Maine Outing Club To Meet Bates Here In Annual Contest

The second annual Outing Club winter carnival, to be held Saturday, promises fair to make an interesting affair of what would otherwise be a dull weekend.

Bates is sending a strong winter sports team against the Maine Outing Club, and will attempt to make up for the ignominious defeat of last Saturday. The well-balanced Maine team, on the other hand, will be weakened by the loss of Harry Booth and Steven Mank, snowshoers, both of whom are going to the B.A.A. meet. The Bates-Maine dual should, therefore, prove unusually close and interesting.

Action starts promptly at 10:00 A.M. on the field in front of Balentine with the ski-snowshoe relay race. This will be followed by the 150-yard snowshoe event, after which the skiers start on their long 7-mile cross country trek. While this is in progress, the 2-mile snowshoe event will be run, and the morning activities will close with the finish of the ski race.

At 1:30 P.M. the starting gun will sound for the ski slalom, or proficiency race. This event offers a certain cure for the inexperienced competitor who suffers from too much dignity, and is most entertaining to watch. It will be held on the slopes alongside the ski jump, directly across the Stillwater from the power house and within easy walking distance of the campus. Maine Professors Elected As Fellows In Science Group

Fitch and Dickinson Are Awarded Noteworthy Honor

Prof. A. L. Fitch of the Physics Department, and Prof. C. A. Dickinson of the Psychology Department have received notice of their election to Fellowships in the American Association for the Advancement of Science. Fellowship in this organization is dependent upon outstanding work in a scientific field, and although no definite word has been received as yet, it is certain that their election was based upon this ground.

The American Association for the Advancement of Science is the oldest scientific society in the United States, and was founded as an offshoot of the older English society of this type. The society grew out of the Association of American Geologists, which first met in Philadelphia in 1840. The present title was adopted in 1847. The Association includes in its members, men from every branch and field of science. Many independent societies have become affiliated with this association which has proved of much value to the progress of modern science.

The society meets once a year in some American city, the convention lasting a week. During this period, papers from

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Forestry Club Hears Lecture By National Forest Official, Kuhns

At the meeting of the Forestry Club held Tuesday evening, Feb. 10, in Winslow Hall, Mr. Kuhns, Supervisor of the Whitman National Forest in Oregon, was the speaker.

In his talk to the Forestry Club, Mr. Kuhns told of conditions in, and problems of, the Whitman Forest. The lecture was illustrated with an extensive set of colored slides, which showed conditions in the forest itself, grazing areas, fire control measures, wild life, and a set of pictures showing part of the forest in its primitive state. This area is to be left in its original condition, as it is expected that there will be very little wild primitive country left in 20 to 30 years. The area is not to be improved by roads, but is to be left so that the vacationist can spend a delightful two weeks wandering amid glaciers, moun-

The Sophomore-Freshman competition for girls held Saturday morning, February 7, was won by the Sophomores by the score of 30-17. Both classes were well represented, and a fine spirit of competition was aroused between the two competing classes. The excellent show of interest and good sportsmanship on the part of the first year girls was an influence on the decision of the "All Maine Women" in shortening the length of time that the hats would have to be worn to Monday, February 16.

Games of basketball and dodge ball, and a relay race and broad jump were held. The dodge ball game, the first event on the program, was won by the Sophomores. There next followed several relay races which were also won by the second year girls. The feature of the morning, however, was the basketball game which was won by the Sophomores by the score of 38-10. Two events followed the basketball game which were won by the Freshmen. They were the alphabet relay and broad jump.

During the contest, the Freshman girls wore red feathers in their freshman caps and green capes. The Sophomores wore powder blue stripes on their gym pants and blue bows on their blouses. Another feature of the event was a Freshman band, composed of harmonicas and saxophones, making its initial appearance.

Professors Fail On Examinations Given to Students

Tendency to Bluff Shown In Professors' Answers

A list of forty questions prepared by an engineer and a lawyer, were recently published in Scribner's along with an article by Thomas Beer. Twenty-five college students had flunked the exam dismally, and Mr. Beer took the occasion to comment on the ignorance of our modern young people.

The Spectator, student paper of Columbia, offered the same list to 53 faculty members. Of this number, only 10 would take the exam, 43 refusing outright to have anything to do with it. Only four of the ten handed in complete answers, and the highest grade, made by Prof. C. A. Manning, teacher of Russian literature, was 55.1 per cent. Close behind him were two more English professors with grades of 54.3 and 54.2 per cent.

At the same time, a number of students took the quiz, and although the highest grade in this group was 46, several students finished ahead of some of the faculty members.

The Spectator reporters said that the faculty members were nervous and fidgety while taking the test, and otherwise displayed signs of discomfiture, such as pulling at their collars.

That the professors tend to bluff, just as their students do, was indicated by the answer to, "Name three compositions of Brahms". The answer was, "The first, second and third sonatas."

Some of the questions proving the greatest stumbling blocks were "Who were the Piccolimini?" and "Who was Tillman Riemenschneider?" along with "For what is Abu Simbel noted," which question was not answered by anyone. The easier ones were such as "Name five makes of English automobiles" and "Name three living American architects." "What is chromium?" was answered in many different ways.

The questionnaire was a part of the Spectator's campaign against examinations. As for the questions, the Piccolimini were an ancient royal Italian family, and chromium—well, chromium is just chromium.

Frosh Beat Crosby And Lose to Hebron In Week-end Games

Using team "B" almost exclusively, the Maine frosh easily nosed out a weak Crosby High quintet last Friday evening at the armory by a score of 41-16. The yearlings held the upper hand throughout the four periods, and at no time were they even threatened by the visitors.

Topolosky started the ball rolling by putting in a foul shot. Berg then popped in three baskets to end the quarter 7-6. Kenyon substituted an entirely new group in the second period, and at the half the breach had widened to 20-9 in favor of the frosh. The original quintet was then started again, and the team just jogged along, lengthening the count to keep well out of danger.

Bob Berg was individual star of the tilt, dropping in ten points from the floor. The men representing the freshmen were: Berg, Dow, Merrill, Crockett, Topolosky, Weeks, Blanchard, Baker, Favor, Jackson, Osgood, Perkins, Wilbur, Comier, Ballard, and Giguere.

The Maine frosh basketball team were handed their second setback of the year by the undefeated Green of Hebron, last Saturday evening at the armory, by a score of 27-18.

Both teams started slowly, fighting hard for every point, but, after losing the lead gained in the first quarter, the Kenyonites were unable to solve the opposition's tactics, and Hebron, led by the flashing play of Jack Lockery, who shone offensively for the Hebronians, smashed its way through to a well-earned victory.

Towle, who up to now has been high scorer in every game, appeared to be having an off-day, but Stan Searles was the outstanding offensive man for the yearlings, while Giguere did his part in each side.

Dr. Little Speaks At Church Group's Annual Banquet

Dr. Clarence Little, in his address at the Student-Faculty Banquet of the Wesley Foundation Tuesday night, gave some advice to the students present. "Friendship between the sexes should be on an intellectual basis, rather than on a physical basis, and discussion will be found to be one of the surest foundations of such a friendship," said Dr. Little. He went on to say that mere physical appeal was a shallow basis on which to form a friendship. He went on to comment briefly on the relations of science and religion, and pointed out that many great scientists believe in the existence of God; this, according to the speaker, was one evidence of the rapprochement of science and religion.

Dr. Little forecast the development of the science of eugenics, and its application to the life of the man in the street. Dr. Little discussed the problem of those who were afflicted with incurable diseases, and said that it is possible that the future will witness the spread of the idea that such persons, a burden to humanity and to themselves, should be put to sleep.

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President Boardman And Mr. Crossland To Speak Before Alumni

President Harold S. Boardman and Alumni Secretary, Charles E. Crossland leave Friday on a trip to Massachusetts, Connecticut and New York to attend and address alumni meetings.

Western Massachusetts alumni will meet in Hotel Kimball, Springfield, Saturday night at which, in addition to President Boardman and Secretary Crossland, Dr. Mary Ellen Chase, 1909, professor of English at Smith will speak. E. E. Hobson, a law school alumnus, 1900, and a judge of the Superior Court of Massachusetts, is president of the Association and is to be toastmaster.

Monday night, February 16, the Connecticut Alumni Association will hold its annual meeting in the City Club at Hartford. Charles C. Elwell '78, public utilities commissioner of the state of Connecticut is president of the organization.

President Boardman is to address the Engineers Club in New Haven, Tuesday evening. He is then going to New York for a conference on the business of the Society of the Promotion of Engineering Education, of which organization he is president.

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A victorious winter sports team, fifteen strong, returned from Lewiston last Sunday with a beautiful silver trophy and the State Championship won by an overwhelming margin. Maine won with 49 points, Bates was second with 17, and Colby, with her five-man entry, failed to garner a single place. Bowdoin was not represented.

The morning events opened with the 7-mile ski race, which Greene of Maine, a freshman, won by a comfortable margin. Crocker and Burati, Bates, finished second and third, with W. Davis of Maine trailing in for fourth place. The 2-mile snowshoe race was won by a 40-yard margin by Whitten of Bates, but the remaining three places were garnered by Booth, Mank, and Robbins, all of Maine. Whitten's victory later proved to be the only first place that Bates was able to get.

Maine thus held a 12-10 lead at the beginning of the afternoon competitions. These she opened in impressive style by making a clean sweep of the 100-yard snowshoe dash, in which the Hardison brothers, Lewis and Clayton, tied for first, closely followed by Ashton and Robbins.

The ski slalom, contested on a tricky course which wound its way in and around the trees on the steep slope of Mt. David, was a difficult one to contest and a thriller to watch. It was won by W. Davis of Maine in 15 seconds flat, with Chick (Bates), Sorenson (Maine), and Carpenter (Bates) finishing in that order.

The downhill ski race was of somewhat similar nature as the slalom, but

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A CRITICISM OF THE "MAINE-SPRING"

For some time past the "Maine-Spring" has led a precarious existence. Recently, it was a moot question whether it would be continued or allowed to pass out of existence. We feel that there is a need for a literary magazine on the campus, and we also feel that under the right conditions, the magazine could be put on a paying basis.

Perhaps an inquiry into the cause of the present sickly state of the publication would not be inappropriate.

One of the most prevalent criticisms to be heard is that the magazine is too "literary" in tone. Any publication, to be successful, must print the things that its readers desire, otherwise the subscription list will shrink. And it would seem that the present editors refuse to take cognizance of this public taste. The common criticism says, in fact, that the magazine does not print the things that the average student likes to read. It may be true that the poems and critical essays by the faculty are good, but they are not what the student body likes to read. And it is to the student body that the magazine must look for its chief support. Therefore, a change of editorial policy might go a long way toward reviving student interest in the magazine.

Another factor that doubtless can be held partly responsible for the state of the magazine at present is the close censorship exercised by the faculty over the contents of the publication. It should be the endeavor of the editors to have all such close control abandoned, otherwise the editors dwindle to figureheads, with only a very restricted power over the destinies of the publication. It was not so long ago that the magazine became really popular (although there were no copies to be had) when it was found that a story in the issue that had somehow slipped by the censors, had been deleted from the issue, because it was deemed a trifle too sordid for the minds of the student body at this University. Any such censorship as was shown in that instance is a veritable blight on the magazine, and if the authorities wish to kill the magazine in the surest way, they need only to continue their policy.

A third factor that is perhaps responsible for the decadence of the "Maine-Spring" is the regularity with which certain people's names occur in the list of authors. The editors, apparently, make little effort to develop new talent among the student body; they apparently prefer to have professors write learned, deep poems, unintelligible except after a prolonged study, or to have them write essays on almost anything that has little interest for the students. A change of authors would undoubtedly do the circulation of the magazine no harm.

There are, to sum up, three reasons that explain the present condition of the "Maine-Spring"—a censorship that presses out all life-blood, a lack of consideration on the part of the editors for the taste of those to whom the magazine must look for support, and a general policy of not attempting to develop talent, but of being content to publish story after story by the same author. And in the last analysis, it will probably be found that the censorship is responsible in large part for the decline of the magazine. If the administration deems the editor competent, he should be allowed to run the magazine himself—if he is not competent, he should not be editor.

So, unless the policies of the administration and of the editorial board change greatly, it is probable that the "Maine-Spring" will not play any greater part in student life than it does now. And the University will be the poorer.

Book Review

BOOK REVIEW "The Edwardians"

By V. Sackville-West

For those readers who are particularly interested in tales of life in the gay nineties and the decade immediately following, as well as the reader who likes "Just a good story," "The Edwardians" is a gift of the gods.

In the preface, the author states that not one of the characters is wholly fictional; we can't help wondering what the reactions of some of the British nobility must have been upon reading the book. Probably, that is why it has become one of the most talked-of novels this season.

The object of the book is to show the change which has taken place in social standards and the life of the nobility since the Victorian era. The Edwardians lived in the transition period.

We learn how the "great people" lived their private lives. They enjoyed themselves according to their own morals, despite the social code, as long as the world did not know their faults. They were loyal to their friends and to their lovers, but would sacrifice happiness rather than suffer scandal. The story of Sylvia Rochester, famous beauty and friend of Lucy, and her love affair with the young duke, Lucy's son, is the principal plot of the story, but the sub-plots are so ingeniously worked in that it all seems one whole.

The book shows a keen insight into human nature, and is written in a happy mood. Anquetil, who lives through the story in a very obscure way, is really one of the principal characters, and it is through his influence that Lucy's son and daughter find themselves in the spirit of the present day.

PROF. WILLARD RECEIVES SET OF BOOKS ON MATHEMATICS

of greater length and with fewer turns. This was also won by W. Davis; Chick and Sorenson tied for second, and Carpenter and Simpson were deadlocked for fourth position.

The meet was impressively closed with the most thrilling event, the ski jump, in which Maine won every place. Robert Simpson annexed first place and the championship in sweeping style, while Wilfred Davis, the former title holder, had to be satisfied with a close second. Simpson also established a new hill record of 63 feet. Harry Davis placed third, in spite of a leg injury sustained when he crashed into a tree during the downhill race, and Herbert Trask cleaned up the remaining point.

Leif Sorenson, who did so well for Maine at Lake Placid, fell on his first jump, thus losing valuable points which would otherwise have won him a high place.

Wilfred Davis, with two first places, one second, and one fourth, was high-point man of the team with a total of 14 points.

The return of the winter sports crown to Maine, held by Bates for the last eight years, marks a turning point in intercollegiate winter sports in this state. Bates will now have to get out of the rut and meet real competition once more. This will not only revive interest on the Lewiston campus, but should also spur Bowdoin and Colby, the two quiescent members of the college federation, into activity.

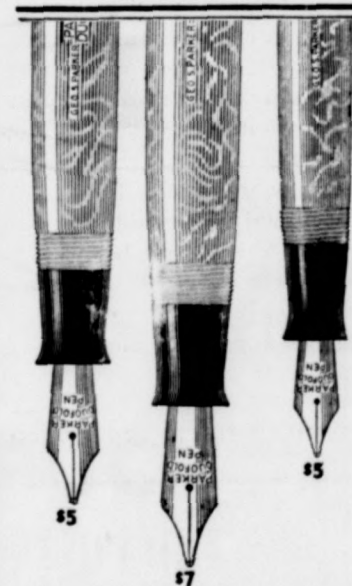

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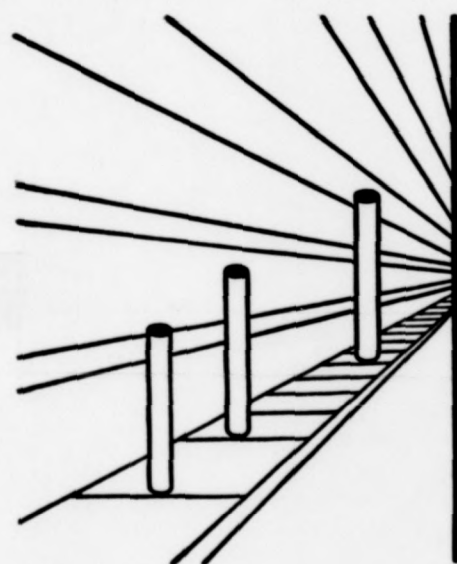
