand stand made running almost dangerous. In fact, Titcomb '15, and St. Onge, '14, fell and sustained bruises and contusions about the legs and bodies, but each man stuck and completed the events in which they were registered.

A COMMENT ON THE GAME

In response to the question: "Why did Maine lose to Bates?" put to Coach Smith on Sunday. the CAMPUS received the following answer which seems to cover the ground completely.

"It's the same old, old story over again. It's a story that is older than the pyramids and one that is repeated as often as the alphabet. Maine lost for the same reason that the Army lost to the Navy last year, for the same reason that Hackenschmidt lost to Gotch in 1908; in fact for the same reason that hundreds of other football, baseball, and track teams have lost when they were looked upon as sure winners. Un-

reasonable element goes hand is the re

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reasonable overconfidence followed up by that element of poor fighting spirit, which always goes hand in hand with this condition of affairs, is the real reason why Maine lost to Bates."

"In the first place we unfortunately ran away with Vermont. After the game everybody celebrated, and the players received the congratulations of every Tom, Dick, and Harry within a radius of five miles. Too much stress was laid on that victory! Too much importance was attached to this achievement! I don't say that it affected the Coaches; but it did effect the players and students, and after all they are the ones who either make or break a championship. On the night of the Vermont game the majority of the players and the students passed away into dreamland. For one straight week they dreamed calmly and peacefully. A bushel of confidence was delivered in their midst by the Vermont game. By diligent and constant endeavor enough "warm air" was daily accumulated on the Campus to cause this bushel to develop into two bushels, and so on until, at the end of the week, that which had rightfully come to us had been increased to gigantic proportions, until the load, to say the least, had become of impossible and unreasonable dimensions. The dream ended as all dreams end. The dreamers were fooled and the awakening was sad.

"We had no right to be overconfident, and should have no excuses to offer. Bates outfought us and demonstrated on this occasion that Maine lacked FIGHT. If you can check an overconfident team, you can lick them, for overconfidence and poor spirit are as inseparable as the stars. No blame can be attached to Coaches Wingard and Reilly for their work is being well done, and merits the confidence and esteem, of the entire University.

"Maine must get together and fight! Our defeat should be taken gamely and in a manly spirit, and from it we should obtain an impetus for stronger and harder efforts. We have had our lesson; and now it is up to us to aim high, to try hard, to fight as Maine men never fought before, to stick together and be loyal, and last but not least to prove to the intercollegiate world and the Alumni that Maine spirit is beyond criticism."
