FRESHMAN MOBS TRY KIDNAPPING SOPH PRESIDENT

Roam Campus Last Night Stopping Cars, Ringing Bells' Hunting Cows

Spring fever hit the members of the Class of 1936 early yesterday afternoon when they made an attempt to kidnap Milton MacBride, president of the Class of 1935, by storming the Phi Eta Kappa house. The attempt was stopped by Monroe Romansky, secretary of the Senior Skulls, when he climbed up on the Phi Eta porch and orated for several minutes, until the ambitions of the angry mob had been quieted.

A tense atmosphere held throughout yesterday afternoon and last night the frosh broke loose again. They poured forth from the dormitories in a large mob and travelled about the campus, doing what mischief they could. Luck was against travellers on the trolleys last night, for the furious frosh stopped one car, by pulling the trolley off the wire, and had much enjoyment, to the disgust of the passengers.

Not only were the men of the Class of 1936 involved in the fracas, but also the women, who turned out dressed for action and did their bit by ringing the Wingate Bell. A piece of fencing was ed to keep persons from walking on the lawn near Cushman Hall was taken, and used by the frenzied frosh to stop automobiles.

It was Don Corbett, cross country man, who did some fancy running last night and beat the freshmen to the cow barns, from which they had intended to extract a cow for parade purposes. Don did some persuasive speaking, and the cow was saved.

There are numerous rumors as to what will develop in the line of action today, but none had been confirmed at press time.

Hop Takes Place This Friday Night

Me. Rifle Team Wins Intercollegiate Title

The University of Maine Rifle Team won the New England Corps championship recently when they scored a 7439 out of a possible 8000 for the highest total among the six competing colleges. Connecticut State was second with 7431.

Maine's winning margin was acquired in prone-standing shooting where after losing the prone-kneeling 1848-1865, they edged the Connecticut runners-up by 23 points and the title. Both teams had previously shot a 1913 in the prone-sitting and Maine had gained a point, 1933-1932, in the prone-prone.

Donald Rollins, freshman at Maine, was the high scorer of the meet with a 758 out of a possible 800. Harry Gersoni, '34, and Actor Abbott, '36, were tied for second, each with 748. Other members of the Maine team were: Sidney Look, '35, Charles Tropp, '36, Robert Caben, '36, Frederick King, '35, Thomas Richard, '35, Craig Welch, '35, Ernest Cram, '35.

In recognition of the championship, members of the squad will receive appropriate gold medals to be presented later in formal ceremony. The team also represented the corps division in the national matches, not yet completed.

CO-ED DEBATE TEAM VICTORIOUS ON TOUR

Four Successive Wins Scored By Walenta and Bisbee On Penn. Trip

The women's debating team, represented by Ruth Walenta and Eva Bisbee, and coached by Herschel Bricker of the Public Speaking department, completed an eminently successful trip April 1 after a two-weeks tour to New York, New Jersey, and Pennsylvania in which they took part in six debates, winning four of them, the other two being non-decision debates. They were accompanied on the trip by Everett Page.

The four left campus March 19 and drove directly to Temple University in Philadelphia. Here the debaters argued the question in a radio broadcast: "Resolved: that housing should be left to private initiative." The Maine team took the negative and emerged victorious.

Haverford College, at Haverford, Pa., was next on the schedule. Here the co-eds spoke against a men's team in a non-decision debate on the question, "Resolved: that the United States should agree to the cancellation of all inter-allied war debts."

Next day the group was off to Hosiuni College, at Collegeville, Pa. This was again a non-decision debate, Maine taking the negative side of the war debts problem. Cross-examinations were allowed in this debate, adding considerable interest to the discussion.

On March 27 the team headed back north to the New York State University. This debate was the most crucial test. Miss Walenta and Miss Bisbee were again on the negative of the war debts question. Decision made, and Maine was again on top.

Upsala College, at East Orange, New Jersey, was the next scene of action. Maine, arguing negatively, emerged bearing the laurels for the third time.

The last debate was in competition with a Pembroke College team. Still on the negative side, the Maine co-eds came through for a fourth decisive victory.

The annual meeting of the Contributors' Club for the purpose of electing new officers was held Sunday evening at the home of Professor R. G. Wood on Park Street. The following officers were elected: Paul Langlois, president; Richard Wooster, vice-president; Ruth Lord, secretary; William Manning, treasurer; Professor R. G. Wood, faculty adviser.

Professor Walter R. Whitney spoke on "How To Sell a Manuscript." An informal discussion followed.

MAINE'S DEBATERS SCORE THREE WINS ON TWO WEEK TRIP

Men's Team Completes Tour Rhode Island To Be Here Friday

The men's debating team of the University of Maine completed its annual trip March 30, having participated in eight debates, winning all of the decision contests. The team was composed of Hamilton Boothby, '35, Max Rapaport, '35, Alfred Gordon, '36, and David Brown, '36. Delyte Morris, debating coach, accompanied the team.

In Boston the delegation was entertained by the Maine Alumni Association at a banquet given to the senior engineers who were making the inspection trip. The debate with New York University was given before the New York Kiwanis Club of which Daniel Chase, '08, is executive secretary. March 25, Arthur E. Silver, '02, a member of the Alumni Council and president of the N. Y. Maine Alumni Association, was host to the Maine team at a luncheon at the Downtown Athletic Club. Carl W. Weeks, vice-president of the New York Alumni Association, was also present.

A return debate with Connecticut State was held in Stevens Hall Friday evening on the subject of war debts. Conn. State was represented by Howard Martin and Norman Baldwin, while the Maine speakers were Hamilton Boothby and Max Rapaport. It was a non-decision contest.

Roger Heiler and Stanwood Searles, representing Maine, will meet a Rhode Island State team, composed of Donald Williams and Leonard Tamulevich, tomorrow morning at 8:30 at the Assembly of Orono High School. The debate has for its subject the advertising proposition and there is to be a decision.

Fourth Foreign Picture To Be Shown at Orono

On Tuesday, April 18, the Strand Theater will present an afternoon and an evening performance of the now well known German operetta "Zwei Herzen im 3/4 Takt," as the fourth in the series of foreign productions being brought to Orono.

Ab Dienstag, den achtzehnten April, wird das Strand Theater die weltberühmte deutsche Tonfilm operette, "Zwei Herzen im 3/4 Takt," zum ersten Mal im Orono zur Vorführung bringen. In New York ist dieser Tonfilm ein volles Jahr gelaufen, und viele andere Staedte der Vereinigten Staaten mussten den Film auf Draegen des Publikum drei bis viermal wieder auf den Spielplan bringen.

This picture played a continuous run of twelve months in New York and four months in Chicago, four times in Baltimore, three times in Milwaukee, and is now breaking records everywhere. Many Maine people have seen it during its run in Boston last year.

The story is that of a Viennese composer whose brilliant operetta is ready to be put on except for the waltz melody for which he has not yet had an inspiration, and a Viennese operetta without a waltz melody is quite impossible. Hedi, the heroine, learns of this, and without having made his acquaintance, appears alone in his house as an uninvited guest. Hedi provides the inspiration for a beautiful waltz melody, but leaves the house without disclosing her identity, and Toni, the composer, is so upset that he forgets the tune. This of course suggests excellent possibilities leading up to a satisfactory conclusion, all to the tune of "Zwei Herzen im 3/4 Takt."

No knowledge of German is required to appreciate "Zwei Herzen im 3/4 Takt." The afternoon performance will take place at about 4 P.M., the evening performance at 8 P.M.

Ernie Black, '35, and Harry Booth, '33, have entered the Patriots Day races in Portland, according to Track Coach Chester A. Jenkins. Black will compete in the five mile event, while Booth will enter the eight mile race.

Both men are outstanding track performers, and Booth is recognized as one of the most talented distance runners in Maine. He has been a consistent scorer for the varsity since his Freshman year in all State and dual track contests. Black, a sophomore, and twin brother of Ken, is ineligible for varsity competition this year as he is a transfer from Syracuse University. Although Ken likewise received an invitation to participate in the races, he declined because it would be necessary to break college training regulations while he prepared for Portland competition.

Last year the eight mile and five mile events were won by Whitten and Jellison of Bates.

TECHNOLOGY MAKES NEW EXAM RULES

Seniors and Sophomores Are Affected by Recent Change

New rulings regarding examinations affecting sophomores and seniors in the College of Technology were made public last week by Dean Paul Cloke, head of that college. The rules will go into effect immediately.

The new system definitely provides that:

1. An admission examination will be given to sophomores of the College of Technology at the end of this spring semester to determine their fitness to undertake the work of the junior year.

2. A comprehensive departmental examination will be given to all seniors in the College of Technology in place of the regular final spring semester senior examinations, as a basis for conferring departmental honors.

Date Named for Annual Prize Speaking Contest

The annual University of Maine speaking contest for students of high schools and academies within the state will be held April 28 on the University campus.

The contest will be separated into four divisions, declamation, extemporaneous speaking, humorous reading, and serious reading, with individual prizes of \$7.50 and \$3.00 awarded in each section. In addition, the four winners will be allowed the privilege of giving their selections over Station WLBZ, Bangor, in a special broadcast. Students scoring in first and second places will also receive invitations to participate in the National Contest, May 8 to 11 at Wooster, Ohio.

The field of discussion in the extemporaneous speaking contest will cover present conditions in certain nations of the world. Included in this group are Germany, British Empire, France, Colombia, Peru, Japan, China, Russia, Italy, and the United States.

Fifteen schools have already announced entrance in the contests but a much larger number is expected before the final day of registration April 15.

Dr. T. Everett Fairchild, class of 1916 of the University of Maine, is to be the speaker at the assembly at 9:45 A.M. Monday. Dr. Fairchild is now assistant to the President of Boston University and was recently appointed to the Directorship of the Summer Session of that institution. His subject is: "Thou Art the Man." Arthur L. Deering, President of the General Alumni Association, will introduce the speaker.

A two reel motion picture, "The Romance of Power," will be shown at the Strand Theater in Orono Tuesday, April 18. The picture will be shown in conjunction with the German picture and the regular feature scheduled for that day.

Nominations for Alumni Watch To Be Made Next Week

Feeling that there is a need among the students at Maine for a loan fund, the Student Senate, at a meeting held in Rogers Hall last night, decided to wage a drive to raise a fund of between \$1000 and \$1400 to be used for student loans. The cooperation of students will be asked at meetings of each class, the time of which will be announced in next week's *Campus*, at which meetings each class will be asked to contribute 50¢ a person from the class treasury.

Honorary organizations will be asked to contribute as much as they wish, remembering that their aim is to aid education and that such a loan fund, if successful, would enable from twenty to twenty-five students to complete their education. Funds will not be solicited from the faculty, but will be gratefully accepted by the Senate Loan Fund Committee.

A meeting of the Senate will be held next Tuesday evening, at which officers for next year will be elected, and nominations for the Washington Alumni Watch will be made.

A short discussion took place concerning the hiring of out of state orchestras for University functions. There is at present a ruling, made by the President, to the effect that no out of state orchestra may be procured to play at University functions. Discussion brought out the fact that past experience in using such orchestras has been unsatisfactory, and no action was taken.

President John Wilson transmitted a request from Superintendent of Grounds Glover that students be careful in their use of the University lawns at this period of the year.

Pauline Aiken '27 Receives Yale Graduate Fellowship

Pauline Aiken '27, now a graduate student at Yale, has been awarded for next year a fellowship of \$1000.00, the maximum amount granted this year. Miss Aiken was graduated from the University of Maine with the highest scholarship average in the history of the institution to that time. From 1927 to 1929 she was a graduate fellow in Latin and during these years completed her work for the Master's degree in English. Her Master's thesis "The Influence of the Latin Elegists on English Lyric Poetry, 1600-1650" was published in 1931 as one of the University of Maine Studies in English.

From 1929 to 1931 Miss Aiken was an instructor in English in the University, and since then has been working for her doctorate at Yale.

Richard Burnham, a University graduate in the class of 1929 and member of Phi Kappa fraternity, lost his life on April 3 when the canoe in which he and a companion were bringing supplies to a trappers' camp was overturned. The accident occurred in Main River, at Getchell's Rip, 40 miles above Machias. Burnham, in attempting to reach shore, was struck in the head by a huge cake of ice floating down the river, and sank immediately. Crews from surrounding towns began work immediately in an attempt to recover the body.

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Unrewarded Effort

If the Maine Masque were to drop out of existence and present no more plays, the student body at Maine would probably never realize it, for student support of the Masque is so small that it amounts to practically nothing. This fact is hampered home every time the Masque presents a play. Of approximately 200 persons who attended the last production of this organization, not more than forty were students. In other words Masque plays receive the support of about two per cent of the student body. This condition is a disgrace to the University of Maine.

Theoretically students attend this institution to get an education. Part of education is culture, and part of culture is an appreciation of good drama and a knowledge of some of the better plays. Each year the Maine Masque presents four plays, all of which are by well-known authors and plays of reputation.

A great deal of time and effort are expended in order to present these dramas. Not only do the members of the casts spend days learning their lines and rehearsing, but a great deal of care is put into the building of the sets, and much hard work is done in the direction of the plays. The reward is certainly not worth the time.

The result, however, is worth the time, because the plays are not amateur in their atmosphere, but are finished productions. They are as good, if not better, than the average stock company production, and they compare very favorably with the dramatics of other colleges throughout the country.

Perhaps it is the effect of the depression and perhaps it is natural indolence, but student interest in anything, if it exists at all, is very small. This is a dangerous condition, for we are told that the college students of America today are the leaders of tomorrow. If they take no interest when they are in college, what reason is there to believe that they will do so after they leave college?

When the support of an organization such as the Maine Masque comes largely from members of the faculty and persons who have no connection with the University and live in nearby towns, it is an insult to the intelligence and quality of the students of the University of Maine.

Considering the difficulties under which Masque plays are produced on the campus, the faculty of the public speaking department and the members of the organization deserve unlimited credit for carrying on this work, and if the students of the University are alive, the audience at the next play will be composed mostly of students.

TRACKMEN PREPARE FOR SPRINGFIELDITES

With a strenuous outdoor season ahead of them, Coach Jenkins' Pale Blue varsity cinder men have been practicing daily in preparation for the annual meet with Springfield College, which is only two weeks away. With an outstanding man in practically every event, the season promises to be a successful one for the Maine squad.

Perhaps the strongest event will be the 880 yard run which will feature Ken Black and Russ Shaw. Ken holds the present indoor record for that event with a time of one minute 57 1/2 seconds, while Russ has covered the same distance in one minute 58 seconds, a time which won him first place in that event in the State meet last year. Harry Williamson and Bob Pendleton, both veterans, are capable of turning in times slightly over two minutes.

Rod Mullaney, Mel Means, Chick Shea, Mit Attridge, and Earle Hill will uphold Maine in the dashes. The Pale Blue mentor expects that Rod Mullaney will be the outstanding of these men. Another veteran speedster is Elwin Moulton whose specialty is the 220 yard dash.

Bill Cole will be Jenkins' mainstay in the quarter mile run. Bill has been a consistent quarter-miler since his freshman year, and placed a close second to Arn Adams, Olympic star, in the 600 yard run in the annual indoor meet with Bates. Other men who should show up well in this event are Mac McKinry, Prony Pronovost, and Larry O'Connell.

Ken Black will be Maine's leading performer in the one mile run, with Don Corbett a strong possibility. It is possible that Joe Marsh, stellar miler who injured his knee last winter, will be able to compete before the end of the season. Before his ailment, Marsh was capable of running the mile in 4 minutes 26 seconds.

Maurice Goddard is by far the best Pale Blue hurdler. He captured third place in the high hurdles at the State meet last year and second to McLaughlin at the University Club meet. Goddard is also able to turn in fast time in the low hurdles. Joe Stevens may compete in both hurdle events, while Lew Hardison will enter the lows and Ralph Dougherty will run the high hurdles.

Harry Booth and Horace Drummond are leading contenders in the two mile run. Booth, a three year veteran, and Drummond, star of the 1935 cross country team, are both consistent performers and tied for first place in that event in the Bates meet.

Alton Alley is far superior to any other shot put man. He holds the indoor record not only for the Maine Armory but for the Harvard Cage, which he captured during the University Club meet. Alley has heaved the lead ball a distance of 45 feet 11 1/2 inches and is expected to do better before the end of the season. His nearest rivals are Hayden Rogers and Warren Kane, but neither of them compare with the heavy Calais athlete.

Alley is probably Jenkins' best bet in the discus also, but Don FAVOR and Hayden Rogers are not far behind him in this event.

The pole vault will feature Freeman Webb, present indoor record holder and State champion in that event. Webb has topped the bar at 12 feet 9 inches. Phil Havey has jumped over twelve feet and Dick Elliott and Alfred McMichael have cleared over eleven feet.

Freeman Webb is the only wearer of the Pale Blue who is capable of high jumping over six feet. However, Chick Shea and Bob Lakin should turn in good performances before the end of the season.

Phil Havey and Dick Gaffney are probably the best broad jumpers along with Mel Means, Warren Flagg, and Charlie Bunker.

Don FAVOR's feature event will be the 16 pound hammer. The "Blonde Viking" turned in an excellent record with the thirty-five pound missile during the indoor season and it is hoped that he will do as well out of doors. His rivals in this event are many, including Phil Parsons, Clay Totman, John Gonzals, and Hayden Rogers.

Student's Education First Objective, Says President

"Although salaries must be reduced and building must stop and other drastic changes be made at the University of Maine on account of the depression, everything possible will be done by the University authorities and myself to see to it that the students will continue to obtain the best education available," stated President Harold S. Boardman at the assembly Monday morning on discussing a topic entitled, "University Affairs."

President Boardman told his audience that the University will have to return \$275,000 to the state from its annual mill tax income of \$757,000. He gave this as the reason for the changes which must be in the University program.

"Since the state's amount of the appropriation was but one-half of the income of the institution, until 1929," he said, "the

institution has had to go to the Legislature every two years and fight for an appropriation. Finally, when the Legislature did pass the mill tax in 1929, the friends of the institution felt that all difficulties were over, but now the depression has turned everything topsy turvey and a great problem is on our hands once again." The large decrease in amount of available money will mean a positive reduction in the University budget, but a definite attempt will be made not to lower the educational opportunities.

"The student body at the present time knows more and has a better view of life than the one of 15 years ago," said President Boardman in his concluding comments. "I believe there are less problems today between the student and the faculty than ever before, and I think you are a great bunch."

VARSITY NINE ROUNDING INTO FIGHTING CONDITION

Season's First Encounter Is with Colby on Wednesday

With high hopes of getting outside by Saturday, Coach Brice has been spending the past few days in giving his baseball squad a final grooming in preparation for its initial contest of the year at Colby College next Wednesday afternoon.

The encounter with the Colby nine will be the first of four games to be played on the squad's annual southern trip, and will be in the nature of an exhibition. It will inaugurate a season in which Pale Blue baseball followers will have only four opportunities out of a schedule of thirteen games to see their team in action on its home diamond. The remaining games of the southern tour will find the team meeting Connecticut Aggies, Rhode Island State, and Northeastern.

With only three veterans, Lewis, Hallgren, and Romansky, back from last year, the Maine mentor has experienced considerable difficulty in developing a smoothly functioning nine. After several weeks of strenuous practice in the cage, however, final selections have been made for every position except first base.

Romansky and Hoyt will share the burden of the mound performances, with Hall and Osgood ready for replacement duty. Jim Sanborn will do the major part of the receiving, assisted by Blanchard, who saw some action with last year's team.

Just who will take care of first base is the biggest problem confronting the Maine coach. The leading contestants for the position are Nunn and Aldrich. Nunn, although possessing greater fielding ability than Aldrich, has not as yet been able to get his batting eye functioning properly, and should be displaced by Aldrich from first, the latter will be given an outfield berth because of his consistent hitting ability.

Second base and the shortstop position will be guarded by Lewis and Hallgren, respectively. MacBride, star of last year's yearling nine, will be at the hot corner.

In the outfield the choices to date are Walton, Talbot, and Henderson, with Hall, Honer, and Aldrich as further possibilities.

Sickness has done a great deal to slow up the team. Six men have been quarantined, and Higgins, a capable hurler, was lost for three weeks.

As has been the custom, three games will be played with each of the three other Maine colleges for the state series championship.

About twelve pitchers and four catchers have reported, and the work has only been light, emphasis being put on the pitchers working for control and getting into shape.

On Monday Coach Kenyon called out his infield candidates, and he was rewarded with thirty-two aspirants. Work this week will consist mainly of the stressing of fundamentals, snappy infield practice, and rounding the men into condition. Several infield combinations are being tried daily so that the Coach can get an idea on every player's ability in the field.

The outfielders will report late this week, and their work will chiefly consist of long batting sessions. As the first game is only two weeks away, the squad will have to be worked to the utmost, for the practice sessions are handicapped by limited time, and the outfield men will get little chance to shag any flies until weather conditions become more favorable and the men are able to work outdoors.

STRONG SQUAD ON HAND, FROSH OUTDOOR TRACK

It's the same men who performed so satisfactorily for Coach Chester A. Jenkins during the indoor track season that will compose the major strength of the University of Maine freshman outdoor track and field forces during 1933.

The genial Maine mentor is counting on the services of O'Connor, Huff, Collette, Ireland, Prince, Thompson, Sidelinger, Frame, and Roberts once more, and this galaxy of stars must produce if the University frosh are to continue their five year undefeated surge in outdoor track competition.

O'Connor is expected to continue his pace-setting exploits on the cinder path in both the 440 and the 880 events, while Jenkins has catalogued Huff for both the 100 and 220 yard dashes. Runners-up to the fleet Lynnfield, Mass., athlete will be Elmer Sisco and Maxim Dowd.

Of the distance men, Prince is undoubtedly the best, although Ives, Beal, Clark, and Peaslee are capable runners. In the high jump, Perkins and Ireland are on practically even terms, with the former

slightly the better of the two. Ireland, however, is the leading contestant for both the pole vault and the broad jump. Collette, seconded by Halle and Chapman, are outstanding among the hurdling candidates, while Collette, in addition to his running ability, has placed first in all freshman meets this year in the shot put. Thompson and Sidelinger are two capable men in the discus, and Frame and Roberts are the best in the hammer throw. Roberts is also expected to star in the javelin.

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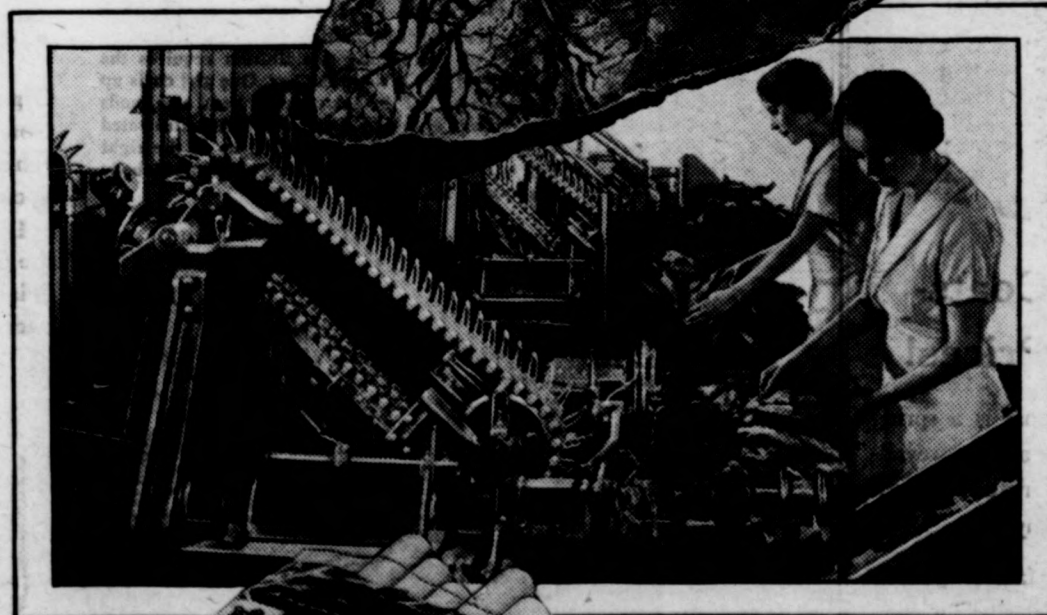
