GIRL SCOUTING TRAINING HAS HELPED MANY COLLEGE WOMEN

In each of the four corners of a spacious gymnasium a group of girls sits in a circle. Boyish bobs, smart nape-rolls, and hair in the painful stages of growing are bent over pieces of clothesline. A girl in the center is teaching the technique of knot-tying—explaining, as the lesson proceeds, how the various knots are used in camping, life-saving, and water sports. Another girl moves quietly from group to group, commending the quick-fingered, offering friendly suggestions to the slow.

A whistle sounds. Knot-tying ends and something else begins. A humorous charade and a nature-study lesson follow in gay, quick tempo. A game of bean-bags sends the whole group laughing and leaping over the wide gym floor.

These running, laughing girls with bright skirts flying are students of Girl Scouting. They are enrolled for a course in Girl Scout leadership—from one to two weeks of daily 2-hour meetings in the least crowded portions of the day. Near-

SCOUTING COURSE TO BE GIVEN HERE

A course in Girl Scouting will be given at Balentine Hall from February 29 to March 5 by Miss Alice Wagener of the national field staff, G.S.A., according to an announcement by Miss Helen A. Lengyel, director of physical education for women.

The aim of the course being given by Miss Wagener is not necessarily to turn out Girl Scout leaders, but rather to familiarize the students with the possibilities of Girl Scouting as an avocation. The course never lasts longer than two weeks, but covers the high spots of woodcraft and other scoutcraft, and includes at least one hike. Miss Wagener emphasizes particularly the flexibility and comprehensiveness of its application. The program may be adjusted to suit the living conditions of any group or locality.

The course at Balentine Hall will consist of daily meetings at 4 p.m. during the week of February 29 to March 5th.

WAR DEPT. OFF ON WRONG FOOT SAYS COLUMBIA STUDENT PAPER

Blames Authorities for Trying To Develop K.K.K. Patriotism

(The following story is reprinted from The New York Times.)

The War Department should withdraw the Reserve Officers Training Corps from colleges throughout the country and limit its training activities to military work, the Columbia Spectator, student daily newspaper, declared yesterday in its leading editorial.

"Not only has the War Department taken upon itself the work of educating youth in military science, but it has gone beyond that and tries to develop patriotism of the worst Ku Klux type," the article asserted. "It has likewise done everything in its power to discredit, without just reason, all movements directed toward pointing out the real motives for the Reserve Officers' Training Corps and the Citizens' Military Training Camps activities."

Objects to "Muscling In" Declaring that it would enjoy seeing the R. O. T. C. and C. M. T. C. disappear entirely, the editorial asserts that until that happens "we can only suggest that the less the War Department tries to 'muscle in' on fields not its own, the better younger America will like it."

"The War Department, we believe, is supposed to be an organization which keeps the army going in case a war should turn up. No one, unless it be a few Legionnaires and those numerous Generals and Admirals who pass their time making silly speeches, believe that the War Department and the Navy Department are supposed to guide our thinking. But the War Department tries to do just that, and in addition evidently wants to dictate the whole conduct of human affairs. It takes upon itself far more than it has a legal right to assume, and most of the legal rights under which it now functions were created during periods of hysteria."

"We feel that it would be an excellent thing if every nation had a law forbidding members of the army or the navy from making public speeches or writing books or magazine articles. We would go even further and suggest a regulation which would keep all members of the army and the navy shut up in army posts, naval bases and battleships, to be let out only when muzzled."

POET DESCRIBES LIFE IN HARLEM

Countee Cullen, Negro Author, Gives Vivid Chapel Talk

Countee Cullen, celebrated negro poet, gave an interesting and humorous lecture at chapel Tuesday morning on "Days and Nights in Harlem." He is a graduate of New York University, and received his master's degree from Harvard. Several years ago he studied abroad, and while in Paris, he accepted an offer from an American Lecture Bureau.

Life in Harlem, an entirely negro community in New York, was very strikingly portrayed by Mr. Cullen, who first lived there at the age of fourteen. The community with a population of two hundred and fifty thousand negroes is known as the American mecca of negroes. It is a hospitable community due to the fact that there are many southerners with whom hospitality is legendary. It has a very heterogeneous population which includes the American negro, the Cuban, the East Indian and even the colored Jew, who celebrates the same holidays as the white Jew.

Harlem is a colorful place, and is called the rainbow tinted city. The inhabitants are fond of pageantry, parades and bright colors.

There are organizations similar to those of other communities. There is a Y.M.C.A., a Y.W.C.A., a Neighborhood House, City Hospitals, Business Men's League, and Colored Merchants Association. The latter organization is to aid the colored man, who is usually the last to be considered in finding employment.

The churches play a major part in the lives of the negroes. These people are essentially religious, and take their emotional street meetings seriously without being ashamed. The Baptist and Methodist are the most prominent sects. In this community there are forty-two Protestant churches, two Catholic, and one hundred and one Jewish.

LOAN FUND PLAN APPROVED BY ALL CLASS EXECUTIVES

Success of Drive Seems Assured as Enthusiasm Is Shown by Everyone Concerned

The Student Loan Fund was adopted by the Seniors at a class meeting this noon following a short discussion. It was voted that a sum equal to fifty cents for each member of the class be paid to the loan fund from the class treasury, this amount to be repaid to the treasury through assessment on the next term bill. This will mean that approximately \$150 will be available for loans immediately. The question will be voted on by the Junior Class tomorrow at 1:00 o'clock.

SENATE ADOPTS LOAN PROPOSAL

Final Decision on Student Parking Is Still Pending

At a short meeting of the Student Senate held Tuesday evening reports were heard from the committees on parking and on the student loan fund. It was unanimously voted to adopt the recommendations of the loan fund committee to hold a drive by approaching the classes through class meetings.

The parking committee reported the temporary change, now in effect, permitting students to park cars in the rear of the Arts and Sciences building. The application for a hearing before the Trustees for a final settlement is still pending.

Following the adjournment of the Student Senate meeting a short session of the Fraternity Council was held, with discussion upon the subject of rushing. It was voted that a committee be appointed to look into the matter of the pledging date. Albert Smith, Harry Williamson, Paul Taplin, John McGowan and John Wilson were appointed as members of the committee.

With the officers and executive boards of all four classes having accepted the plan without a dissenting vote, and the official sanction of the Student Senate granted, the Student Loan Fund appears to be practically assured of success. Starting this noon, each of the four classes will hold class meetings during the coming week, with every student being given an opportunity to vote on the question.

The plan, as finally adopted, provides for each class being given the opportunity to vote on a contribution to be made from the class treasury to a loan fund for the use of students, this fund is to be administered by University officials. It has been suggested that each class contribute a sum equal to fifty cents per member, the treasury of the class being reimbursed by an increase in class dues when they are next collected.

The matter of raising a loan fund was first brought up at a meeting of the Student Senate, several weeks ago. A committee was appointed to determine the best course of action, with the above plan as the result. This plan met with approval of the Senate at its last meeting, Tuesday evening.

It is the aim of the committee in charge to raise \$1,000. If each class adopts the plan which has been recommended, approximately \$750 will be accounted for. Members of the faculty will be asked to contribute, and it is expected that by this means the goal will be reached.

Following the example set by the senior class officers, who heartily approved this plan when it was outlined to them last week, the executive officers of every other (Continued on Page Three)

Music Night Program Uncovers Fine Talent

Scoring a financial as well as social success, Delta Pi Kappa, honorary musical fraternity, presented the annual music night program before an appreciative audience in Alumni Hall last Friday night. Following the musical program in the auditorium by the chorus, band, orchestra, and individual artists, a stag dance took place in the gymnasium with music furnished by Smith Ames' Orchestra.

Bessie Gray, freshman from Van Buren, played her violin solo so artfully that she was called back twice for encores, and Miss Ruth Hamor '34 rendered a vocal solo with exceptional skill. These two artists, though from the lower two classes of the university, carried off the honors for solo work during the evening.

MANY OTHER UNIVERSITIES NOW HOLDING LOAN FUND CAMPAIGNS

The University of Maine, in starting a drive to raise money for a loan fund, is doing no different than many other colleges all over the country at the present time. The manner in which different colleges have attempted to raise these funds have differed, as have the goals which have been set. In many cases contributions have been solicited from sources other than the students and faculty. Decreases in salaries have been resorted to by some colleges. Several representative cases cast an interesting sidelight on the effect of the depression on colleges.

Facing an emergency which threatens to force five hundred worthwhile students to withdraw, the University of North Carolina together with student and alumni organizations is in the midst of a campaign to raise \$100,000 to be used as a student loan fund.

Two thousand students have contributed over \$1,000. Faculty members who have had one cut in salary and are about to be cut again have contributed generously. The community in which the University is located, the trustees, and the Alumni Association are all assisting in the effort to

Raise a loan fund campaign which will extend from now until June is in progress at Creighton University in Omaha, Nebraska. All students are asked to contribute at least one dollar, and the fund raised will be loaned out without interest for varying lengths of time. Loans are made to cover the cost of tuition, books, and school supplies. The money will be available to all students in the university in need of financial assistance, and without which they would be forced to leave school. Eight hundred and twenty-five dollars have already been loaned out to students this semester.

"Five cents a week for twenty weeks" is the slogan which has been adopted for the Student Loan Fund at the University of Omaha which is now being planned. This plan is estimated to net at least \$1500.

Among the universities where salaries have been cut is Ohio Wesleyan, where the professors have accepted a ten per cent decrease in their salaries in order that the university may balance its budget.

The Loan Fund Drive in Brief

THE ORIGIN—The idea was first introduced at a meeting of the Student Senate. The plan has been endorsed by all class officers and executive boards.

THE NEED—Each year some students find themselves unable to complete the semester without aid; seniors are sometimes unable to graduate. This year the need appears greater than usual. Present funds are inadequate—only a little more than \$200 is now available.

THE VALUE—A thousand dollars raised now would probably keep fifteen or twenty students in school who would otherwise be forced to leave. A senior with only a month to go before graduation could be given the aid that would keep him here. The fund will tend to increase as the years pass, and students can be helped each year.

THE METHOD—Students are being approached through classes because money can thus be put to work in the shortest possible time, it can be collected conveniently, and there is no overhead expense—every penny collected is loaned out. It is the surest means to reach every student.

THE LOANS—The money raised will be loaned through regular channels. All the machinery of the University will be utilized to select the most deserving applicants and assure prompt repayment. Students can always tell how their money is being administered by consulting the financial report of the University.

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A BRIGHT OUTLOOK

With the Student Loan Fund plan already endorsed by four class officer groups and no dissenting opinion having appeared yet the success of the venture appears assured. It is a worthwhile project, and is deserving of an enthusiastic reception.

In former years there have always been a group of students forced to leave because of a lack of resources. Many good students have been lost by the University in this way, some of them never to complete their course. Even in good years this has been the case. The outlook this year is more unfavorable than usual. But with the students and faculty rallying to meet their own difficulty, a solution of an unhappy situation appears in sight.

The funds in the hands of the University have never been large enough to meet the needs, and much of the money which has been available has been so encumbered by restrictions and conditions made by the donors that it has been impossible to use it where it was most needed.

If the goal of \$1,000 which has been set is reached much can be done this year to aid students. The money will not be restricted to any college, nor any group. It will not be based solely on athletic ability, on scholarship, or any other one phase of a student's career. The primary requisite will be need of money to continue at the University.

It is a modest sum that has been asked of each person. No great hardship will result to anyone. The money will be available for use immediately, but students will have plenty of time before they must pay their share.

Every cent of the money pledged by students will be used for loans. There is no overhead expense whatever.

Many colleges have already raised money in this way. The University of Maine is not in so severe a situation as some of them, and by taking this step early it is proving itself well prepared to cope with the situation should it get worse.

The drive has made excellent progress so far. With the continued support of the students it will soon be brought to a successful conclusion.

KEEP ABREAST OF THE TIMES

If students were as sensitive to the pain of severe criticism as is the President of the United States, they certainly would take more interest in the statements which brand them as being "abysmally ignorant" of current events.

Time and again the apparent lack of interest of college undergraduates in world and national affairs has stirred up vigorous attacks on the intelligence of the average college student. Intelligent men and women are appalled to hear that some college students peruse only the sports and comic sections of the newspapers.

"How can an intelligent, wide-awake young person fail to be interested in the daily events which are making history? Is it possible that an educated man or woman could be so unimaginative or so totally lacking in curiosity that he or she would not be interested in the conditions and events which are shaping the destiny of the world?"

Such questions as these indicate the importance which educated people ascribe to the desire of keeping in touch with the spirit of the times.

It is so easy to keep abreast of the times that people who are in the dark concerning world conditions seem ridiculous as well as stupid. The daily reading of a good newspaper for a half-hour, or even less, is sufficient to acquaint anyone of average intelligence with that information which sheds light on the world.

The feature of the meet was the 300 yard dash between Red Mullaney, frosh ace, and Ollie Borden, Bridgton star, which the former won by a scant yard after pulling away from his rival in the home stretch.

Arrest at C. C. N. Y. Assailed
The editorial criticized bitterly the action of military men at City College who recently caused the arrest of a 23-year-old youth, who, as a member of the National Student League, was distributing handbills urging freshmen not to register for a course in military science. It also pointed out that a week ago a petition signed by 327 college presidents, deans and other educators was presented to Congress declaring that both the National Defense Act and the traditional American policy of leaving education to the State and local authorities were being violated by the methods now used in conducting the R. O. T. C. and the C. M. T. C. The petition also held that most military men are not trained for teaching and are therefore usually incompetent in teaching positions.

and sixteen churches in the store fronts and in private houses.

Mr. Cullen showed the difference between the day life and the night life in Harlem. In the day time it is busy with the laboring people going to and from their work. It is quite different at night. It has been mistakenly named the "Summer's Paradise." The people who have received this impression have seen only the "speakeasies." The cabarets are patronized for the most part by white people. The negroes cannot afford to go as the prices nearly equal those of Broadway, and the type of entertainment does not particularly appeal to the negro.

The negroes find great enjoyment in the theatres where native wit and humor are displayed. The theatres are devoid of formality. The audience enjoys the same jokes and the same plays over and over again with only slight modification.

Mr. Cullen believes that the play "Green Pastures," is a failure in portraying the real religious emotions of the negro. He closed his lecture by reading several poems of different authors who had varied conceptions of Harlem.

Placing in the positions which were expected of them, the members of the University of Maine track team clinched second place in the Class B division at the University Club Meet held Saturday at Boston, with a score of 35½ points. Bowdoin won the meet with 43½ points, while Bates and Colby with 27 and 22 points respectively, finished third and fourth. The remaining teams tallied accordingly: Amherst 9; Wesleyan 7½; Norwich 2; Rhode Island 1½; B.U. 1; Worcester Poly. 1; and Mass. Aggies, Middlebury, Connecticut Aggies and Tufts failed to score.

Med Means won the 50 yard dash in 5½ seconds which was just as fast as the time made in Class A. Means got a great start and led Knox of Bates all the way to the tape by a scant margin.

The 16 pound shot was a victory for Al Alley, who heaved the weight 43 feet, a good foot beyond his nearest competitor, Larson of Bowdoin.

A big surprise came in the pole vault, when Freeman Webb, picked as a sure winner, was replaced by Bill Hathaway for first position. Hathaway leaped 12 feet, 6 inches to cop the event while Webb tied for second with Van Schenck of Amherst at 12 feet. Webb also tied in the high jump for second place with Odell of Wesleyan and Stanwood of Bowdoin.

Running around the final lap at top speed, Harry Booth tried in vain to overcome the lead of Whitten of Bates, and finished second to the latter in the two mile run. Both men ran a great race and at the finish were far ahead of the big field. Everett Gunning came in fourth position for the Pale Blue in this event.

Don FAVOR, competing for the first time in varsity company, placed third in the 35 pound weight and made a good showing.

Maine turned in the fastest time of all the relay teams and capped first place. In its race against Brown and Rhode Island, the Pale Blue outfit went into the lead at the end of the first relay and won out by 18 yards over Rhode Island. Timberlake, as second man, put in some valuable running to take the race out of the nip and tuck class and give his teammates an advantage of 12 yards. Wendell, Pendleton, and Moulton completed Coach Jenkins' crack relayers.

"You can learn more about people by working with them for a common purpose, say for a Girl Scout camp or Little House, than by meeting them in innumerable social ways.

"This brings up another advantage of Girl Scouting as an avocation. The girl who becomes a Girl Scout captain, camp counselor, or committee member is not merely taking up a pleasant and diverting hobby. She becomes a part of a serious educational movement and she can make of her volunteer work, if her will and her capacities permit, a creditable and perhaps an outstanding educational contribution.

"The short courses given in colleges and universities are, of course, only an introduction to the Girl Scout movement. Young women who find self-development and worthwhile work in Girl Scout activity take courses in the additional 'universities in the woods' which are otherwise known as national Girl Scout training camps. You not only learn Girl Scouting, you learn what real adventure is and what the real America is like by spending a few summer vacations with these Girl Scout student campers.

"One Girl Scout student group travels in a covered wagon 300 miles into the Ozark Mountains of Missouri. Another goes by boat down the Ohio River into the romantic Daniel Boone country of Kentucky, and still others study Girl Scouting in the Rocky Mountains, under the California Redwoods, in sunny limestone caverns of the Georgia mountains, and on pioneer trips which follow the trails of the old French Voyageurs of Minnesota.

"The student may make a choice from 73 different courses, including camp craft in its various forms, nature study, handicraft, dancing, games, and story-telling."

How Loans Will Be Made

The money which is raised will be created as a separate fund, the name of which will be agreed upon later by the Senate and class presidents.

It will not be limited to any size or group. It can be added to at any time, and in any amount. Either classes or individuals may contribute.

Loans will be made through regular channels, being approved by President Boardman after recommendations have been made by Dean Corbett. Qualifications will be general in nature, based on no particular college or course. Scholarship, ability, need, etc., will all be considered in favor of applicants.

Repayments of all loans are expected from the first earnings of the borrower following graduation. Interest at six per cent will be charged. Money will be loaned out as rapidly as it is repaid, and with the accrued interest the fund will tend to grow larger each year.
