Tentative Dates Set for Maine Hoop Tourney

Play-off for State Title To Be Held at Orono

Dates for the annual interscholastic Eastern Maine basketball tournament at the University of Maine were set for March 14 and 15 at a meeting today of the athletic board of the University.

If a plan, now under consideration, is adopted, the tournament will open on Thursday, March 13, for the preliminary games, so that Friday may be devoted to the semi-finals and Saturday left open for the championship game.

The tournament will be open to high schools in the eight eastern counties of Maine. Another for schools in the eight Western counties will be held at Bates College. Winners of the two tournaments will meet here on March 18 to decide the State championship.

The committee adopted a measure to prevent two teams of one league from participating in the tourney. The feeling of the committee, as expressed by Chairman A. K. Gardner was that to invite a second choice from a league after its season had closed and a league champion already decided, would be to invite upsets, and that a "safe champion satisfactory to all" never would be found.

A team from a weaker league may now be invited, he said, even though its schedule may not have been as difficult as that of a second place winner in some other league.

Interfraternity Loop Starts at U. of Maine

Interfraternity basketball which starts at the University of Maine this week, will do much to take the place of the varsity sport which was discontinued at Maine this season. There has been much interest shown in preparing for the opening of the season. The eighteen fraternities on the Maine campus will compete for the cup. The trophy was won by Beta Theta Pi last season.

This year there should be more real competition than ever before because with passing of varsity basketball there will be more men eligible for the house teams. When basketball was a varsity sport only men who were not on the varsity team could compete, but now all men are eligible to play. The houses will be divided into two leagues instead of three as in the past.

The definite playing schedule will be announced early this week.

Play Production Class Will Present Three Act Comedy

"The Brat", a three-act play, will be presented in Alumni Chapel on the evening of January 16 by the class in play production under the direction of Professor Mark Bailey.

It is a domestic comedy which will continually puzzle the audience. The Brat, played by Myrilla Guilfoil '31, is a street walker with no home. She is taken in by MacMillan Forrester, a prominent American novelist, interpreted by Donald MacCormick '31, who wishes to use her as a type in a book which he is writing. She becomes interested, first in him, then in his younger brother Steve, played by Charlie O'Connor '31, who is the "black sheep" of the family. Youngs, concerning the purchase of a modern, encased bulletin board to be used for the announcement of Chapel speakers and important campus events. It was suggested that this board be placed in front of the bookstore.

Three Maine Men In Winter Sports Meet At Lake Placid

For the first time since 1925, Maine was from December 27 to January 1 represented at the intercollegiate winter sports competition at Lake Placid, New York, by three members of the Outing Club's team, Charles Cutting '30, Wilfred Davis '32, and Leif Sorensen '33. As could almost be expected, this small team failed to score against the heavy competition of the larger and more experienced teams of the other colleges, but much experience which will be of advantage in later meets was gained.

Forty hand-picked winter sports men from the United States and Canada were present at the fashionable New York winter resort, and of these forty Wilfred Davis was chosen to start as No. 1 in the ski events. This was unfortunate for the Maine team, since it almost eliminated Davis from the competition. All the ski events, with the exception of the jump, are started at time intervals, and the first man to start has the hardest task of all the participants since he more or less has to break a trail for the others.

The 7-mile ski race, which was run off in a driving snowstorm, was won by Saunders of Dartmouth; Pedersen of New Hampshire captured the downhill ski race; while Johnson of McGill negotiated the turns in the slalom race efficiently enough to win the event. Engineering Film To Be Shown At Civil Club Meeting

A motion picture entitled "Hydroelectric Power Production in the New South" is a feature of the program given tonight at the meeting of the Civil Club at the University of Maine.

This film, which was obtained through the courtesy of E. I. du Pont de Nemours & Company, Inc. of Wilmington, Delaware, showed the development of a great hydroelectric project in the heart of the Great Smoky Mountains of North Carolina. How the contractors were forced to blast ledges along the sides of the mountains for the right-of-way for a railroad to the site of the dam; how cables, 200 feet above the river, were thrown across a gorge so that men as well as equipment could be swung across in small cars to the hitherto inaccessible operations; how a flume had to be built to divert the waters of a creek from the tunnel headings and how ingenious machines were designed so that the lining and driving of the tunnels could progress at the same time, are all depicted in the film. Animated graphs outlined the project plans and the same type of illustration made clear to the audience the correct use of explosives in tunnel work.

This film is the third of a series of engineering motion pictures released by the du Pont Company and was well received because of current interest in all hydroelectric and public utilities developments.

Other films obtained from the same source will also be shown. These include Driving the Cascade Tunnel.

All interested are invited to attend.

President Boardman Cuts Play From Dec. Issue Of Maine-Spring

"Beef Stew," a short play written for the December issue of the Maine-Spring, the University literary publication, was clipped by direction of President Harold S. Boardman who objected to the language contained in the play and the theme of the story. President Boardman stated that as the Maine-Spring is supposed to be the literary magazine of the University its standards should be higher than those shown in the story. According to President Boardman the phase of life indicated therein is one which could readily be obtained from publications on sale at news-stands but has no part in the make-up of a high grade literary magazine.

The contents of the play were called to the attention of the President by the foreman of a Bangor print shop where the Maine-Spring was printed. After the printer reported, it was at first decided to strike out the objectionable words. This was tried but it was found that the stamps did not cover the print. The President then directed that the play must be cut entirely from the magazine before it could be distributed.

The story had been submitted to United States postal officials who reported that there was nothing in the play that would bar the publication from the United States mails, but this did not deter the President from his original decision that the story had no place in the college literary publication.

Girls' Basketball Squads Show Up Well In Practice

Both of the co-ed basketball squads have shown up well in recent practices in spite of any vacation reactions. Their numbers have increased steadily both among Freshmen and Varsity since the first workout after the holidays.

It would appear that the inevitable effects of Christmas vacation are either latent or nonexistent for the two groups have been more keenly alive on the basketball court than they were before the two-week recess.

On the varsity squad there are larger numbers working out for guards and side centers than for any of the other four positions. Among the freshmen there is more competition for center; whereas the remaining positions have an equal number of aspirants.

With a considerable amount of time before their first games both the Varsity and Freshman teams should be in the best possible condition.

Maine To Have Two Frosh Fives A and B Squads To Play Separate Schedules

The freshman basketball squad at the University of Maine will be divided into two separate combinations that will play separate schedules, according to announcement Tuesday afternoon by Bill Kenyon, freshman coach. There are about thirty five men on the frosh squad and rather than make a cut, Kenyon decided to form another team, thus bringing more men into active competition.

B. C. Kent, faculty manager of athletics, said Tuesday afternoon that he would start at once arranging a schedule for the new team, but he expects to get games with local high schools and independent clubs including Orono High, Old Town High and Bangor High.

The division of the squad will take place at once and it is hoped that regular games will start within a week.

The first squad, which will be known as Squad A, will play the regular freshman schedule and go through the season independent of Squad B which will be made up of second string men.

The first five on Squad A will probably be as follows: Right forward, Sven Hallgren, former Portland High and Hebron Academy star who has been doing good work for the frosh this season; left forward, Romansky, high point man of the squad of Alfred High; center, McMichael, former M.C.I. star; right guard, Hall, former Hebron and Lewiston High star; left guard, Alfred McMichael of Pittsfield, former M. C. I. ace.

Maine-in-Turkey Drive Starts Monday

In 1925 the Maine-in-Turkey Association was formed as an organization to spread the spirit of the University of Maine to foreign fields. There are at present four Maine graduates in Turkey, namely, Lee and Helen Vrooman, Ruth Hitchings and Fred Thompson. The work of the Maine-in-Turkey Association consists of inculcating high ideals in the younger generation, promoting friendliness toward other nations, and encouraging the adoption of modern methods of education and life.

Last year there was no student drive for funds to carry on this work. This year the drive starts Monday morning with an Assembly talk by the Rev. Ernest Riggs of the Congregational Board of Foreign Missions. Mr. Riggs has spent many years in Turkey and comes especially well qualified to tell us of this land where customs observed for centuries have been discarded overnight. Hear Mr. Riggs talk and support our Maine representatives generously this year.

"Bill" Kenyon's frosh squad began their season with a bang, winning their first mixup with Mattanawook Academy by a large margin and scoring a win from Dexter last week after a hot little contest. The Frosh have three good teams this year. Coach Kenyon may move in several shifts and still have a fine working group. The opener with the boys from Lincoln resulted in an easy win for the Frosh the final tally being 54-20. The game with N. H. Fay High School kept the cubs guessing for a while, however, the tally registering 12-12 at the half, but by clever court work the yearlings looped in a few ringers that ended the melee 31-19.

January Alumnus Announces Song Contest for Maine

The January Alumnus contained announcements of two song contests sponsored by the General Alumni Association. Both are open to students in fact, students are urged to participate. A copy of the regulations may be secured in the Alumni office, 13 Fernald Hall.

Prizes amounting to one hundred dollars have been offered by G. O. Hamlin, 1900, of New York City for the best new music, verse or complete song. The points on which new productions will be judged are given in the regulations.

Which of the old songs should be retained is rather a difficult question to answer. Probably there are few of the present students who are familiar with more than a limited number of our college songs, although there are about sixty written especially for Maine. This is evidence of the need of a new song book. There is not available a copy of the 1910 song book.

Most of the Maine songs were written by members of the classes in college at the time the book was compiled and published in 1910. It is hoped therefore that many students will become interested in the production of new songs. Verse may be written to any popular tune. Two students may work together.

There is but one point which must be observed, that our songs do not cast reflections upon other colleges. Present day good sportsmanship makes this undesirable. Furthermore both the Song Book Committee and the Alumni Council have expressed themselves very definitely on this point.

The members of the Song Book Committee are Director A. W. Sprague, '05, chairman, Dean Achsa Bean '22, Dr. Milton Ellis, '07, J. A. Gannett, '08, C. E. Crossland, '17, Doris Gross, '30 and Galen Veayo '30.

Fred Brice announced Monday that Winter football practice will be started at the University of Maine in the near future, probably next week. Brice said that he believed that the squad was anxious to get started and that he thought that Winter workouts would be the best thing he could do to get a line on his team for next Fall. Winter practice is a new thing at Maine and whether it will be continued in the future will be decided by the interest shown this Winter. The training periods will be held in the indoor field on the Maine campus where the men will have plenty of room for punting and passing.

The work during the first part of the Winter season will be devoted to the perfecting of passing and kicking. Brice expects to devote most of his time to backfield men and centers. He will take the men in groups of about five, at first, in an attempt to develop individual talent and then bring them together later in the Winter for regular workouts. By the opening of the spring season Brice expects to have his team well in hand and it is expected that scrimmage will be held during the early Spring and up until the close of college in June.

TO AVOID SCRIMMAGES
In the past Maine has had to scrimmage during the playing season with the result that many valuable men were seriously injured so that they were unable to compete when it came time for regular play. With the Winter training Brice hopes to get his men hardened up in the Spring so that he can start the Fall with a little scrimmage and then let the varsity team devote most of their time to playing.

Last year the Maine team looked like a winner in the Spring but when Fall came around the bottom fell out of the outfit and Brice was forced to draw on a green bunch of players with the result that Maine came out down near the bottom of the list when the state series was over. This year Brice hopes to have a good idea of what men will comprise his eleven in the Fall when the men go home for the Summer vacation. Of course there is always the possibility of men not returning to the university after the vacation but with the nucleus of a team formed there will be something to work with when Fall practice starts.

There are plenty of candidates for varsity football at the university and it is expected that there will be a large gathering at the indoor field when "Foxy Fred" sends out the call.

Many of last season's team will be on deck for practice. Sims, flashy halfback who gained plenty of ground for the Pale Blue during their past not too successful season will be on hand. Walter Riley of Portland is another sure bet for a half-back. (Continued on Page Three)

Women's Dorm To Be Completed Early In May

The new women's dormitory now being constructed in back of Balentine Hall will be completed, it is hoped, about May 1. This new dormitory is a three story, colonial type building and is planned to accommodate 48 women.

On the first floor the dining room, living room, and hall have been arranged so they can be used for dancing and social purposes. The second and third floors are divided into suites of rooms. Each suite, consisting of a study and two sleeping rooms, will provide quarters for four girls. There is to be a kitchenette and laundry in the basement for the use of co-eds.

Although the new building will be finished this spring it is not probable that it will be occupied before fall.

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VISITORS

The Student Senate is to be commended for its work in behalf of the fraternities, in an effort to reimburse them for expenses in connection with entertaining groups of visitors. Obviously the fraternity is acting in the capacity of the University when it is host to a delegation, whether it be athletic or otherwise. It then follows that the presentation of a bill to the University is most logical and business-like and is in good order.

The Senate tells us that a rule which provides for this situation is already in existence but its application has been forgotten. Whether this came about through fraternity laxity or University desire is of no importance in the present issue. The fraternities should be paid.

BASKETBALL

The division of the freshman basketball squad into two separate teams is a great improvement in the athletic policy at the University of Maine. With more men in active competition there is bound to be more interest in basketball at Maine and may result in putting varsity basketball back on the Maine sports calendar.

Bates, Colby and Bowdoin all have "pick up" basketball teams this season and there is also the nucleus of a varsity "pickup squad" at Maine.

With these clubs starting up at all the Maine colleges there should be only another short step to be taken to bring about a Maine State series in basketball. A basketball series would be a valuable addition to the sports calendars of the Maine colleges, and would furnish something for sport fans to follow during the winter season which is at present a "dead issue" especially at Maine where there are no varsity sports in the winter with the exception of an occasional track meet.

DEBATING

For the past two months the debating organization of our University has been actively concerned with preparation for the debating season. That season is now upon us and we believe that a few words in retrospect would be in order.

The policy of the organization during past years was to show no class distinction as regards eligibility for varsity debating. This meant that a freshman was free to go out for varsity debating and equally free to make the team. This condition, naturally, resulted in the decline of freshmen on the debating squad, due to the fact that the upperclassmen had won the desired positions and the freshmen despairingly dropped off.

This condition has been remedied this year by freshman groups where the first year men have an opportunity to get training for later varsity work. The director of debate is to be complimented for creating the freshman groups.

President Boardman has directed instructors not to leave final examinations in departmental offices. Probably the "night brigade" will have some quiet evenings during the final examination period.

KENT REPORTS ON NEW YORK ATHLETIC MEETINGS

B. C. Kent, faculty manager of athletics at Maine, made the following report on the meeting of the Football coaches' association, National Collegiate Association, and the American Physical Directors:

The attendance at all of the three meetings was the largest that they have ever had, and without doubt it was due much to the fact that members are striving to help one another rather than to keeping the various professions a closed corporation.

At the Football Coaches meeting the various coaches discussed the different types of plays both offensive and defensive. They were all very frank in their discussions, and explained their pet plays. It was particularly interesting to note the reference of the speakers to the report of the Carnegie Foundation on college athletics.

At the meeting of the Physical Directors' Association, much time was spent in the discussion of physical examinations and the part they should play in the educational program of the institutions. The report on the trend of gymnasium construction was particularly interesting and showed considerable change in the past decade.

At the meeting of the National Collegiate Association, the talk of Pres. George H. Vandebogart on relation of the junior college to intercollegiate athletics certainly showed to the various colleges and conferences a way in which the athlete who has competed in the junior college can be taken care of in the college. The talk of Frank P. Day, President of Union College, on the challenge of the Carnegie report was interesting, and caused a great deal of comment. Dr. Day suggested as a remedy, first, to do away with all gate receipts; second, to do away with paid coaches and use only alumni amateur coaches; third, require every student to buy his own athletic equipment; fourth, to organize various colleges in conferences and compete only with the members of the conference, thus the smaller colleges would not compete with the larger institutions.

It was brought out at the meeting that the relation between the A.A.U., American Olympic Association, I.C.A.A.A.A. and the National Collegiate Association were in much better shape than had been for a number of years past, which certainly was gratifying to all those interested in sports.

Fitting tribute was paid at the final session to Brigadier-General Palmer E. Pierce, retiring President of the National Collegiate Athletic Association, which was practically founded by him, and of which he has been President since 1907. The incoming president, Dr. Kennedy of Princeton, is a man well equipped to carry on the work started by General Pierce.

the competition, finished seventh in the 2-mile snowshoe race. This event was won by Whitten of Bates.
The last event of the competition was the spectacular ski jump. This was run off on the great Intervale hill where the Winter Olympics of 1932 are to be held. Davis and Sorensen, Maine's two entries in this event, were unable to make their skis travel fast enough over the soggy snow to place, although both men made jumps well over 100 feet in length. Ellingson of St. Olaf College, Minnesota, won this event with two beautiful long jumps.
Dartmouth college was the winner of the competition with 20½ points, while New Hampshire was a close second, only ½ point behind.
Of the three men who competed for Maine, the work of Leif Sorensen was especially noteworthy. Sorensen is a freshman, but he carried himself like a veteran in spite of the fact that he was suffering from the after-effects of a dislocated knee.
The next winter sports meet for the Outing Club's team comes on February 1. At this time Maine will meet the powerful Bates team at Maine. This event, the first of its kind to be held at Maine for several years, should prove of great interest, especially since the completion of the Outing Club's new 60-foot ski jump.
