MAINE TRACKSTERS MEET SPRINGFIELD IN DUAL ENCOUNTER

Massachusetts Team Comes
To Orono Sat. with
Strong Outfit

WEBB NOT TO COMPETE

Hurdles, Dashes, and Weight
Events Look To Be Evenly
Matched for Meet

The varsity track team will open its outdoor season Saturday afternoon when it will compete against Springfield College in a dual meet. Springfield comes here with a strong outfit and last week it defeated Wesleyan College by a comfortable margin. The team from western Massachusetts was the winner of the Eastern Intercollegiate Track Meet last year and defeated New Hampshire a week later after the latter had copped the New England at Cambridge.

Springfield boasts of two excellent dash men in Wheeler and Haight. In the 440, it has Jaeger, holder of the indoor N.E. A.A.U. title for the quarter mile. Brown is their best dash man and against Wesleyan he turned in a 22" time for a first place. The chief representative in the mile will be Olmstead, who scored in several important meets last season.

Both the low and high hurdles will bring together two former preparatory school rivals and should be two of the feature races of the dual. The visitor, Shaw, running for Worcester Academy, was Bill Floring's opponent while Bill ran for Huntington Prep. Shaw has developed.

Stevenson's Famed Novel
Tomorrow Evening

Tomorrow evening in Alumni Hall the Longer Play group will present "Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde," the dramatization of the Stevenson novel. The play is sponsored by the Maine Masque.

The cast has been assigned as follows: Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde, George Stinchfield; J. C. The play is directed by Stanley Protas.

Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde is a difficult play to stage, since it is necessary for the person playing the role of Dr. Jekyll to change to that of Hyde on the stage and in full view of the audience. Only by constant experiment have the cast and directors succeeded in working out the manner in which the transformation will take place; the results, however, are gratifying, and those attending the production are assured of a realistic and breath-taking performance.

Two Alumni Awarded Clark U. Scholarship

Among the eighty-two students who have been awarded scholarships and fellowships by Clark University for the academic year of 1932-33, there are to be noted two men who have received degrees from the University of Maine.

David E. Barker, who received his A.B. degree from Maine in 1931 and who is at present an instructor in the economics department, was awarded a scholarship as a special student in economics. Barker is a member of Beta Theta Pi fraternity.

Lyle L. Schmitter was awarded a fellowship in economics and sociology. Schmitter received his master of arts degree from the University of Maine in 1929.

11,000 VOLTS KILL FIRST MAINE GRAD

B. F. Gould '72 Would Have
Attended Commencement.
Owned Calif. Ranch

Benjamin Flint Gould, the first man to receive a diploma from the Maine State College, now the University of Maine, was accidentally electrocuted last Thursday morning at his home in Colusa, California. He came in contact with an electrically charged fence wire when he rushed blindly to the aid of his son-in-law, J. R. Dunham, who had been electrocuted a moment before.

A power line had blown down on the fence a few miles away. Dunham happened to touch the fence while passing through the gate near his home. He was immediately enveloped in flames. Gould, seeing Dunham's body burning as he drove by in his car a moment later, leaped out and ran to his side. As soon as he touched Dunham he was electrocuted and fell to the ground. He failed to heed the warning of a woman who had yelled, "Don't touch him," as he ran to the fence. 11,000 volts of electricity passed thru his body.

Gould, 80 years old, had planned to attend the commencement exercises and alumni gatherings at the University in June. His class of six men received their diplomas from the Maine State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts in August, 1872. He entered as an engineer in 1868.

Ben Gould was born in Madison, Me., on Christmas Day, 1852. After graduating from the University in 1872, he went west, where he has spent most of his life. He settled in Colusa, California, and has led an active and busy life as an engineer. At the time of his death he was living on a large ranch near Colusa. He has been for the past ten years President of the Board of Trustees and Manager of Representatives of Reclamation District 1004 in the Sacramento Valley, in California.

KENTS HILL TRAMPLES OVER FRESHMAN NINE

Trying vainly to find themselves, the frosh baseballers went down before the fierce onslaught of the invaders from Kent's Hill on Friday afternoon to the score of 22-1. The freshmen were overwhelmed from the beginning but battled gamely through the whole game to stem the tide.

It was the first game for the yearlings and many of the men in uniform had had but two or three days practice. Coach Kenyon used the game as a means of trying out the raw material to see where his men should be placed. Many of the men out have been high and prep school stars, and many others show decided promise.

Seven different pitchers were tried out during the course of the game, and several different styles of ball were demonstrated. Most of the pitchers lacked control, and many men were walked to first, but with experience behind him, Coach Kenyon should have but little trouble on the mound.

Red Walton starred for the frosh, making the first safe hit and two others in four trips to the plate. Good backing up was displayed, but getting the team to act as a unit will be the requisite necessary to make a winning team.

The next game will be played against Eastern Maine Conference Seminary on Monday, May 2.

KAPPA GAMMA PHI AWARDS PRIZES TO H. S. EDUCATORS

And Deering Selected
For First Places

High school journalists from all sections of the state attended the Tenth Annual Journalistic Conference held here last Friday and Saturday, sponsored by Kappa Gamma Phi, honorary journalistic fraternity. First prize for the best high school newspaper in the state went to Station E. L. H. S. published by Edward Little High School of Auburn. The Amethyst, yearbook of Deering High School, was awarded the cup for the best yearbook, and The Nautilus of Waterville High School won the prize in the magazine group.

Round table discussions on Friday afternoon followed an address by Dean of Men L. S. Corbett. Frank L. Perrin, executive editor of the Christian Science Monitor, was the speaker on Friday evening at a banquet given at the Phi Gamma Delta house. Seventeen Will Attend Their Fiftieth Reunion

A majority of the seventeen members of the class of 1882 at the University of Maine now living plan to attend the fiftieth reunion of their class on Alumni Day, June 11. Of the thirty-two members originally in the class, fifteen have died since their graduation in 1882.

Members of this class have found homes in varying parts of the United States. There is one member each in California, Colorado, Texas, Washington, New Jersey, Minnesota, three in Massachusetts, and eight in Maine. Professions are well represented, there being: three legislators, a manufacturer, a salesman, a grocer, a farmer, a retailer, three engineers, a lumber scaler, a teacher, two lawyers, a doctor, and a grain jobber.

ROBBERS GET AWAY WITH \$250 LOOT IN FRATERNITY HOUSES

Phi Gam and Delta Tau Are
Victims for Second
Time This Year

POLICE HAVE NO CLUES

Successive Breaks Have Been
Reported in Other New
England Colleges

Six fraternity houses on the campus were looted last Wednesday night with a total loss of nearly \$250 making the second robbery of its kind here this year. The houses hit by the burglars include: Phi Gamma Delta and Delta Tau Delta, both of which suffered in January from a similar break; Theta Chi, Sigma Alpha Epsilon, Kappa Sigma, and Lambda Chi Alpha.

Police were notified of the breaks, but thus far no clues have been found that would disclose the identity of the robbers. Evidence indicates that the robberies took place between the hours of two and five in the morning.

Goods stolen included money and jewelry, though most of it was ready cash. Police believe that the burglaries are the work of some person or persons familiar with the houses and the habits of the men in them.

Evidence that this series of breaks is the work of an organized gang is shown by the fact that similar robberies occurred on the campuses of four New England colleges on four successive nights. It is believed, however, that this is merely a coincidence.

In a bulletin issued March 15 plans were made for a division in the University Extension Department to include training in nursing. This department will be in charge of Prof. K. S. Rice.

This course will include adequate basic laboratory instruction that is essential to a thorough training in nursing. The work covered will be equivalent to two years' work in an ordinary training school.

The course, consisting of 33 hours, will be opened in September, providing at least 14 women register. A student in this course will receive full credit toward a Bachelor's degree. Moreover, the Eastern Maine General Hospital will grant 6 months credit to all students in this department, if they enter the Training School there.

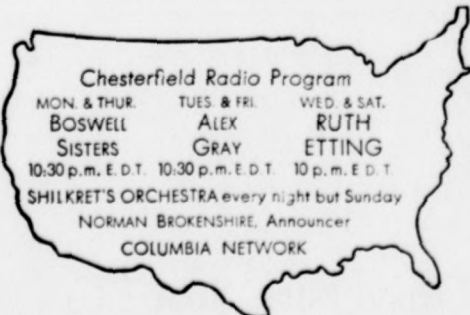
