Mr. Curtis who is acting as coach for the winter sports team, spoke briefly about the action of the athletic association concerning the award of letters to winter sports men. Any boy taking part in competition with other colleges and taking one, two or three places will receive his letter. In dual meets anyone taking first or second place will receive his letter. Mr. Curtis congratulated the outing club upon its excellent work in the past few years, and also spoke of the possibilities for this year's carnival with Bates.

Reed, President Turkish College, Speaks In Chapel

President Arthur Reed of the American International College at Smyrna, Turkey, spoke in chapel last Thursday of the work that is being done in Turkey by colleges founded by Americans.

President Reed said, in part, "Institutions perpetuate themselves in other institutions. Just as Harvard was a child of Immanuel College, so is education in Turkey a child of American colleges. About 300 men are registered at the American International College, with 12 professors and an entire teaching staff of about 35."

In his talk, Pres. Reed went on to say that "Turkey is one of the most interesting places in the world. It is the crossroads of civilization. The World War centered largely on the problem of what European nation was going to be enlarged at the expense of Turkey. Eight years ago, Turkey was practically down and out, but there has been a rebirth of a nation. In six days in 1922, as many as 240,000 Greeks were forcibly driven out. Almost 20% of the population of Greece consisted of these refugees. This may have been a means of unifying both Greece and Turkey. There have been marvelous changes in Turkey. The old Sultan is gone, and a modern representative government has been instituted. The women have taken off their veils, and the men have taken off their fezzes. Two years ago, the use of the old Arabic letters was exchanged for the Latin phonetic letters. It has been an aggressive, daring venture for these people."

According to the speaker, the Maine-in-Turkey movement is much appreciated and much good is being done. In his opinion, Lee Vrooman, the leader of the Maine-in-Turkey movement, is one of the most brilliant men in the Near East. The interest of the University of Maine is much desired. It serves as a link between the two universities in this day when the nations of the world are more closely bound together than ever before.

Maine-Spring Published

The January issue of The Maine-Spring, the literary magazine of the University, will be on sale Friday, Jan. 16. The issue is full of interesting stories, essays, and poems. It is Maine's only expression of purely literary ability and deserves the support of all, not only for this reason but in its own right. The present issue contains several items of interest, such as articles on religion, the Griffin Prize Essay for 1930, a translation from Virgil by Dean George Chase, and humorous poems and stories.

Sigmund Spaeth Pleases Students In Talk On Music

Shows That Popular Songs
Are Adaptations of
Famous Pieces

Dr. Sigmund Spaeth, educational director of the Community Concert Association of New York City entertained the students at chapel on Monday with a humorous and instructive talk on "The Common Sense of Music." Dr. Spaeth pointed out the development of song from the two notes imitative of the cuckoo to the more complex composition. He showed how invariably the popular songs of today are based upon famous selections of early composers. Using for illustration the once-popular song, "Yes, We Have No Bananas," he proved that the writers of the ditty borrowed almost the entire jazz hit from sections of four early, familiar tunes. Besides being a delightful lecturer, the director is an accomplished pianist.

Dr. Spaeth was graduated from Haverford College in 1905 and received his Ph.D. from Princeton in 1910. He served as a teacher of music and as a composer and is famous throughout the country by his radio talks and writings on music for innumerable magazines.

Before bringing his talk to a close, Dr. Spaeth announced the adoption of the new Community Concert Plan in Bangor to take the place of the annual Festival. Under this plan, three great artists will be brought to Bangor during the ensuing season and special student membership tickets are being sold by a student committee, headed by Galen Veayo.

Merrill Hall, Home Economics Building, Nearing Completion

BUILDING WELL-EQUIPPED
AND FURNISHED THRU-
OUT NUMEROUS LABS AND
RESEARCH ROOMS

Merrill Hall, the new home of the Home Economics department will soon be finished and ready for use. The building, three stories in height, is of Colonial design, executed in red brick.

The hall, on the first floor, contains rooms for children with blackboards and door-knobs set so that small children can reach them, play-rooms, a kitchen, serving rooms, dining room, two class rooms, a small library and a conference room.

The northern end of the second floor contains a chemistry lab for food analysis, an animal room in which the rats and guinea pigs used in vitamin studies can be kept under constant conditions of temperature and ventilation, a household equipment laboratory, and a respiration room where the energy expended by human beings can be measured.

The southern end of the second floor contains a foods laboratory with twenty individual work cabinets and five unit kitchens, each unit of which contains all the essential elements of a modern kitchen. On this floor are also the general offices for the department, as well as a student lab devoted to a study of various types of household equipment.

The third floor contains a designing room in the northern end of the building, and a clothing room in the southern end on the same floor. Electric sewing machines, textile testers, mercury vapor lamps for testing color fastness, are part of the equipment. The middle section of this floor contains three offices for the use of the Home Economics extension staff.

The interior of the building is finished in oak, stained silver gray, with office equipment in olive green metal.

The new hall will fill a long-felt need. Heretofore, the department has been located in the Facilities and North Hall, with inadequate facilities in both places. With the department housed under one roof, it will be able to render better service to the communities of the state.

NEW PLANS FOR ARTS AND EDUCATION EXAMINATION SCHEDULE

A new plan for the final examination schedule in the College of Arts & Sciences and School of Education has been adopted this year. It is hoped that the new plan will give a better distribution of examinations throughout the examination period and prevent the congestion of several examinations within a short period for some students as has occurred in the past.

All classes in the College of Arts & Sciences and School of Education will stop on Tuesday night, January 20 at 5:05, two days earlier than in Agriculture and Technology. On the two days following, namely, Wednesday and Thursday, January 21 and 22, certain Arts and Education examinations will be given for courses taken only by Arts and Education students. These are shown on the examination schedule.

Classes in Agriculture and Technology will proceed as usual during these two days and on Friday, January 23, examinations will begin for all students.

Dartmouth-Maine Dual Track Meet At Hanover, N.H.

Track relations with Dartmouth have been taken up by the University of Maine, which will journey to Hanover on May 2, with the promise of a return match at Orono next year. Theodore S. Curtis, faculty manager of athletics at the university, announced today after making negotiations with Henry R. Heneage, supervisor of athletics at the New Hampshire institution.

The University of Maine will not meet Bowdoin in relay at the B.A.A. Meet to be held Feb. 14 in Boston, according to Coach Chester Jenkins. The university has adopted a policy against competing with a Maine college in a relay meet conducted outside the State. It will be up to the B.A.A. officials to select another suitable opponent.

The team, which has not as yet been picked, will consist of four men from the varsity who will each run 440 yards to make up the mile.

Massachusetts Institute of Technology comes to Orono on May 9 to meet the boys from this institution, while the four Maine colleges will hold their State Meet on the following Saturday, the 10th. The team will try to return the New England track championship for a fifth year to the university, when they compete in Boston, May 23. On May 30, they journey to the National I.C.-4A Meet at New York.

Two Junior Co-eds Get Maine Athletic Seals

At the last athletic rally held in the Balentine gym, "Spud" Churchill and "Stubby" Burrill each received a Maine athletic seal. This is the highest women's athletic award that a girl can earn. No woman in the history of the University has before been awarded this honor in her junior year. The numerals and letters were also given out to various team members.

"Stubby" Burrill was chairman of the meeting. Miss Rena Campbell, Miss Lengyel and Miss Rogers were the speakers of the evening. "Marnie" Smith and "Ikey" Montgomery led the cheers.

The prisoners were attired in clothes befitting their status.

Committee Completes An Extensive Survey Of Colleges In State

UNIVERSITY OF MAINE FIG-
URES PROMINENTLY IN
REPORT. DEFINITE REC-
COMMENDATIONS MADE

The January issue of the *Alumnus* contains a summary of the report of the survey of higher education in the state of Maine recently completed by the committee in charge. This committee, headed by Pres. Boardman, with Dr. O. S. Lutes as Executive Director, has spent almost two years in its research; its report, to be published shortly, covers 600 typewritten pages, and is a thorough and searching probe into the needs and efficiency of the state educational system, including the other three colleges within the state.

In brief, the conclusion of the report may be boiled down to this: the future should witness an improvement and enlargement of existing facilities, rather than the development of additional professional schools, or institutions for women. The authors of the report consider that with an increased measure of support, the existing institutions can handle any reasonable increase in the number of those desiring higher education within the state.

The report points out that the state "has less basis financially for supporting higher education than has the United States as a whole, and (2) Maine is using proportionately less of what she has, for the purpose of higher education than is the country at large."

The report takes up in detail the physical requirements of the University and makes definite and specific recommendations for the improvement of the campus.

Copies of the report, when printed, will be sent to those who request it.

Prominent Alumnus Chairman Of State Committee On Homes

Mr. John T. Gyger, of Portland, has been appointed Chairman of the Maine State Better Homes Committee. Mr. Gyger was recently appointed a trustee of the University of Maine and is Superintendent of Schools for Falmouth, No. Yarmouth, Cumberland, and Cape Elizabeth. Miss Rena Campbell, Assistant Professor of Home Economics at the University, will serve as secretary of the committee.

The Maine committee, like that of other states, was organized for the purpose of studying housing conditions and for generally bringing about a wholesome type of home and community life. President Hoover has taken an active interest in the work of the National Committee and is now continuing to serve in an honorary capacity.

Sixty-three Maine communities took part in the 1930 Better Homes Campaign, presenting programs designed to stimulate and encourage home improvement.

Mrs. Donnell B. Young was chairman of the committee for the Orono district.

Thirty-eight Maine communities are already engaged in the 1931 Better Homes Campaign, which will culminate in the observance of Better Homes Week, April 26 to May 2.

Sparkling Comedy, "Kempy", Played Tonight in Chapel

Play Production Class
To Stage Drama Of
American Life

One of the cleverest comedies presented here in a number of years will be staged this evening in Alumni Hall at 7:30 o'clock by the Play Production class under the personal direction and supervision of Professor Mark Bailey. It has been well over a year since the amusement public here has seen a first class comedy and there is nothing which appeals to an audience as a fast moving play filled with a renewed freshness and sparkling with witticisms and red hot laughter.

This season the play to be produced is "Kempy" written in that inimitable style by J. C. and Elliott Nugent. This play has been royally received by audiences on two continents for over seven years as a model of typical American home life portrayed in a fine clever dialogue from the pens of those master comedians.

"Kempy" far exceeds the usual run of comedies in that it contains a laugh a minute, side-splitting scenes, and situations which are produced to send audiences bending with uncontrolled spasms of laughter. Three acts of the best that the present day theatre can offer is included in the makeup of "Kempy."

A great cast has been assembled by Professor Bailey and to insure perfect success, great pains are being taken in all departments. The cast of "Kempy" includes all of the well known campus favorites who have won names for themselves in former dramatic presentations, both in the Masque and in class plays. Headed by Kathryn Small, as the unruly daughter, it consists of Stanley J. Protas, Edna Grange, Atwood Levensaler, Ernestine Merrill, Helen Osgood, William Fahey, and John Barry.

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Winter Sports Team Competes In College Meet At Lake Placid

The M.O.C. winter sports team, by virtue of a fourth and sixth place in the ski jump and a fifth in the 2-mile snowshoe race, placed eighth among the colleges and universities of the United States and Canada in the 10th annual College Week competitions at Lake Placid from December 29 to January 2.

Three men represented the Maine Outing Club at the fashionable New York winter resort: Harry Booth, snowshoer; Wilfred Davis and Leif Sorenson, skiers. Booth, running his first race on snowshoes, finished a close fifth in the 2-mile event, and was in excellent condition. Only lack of experience kept him from finishing with the leaders.

The ski jump, held on the gigantic 60-meter Intervale jump which will be used in the 1932 Olympics, attracted the greatest interest and was attended by a crowd estimated at 7000 people. Here Sorenson, displaying splendid form and courage, won a well-deserved fourth place. He was beaten only by men whose names will undoubtedly appear in the Olympics next year. Davis placed sixth in the same event, being barely nosed out of fifth place by Dewey of Dartmouth.

All the events were held under adverse weather conditions, and the times and distances were correspondingly slow.

Dartmouth won the meet by an overwhelming margin, while New Hampshire was second and McGill a close third. Maine's final placing, eighth, may seem rather low, but it is much higher than last year, and the training and experience received by the three men will prove invaluable in future meets.

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SAVE YOUR TEXT-BOOKS

At the end of each term, students in large numbers try to sell the text-books used in that term. Several members of the faculty, when asked for their opinion on this practice, have voiced their disapproval.

There are probably very few students here who are so situated that they feel compelled to sell their books in order to help meet expenses. Many times those who save their text-books used in an elementary course find them useful for reviewing the facts at the bottom of an advanced course in that subject. Aside from the poor prices obtained by selling these text-books, the student is voluntarily depriving himself of an excellent means of refreshing his memory at a time when some forgotten information may be needed.

It would seem that Tech students have a better realization of the value of their text-books than Arts students have, for it is common to see two or three year's accumulation of engineering text-books on their desks.

A WORK WELL DONE

The abstract of the report soon to be published by the committee in charge of the state-wide educational survey is evidence of the large amount of labor and thought expended on the report. Several conclusions can be drawn from it. It is obvious that the members of the survey committee are aware of the needs of the University as seen from the student viewpoint and have incorporated them into their program of suggested improvements. Among them are a new chapel, a building devoted to social functions, better dormitory accommodations, and the completion of the Memorial gym.

The report points out that in spite of the recent increase in the amount contributed to the support of the University by the state, that the state expenditure on higher education is still below the average for the United States as a whole. There seems to be, however, slight prospect of any increase in the near future, in spite of the facts noted in this report. It is evident that the University is laboring under a handicap in the matter of appropriations from the state. Any delay in adopting the measures and improvements advised in the report can be laid to lack of means, rather than to any unwillingness on the part of the authorities.

A survey of this kind is of great value—it is in the nature of a stock-taking and appraisal of the resources and future needs of the colleges within the state. It draws attention to situations which need remedying, but which are perhaps not obvious to a casual observer, or which are possibly forgotten in the pressure of more immediate matters.

The survey, sponsored by President Boardman, was well-planned and well-carried out. To Dr. Lutes, Dean of the School of Education at the University, must go a great deal of credit for the manner in which he brought the survey to a successful conclusion.

PROF. FITCH DESIGNS
INSTRUMENTS

Professor A. L. Fitch of the department of Physics of the University of Maine has perfected two pieces of Physics equipment which are advertised in the recent catalogue issued by a manufacturing company which specializes in supplies and equipment for scientific laboratories.

The first of these pieces is known as Young's Modulus Apparatus with optical lever attachment, Fitch design, and the Fitch Optical Lever. The other piece is the Free Fall Apparatus, Fitch design, which has lately been put on the market.

Professor Fitch was born in Byron Center, Michigan; attended Albion College where he received his A.B. degree and his A.M. degree, and the University of Michigan where he received his Ph.D. degree.

He was a research physicist from 1916 to 1919 and belongs to the following organizations: Sigma Xi, Gamma Alpha, Phi Kappa Phi, American Physical Society, American Optical Society, The Acoustical Society of America, the American Association for the Advancement of Science, and the American Association of University Professors.

SCHOOL OF EDUCATION
SPONSORS SCHOLARSHIP
CONTEST

The School of Education is sponsoring a scholarship contest among the secondary schools of Maine to be held the coming spring. This contest is to comprise a number of tests in the subjects commonly taught in the secondary schools of Maine. All the secondary schools of the State have been invited to enter.

It is planned to hold the contest in two stages. The first will be the Every Pupil contest, in which all pupils enrolled in the subjects tested will participate, and will be held in the local schools. The second will be a District contest, in which the winners in each subject in each school of one or more counties will meet at a central school in the district, and compete for individual prizes.

The tests will be supplied by the University and will be given and scored under the direction of the School of Education. Professor J. R. Crawford, who has had experience in conducting such contests in other states, is in immediate charge of the project for the School of Education.

The main purpose of the contest is to stimulate interest in academic achievement and scholarship which will be somewhat comparable with the interest in athletics and other extracurricular activities in the schools. Similar contests have been held in other states with remarkable success. It is hoped that the same results may be had in Maine.
