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Colvin Hall Opened To Visitors; Girls Act As Hostesses

The new dormitory was opened up to visitors last Thursday afternoon and evening. The hours in the afternoon were from two to four-thirty and about seventy-five students and out-of-town guests were received. The hours in the evening were from seven to nine. Teachers from Bangor, the faculty, and President Boardman were cordially welcomed. About two hundred and fifty guests, in all, were entertained. The guests were met at the door by the girls, acting as hostesses. They were then taken to the receiving line which was made up of Dr. Colvin, Mrs. Sullivan, and the house president, Mary Gallaher. From there they were taken through the hall, from the kitchen in the basement to the garret on the fourth floor, where the trunks are stacked. The reception rooms were daintily decorated with chrysanthemums, and nearly all the girls' rooms contained cut flowers. The guests, on their way back, visited the dining room where punch and fancy cookies were served. There were many favorable comments on the color schemes which different girls have worked out in their rooms. Many of the alumnae declared that such a beautiful home for girls, as Colvin is, was not even dreamed of when they were students. One man chanced to be visiting the campus on the afternoon of the 23rd, noticed the new building, stopped and inquired what it was. He was immediately invited in to the house-warming. After he had been there a few minutes the girls found that he had graduated from the University of Maine twenty years ago.

Hebron and Pennell Win In Respective Divisions Of Interscholastic Run

Pennell Institute captured first place in competition with the thirteen other schools entered in the high school division of the University of Maine Interscholastic Cross Country Meet. Sawyer, captain of the Pennell Institute harriers, set the pace from the start, and ran a remarkable race throughout the entire three miles to cross the finish line first, with a time of fourteen minutes and thirty seconds, despite the muddy course. Sherwood, of Houlton, came in second, while Williamson copped third place for Winterport. Pennell Institute led with a score of 70 and one half, Caribou came second with 94 and one half, while Deerfield High scored a close third with a total of 96 and one half points.

The other entrants were Houlton, Brewer, Winterport, Island Falls, Crosby High, Sherman, A.C.I., Stetson, Cony High, and Lawrence High School.

Hebron easily took first place with 29 points in the prep school division, although Osgood, of Lee Academy, grabbed first place—the second time he has crossed the finish line on Alumni Field first in two weeks. Lee came second with 59 points, and Kents Hill came third with a score of 65. Winstons of Hebron placed second, and Foster of Kents Hill took third. Osgood's time was 14 minutes, 40 and 2-5 seconds, 10 2-5 seconds longer than the winning time of the high school division.

There were 105 men entered in the high school division, and 27 men represented the three prep schools entered. The judges at the finish were: Prof. L. S. Corbett, Mr. F. S. Youngs, Mr. A. K. Gardner, E. B. Brooks, and R. E. Austin.

Without a doubt, a dry field would have changed the aspect considerably for the four State teams. Colby seems to have benefited by Bowdoin's inability to take to the air route and to send the fleet-footed Sid Foster on some of those hair-raisers which thrilled the spectators at Brunswick in previous encounters. Maine was in the same boat as the Polar Bears and were unable to row thru the veritable sea of mud.

Colby will rule the favorite this Saturday when they journey to Orono, by virtue of their win over Bowdoin, which was probably the hardest game on the White Mule's schedule. Colby is fortunate in having a team composed of all veterans who have been under fire in many games. With the return of Walter Lovett and Arthur Howard, the Colby backfield power will be considerably improved.

In last Saturday's game with Bates, Maine was not able to demonstrate its open attack, which perplexed Jimmy Connellan, Waterville scout, in more than one way. Up in the press box Jimmy was noticed by your correspondent busily sketching out Maine plays, but was quite peeved when he was not able to get a line on some aerial maneuvers.

Coach Brice plans to use some of his lighter halfbacks this Saturday, should things break a little for Maine. The Orono team has no really fast backs that can stand up against a strong attack. Milt Sims and Jack Moran, although heavy, are of the slower type. Walter

Varsity Harriers To Run Bates In Contest Friday

The University of Maine cross-country team meets Bates in a dual meet here Friday. With the loss through graduation of Harry Richardson and Francis Lindsay, who tied for the United States intercollegiate championship last year, the Stein Songsters will have to step hard to beat the Bobcats. Bates has a perfect score victory over Northeastern, while Maine has won from the Connecticut Aggies 19-42.

Eugene Brooks and Everett Gunning were recently elected co-captains. Brooks is one of the grittiest hill and dalers to wear the pale blue of Maine. An operation for appendicitis hampered his running last year, but he has improved this season and ought to finish up front. Gunning and Harry Booth, individual stars on the last two freshman packs, seem to be the fleetest of the varsity candidates.

Steven Mank, a veteran of two seasons, but who stayed out of school last year, is back in togs and should give the leaders a good run. Robert Pendleton, a rangy sophomore, finished sixth against Connecticut, and judging by the improvement he has shown in the past few days, he may better his position. James Fuller and Ronald Austin, two consistent pluggers, were both in the scoring of every meet last year.

In the Lewiston camp, veterans seem to predominate the picture. Seasoned runners who have seen quite a good deal of competition include: Captain Wallace Viles, Russell Chapman, Wendall Hayes.

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Frosh Gridders Defeat Higgins Institute 26-0; 80-yd. Run By Sinclair

The Freshman football team defeated Higgins Classical Institute 26-0, here, on Friday afternoon in a game marked by loose play. Due to the muddy condition of the field, fumbles were frequent. Although outweighing their opponents twenty pounds to a man, the Frosh line allowed the light Higgins backs to slip thru the line for large gains. In the first half, the entire Freshman play was noticeably inferior to that of last week.

The greatest part of the first half of the game was dominated by Higgins' offensive play. On two different occasions the Institute team was on the way for a touchdown, but lost their chances by untimely fumbles. Berry, the Higgins quarterback, seemed to be able to gain at will through the left side of the Frosh line. In the last half of the second period the Freshmen took possession of the ball and took it down to the Higgins goal line. Higgins stubbornly held for three downs, but on the fourth, Favor carried the ball over for the first score. Forward passes from Favor to Heald and Searles paved the way to the touchdown.

The second half was featured by the type of football that the Frosh team is capable of. Soon after the opening of the half a second score was put over and the point kicked by Favor. Higgins was unable to gain through the line and resorted to passes. The third touchdown was scored by Sinclair, who intercepted a long Higgins pass on his own twenty yard line and ran the length of the field for a touchdown. In the last quarter substitutions were frequent the entire Frosh squad being at some time in the game. A Higgins fumble led to the final touchdown which was scored by Favor.

Davis and Marsons in the line, and Favor, Searles, and Sinclair in the backfield looked good for the Frosh. Berry was the most consistent ground gainer for Higgins, while Archer at tackle featured the defensive play.

Weston To Be Chief Speaker On "Maine Night" Program

Fogler Is To Award Alumni Service Emblem. Bonfire To Follow Rally

Prof. Charles P. Weston, head of the department of Mechanics at the University of Maine, a graduate of the class of 1896, is to be the chief speaker at Maine Night which is to be held in the Indoor Field at the University, Friday evening at 7:30. Dean L. S. Corbett, chairman of the committee, also announced that the Senior Skulls were arranging a big bonfire to take place at the conclusion of the formal program.

Professor Weston is widely known among students and alumni alike. Although he has spoken before students and alumni many times, his wit, humor and natural ability as a speaker makes him always welcome on any program.

For many years it has been customary to have a big bonfire on Maine Night. At first the student members of the committee felt doubtful about continuing this feature but found upon asking students that the sentiment was strong for the fire, so the Senior Skulls are making arrangements.

The program is as follows: Beginning at 7:20 the band of eighty pieces will play a few marches, and at 7:30 the speaking program starts. Dean Corbett, chairman of Maine Night committee will introduce President H. S. Boardman '95 as presiding officer. Margaret Burrill '32 will be the first speaker, this being the second year the girls of the University have been represented on the program. Others who are to speak are—Linwood Cheney '31, coach of football, Fred Brice; Chester A. Jenkins, coach of cross-country and co-captains of cross-country, George Brooks and Everett Gunning.

Raymond H. Fogler '15, president of the General Alumni Association is to award the Alumni Service Emblem to an alumnus who has rendered outstanding service in alumni and University work.

Ermo Scott '31 of Bangor will lead the singing and "Sam" Savage '31 of Wells will handle the cheering, with the band contributing occasional numbers. The program will conclude with the singing of the Stein Song.

Student Senate Defines Rushing

At the meeting of the Student Senate Tuesday night, the Interfraternity rushing and pledging rules received much attention. Most of the difficulty encountered lay in formulating a satisfactory definition of pledging. It was finally decided that the houses were to be permitted to promise bids to freshmen at any time but that no pledge pins could be given out before 5 p.m., Feb. 17, 1931. It was further decided that if a fraternity extends the promise of a bid, and the freshman accepts, the promise is not binding upon either party. The freshman may retract his promise any time before Feb. 17, and he will suffer no penalty. Various minor changes were suggested and will be returned to the houses for final approval.

The matter of the election of freshman class officers also came up for discussion. Gerry, chairman of the committee appointed to draw up recommendations, reported his findings. It was decided that the proctors in the dorms should settle on the means of election, and will, in the near future, call a compulsory meeting of freshmen to explain the regulations to them.

President Boardman spoke to the Senate for a few moments. He stated that from the weak body which had formerly been, the Senate had grown into a powerful organization, which plays a major role in student affairs. He expressed his pleasure at the opportunity the Senate offers for contact between the Administration and the students. President and Mrs. Boardman extended to the Senate an invitation to dinner at their home on Dec. 9.

A drinking fountain was installed Friday in the main corridor of Alumni Hall. The fountain is made of white porcelain, and presents a very neat appearance.

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Touch Football

Alpha Tau Omega won its second game in the touch football series by defeating Phi Eta 6-0 in a thrilling game. The score came as a result of a blocked punt and a long forward pass by A.T.O. Both teams displayed a good passing attack. By winning this game and by drawing a bye A.T.O. reaches the semi-finals.

Kappa Sigma also won its second game in downing S.A.E. by a score of 6-0. The Kappa Sigma team scored in the second quarter of the game by intercepting a forward pass and carrying the ball forty yards for a touchdown. Kappa Sigma showed a good passing combination as contrasted with a weak one of the S.A.E.

Later on in the week Sigma Nu will oppose Kappa Sigma, while Lambda Chi will play Phi Gam for the right to compete in the semi-finals.

UNIVERSITY OF MAINE

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For the last thirty years, Maine Night has been a feature of the Fall season at this University, comparable in many ways to the place that Home-Coming Day occupies in many other universities throughout the country. The night before the last home football game has been reserved for Maine Night since the days when the University consisted of a few scattered buildings. Alumni, if they come back at all, usually try to come back for Maine Night. Regardless of the weather, there has always been a good turnout for the meeting. The meeting is frankly a "pep" meeting, held for the purpose of stirring up "enthusiasm" for the football game of the following day. Amid the numerous useless customs with which the students of this University are burdened, this custom is conspicuous by its significance, and it is one which deserves the support of the whole student body.

Tuesday night, the Student Senate, after much discussion, arrived at something like a definite understanding as to just what is permitted under the pledging rules. As the matter now stands, a fraternity may do everything but give a freshman a pledge pin and still be within the rules of the Interfraternity Council. It must be remembered, however, that if a fraternity promises to give a man a bid in February, and the man promises to accept a bid at that time, neither party to the agreement is bound to carry it out until after February 17, 1931. After that date, a freshman who breaks a pledge cannot be offered another bid until a year has elapsed. This definition will remove from the fraternities the stigma of underhanded methods of rushing and pledging, and if for no other reason, is to be commended.

Some comment has been heard on the campus, during the past week, concerning the leaving of some members of the band at the half of the Bates game. This departure might have been warranted if a similar action had been taken by the members of the Bates organization. The action was unsportsmanlike, and the members of the Bates band must have felt some resentment at the lack of courtesy of the Maine bandmen who left early. Also, to those in the Bates stand it was probably a depressing example of lack of college spirit. The discomfort of the band is but a small thing, if by enduring that discomfort, the band can increase the respect of outsiders for Maine Spirit. A little forethought on the part of Maine students will avert any recurrence of this episode.

BOOK REVIEW

"Emily" by MacGregor Jenkins
"Emily" by MacGregor Jenkins is a new book which has just recently appeared about the life of one of the most interesting personages of the American literary world. Emily Dickinson, "the recluse poet," is gaining in popularity as the years pass. She was little understood even by those who knew her, but with the assistance of several good biographies and studies, which have appeared fairly recently, she no longer remains a mere shadow in the literary past.

Jenkins' new book is a novel and not a biography. He has built a charming love story about Emily's friendship with the minister, Robert Hayward. The story is told from the latter's viewpoint, thus giving us the picture of Emily thru the eyes of a lover. Hayward, who was already happily married, saw the beautiful young woman in his congregation one Sunday morning, and in her eyes he read the solution to the problem which had troubled his soul for many years.

Emily goes to him in his study, and they both realize that the only thing possible for them to do is to renounce their love.

It is a plaintive, wistful tale—after reading some of Emily Dickinson's poems you realize that the author has drawn the heroine of "Emily" remarkably true to what the real woman must have been.

SUMMER SCHOOL BOOK-LETS SENT OUT

Dr. Roy M. Peterson, Director of the University Summer Session, has been sending six thousand copies of an attractive folder to prospective students outside the State of Maine. This folder stresses the advantage of the climate at the University in the summer, by means of comparative temperatures. In the form of a table on this folder, the temperatures of Orono and a dozen cities in the eastern part of the country are shown. During the period of the 1930 session, the thermometer at Orono never went as high as 90 degrees. The average maximum temperature was 79.3 degrees; the average minimum, 51.4 degrees. The slogan of this folder is, "Come to Maine to study." A folder somewhat similar has been sent by mail or distributed at the recent Teachers' Convention to the teachers of Maine. The slogan of this folder is, "Remain in Maine to study."

MAINE MASQUE

The Maine Masque plans to present four plays during the year. These plays will be a revival of the Old English theatre classics.

The first play to be presented is the comedy "She Stoops to Conquer" by Oliver Goldsmith. This play is probably one of the best comedies in the English language.

The principal characters will be Francis Ricker as Mr. Hardcastle and his daughter, Miss Hardcastle, portrayed by Myrilla Guilfoil. John Longly will take the part of the young lover. The role of Tony Lumpkin will be played by Merton Berry. The rest of the cast has not been definitely decided upon as yet. Announcements of the date of the play will be printed in a subsequent issue.

STUDENT-FACULTY CONFERENCE TO MEET IN DETROIT

Much interest is being aroused on campus in the regard to the National Student-Faculty Conference to be held December 27-31 inclusive, in Detroit, Michigan at the Book-Cadillac Hotel.

Several meetings have been called here for discussion of the conference, and one was recently held at Lucerne to consider the delegates to be sent from Maine. Only six people can be chosen, and they may be men or women, students or faculty members.

This is one of the first national conferences of its kind ever held, and colleges from all over the country will send their best representatives.

The purpose of the Conference is to bring about more effective sharing on a national scale of thought, conviction, and experience. While certain themes of major importance will be dealt with, there will also be a daily series of sectional meetings for the delegates to consider more thoroughly such matters as:

1. The administrative policy at college, and the effect of the relationship between trustees and faculty; faculty, alumni and students, and of student government on the development of character and responsibility;
2. Educational system and the bearing of class room technique, exams, system of grading on the actual development of the individual;
3. Social and organized life of the campus;
4. Moral standards;
5. Social attitudes and responsibilities in regard to such questions as racial and international relations, industrial and social conditions;
6. Vocational guidance.

There will also be special group meetings for the discussion of religion in regard to college life.

This conference will offer opportunity for gathering together of all those who have the most experience and insight to share, and some of the most competent men and women of the country have agreed to guide the various discussions.

Its chief purpose is to facilitate consultation between the leaders of all religious groups in the various colleges and universities of the country, and the conference is attracting much attention among students and faculty members.

Dr. Uphaus is in charge of the conference.

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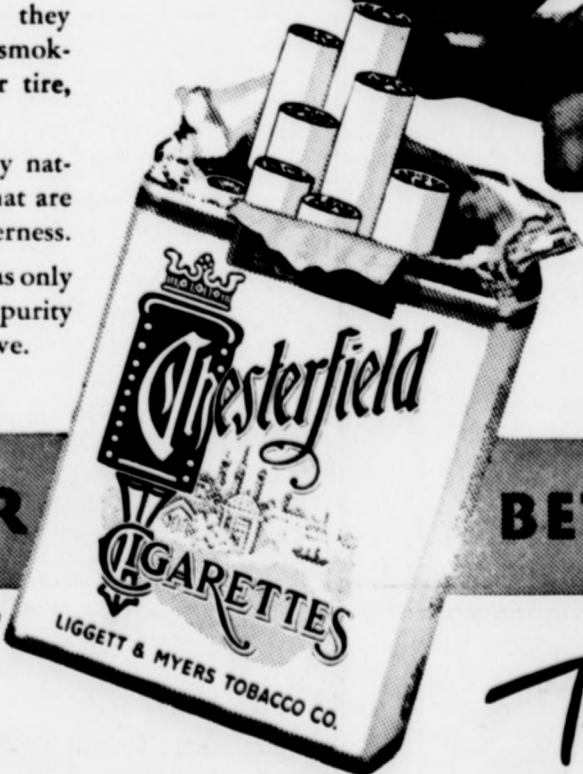
