

Coach Jenkins Makes Plea For Greater Track Interest In Speech Before Track Club

Gardner Elected Faculty Advisor; Lindsay, Richardson, and Mile Relay Team To Compete in K. of C. Games at Boston

"A man's capacity to study increases or decreases with his physical condition," stated Coach Chester Jenkins at the monthly meeting of the Track Club held Tuesday evening. Coach Jenkins issued a plea to the Track Club to form a definite plan of action on the campus to insure more interest in track and get more men out. The coach stated that men should stay out for a sport as long and often as possible. Far from impairing their success in final exams, physical activity will place the individual in a better position to cope with all exigencies. A Board of Statisticians is at present working upon this assumption in the leading colleges in the United States, to prove the necessity of physical perfection.

In varsity track there are the usual number of contestants but the freshman situation does not look so promising. Only one freshman is out for the 100 yard dash and there is one 440 man in action. There are plenty of men out for the field events but a lack of participants on the track. The fact that freshmen are not allowed to live in fraternities as before is undoubtedly undermining the track situation at Maine. In past years the houses got behind their freshmen and made them go out for sports. Now many of the newcomers can follow the line of least resistance and consequently track will suffer.

Dean L. S. Corbett, another speaker of the evening brought before the club the necessity of choosing a faculty advisor. A list of names was presented and A. K. Gardner was unanimously elected. Plans will be made in the near future for the Track Club Cabaret.

The indoor gymnasium is the scene of active preparation these days, however. Track and relay men are fast getting into shape. Coach Jenkins held time trials last week for the quarter milers and half mile runners. Dekin and Wendell upset the dope sheet, turning in better time than any of the veterans. "Rabbi" Dekin turned in time of 1.43 flat for 350 yards and Wendell was on his heels at the tape in 1.43. Tolman and Lathrop were in the 1.43 locality and Berenson's time clocked 1.43.

There is plenty of veteran material. Captain Berenson, Lathrop, Stymlist, and Tolman our old quarter milers. Dekin, Wendell, White, Lufkin, and Battles will make some men work hard for a berth.

Jenkins is getting a mile relay team in shape for the K. of C. Games at Boston Saturday, January 25. Lindsay and Richardson have also received invitations to compete and there is a possibility that more men may be entered. Last year Maine was defeated by the M.I.T. relay team which was one of the best in the country but it is not known who the opponent will be this season.

Richardson will compete for the Lee Larrivee Cup in the two mile run. This cup was put up last season in commemoration of the Holy Cross star who was killed in an auto accident. Nurmi won the two mile last year and Richardson was third, beating out Gus Moore, now of the University of Pittsburgh, and turned in time of 9:26 4-5 at the Brooklyn K. of C. Meet last week.

Lindsay will compete for the Hon. James M. Curley trophy.

In the Lowell Electric Light Corporation Contest Roderic C. O'Connor, U. of M. 1929, won first prize; and Kenneth S. Field, U. of M. 1927, fifth prize.

Bates Will Compete Against Maine Team In Winter Carnival

Twenty Men Working Out For Maine Winter Sports Team

Saturday, February 1, will see the renovation of the Winter Carnival at Maine, when Coach Ray Thompson of Bates brings his charges against the winter sports team of the Maine Outing Club. Four events will be included in the program: the 7-mile ski race, the 2-mile snowshoe race, the 150-yard snowshoe dash, and last, but not least, the ski jump. All the races will start and finish on the field in front of Balentine, while the jumping will take place on the Outing Club jump, located just across the river from the power house. This carnival will be, as far as is now known, the only intercollegiate athletic event on the campus during the winter season, and should prove of much interest. In the ski jump, after the main competition, two of Maine's foremost jumpers will perform several exhibition jumps which will be well worth watching.

Over twenty men are now working out for the winter sports team, and there is much good material in the squad. Leif Sorensen, a freshman, has already won his laurels as a ski jumper for the Chisholm Ski Club in Rumford, Maine. Wilfred Davis won the state intercollegiate ski jump at Bates last year, and much is expected of him this season, since he is also an able cross country skier. John Adams and William Cullinane also show much promise in the ski events. For the snow shoe races, there are Charles Cutting, veteran snowshoer of former Maine teams, Hen Plummer, who has just returned from the forestry camp and should be in the very best of condition, John P. Doyle, Bob Ingraham, Stanley Cole, Jackson, and others.

On the other hand, Bates has a very strong team in the field this year. There is Whitten, national champion in the 2-mile snowshoe race, Benjamin Chick, an excellent skier, and Wallace Lowell, state ski jump champion three years ago, who can do almost anything on skis. With these men and the wealth of material from which there is to pick at Bates, Maine will find a very hard competitor to overcome. This year Bates seems to have the edge on Maine in almost every sport; it now remains to be seen what the winter sports team can do.

In the meantime, the members of the Maine squad are taking daily workouts. On Sunday afternoons, the ski jumpers get together at the jump and gain much from criticizing and watching each other.

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Ten Maine Students Work With Staff of Bangor Commercial

Ten students from the University, in the past week and a half, have been acting as reporters and copy-readers on the staff of the Bangor Commercial. Some have been sent out to get feature stories, some have taken local stories over the phone, and all have written headlines. Next Sunday night, they are to go to Waterville and assist in the publication of the Waterville Sentinel, as feature-writers and reporters for that paper. This trip, arranged by Mr. Fassett, is made possible by the kindness of Mr. Lewis, general manager of the Sentinel. The men who have been working on the Commercial and who are going to Waterville are Eugene Vail, Kingdon Harvey, Lowell, Walker, Lindsay, Wheeler, John McGowan, Henry Romanow, Edward Greely and Norman Porter. These men are taking the course in the Mechanics of Editing, English 27.

The work has proved very interesting, and has given the 10 men an insight into the publication of a city newspaper.

Next year, Mr. Fassett hopes to arrange matters so that it will be possible for those enrolled in the English 27 course to take trips to nearby cities and spend two days, if possible, working on the papers.

Some information regarding the press used by the Commercial may be interesting. The press weighs 65 tons and can deliver papers at the rate of 650 a minute or approximately 40,000 an hour. This capacity is not used by the officials of the Commercial, as they slow down the press to 480 papers a minute. Conversation is well-nigh impossible beside the press when it is in operation.

Strong Frosh Hoop Teams Add Three Victories to String

Kenyon's new freshman basketball team known as B team handed the Maine School of Commerce a trouncing Monday afternoon, when they whipped the Bangorites 44-22. Coach Kenyon sure had plenty of hoopsters available this year for many of the men on his new quintet look as good as the Class A outfit. A schedule is being arranged for the new team which will probably include Old Town, Brewer, etc. Basketball sure is king at present. Intra-Mural scrimmages, the Class A Frosh games, and now another freshman court team should keep the basketball rooters satisfied.

The frosh squad ran away from Higgins Classical Institute Tuesday 61-31 in a contest which proved a practice game for the frosh and a chance for Coach Kenyon to use all the freshman material available. Higgins had no comeback at all, the frosh leading them 31-1 until within two minutes of the end of the half, which terminated 31-4. Desmond played a remarkable game at center, scoring 13 points for the frosh and Pearlmuter piled up 11 points. Harvey was high man for the visitors with 8 counts.

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Prominent Women Speak at Balentine On Professions

Dr. Barbara Hunt and Miss Flora Weed, both of Bangor, were introduced as speakers by the Y.W.C.A. vocational guidance at Balentine Thursday afternoon. Dr. Hunt spoke on the medical professions. She told of the hardships and the joys of medical work as she has found it, saying that a love for the work is quite necessary.

Miss Weed spoke very briefly of professions in general and Business in particular. She pointed out the advisability of keeping a budget both in college and in later life.

Monday and Tuesday of this week, Miss Jackson of Wellesley College was on campus. She met many of the women in private conference discussing with them the problem of choosing a vocation. Monday afternoon, she gave a lecture on "Personnel as a Vocation." Everyone says at one time or another, "I want a job." Then he is faced with the question, What can you do? Women today can, the speaker said, do anything for which they are willing to pay the cost.

The speaker pointed out that a woman must be able to do a job better than any man could before she will get a position, particularly a highly paid position. Whatever a woman does after she gets out of college, she must have her requirements, and now is the time to get them, the speaker said. In closing Miss Jackson said that pleasure from work is not a career, is not even a vocation, but a highly romantic adventure.

Work of Maine Grads In Turkey Emphasized By Chapel Speaker

The Reverend Ernest H. Riggs, secretary of the Congregational Board of Foreign Missions, was the speaker at chapel exercises Monday. His subject was Turkey, especially emphasizing Maine-in-Turkey. There have been five major Revolutions in Turkey during recent years according to Mr. Riggs; political, in which the government was overturned and a republic set up; religious; social, in which the wearing of the fez was forbidden and western fashions adopted; economic, in which all the foreigners who were business leaders were driven out, the country now being forced to produce its own; and educational, in which the Moslem schools were abolished and the western school system introduced. Latin characters were adopted in writing and they no longer read from right to left as they had formerly.

Turkey is rapidly becoming westernized; they have turned their backs upon the east, Mr. Riggs stated saying that

BOOK REVIEW

A Modern Girl

By U. B. Trites

Ruthlessly waving aside its title, this book is a war story in which the interest centers in aviation and not in the modern girl. The story of aviation during the war is graphically told, but the story of Jack Stafford, the aviator, does not plough deep enough. The pictures of Hilda March—in the cafes, at Mrs. Custer's Officers' Club, in the gay life at Nice, as the girl smokes opium at the Princess Slavinsky—are vividly painted. But Hilda herself, despite her beauty, her waywardness, her heroic effort at regeneration, lacks any real poignancy. Yet, notwithstanding its vagueness of characterization, *A Modern Girl* makes a definite contribution to the literature of the war. Not only does it deal accurately with aviation, but also it holds up to just ridicule phases of so-called relief work touched by other chroniclers. Here and there throughout the book are scenes that rise to the level of high drama.

DRAMATICS

Here is a chance for the erstwhile unseen dramatic talent to come to the front. For its next play the Maine Masque is offering *The Swan*, which has eight roles for women and nine for men. The dramatic field at Maine is one whose far-reaching opportunities are not sufficiently recognized. There should be more competition. It is difficult to choose a cast from a small group; moreover the possibilities for a better cast are limited if there are few candidates. *The Swan* should attract many not only because of the quality of the play itself but also because of its seventeen roles.

Every Marlow or Sothorn at the University has in him an unusual opening to show his dramatic talents.

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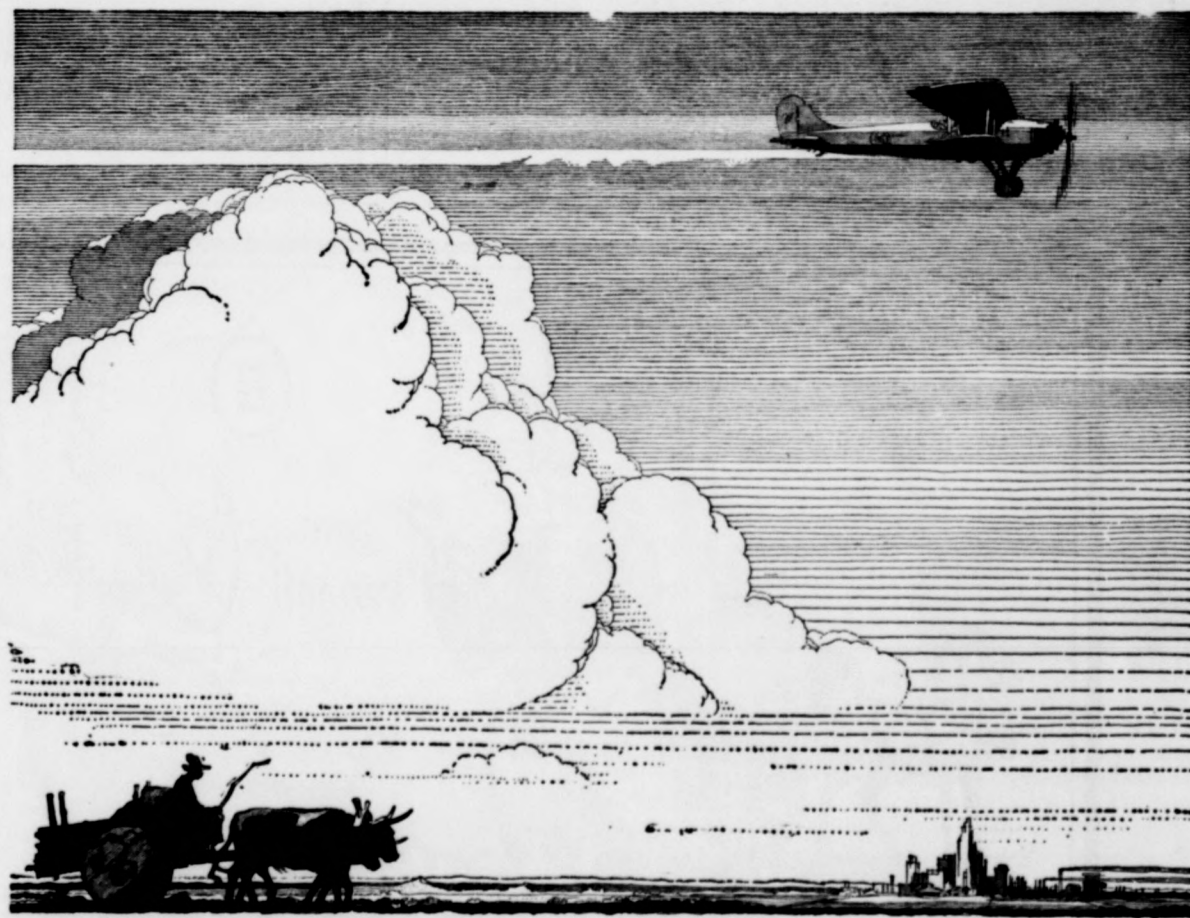
