Maine Bows To New Hampshire, 14-6, In Game Marked by Brilliant Play

Maine lost to New Hampshire last Saturday, 14-6, in one of the roughest and hardest fought games of the year. Maine outstruck New Hampshire on her own field, making fourteen first downs to her five. Poor punts, intercepted forward passes, and general breaks all worked in New Hampshire's favor, however, and enabled her to make the first touchdown after only four minutes of play. Eustis scored the touchdown and Slack kicked the goal.

Maine immediately tightened up, but a fumble soon put the ball back into the Wildcat's waiting paws. The Maine line held, however, and New Hampshire was forced to punt. The ball appeared to go offside, so Blocklinger let it roll; but the powers that be decided that the ball stay within bounds, and it stopped on the two-yard line. Maine punted badly, and New Hampshire had the ball in scoring position. Again, however, the powerful Maine line held, and the half ended without further scoring.

Maine came back strong in the second half and clicked off two first downs without much trouble, when New Hampshire intercepted a forward pass and started her second determined bid for a touchdown, with Eustis leading the parade. In three tries he advanced the ball 19 yards, and Lane added another 10 to put the ball on Maine's 11-yard line. Wood, slippery New Hampshire quarterback, nearly scored on a long end run, but was forced out by Blocklinger's scum foot from the final stripe. Maine then

held and received the ball, but Hagstrom blocked Blocklinger's punt, and New Hampshire recovered the ball on the 6-yard line. A fumble followed, however, and Sims recovered for Maine. Blocklinger did his best to punt Maine out of her dangerous position, but after Eustis had run the ball back 10 yards New Hampshire was still only 35 yards from her second touchdown. With Eustis carrying the ball, she made repeated gains on end runs and line plunges, and soon crossed the line for the second counter. Slack again kicked the goal.

Then came the fourth quarter, in which Maine settled down and played the brand of football which should eventually win for her the State Series. Starting from her own 28-yard stripe, the Pale Blue made the most brilliant march of the day in a flashing, furious attack that punched its way straight down the field

Last Saturday, a fighting Freshman football team held the undefeated Bridgton team to a 0-0 tie. It was a well and evenly played contest, in spite of the muddy condition of the field. Both teams played heads-up ball and as a result few fumbles were made.

Coach Jones must have instilled some fighting spirit into the players, because it was a rejuvenated Freshman team that took the field against Bridgton. A noticeable improvement was shown in the line and backfield play over that of the past week. Also, defensive and offensive play was much stronger. At least twice, by the use of a fine running attack, the team was in position to score and two times Bridgton was held from a score at their own goal line.

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Prescott Escapes With Minor Hurts As Auto Overtakes

Theodore W. Prescott, '33, escaped serious injury Monday evening when the car in which he was riding turned over in front of the Phi Gamma Delta House.

Prescott was returning from Orono shortly after ten o'clock and was about in front of the Pi Beta Phi cabin when the steering wheel of the car suddenly locked, causing the car to swerve suddenly across the road, heading for the ditch on the Phi Gamma Delta side of the road. The suddenness of the turn caused the car to turn over, after first throwing Prescott clear. Prescott landed on his back near the edge of the concrete some distance ahead of the car, which rolled over twice before leaving the road and crashing into a tree.

Slight cuts on the leg and wrist, and a badly bruised back were the extent of injuries obtained by Prescott. Following the accident he was taken into the Phi Gamma Delta House and given first aid treatment. Dr. Adams was called by members of the fraternity, and after an examination Prescott was allowed to be removed to the Sigma Nu House. He is a member of the Sigma Nu fraternity, and his home is in Island Falls.

Debaters To Consider Possibility Of Joining National Organization

The debating club met Monday with an attendance of seventeen. The meeting which was called to discuss the question, "Shall we petition a national forensic fraternity for membership," was opened by Mr. Bricker, and taken later by the president, Mr. Berry.

The two possibilities mentioned were Delta Sigma Rho and Pi Kappa Delta. Delta Sigma Rho is one of the oldest and strongest societies of its kind in the United States. It has chapters at Bates, Harvard and Yale and one was recently installed at Boston University. Pi Kappa Delta is even larger than Delta Sigma Rho, but its membership is composed mostly of schools very much like the University of Maine. It meets once every two years, holds tournaments, and selects a question which is practically standard for schools throughout the country. Each school which supports a chapter is expected to send at least two delegates.

The meeting was not one to discuss debating and no mention of the subject was made. Mr. Bricker read letters from the two societies. Delta Sigma Rho did not seem especially in favor of accepting this club as a chapter, while Pi Kappa Delta spoke well of the proposition. One member made the suggestion that if we could obtain membership in Delta Sigma Rho, in spite of the unwillingness, it would add to our prestige.

The meeting was finally adjourned until next Monday, at the same time and in the same place, when the question will be brought to a close. A good attendance is asked for, as this is an important matter in the future of the debating club.

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Maine Is Favored to Defeat Bates In Opening Game of State Series

Bornstein, Bates Star, Expected To Cause Maine Team Trouble. Calderwood To Start Game

Bates will not find pickings quite as easy as last year when they defeated Maine 6 to 0, that actually gave the Bobcats the State title. Looking back, it may be recalled that Maine rushed all over the field, failing to score only because of Bates' furious stands in its own territory.

With Maine seemingly much stronger this year, and Bates weaker, especially in the attack, the Bear should enter the fray the favorite. Dave Morey, Bates' coach, however, has a habit of concealing this and that until a critical moment, and it may be that Garnet's real power has not been thrown on the field.

At the moment, it appears that the Bobcat's only hope seems to lie in what it has behind its back. And even then, the power of the Maine attack, amply demonstrated even in Saturday's defeat, may bring it out in front at the finish.

There is some indication that Maine will trounce the Lewiston group in the scores of the Rhode Island game of last Saturday when Bates lost 13-0 and that of two weeks previous when the Orono lads turned back the visitors 13-12 in a nip and tuck tussle. But scores are not certain indicators.

Bunny Bornstein is the Bates backfield threat. The boy is a good runner and line plunger and ought to provide some hair-raisers should he get the chance to break away as in the Bates-Norwich encounter when the diminutive back eluded the entire Norwich team on a criss-cross play to run 55 yards to his opponents' four-yard line, which paved the way for the lone score.

Garcelon and Farrell, halfbacks, bear watching. Valecinti is quite a good man at kicking the pigskin about.

For the Maine team, things look good. Brice hopes to be able to put in his whole strength. Up to the present game he has not found it desirable to show the real strength of his team, but promises a great spectacle for the stands, Saturday.

Calderwood, who was in for only ten minutes in the New Hampshire game, is expected to start, at guard. Bagley, at quarterback, turned in a fine performance which will earn for him a starting

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Colby "Bloody Monday" Is Abolished by Council Of College Students

The following article from a Waterville paper may prove of interest in light of the fact that the Student Senate at Maine recently went on record as favoring the abolishing of the Bag Scrap.

The abolishment of the traditional "Bloody Monday" freshman initiation ceremonies, together with rules governing freshman-sophomore relations in the future, was made known in a statement from the Colby Student Council published in the Colby Echo Wednesday evening.

After stating that "Bloody Monday" is totally abolished as a tradition that has outworn its merits, the new regulations provide that in order to decide which is the superior class, either class may challenge the other to a flag rush, pushball contest, rope pull or similar contest. If the freshmen win two out of three such contests, the freshman rules, such as wearing the special caps, green ties, etc., will go off before Thanksgiving, otherwise they are to remain in force until the Christmas recess. All competition between the two classes is to take place on college property, the town being regarded as neutral ground.

Enforcement of the freshman rules shall remain as traditionally in the hands of the sophomores to be decision as to infringements is to be in the hands of a committee consisting of the presidents of the two classes and one other member of the Student Council. Appeal from such decisions may be made to the Student Council in full session.

Frosh Harriers Defeat Lee Academy. Osgood Wins in Thrilling Finish

The frosh cross-country team came through with a 39-20 victory over Lee Academy last Saturday forenoon.

The race provided a thrill to onlookers when Osgood, of Lee, overtook Jackson, Maine yearling, in the last one-eighth of a mile of the three mile stretch, to grab first place for Lee. However, the following six men to pass the finish line bore Maine jerseys.

In spite of the rain and muddy course the winning time was 14 minutes and 37½ seconds, which is only 23 seconds slower than the time made by the varsity team last week on a dry course.

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Last year at the football games on Alumni Field, there was some confusion when people went to their seats and found them already occupied. This year, as a means of avoiding some of the mixup, Mr. Pierce of the Treasury Department has agreed to arrange for more ushers to be on hand at the games. If each person will make sure that he or she takes only the seats which he or she is entitled to, there will be room enough for all, because only a many tickets will be given out or sold as will be accommodated by the bleachers. With a larger force of ushers and some co-operation on the part of the student body, there will be no difficulty in getting one's rightful seat.

The Student Senate recently adopted rules for rushing and pledging of freshmen. That these rules are being violated in spirit if not in letter is too well known to need stating. Part of the reason for these violations lies in the difficulty of making a clear-cut definition of just what constitutes rushing or pledging. Some fraternities adopt the view that as long as a prospective pledge is not given a pledge button he is not being pledged. So we find that freshmen are being given the promise that they will receive bids next February. This, while not strictly classifiable as pledging, is certainly a violation of the rules regarding rushing. Some claim that once one fraternity adopts the practice of promising bids, the others must follow suit, otherwise they will be out of luck when the date of pledging rolls around. So it comes about that all the fraternities are conniving at a deliberate breaking of the rules. The freshmen can do their part toward remedying the situation. If freshmen invited to a fraternity house for dinner would remember that they cannot be pledged before February 17, 1931, and that any attempt to line them up before that date is illegal, they would perhaps feel resentment at the practice. The best policy for freshmen, it would seem, is to avoid until February 17 all commitments and agreements to take a pledge pin. There is a period of over three months before any pins can lawfully be given out and if a freshman promises to take a pin he is acting against his own best interests. One of the chief reasons for the delaying of pledging is that the freshmen may have a better chance to judge the merits of the various houses for themselves and in that way, to reduce the possibility of a choice that they might later regret. Viewed in this light, freshmen may see that they are acting unwisely in allowing themselves to be lined up at this early stage of the game.

With the constant expansion of the University an advance in tuition rates is perfectly logical, yet it would seem that the justice of the move is somewhat questionable from one aspect.

Every student not registered last semester is affected by the increase, whether or not he has previously attended the University. Bertrand Russell has stated that tradition is the enemy of progress. This has a direct bearing upon the pressing situation in our college,—the Freshman Rules.

We are all well aware of the fact that no one needs more help and sympathy than the immature members of every incoming class. The Freshman Rules are most successfully accomplishing the opposite result. We of the upper classes are indirectly challenging the Frosh to break the laws established by our fore-runners. The Freshmen are dared until one, a little bolder than the rest, takes the step and then he is chastised in a way hardly becoming of an educational institution. Working upon the hypothesis that the learned people are the product of the college we find something is amiss. The form of punishment recently bestowed upon one of the class of 1934 is more becoming to the punishment of a criminal member of a tribe of, let us say,

Zulus. To spend one fourth of one's college life in its initiation is not an entirely logical procedure. Furthermore, such an initiation is entirely unnecessary among so large a group of young men and women whose primary object is to study and study hard. But still tradition is here and it is hard to break, but eventually the step will be taken so why wait? Picture for yourself to what extent civilization would have progressed if man had always clung so tenaciously to his first simple-minded customs. We should all be proverbial cave-men roaming the dense forests in search of food.

Other colleges have abolished the Freshman Rules in their entirety. Outstanding among them is Dartmouth College. It would be a great step forward if the University of Maine added itself to this evergrowing group. Let me urge the university authorities to take the necessary steps toward the abolishment of the unpopular Freshman Regulations.

Book Review

"Elfin" by S. Fowler Wright
Those who have read "Deluge", that strangely fascinating story of the modern world flooded for forty days and forty nights as in the time of Noah, and "The World Below," an equally odd book, will be interested to learn that S. Fowler Wright has recently published his third volume and that it is as good as its predecessors. It is entitled "Elfin", and as its name suggests, is a story of Anglo-Saxon England.

Wright has a marked tendency toward the fantastic, but in "Elfin" the plot seems somewhat more plausible than in the others. In his latest novel he selects the beautiful, wilful granddaughter of Alfred the Great for his heroine. She is looked upon as the guiding light of the Saxons and is expected to save them from the Danes, but despite her patriotism she falls in love with a Danish prince. They are parted for a time but at last the Viking leader, Thorkeld, reunites them and they sail away over the sea to the west aboard the great Thorkeld's ship.

It is a vivid, vigorous tale which is sure to interest many.

MAQUA REGIONAL HOLDS CONFERENCE

Last week-end the Maqua Regional Conference was held at Cedar Hill, Waltham, Mass. This is the first time that 18 New England schools have been recognized as a branch of the National Student Council. Miss Lemoine did a splendid piece of work as its chairman.

The first session started Saturday morning with a talk by Miss Zeigler of Wellesley College on the National Executive meeting. Miss Zeigler is president of the Council of Christian Associations. Starting from here many interesting problems of New England campuses were plunged into. Considerable interest was aroused on the industrial situation, each local association being urged to do some definite piece of work and put serious thought on the industrial conditions as they exist about them.

Means by which each council member could work more closely with those schools not having a direct representative on council and methods for building up a regional or Maqua "consciousness" were proposed. One method adopted was that of having a "News-Letter" which will be circulated to all colleges or universities in this region. A second method suggested was to have the chairman of the Council visit as many schools as possible.

It was decided also that most New England schools lack considerably by having no contacts with foreign students. The policy of having one or two foreign students visit campuses and lead informal discussions was also suggested. The Maine campus is fortunate in having as its local Y.W. head the council chairman of New England. The Y.W. members should co-operate wholeheartedly and receive the new and progressive ideas as something not only to hear but to tackle.

PROF. BROWN OF YALE SPEAKS AT CHAPEL

At the Monday meeting of chapel Professor Walter E. Brown of Yale University spoke on "The Place of Religion in Education." In his remarks Dr. Brown said:

"Education without religion will give learning but not wisdom. A man may know all the mechanics of a trade, all the machinery of business but without inspiration he will always be commonplace.
