Maine Track Team Pointing for Meet With Holy Cross; Daley, Stellar H.C. Dash Man, to Run

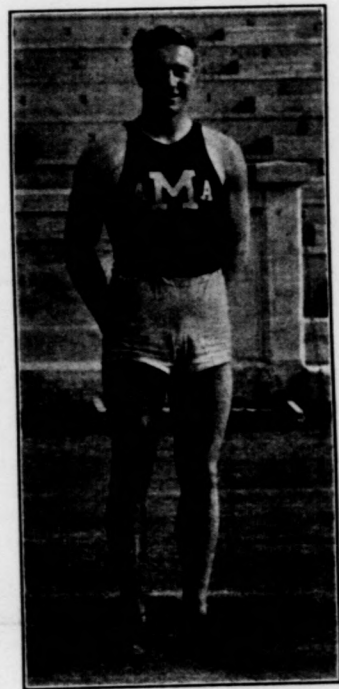
Poor Condition of Track Retards Progress Of Jenkins Men; Time Trials Being Held in Indoor Gym; Maine Strong in Field Events

Under the leadership of Captain Gowell, Maine will present a well balanced track team against a group of stars from Holy Cross on May 10, when the latter team journeys up here for the opening track meet of the outdoor season, according to Coach Chester Jenkins. Students will get a chance to see in the Holy Cross tracksters some of the cream of the intercollegiate track world.

Among the Holy Cross men running in the meet will probably be Jimmy Daley, who won the 70 yd. dash in the indoor I.C.A.A. meet in the time of 7.3 seconds. Coach Jenkins is giving his men a chance on the outdoor track, although the condition of the cinder path is poor and the runners are hindered by the baseball men who are practicing daily on the field. Due to these handicaps, time trials are being held indoors.

W. Jones Chosen To Speak in Contest

Winslow Jones was chosen in the preliminary tryout to represent the University of Maine at the State Intercollegiate Contest which is to be held at Alumni Hall May 8. The subject used in the preliminary tryout was "Peace." Professor Richard G. Wood, Reverend H. G. Spoerl and Mr. Grant Lavery acted as judges. The State Intercollegiate Contest will include representatives from Bates, Colby and the University of Maine. Two prizes, the first for sixty dollars and the second for forty will be awarded the best speakers.

RECORDS OF STEIN SONG DISTRIBUTED AMONG STUDENT BODY

Since the distributing on the campus of 1500 free copies of the Stein Song on the new flexible records, much interest has been evinced in the new material, and the process that produces it.

The records are the result of the discovery of a new chemical composition by Dr. Hal T. Beans, professor of chemistry at Columbia University. This composition, known as durium, is the outcome of a search for a cheaper and more effective material for use in making newspaper matrices; but due to its unusual properties it will undoubtedly find applications in many other industries.

The new material is described by Dr. Beans as a "liquid in its original form, which is transformed by subjection to heat into an insoluble, infusible solid which combines hardness and flexibility to a remarkable degree."

The application of the new composition to the making of phonograph records is expected to produce startling changes in that industry, for the new disc will be able to withstand the rough treatment that shatters the ordinary record. The new records are to be sold in drug, tobacco, and paper stores as well as in the music shops, in as much as special handling will not be required.

Masque to Offer "Escape" as Junior Week Production

Junior Week activities will be opened with presentation by the Maine Masque of John Galsworthy's comparatively recent play "Escape". A large cast is used in this play, the last production of the season, and many new faces will appear behind the footlights; among them will be those of Professor Bailey and Mr. Bricker of the Public Speaking department who are taking part in the plays which they produce.

"Escape" concerns itself with an English gentleman, Matt Denant, who accidentally kills a detective when they become embroiled in an argument over a prostitute who has approached Matt. For the murder, Matt is sentenced to jail, but he soon contrives his escape with the aid of a fellow convict. The play is then divided into nine episodes which follow Matt through his many contacts with different types of people in the countryside. Through various ingenious methods Matt succeeds in keeping clear of the law and it seems as though he would effect a complete escape when Galsworthy causes him to turn himself over to the police rather than allow a parson to swear to a lie in order to protect him (Denant). Throughout the play Galsworthy neatly introduces various bits of philosophy, all tending towards a brighter outlook on life and also effects a brilliant ending by bringing to light the truth that although a man may escape from his worldly pursuers, yet he can never escape from his conscience.

The play is simple and effective, and nowhere in the nine episodes and prologue is there any fatiguing discussion or action. It is alive and living, and best of all, realistic in the presentation which the famous English playwright has favored in preference to the expected sensational treatment which another less-experienced author would have given to a play of this nature.

The character of Matt Denant, the escaped convict, is played by C. Munro Getchell, who has ably headed many another cast on this campus. Getchell is supported by a cast of thirty among whom are several veterans of Masque productions. Myrilla Guilfoil, Jean Campbell, Caroline Cousins, John Barry, Atwood Levensaler, Smith Ames, Frances Ricker, and Philip Anderson, all of whom have had past experience, take part in the play and in addition several new faces are seen. Maine Nine Meets Colby on Saturday

Due to the seasonable weather and the good condition of the athletic field, Coach Brice has been able to put in a busy week prepping his baseball men for the rapidly approaching game with Colby at Waterville on Saturday. The squad is somewhat smaller than last week, but shows indications of developing into one of the best teams Maine has had for years. Not only does the batting show great offensive strength, but the groundwork and team play is steadily improving. Several practice games were held last week, during which some real technique of fine baseball was shown.

The outfielders have now had some real outdoor practice, and have narrowed down to five outstanding men: Hinks, Corbett, Lathrop, Palmer, and Kizonak. The pitching element is still somewhat uncertain, although Perkins and Solander are rapidly getting into their stride.

The line-up for the Colby game will probably be as follows: pitcher, Perkins or Solander; catcher, Wells or Palmer; first base, Smith or Horne; second base, Wescott; third base, McCabe; shortstop, Plummer; left field, Corbett or Lathrop; center field, Hinks; left field, Kizonak or Palmer.

From Colby comes the report that the White Mule team does not show anything out of the ordinary. Its main weakness seems to be pitching. Nothing definite can be said as to the outcome of Saturday's game, however; Colby generally manages to have some surprise in store for all Maine teams.

The team, consisting of eighteen or nineteen men, will leave for Waterville at 8:30 Saturday morning.

Maine Splits Dual Debate with Colby On Disarmament

By a vote of two to one the University of Maine was awarded the judges decision at their debate with Colby in chapel Tuesday evening. The debate was characterized by excellent speaking which was conducted according to the Oxford plan. The question, Resolved: That a plan of complete disarmament be adopted by the nations of the world excepting for the forces necessary for police protection, had been debated upon before by the Maine and Colby teams and both were very able in their presentation of the subject.

Maine, which had the affirmative side of the question, opened the discussion with Harry R. Mayers presenting the first constructive argument. Rupert Loring of Colby followed with the first negative argument. John Gehring of Maine spoke next and was answered by Arthur Wasserman of Colby. Charles O'Connor, Maine's veteran debater, presented a most effective speech in his usual quiet, deliberate manner, and George Sprague then presented the rebuttal for Colby and gave one of the best speeches of the evening. Harry Mayers then delivered the rebuttal for Maine and summed up the question briefly. Dean Cloke, chairman of the evening, announced the decision of the judges: Judge Edward I. Gleaser, Bangor; Samuel B. Gray, President of Old Town Canoe Co.; H. E. Bryant, Director of Debate, Bangor, which was two to one in favor of Maine.

On the same evening the negative of Maine composed of John Barry, John McGowan, and William Roche journeyed to Colby to meet their affirmative team. The team was declared the winner after a heated discussion between the opponents.

Soph Hop Attracts Over 250 Couples

Last Friday night, the class of '32 gave its first dance, in Alumni Hall. Apparently every fellow on the campus who had a tuxedo was present. There were approximately 250 couples present at the Hop.

Wescott Rushed to Hospital

According to latest report, the X-ray taken at the hospital revealed that Wescott's upper cheekbone was broken.

Yesterday afternoon Lee Wescott and Earl Taft were struck by a bat that slipped from the hand of a player. The big end of the bat hit Wescott on the left side of the cheek, and the handle hit Taft on the upper lip.

The accident, which happened in the indoor gym, occurred as the player was taking a cut at the ball. It is thought that his hands were slightly moist, and so the bat got away from him. Wescott and Taft were sitting on the players' bench near the plate, and the bat, by an unfortunate mischance hit the men. Wescott's glasses were broken, and it was feared that his eye was put out, but according to latest reports, it is thought that he will not lose the sight of his eye. Also, it is the opinion of those in attendance that his cheekbone, while badly bruised, is not broken. Taft had three stitches taken in his upper lip.

Wescott was rushed to the Eastern Maine General Hospital, where an X-ray will be taken today to determine the extent of the injury.

Wescott, who plays at second base, will probably be lost to the team for some time, if not for the whole season. He is a member of Phi Eta Kappa, the Senior Skulls, and was a regular on last year's ball team.

Taft who pitched on the championship ball team recently returned to school after an absence of three years. He is a member of Sigma Nu fraternity.

Intramural Cups Awarded in Chapel

In Monday morning chapel "Lon" Cheney, president of the Intramural athletic association presented trophies to winners of the Intramural track, basketball, and boxing contests.

The Charlie Rice Cup and the Intramural cup were awarded to Phi Eta Kappa, winners of the track meet at which four records were broken. The trophy for second place was taken by Kappa Sigma. The basketball cup went to Beta Theta Pi, and the Southern League trophy to Phi Gamma Delta. The relay trophy was won by the Kappa Sigma team composed of White, Chase, Battles, and McKinnery. The boxing awards were as follows: the heavyweight championship to Sigma Chi, light heavyweight to Phi Kappa, lightweight to Alpha Tau Omega, and featherweight to Phi Eta Kappa.

President Cheney presented gold boxing gloves to Bill Daley and Bill Kenyon, to Zottoli, heavyweight champion; Asali, light heavyweight; Vernon, lightweight; and Whitten, featherweight.

Professor Kent, faculty manager of athletics spoke of the hardships that Maine athletics endured in former times when the only gymnasium the college possessed was an old barn located in the vicinity where Aubert Hall now stands. He told of men training on an outdoor track when the thermometer registered zero or below. He spoke of the improvement when the Alumni gymnasium was built, and of the tremendous advantage our present day athletes have in the indoor field.

Professor Kent voiced his appreciation of the men who worked with him for the benefit of the Intramural Association, and to "Bucky" Berenson, former president of the organization.

President Cheney announced the opening of the tennis league and of Intramural baseball. President Cheney then spoke of Charlie Rice, his achievements at Maine, and his death in the service.

President Cheney stated that boxing has gone a little above the interfraternity class and should be taken over by the university. He ended his talk by appointing Asali, Robertshaw, and Hagan as a committee to take up the matter of making boxing a minor sport.

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The Administration recently sent the following self-explanatory communication to the Campus. We feel that it is a very fair statement of the case:

"There has been some discussion on the campus about the possibility of this paper conducting a poll among the students on the subject of prohibition. While the poll and its results would undoubtedly prove interesting to students and faculty alike, the administration has recently pointed out to a Campus representative the undesirable results which would inevitably accrue from the plan since Maine is a state university of a state whose citizens early adopted the prohibitory law.

"The administration is subject to the critical opinion of the citizens and law makers of the state. Altho the vote would be taken by the students, any unfavorable reaction to it on the part of citizens of the state would fall almost entirely upon the administration. It is certainly doubtful whether the poll, regardless of its outcome, would serve any helpful purpose commensurate with the problems which most probably would result. The administration therefore questions the advisability of proceeding with the poll."

The Maine-Spring goes on sale next Tuesday. This magazine, edited by Maine students, and containing between its covers the best literary work of the editors and other Maine students, is not receiving the support that it deserves.

With each issue, the editors face the problem of "selling" the magazine. It would seem that there are only two ways of arousing public interest. One way is to advertise the magazine widely and intensively. The other way is to have one of the stories in the magazine banned. Even with the aid of these two methods, the sales of the magazine are, to say the least, discouraging.

We submit that this state of affairs is one that should not exist. We firmly believe that an activity of this kind—one that is constructive and of an intellectual nature—is fully as deserving of support as any activity that exercises the body more than the mind.

The Maine-Spring should not need the undesirable publicity which comes with the deleting of one of its stories to sell itself. Each issue of the Maine-Spring should be a sell-out. Don't wait for the other fellow to buy one.

The Maine Water Utilities Association will hold their annual meeting at the University of Maine on April 23. There will be a dinner at Alumni Hall at 12:00 M. Students and faculty members who are interested in attending, are cordially invited and should see Dean Cloke by April 16.

Dean Paul Cloke is to be the speaker at the Twentieth Century Club on April 14. His subject will be The Industrial Revolution.

At the Conversation Club which meets at Prof. M. D. Jones' April 18, Dean Paul Cloke will be the leader in a discussion on the subject of Maine Water Power.

As a delegate of the University of Maine Dean Paul Cloke will attend the dedication exercises of the new Materials Testing Laboratory of the University of Illinois at Urbana, Illinois, May 2 and 3.

Thursday the 24th of April affords Tech men something of interest. Mr. Geo. 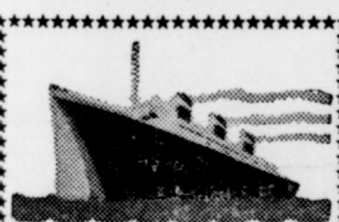

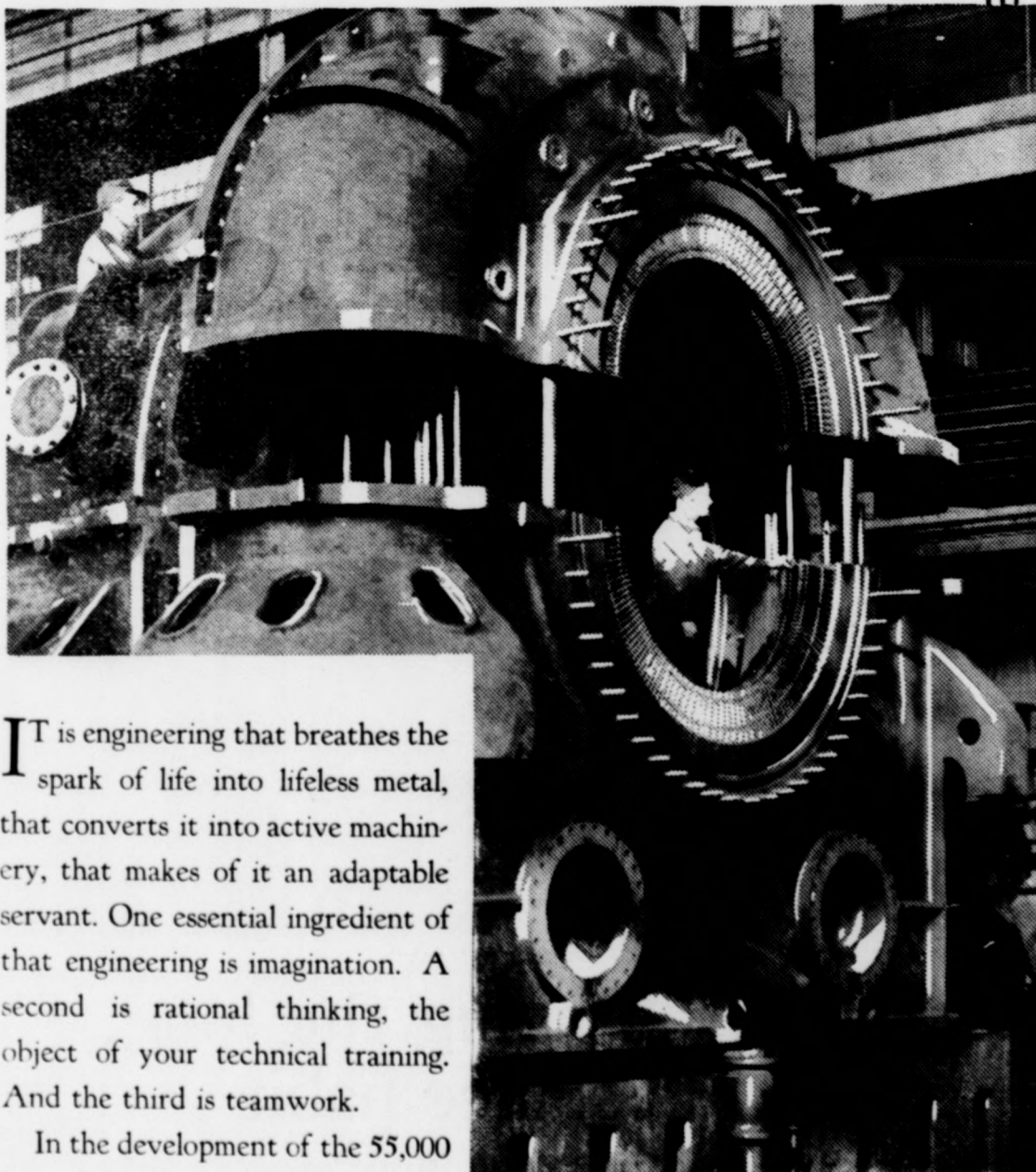
