MCA Plans Annual Membership Campaign

Drive Starts First Week Of October

The annual membership drive of the Maine Christian Association which is planned for the first week in October will get under way Sunday evening with a rally in the M.C.A. building at 7:00 p.m. for all members of the committee working in the drive. The membership drive will be under the leadership of Dorothy MacLeod and John Cullinan, who will be assisted by representatives from each fraternity and dormitory.

English Geneticist Speaks Here Oct. 2

Dr. R. Ruggles Gates, noted English geneticist, will speak on "Present Aspects of Human Genetics" on Thursday, October 2, in 15 Coburn Hall at 8:00 p.m.

Dr. Gates is recognized as a leading authority on human inheritance and at present is lecturing throughout the United States. Students and the general public are invited to attend the meeting.

University Receives Portrait Of Lieut. Col. Albert Stevens

A portrait of Lieut. Col. Albert W. Stevens, Army Air Corps, whose stratosphere flight to 72,395 feet set a world's record in 1935, and a graduate of the University of Maine in 1907, has been presented to his alma mater, it was announced from the office of President Arthur A. Hauck here today. The painting, the work of John Hilliard, well-known Boston portraitist, will hang in the University library.

Exhibited in New York

The portrait, which shows the altitude record holder in uniform, seated, against a deep blue background "suggested by the color of the stratosphere as described by Lt. Col. Stevens" according to the artist, has been exhibited at the members' annual exhibition of the National Arts Club of New York City and at the Annual Jordan Marsh Co. exhibit in Boston.

Mr. Hilliard, who has been vice president of the Boston Art Club and member of the Copley Society of Boston and the Rockport Art Association, has often painted university and academic figures, portraits by him being hung in the halls of Boston University and Boston College among others.

Lieut. Col. Stevens achievement in aviation, in aerial photography, and in exploration has been recognized by a series of high awards. In 1929 he was given the Mackay trophy for the outstanding Air Corps achievement of the year. In 1934 he was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross after his first stratosphere flight, to which were added an Oak Leaf Clusters two years later, following his world's record flight.

The National Geographic Society has twice honored him, bestowing on him the Burr prize for accomplishments in the technical field of aerial photography and the Hubbard medal for outstanding achievement in geographical research and exploration.

His "firsts" include: pictures from 27,000 feet of the eclipse of the sun showing the shadow on the earth; pictures showing the curvature of the earth's surface; pictures showing objects 300 miles distant, not observable with the naked eye; and pictures taken at 36,000 to 72,000 feet. His explorations have ranged from 1,000-mile "mushes" by dog sled in Alaska to flights of 12,000 miles over the Brazilian jungle.

Maine Masque Opens Season Ticket Drive

Group Considers Presentation Of Outstanding Plays

The annual season ticket campaign of the Maine Masque Theatre got underway today under the direction of Ruth Towne, ticket manager. One of the largest first-day ticket sales was expected because of the unusually heavy demand earlier this week.

As has been the custom in the past, the Maine Masque Theatre expects to offer another season of entertainment directed again by Herschel L. Bricker, who is recognized as one of the outstanding men in the country in his field.

Among the plays being considered for production this year are "Family Portrait," by Lenore Coffee and William Cowen, and "Jim Dandy," by William Saroyan, award winner of the Dramatic Critic Circle. The latter play will be presented all over the country simultaneously by the National Theatre Conference members.

Another play, the title of which has not yet been selected, by William Green, president of the National Theatre Conference and Pulitzer Prize winner, is under consideration. The Masque also plans to produce another Shakespearean play this year. Among those being considered are "Romeo and Juliet," "Twelfth Night," "Richard II," and "Taming of the Shrew."

At a meeting last night in the Little Theatre, the ticket campaign was inaugurated by Maynard French, president, who said that a good number of tickets had already been sold.

195 University Students Now Have NYA Employment

At the end of the first week of school, the college work program of NYA, under the direction of the Placement Bureau, has a total of 170 student workers already at work, with 25 others assigned to start immediately, it was announced today by Mr. Philip J. Brockway, the Placement Director.

With appropriated funds to the colleges and universities throughout the country cut about 25% this year, this number will undoubtedly be the largest number of workers that can be appointed.

450 Applications Received

Throughout the summer months, the Placement Bureau was busy receiving applications of persons desiring employment, with a final total of 450 applications received for the 200 appointments available. A notification of acceptance was sent to as many of these workers as the appropriation provided for, as the selection was made.

When registration was completed,

the final statistics of NYA employment were: upperclassmen, 148; freshmen, 47; making a total of 195 NYA workers at the university.

In addition, a waiting list of nearly 100 names has been established to fill vacancies occurring by withdrawal or some other means.

135 Campus Projects

Work for NYA students is provided by 135 projects on the campus, covering offices, laboratories, buildings, equipment, and services throughout the university.

General details of the NYA project will be mostly unchanged this year, with a maximum of \$15 per month available for most students. This is equivalent to 50 hours of work. At the same time, an average minimum of \$10 will be required of workers. The only new procedure of importance is that of keeping monthly time records in a new form, which each worker will be required to fill out on the final working day of each month, which this year has been set as the 27th.

Frosh Shows Hasty Hello

Apparently there is one member of the class of 1945 who finds the Maine "hello" a rather tedious custom, for according to authoritative sources this person has worked out a special technique of his own for handling the matter.

It seems that, spying a long line of upperclassmen moving in his direction (around noon it happened), this freshman, constantly gathering speed as he travelled, rushed the entire length of the line—a distance of at least a hundred yards.

Large Number Class Of 1941 Are Employed

Many In Defense Work; All Tech Grads Working

Mainly as a result of national defense efforts, a large part of the class of 1941 has found employment since graduation, according to a statement made by Philip Brockway, Placement Director of the University.

The best record was made by graduates from the college of technology, which showed 100% placement. The engineers have gone into all fields of industry, although a large number are connected directly with defense or with secondary industries, such as machine tools, paper, construction, and chemicals.

The college of arts and sciences does not have such a large percentage employed, but it has had the best year for placement since 1930.

Opportunities in Agriculture

Agricultural fields are especially good in comparison to recent years. Agricultural teaching opportunities as well as other fields of education have been on the upgrade. This has been attributed to several factors, including the drafting of numerous men teachers with their subsequent replacement by women, and the wider field of opportunity given to women as a result of the defense program.

Increased income in some families has also enabled the wife to give up her teaching job. All this has created a shortage of teachers and leaves many opportunities in this field for graduates.

In Mr. Brockway's opinion this year will probably be a banner year, barring any unforeseen events of great scope. Requests for information as to future graduates have been received all ready, which is earlier than they have ever been received before.

Hell Week Activity Set For Oct. 13-18

Hell Week, annual period of informal fraternity initiations, will be held from October 13-18 this fall, it was decided at a meeting of the Interfraternity Council Tuesday evening.

The rules governing the conduct of Hell Week are substantially the same as those in force last year. Initiation activities are prohibited on the campus and must be confined solely to the fraternity houses.

Representative of the fifteen campus fraternities were in attendance at the meeting, which was conducted by Laurence Downes, president of the Interfraternity Council.

Helen Deering Heads Home Economics Club

Helen Deering and Julia Robbins have been elected president and vice president, respectively, of the Home Economics Club, it was announced this week. Mildred Wooster was named secretary and treasurer, and Mary McConnell was elected social chairman.

Maine-N. H. Technical Men Here Tomorrow

Noted Chemist To Address TAPPI Meeting

Prof. Furnas of Yale To Speak at Dinner Here Tomorrow

Prof. C. C. Furnas, associate professor of chemical engineering at Yale University and author of scientific and of best-selling books on science for laymen, will speak on "The Storehouse of Civilization" Friday night at the dinner of the joint meeting of the Maine section of the American Chemical Society and of the Maine-New Hampshire section of the Technical Association of the Pulp and Paper Industry which are convening at the University of Maine on the occasion of the dedication of the new wing of Aubert Hall.

In the field of scientific writing, Prof. Furnas has contributed many articles and bulletins on technical subjects to scientific journals and has had popular articles in many magazines. His series of books on the future of scientific developments and their relations to living have won a wide audience. Among them have been "America's Tomorrow," "The Next Hundred Years," "Man, Bread, and Destiny," and "The Storehouse of Civilization."

Born in Indiana in 1900, he attended Purdue University, where he was Big Ten champion in the cross country and 2-mile track events, and in 1920 was a member of the United States Olympic team which competed at Antwerp. He now keeps in condition climbing mountains.

He took his Ph.D. in chemical engineering at the University of Michigan. Then as a physical chemist with the United States Bureau of Mines, he worked at the Minneapolis Experiment Station for five years, being particularly interested in blast furnaces. He has been consultant in chemical engineering and metallurgy to industrial concerns.

Prof. Furnas is a member of the American Institute of Chemical Engineers, American Chemical Society, Sigma Xi, Tau Beta Pi, and Phi Lambda Upsilon.

Frosh Parents Day Planned For Oct. 1

Parents of the class of 1945 will have a chance to see their sons and daughters participating in classroom and campus curricula when the fifth annual Parents' Day takes place here on Saturday, October 11.

Among the events of the day will be the Maine-New Hampshire football game and varsity cross country meet. The freshman cross country team will compete against the combined high school teams of Hopedale, Presque Isle, Winter Harbor, and Freedom, and a special military review will be given by the military department.

Registration Drops Slightly

At the latest reckoning, as of this morning, fall registration here at the University was set at 1,957, it was announced at the office of the registrar today.

In view of the unsettled conditions, this figure is considered very good, Registrar James A. Gannett said. Drops in enrollment at other colleges have been proportionately much larger, he added.

This year's total is smaller than last fall's all-time high of 2,100 by about 150.

To Dedicate New Wing Of Aubert Friday

The University of Maine will play host to members of the Maine-New Hampshire Section of the Technical Association of the Pulp and Paper Industry, as well as the Maine Section of the American Chemical Society, on the occasion of the formal dedication of the new chemical engineering building tomorrow and Saturday.

The dedication will be held on the east lawn of the new building at 4:30 tomorrow, and the speakers will be Edward E. Chase, president of the Board of Trustees, and Paul Cloke, dean of the College of Technology.

Group Will Hear Papers

Friday's program will be divided equally between the members of the Maine-New Hampshire TAPPI and the Maine Section of the American Chemical Society. Registration of both groups and inspection of the building will take place between 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. in the lobby of Aubert Hall. At 2:30 the pulp and paper men will meet in Room 362 of the new building, where a meeting presided over by W. E. Brawn of the Peapack Paper Company will hear two papers presented.

The first, by William J. Nolan, associate professor of chemical engineering at the University, will cover "Pulp and Paper Applications of Chemical Engineering Research at the University of Maine." This will be followed by "Forest Resources for Pulp and Paper," to be given by Dwight B. Demeritt, professor of forestry here.

Speakers from Bowdoin, Colby
At the same time, in Room 305 of the old building, the American Chemical Society group, presided over by Frederick Martin of the University's chemistry staff, will hear A. Frank Ross, associate biochemist at the University, speak on "Chemical Studies on Stem End Browning of Potatoes,"

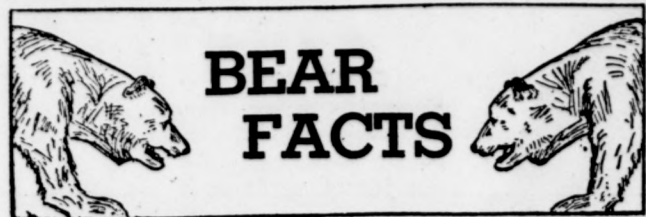

JUNE 15: Briggs Field, M.I.T., New England A.A.U. Track and Field Championships—Dick Morcum won the pole vault at 13' 7 3/4", the high jump at 6' 3", and took second in the broad jump with a leap of 22' 8". Ed Styrna took the javelin with 180' plus and the hammer with 175' 5 1/2". Bob Carroll the 880, and brother Bill the mile. JUNE 27: Walt Reed, Jr., University sophomore, won the Maine Junior Golf Championship today at the Portland Country Club. Runner-up was Ray Lebel of Lewiston; last year the final was just reverse. On July 9 Walt won the amateur title in the New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island Golf Tourney with a two-day total of 156.

JULY 10: Bob Dunbar in the Boston Herald: "Rhode Island State football won't be the same this fall without dynamic Frank Keane coaching the colorful Rams..." We shall see! On Saturday! Last week Coast Guard won its opener by a 38-0 score over Rhody. Assistant Coach Bill Beck has moved up to Frank's position; Bill was a star at Everett High when Keane coached the Red and Blue. Despite a lack of poundage, he was rated as one of the most courageous players ever developed in that section.

JULY 19: The Boston Braves' Lewiston Baseball School under Danny McFayden (he attended my old alma mater, Hebron, where he played baseball and later returned to coach the hockey team during his off seasons with the Braves) and Jeff Jones closed its doors with the naming of an All-Star team of likely prospects. At first base was Sanford's Bob Nutter, Maine '44. On that same day Joe Manzo, tackle, became the first of the Sugar Bowl Boston College team to be called to the colors.

JULY 23: Coach J. O. Christian and staff started laying plans for the University of Connecticut fall gridiron campaign; the Nutmeggers face Maine on October 18 at Storrs. The team—minus four star backs but still strong behind the line; weak at the tackle posts.

JULY 31: Al Grenda—remember him? Well, on March 28, Al was the dark horse candidate for the position left vacant by Al McCoy at Colby. Today he signed as frosh football coach with Manhattan after six years as assistant line coach at his alma mater—Columbia. (More next week)

BLACKS vs. BLUES

SECOND PERIOD: Time is running short. Jack Reitz of the Whites fades back for a pass; the ball travels upfield to Dick Burrill. But in comes Emile King on the midfield stripe to snatch the ball out of the air and tear down the sidelines for the first score of the day and six points for the Blue forces. Phil Pierce did a good job at the muck with Jack Buck acting as spotter. Best laugh: a freshman minus coat and hat (part of the time), and on the grass, playing football with the President of the Senior Skulls at the half.

Martinez, Estabrooke, Moody, and Ingraham Report To Jenkins

The initial time-trial for varsity cross country runners will be held over the short freshman course, a mile and three-quarters long, on Saturday afternoon, Coach Chester A. Jenkins announced this week.

Four of last year's State Champions are back this year, Dick Martinez, Dwight Moody, and Leo Estabrooke, juniors, and Mark Ingraham, a senior. Also back is Phil Hamm, who was lost to the squad last fall after suffering an injury in the New Hampshire dual meet.

Graduation Takes Two

Lost by graduation are veterans Howie Ehrenbach and Ken Blaisdell, while Art Farris left school last February. Striving to take over the positions left vacant by these men are two seniors, three juniors, and seven sophomores, including six of the seven who went to the Nationals last year as freshmen.

Fred Kelso and Irwin Higgins are both seniors, and Higgins in particular stands a good chance of making the team this year. Walt Brady, John Stewart, Stan Frost, and Bill Hadlock are the juniors. Brady, the best all-around track man in the University, is another who stands a good chance of winning a position.

The sophomores out for the team are Ken Johnson, John Stanley, Henry Condon, Ray Atwood, Manley Brackett, Al Crockett, and Doug Cowan.

Lt. Lask Issues First Call For Rifle Team

On Friday, September 19, Coach Walter M. Lask, 1st Lieutenant, Coast Artillery, issued the first call for the University of Maine's Rifle Team and asked that all of last year's team report to him immediately. 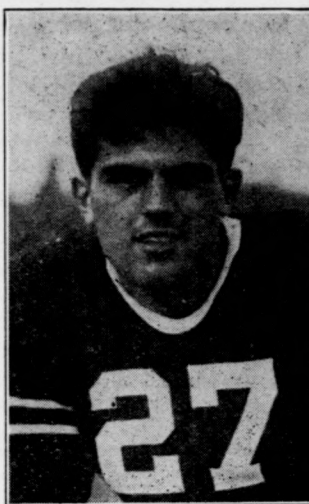

Information Men Needed For Defense Work

Have Many Openings For Good Paying Governmental Jobs

Information specialists are needed by the government in connection with every phase of national defense activity. Publications of all kinds must be prepared for special interest groups and for the general public, and interpretative radio broadcasts written and put on the air. To these jobs, and many others, war, agriculture, interior, the office for emergency management, and other agencies assign their information specialists.

To fill these positions, the Civil Service Commission has just announced an examination for information specialists in press and publications, and in radio. There are over one hundred jobs to be filled in the various government agencies with salaries ranging from \$2,600 to \$4,600 a year.

Eligibles on the employment list established last year as a result of the information specialist examination need not take this new examination unless they have acquired additional experience and wish to apply for a higher grade, as their names will be retained on the current register.

Experienced Persons Needed

Persons with general experience in press and publications, or radio work, are needed, as well as persons with publicity experience in such specialized fields as: Foreign news reporting or editing, aeronautics, public health, conservation, economics, mining, agriculture, and engineering.

To qualify for the press and publications option, applicants are required to have responsible professional experience in writing or editing for a large newspaper, national magazine, news or information service, or governmental agency. For the radio option, experience is required in educational or informational radio work, including the preparation of radio manuscript and the broadcasting of radio programs.

For all the positions, applicants may substitute study in a residence educational institution above high-school grade for part of the experience. No written test will be given but applicants will be rated on their education, experience, and corroborative evidence. In connection with the radio option, a voice test may be required of eligibles.

Applications must be on file with the Commission's Washington office not later than October 23, 1941. Further information about the examination and application forms may be obtained from the Commission's representative at any first- or second-class post office or from the central office in Washington, D. C.

CAA Flying Course To Begin Shortly

Primary and advanced flying courses offered under the Civil Aeronautics Authority are scheduled to begin shortly, according to an announcement by Harry D. Watson, head of the department of mechanical engineering, yesterday.

Prof. Watson, aeronautics supervisor at the University of Maine, requested that all students interested in taking C.A.A. courses contact him immediately.

These courses have been offered at the University for the past few years in co-operation with the Civil Aeronautics Authority and may lead to private and commercial pilot ratings.

The instruction is open to juniors and seniors passing the physical examination and certain other requirements. A charge of \$40 is made for the course. The program includes ground work here at the University and flying instruction at the Bangor airport.

Noiseless Submarines Under Investigation

COLUMBUS, Ohio—(ACP)—Possibility of locating "noiseless" submarines by a meteorite detector designed by Ohio State University educators is under investigation by Canadian and American sources.

The detector's importance increased following German claims of underwater craft with sound-proofed engines which would destroy the usefulness of standard hydrophones for locating submarines.

Designed and perfected by Prof. Lincoln La Paz, Ohio State mathematician, the detector has been used in the last two years to search for meteorites buried in the earth.

Loan Pictures Ready On or After Oct. 1

About fifty framed pictures which are on exhibition in the University Art Gallery will be available to students who wish to borrow them on or after October 1, according to an announcement by Prof. John Huddleston. Applications for these should be left with the gallery attendants in South Stevens or with Prof. Huddleston.

Owing to a call for thirty pictures for a high school event in Auburn, that number will not be available for loan to students until about November 20. The new course in American Painting also makes it necessary to keep the entire number of American color reproductions on exhibition for the present semester.

Over one hundred pictures are now hung in the "American Gallery," including several well-known originals by Waldo Pierce and Mrs. Pierce, natives of Bangor.

Maine Chem Students Show High Averages

Students in introductory work in general chemistry in the colleges of technology and of arts and sciences at the University of Maine scored as high or higher than their fellow students in 138 other American colleges, according to W. E. Tomlin, instructor in chemistry and chemical engineering, who has analyzed the results of the students in his course in the co-operative chemistry test conducted last spring by the American Council on Education.

More than 7,000 students took part in the test. The average student in the University of Maine exceeded, on a percentile basis, 75 per cent of all the students who took the test. The average mean score for the country was 76.1 points, and the Maine men scored on an average 90.7 points.

Students spend 21,000 hours a year standing in line during registration periods. (ACP)

Oxnam Flays Totalitarianism

The United States, in carrying its share of the burden of reconstruction after this war, must think in terms of the world, declared G. Bromley Oxnam, resident bishop of the Boston area, the Methodist Church, speaking at the opening convocation last Thursday in the Memorial Gymnasium.

"Democracy is a world idea and it cannot exist in the same world with totalitarian slavery," he said. "After the bomber comes the builder, who must build a just and durable world. We must remove the fears of a future insecurity from the minds of the workers of the world, the fear of technological displacement and unemployment."

Chase Also Speaker

Also speaking on the opening assembly program was Edward E. Chase, of Portland, president of the board of trustees of the University. Mr. Chase declared that Americans should face facts with determination, with a sense of personal responsibility, and with consciousness of the importance of individual effort.

"Social situations," he said, "have their sources in general attitudes and points of view, and the optimism of the United States is the prime cause of the present mess."

Pres. Arthur A. Hauck presided at the convocation and read a brief message from the President concerning the importance of the college and university in the present world crisis.
